

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PLAN OF ACTION FOR THE YEAR 2026

INTRODUCTION: The experience has been that the National Plan of Action has helped not only to streamline the activities of the Legal Services Institutions but also to step-up its pursuits. Though much remains to be done, but it can't be denied that the legal Services activities have expanded manifold and has most certainly shifted from the conventional legal aid in the Courts, to assistance in access to justice. All this has happened on account of the NALSA's various Schemes, including Legal Services to Disaster Victims through Legal Services Authorities, Scheme of Para Legal Volunteers (PLVs) and the NALSA's (Legal Aid Clinics) Scheme, 2010. Setting up of legal literacy clubs in Schools and Colleges has helped in not only encouraging the students to inculcate legal and constitutional temper but also contributed to the society by bringing to the notice of the Authorities concerned, of any violation of legal rights or avoidance of duties. With the setting up of ADR Centers there is a need to strengthen the ADR mechanism and streamline activities in the ADR Centers. However, people approaching the courts for redressal of their rights is a healthy trend and must be encouraged. Therefore, the legal assistance rendered in the Courts must be upgraded in terms of quality. To provide qualitative and competent legal services in criminal matters to all eligible persons and to manage and implement legal aid system in professional manner in criminal matters, Ladakh Legal Services Authority has established Legal Aid Defense Counsel in both the districts. These Legal Aid Defense Counsel Office shall be dealing exclusively with legal aided matters in criminal matters, wherein it is established. It shall be providing legal services from the early stages of criminal justice till appellate stage, and the same shall include visits to jails from catering to the legal needs of unrepresented inmates. In order to

spread the awareness and facilitate the eligible beneficiaries in availing free legal services, the Ladakh Legal Services Authority, in collaboration with the other concerned department is intending to increase the outreach of legal services to the eligible categories specially the villagers and underprivileged residing in rural and far-flung areas of the U.T of Ladakh. The people approaching the offices shall not only be made aware of their rights and entitlements but also, the personal present at these offices shall facilitate access to justice to the eligible persons with the help of available technologic tools.

**Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Justice Awareness for
Grassroots Information and Transparency Initiative (JAGRITI)
(JAGRITI), 2025**

The NALSA JAGRITI Scheme, 2025 is a flagship legal awareness and empowerment programme launched by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) to strengthen justice awareness at the grassroots level across India. Under the full title "Justice Awareness for Grassroots Information and Transparency Initiative (JAGRITI)", the scheme is designed to inform and educate citizens—especially in rural and vulnerable communities about their legal rights, entitlements, and mechanisms for accessing justice. It focuses on spreading legal literacy, promoting transparency in legal processes, and increasing public engagement with legal aid services and redressal pathways through activities such as legal literacy camps and interactive outreach conducted by State and District Legal Services Authorities. By fostering an informed citizenry, JAGRITI supports NALSA's broader mission of making justice accessible, understandable, and actionable for all sections of society.

Objective:

The main objective of the NALSA JAGRITI Scheme, 2025 is to enhance legal awareness and promote transparency in justice processes at the grassroots level by educating ordinary citizens—particularly in rural and vulnerable communities about their constitutional rights, legal entitlements, and mechanisms for accessing justice. The scheme aims to strengthen public understanding of laws and legal remedies through interactive legal literacy camps, outreach programmes, and information dissemination, thereby empowering people to navigate legal systems confidently and seek redressal for their grievances. By fostering justice-centric awareness and transparency, JAGRITI supports NALSA's broader mission of making justice accessible, understandable, and actionable for all sections of society.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Strengthening Access to Justice for Marginalized, Vulnerable Adivasis and Denotified/Nomadic Tribes (SAMVAD), 2025.

The NALSA SAMVAD Scheme, 2025 is a targeted legal services initiative launched by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) to enhance access to justice for historically marginalized and vulnerable communities, particularly Adivasis (tribal groups) and Denotified and Nomadic Tribes across India. SAMVAD focuses on addressing the systemic barriers these communities face in obtaining legal information, protection of rights, and legal redressal mechanisms. By organizing legal awareness and empowerment camps, offering referral and helpline support, and strengthening outreach through State and District Legal Services Authorities, the scheme aims to bring legal knowledge and assistance closer to grassroots populations, helping them assert their constitutional and statutory rights effectively.

