

Government of India celebrates 21st April every year as Civil Services Day which provides civil servants a platform for introspection, exchange of experiences and discussions on common concerns. This day coincides with the date on which Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel had addressed the first batch of probationers at the All India Administrative Service Training School at Metcalfe House, New Delhi in 1947.

2. The 9th Civil Services Day 2015 is being organized on 20-21st April 2015 in Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi. The Hon'ble Prime Minister of India is expected to grace the occasion. A copy of the tentative programme is attached.

3. Unlike earlier years, this year the programme is being organized over two days. As a precursor to the main event, discussions on four themes (details enclosed) is organized in which participants from the Government, private sector and experts would share their thoughts and experiences.