Objective:

The primary objective of the NALSA SAMVAD Scheme, 2025 is to strengthen access to justice for historically marginalized and vulnerable tribal and nomadic communities by addressing the social, linguistic, and informational barriers that often prevent them from effectively asserting their legal rights. The Scheme seeks to *raise legal awareness, empower communities through grassroots outreach, and provide targeted support such as legal aid camps, referral services, and helpline assistance*, enabling Adivasis and Denotified/Nomadic Tribes to better understand and utilise justice mechanisms available to them. By focusing on community-driven engagement and sensitization, SAMVAD aims to bridge the gap between constitutional safeguards and their realization on the ground, ensuring equitable and

meaningful access to justice for these disadvantaged groups

Implementation of the NALSA Scheme, Victims of Trafficking Commercial Sexual Exploitation, 2015.

Victims of trafficking for Commercial Sexual exploitation face a great deal of trauma not just following such trafficking but also after their rescue. They need to be protected against the traffickers who would want them to come back or not pursue their case. There are also livelihood issues and if available alternative is not given, chances of being re-trafficked are high. The Ladakh Legal Services Authority intends to take following steps for implementation of the Scheme in the U.T of Ladakh.

- a) Provide legal assistance to the victims of trafficking and sexual exploitation at the time of rescue and thereafter during trial.
- b) Facilitate the accessing of the District Legal Services Authorities for award of Victim Compensation.
- c) To monitor and act as social auditors of the existing facilities available for rehabilitation of rescued victims of Sexual exploitation and trafficking.
- d) To organize awareness camps in the Community through the panel lawyers and Para-legal volunteers about the issues of trafficking particularly in vulnerable areas and among vulnerable groups.
- e) To ensure that the DLSAs can act as converging nodes so that the government Schemes meant for the marginalized actually reach them and such access to the government support does have a positive impact in preventing trafficking and falling prey to traffickers.

Encourage ADR methods of Lok - Adalat, Mediation, Conciliation and Plea-Bargaining.

There must be an emphasis on spreading awareness in the community about the various ADR methods and the benefits of non-adjudicatory methods of dispute resolution. Lok Adalats, Mediation, Conciliation and Plea-bargaining must be made familiar to the community at large. Thus, not only civil matters but also compoundable criminal cases and matrimonial disputes could be disposed off and to extent the burden with the courts could be reduced. People should be encouraged to adopt the ADR methods before coming to the court even at the pre- litigation Mediation stage, by reference to the Lok Adalat or Conciliation. In this regard Ladakh Legal Services Authority intends to organize awareness camps to encourage people to resort

to reconciliatory methods of adjudication.

Strengthening of the Para-Legal Volunteers Scheme through enhanced training and monitoring.

In the previous years, a number of Para- Legal Volunteers (PLVs) have been trained. However, fresh trainings will need to be imparted to make the PLVs more effective in their work. Strict monitoring of their activities is the need of the hour. At the same time mentoring and hand-holding would be necessary, if the PLVs have to establish themselves within the community as sources of help and solace to the community. The Ladakh Legal Services Authority intends to organize training programmes for PLVs at District headquarters to sanitize the PLVs about their role in spreading legal awareness in the U.T of Ladakh about the marginalized groups.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme on Drug Awareness and Wellness Navigation for a Drug-Free India (DAWN), 2025.

The NALSA DAWN Scheme (Drug Awareness and Wellness Navigation – for a Drug-Free India), 2025 is an initiative launched under the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) aimed at combating the growing problem of drug abuse and its legal and social consequences in India. This scheme focuses on creating awareness about the dangers of drug addiction, providing wellness navigation support, and facilitating access to legal aid, counselling, and rehabilitation services for individuals and families affected by substance abuse. Through partnerships with State and District Legal Services Authorities (SLSAs/DLSAs), DAWN promotes outreach programmes, community sensitization, and legal empowerment to support vulnerable groups and contribute to building a drug-free society by combining preventive education with legal and social support systems

Objective:

The primary objective of the NALSA DAWN Scheme, 2025 is to combat drug abuse and promote a drug-free society by combining awareness, legal empowerment, and wellness support. It seeks to educate the public – especially youth, families, and vulnerable communities about the harmful effects of drugs and the legal consequences of substance abuse, thereby preventing addiction and its social impacts. The scheme also aims to provide guidance on accessing legal aid, counselling, rehabilitation, and support services for individuals and families affected by drug use, helping them navigate both legal challenges and pathways to recovery. Through outreach programmes and campaigns organized by Legal Services Authorities at

various levels, DAWN works to foster community awareness, wellness navigation, and proactive engagement to build resilience against drug dependency and its consequences.

Ladakh Victim Assistance Scheme, 2022.

The victim compensation scheme launched by the Administration of Union Territory of Ladakh, for providing compensation to the victim or their dependents who has suffered loss or injury as a result of the offence committed and who require rehabilitation. As per the scheme, the Ladakh Legal Services Authority shall sanction the compensation after recommendation is made by the Court for compensation or the application made to the concerned District Legal Services Authority, the concerned authority in deserving cases may initiate preliminary verification of facts for the purpose of grant of compensation to the victim taking into consideration the factors related to the loss or injury suffered by the victim. Ladakh Legal Services Authority intends to hold awareness camps at District and Tehsil level to aware the general public about the existence of the scheme so that all the deserving victims are compensated.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Veer Parivar Sahayata Yojana, 2025

The NALSA Veer Parivar Sahayata Yojana, 2025 is a nationwide legal aid initiative launched by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) on 26 July 2025, coinciding with Kargil Vijay Diwas. The scheme, inaugurated under the leadership of Justice Surya Kant, Executive Chairman of NALSA, aims to strengthen and expand free legal assistance for serving and retired defence personnel, Central Armed Police Forces members, and their families. It ensures access to competent legal advice, representation, and support for a wide range of civil, criminal, service-related, and welfare matters, helping those defending the nation resolve disputes and protect their rights without legal burden or delay. The programme is implemented through Legal Services Clinics established at district, state, and central levels often linked with Sainik Boards to make justice easily reachable for defence families across India.

Objective:

the primary objective of the NALSA Veer Parivar Sahayata Yojana, 2025 is to ensure accessible and timely justice for serving and retired defence



personnel, Central Armed Police Forces members, and their families by providing them with free and competent legal assistance. The scheme aims to address the unique legal challenges these individuals face—such as civil disputes, family matters, service-related issues, and other legal hurdles—that arise due to frequent relocations, remote postings, and limited availability for court proceedings. By establishing a dedicated network of legal services clinics linked with Sainik Boards, deploying trained legal aid counselors and paralegal volunteers, and integrating digital tools like e-Lok Adalats and online mediation, the initiative seeks to uphold the constitutional promise of equal access to justice under Article 39A, safeguard the dignity and rights of defence families, and expedite the resolution of their legal matters with compassion and efficiency.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Access to Justice for Victims of Human-Wildlife Conflict, 2025.

The NALSA Scheme on Access to Justice for Victims of Human-Wildlife Conflict, 2025 is a pioneering initiative launched by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) to provide legal support and justice to individuals and communities affected by conflicts between humans and wildlife. These conflicts—such as attacks on people, loss of life, injury, or damage to property and crops—have increased due to expanding human settlements and shrinking wildlife habitats, disproportionately impacting vulnerable groups like farmers, tribal communities and migrant workers.

Under the scheme, victims of human-wildlife conflict are entitled to free legal aid, assistance with compensation claims, and speedy redressal mechanisms, ensuring they can effectively access justice. The initiative also promotes awareness of legal rights, encourages inter-departmental coordination, and supports comprehensive rehabilitation including documentation, insurance facilitation and other entitlements that victims may need.

Objective:

The main objectives of the NALSA Scheme on Access to Justice for Victims of Human-Wildlife Conflict, 2025 are to ensure that individuals and communities affected by human-wildlife clashes receive effective legal support and justice, especially those from vulnerable sections such as farmers, tribal groups, women, and children. The scheme aims to provide free and competent legal aid, assist victims in claiming compensation and entitlements, and secure timely redressal of their grievances through appropriate legal mechanisms. It also seeks to raise awareness about legal

rights and remedies available to such victims, facilitate rehabilitation support (such as insurance and psychological assistance), and promote coordination between legal services authorities and government departments to ensure comprehensive support. Ultimately, the scheme reinforces the constitutional guarantee of justice and protection of life and livelihood for those impacted by human-wildlife conflict.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Child-Friendly Legal Services for Children, 2025.

The NALSA (Child-Friendly Legal Services for Children) Scheme, 2025 is a specialized initiative under the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) aimed at ensuring accessible, sensitive, and effective legal assistance for children in India. Building upon earlier frameworks, the Scheme focuses on providing age-appropriate and child-centric legal services to children, including those with disabilities or in vulnerable situations, across all stages of legal proceedings. It seeks to empower children with knowledge of their legal rights and entitlements, offer expert legal representation, and create a child-sensitive justice environment that respects their best interests. The Scheme also mandates outreach, awareness, and capacity-building efforts to strengthen institutional support and community engagement in protecting children's rights within the justice system.

Objective:

The primary objectives of the NALSA (Child-Friendly Legal Services for Children) Scheme, 2025 are to ensure that children, including those with disabilities, have access to age-appropriate, competent, and child-sensitive legal services at all stages of civil, criminal, and administrative proceedings. The Scheme aims to create a child-friendly justice environment that protects children's best interests, encourages them to participate in legal processes, and respects their voices. It also seeks to build a specialized workforce of trained panel lawyers and para-legal volunteers who can provide trauma-informed, gender-responsive legal aid, and to conduct community outreach and awareness programmes to educate children, families, and communities about children's legal rights, entitlements, and remedies. These objectives collectively strengthen the legal support ecosystem for children and uphold their rights within the justice system.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Legal Services to Senior Citizens. 2016.

A Person of the age of 60 years or above is regarded as Senior Citizen. Despite the existence of various legal provisions and schemes for Senior Citizens, the benefits of the schemes have reached to very few Senior Citizens. Often the senior citizens are unaware of their entitlements and or they are in too destitute a condition to be able to access the said benefits. They are not only deprived of their properties but also subjected to all forms of abuse ripping them of their dignity as well. For the widows, who are senior citizens or for the retired senior citizens, it often becomes a herculean task to get their pension and other benefits. The laws and the schemes lay down the entitlements of the senior citizens and if the senior citizens have any difficulty in availing their entitlements under the laws and the schemes, it is felt by NALSA that Legal Services Institutions have a significant role to play in ensuring access to the benefits of the schemes and the legal provisions to the Senior Citizens.

Implementation of the NALSA, Scheme, Legal Services to Persons with Mental Illness and Persons with Intellectual Disabilities, 2024.

The NALSA LSUM Scheme (Legal Services to Persons with Mental Illness and Persons with Intellectual Disabilities), 2024 is a central legal aid initiative under the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) aimed at enhancing access to justice for one of the most vulnerable segments of society. Launched in 2024, the scheme focuses on providing specialized free legal services to persons with mental illnesses and those with intellectual disabilities, recognizing the unique challenges they face in navigating the legal system. Under this scheme, Legal Services Units called "Manonyay" (LSUM) are established at the district level to offer tailored legal assistance, outreach services, and support for enforcing statutory rights, ensuring that individuals with such disabilities can effectively protect their legal interests and receive equitable treatment within civil, administrative, and criminal legal processes.

Objective:

The primary objective of the NALSA, Legal Services to Persons with Mental Illness and Persons with Intellectual Disabilities (LSUM) Scheme, 2024 is to ensure effective access to justice for persons with mental illness and persons with intellectual disabilities by providing specialized and responsive legal aid tailored to their unique needs. The scheme aims to make legal services accessible in all civil, administrative, criminal, and related matters,

addressing the legal and social challenges faced by these vulnerable groups. It also seeks to establish dedicated legal services units (Manonyay) in every district with trained lawyers and para-legal volunteers who understand their specific requirements, protect their legal rights, and help them avail entitlements under welfare schemes and disability benefits. Through community outreach, awareness programmes, and personalised legal support, the scheme works to promote equal access to justice and inclusion in the legal system for persons with mental illnesses and intellectual disabilities.
