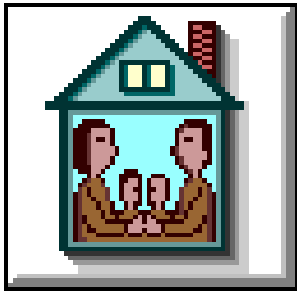
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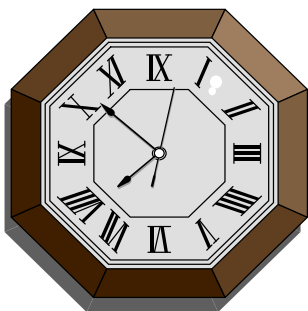
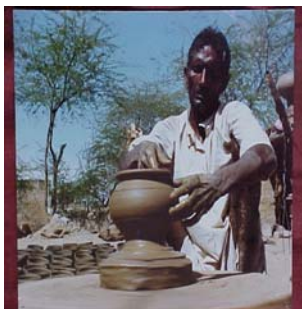
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## PREFACE

The present report on “Employment and Unemployment situation in Haryana” is brought out by Department of Economic and Statistical Analysis, Haryana on the basis of sample survey conducted under the 64<sup>th</sup> NSS (2007-08) round in respect of State sample.

This report is based on the State sample data collected from 2390 households selected in the 143 villages and 96 urban blocks in Haryana. The information was collected by officials of subordinate offices (District Statistical Offices) of DES. The sample design, definitions and estimation procedure provided by NSSO, have been used in the survey/report. I am thankful to the National Sample Survey Office, Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation, Government of India for providing detailed guidelines and assistance in table generation work on the basis of which this report has been prepared.

This report gives information about valuable data on labour force, work force and unemployment in Haryana. Labour participation rates –sex-wise, sector-wise, activity-wise, details about the unemployed lot in terms of qualification, gender was also given in the report. The report also contains demographic characteristics.

I place on record my appreciation for the officers/officials associated with NSS work whose concerted efforts made it possible to collect the data from the field against all odds and tabulate the data. I also place on record my thanks to Shri Manoj Kumar Goel, Deputy Director and Shri R.S. Bhatia, Research Officer, who analyzed the NSS data exhaustively.

Last but not least, credit also goes to all respondents of households and enterprises, who provided the desired information to the field staff patiently during the survey.

I hope the publication will prove useful to the diverse set of users in their respective fields and will come up to the requirements and expectations. This report is placed on the Department Website also which can be accessed at [www.esaharyana.gov.in](http://www.esaharyana.gov.in).

## HIGHLIGHTS

This report is based on the 64<sup>th</sup> round survey on employment and unemployment and migration particulars conducted during July, 2007 to June, 2008. The survey covered a sample of 2390 households (1430 in rural areas and 960 in urban areas) and a sample of 11244 persons (6972 in rural areas and 4272 in urban areas). Employment and unemployment rates were measured in three different approaches viz, usual status (us) with a reference period of one year, current weekly status (cws) with a one-week reference period and current daily status (cds) based on the daily activity perused during each day of the reference week. Unless otherwise stated, 'all' usual status workers will mean all workers taking into consideration the usual principal and subsidiary status taken together (ps+ss). Some of the key findings are stated below:

### A. Household and Population Characteristics

- About 70% of the households belonged to rural Haryana and accounted for nearly 72% of the total population.
- Average household size in Haryana was 4.9. The rural household size (5.0) was slightly higher than urban household size (4.5).
- The population in the age group 15-59 years, which is defined to be economically active, comprised about 66% of males and 71% of females in rural areas and about 67% of males and 73% of females in urban areas.

### B. Labour Force and Work Force

- According to the usual status (ps+ss), 30% of population belonged to the labour force. This proportion was 30% for rural and 28% for urban areas. The labour force participation rate (LFPR) was about 50% of rural males and 7% of rural females belonged to the labour force. The corresponding proportions in the urban areas were 49% and 3% respectively.
- About 29% of the population were employed according to usual status (ps+ss). The worker population ratio (WPR) was about 30% in the rural areas and 27% in the urban areas.
- The male WPR in both the rural and urban areas were considerably higher than female WPR. In both the rural and urban areas, male WPR was nearly 48%. Compared to this, the female WPR was 7% in rural areas and 3% in urban areas.
- WPR in Haryana, was 28% as per current daily status, 29% according to current weekly status, and it was 29% according to usual status.
- Self-employment status was dominant for both males and females in rural area. In rural, more than half of the usually employed ('all' workers) were self employed – 60% among males and 69% among females. The corresponding figures in urban were 60% for males and 32% for females.
- The percentage of regular wage/salaried employees to work force was relatively lower among females as compared to males in the rural areas. The proportion of regular wage/salaried persons was 10% for males and 4% for females in the rural areas, whereas in urban areas, these figures were 27% and 58% respectively.
- The share of the casual labourers in total workforce was much higher in the rural areas than in the urban areas. In the rural areas, 30% of male workers and 26% of female workers were casual labourers. In urban areas, 13% of male workers and 10% of female workers were casual labourers.

- In rural, among the usually employed (ps+ss) about 61% of males and 79% of females were engaged in agriculture sector. Whereas in urban areas, these figures were 4% and 17% respectively.
- With regards to the education level, 81% rural males and 79% urban males of the education level 'illiterate' for age 15 and above were in working.
- Among the total working persons for age 15 and above, the educational status of 48% in rural and 29% in urban areas was either illiterate or up to primary.

### C. Unemployment rate

- Unemployment rate was 3% in both current daily status (cds) and current weekly status (cws) approach and 2% in the usual status approach, i.e., in usual (adj.).
- According to usual status (ps+ss), the unemployment rate (Number of persons unemployed per 1000 persons in labour force) was 19 in rural areas and 38 in the urban areas. The unemployment rate for females was lower than males in rural areas, where as it was higher in urban areas.
- In the rural areas, generally, the female unemployment rate was lower than the male unemployment rate, in all the approaches of measurement, but this trend was reverse in the case of urban areas.
- In the rural areas, female unemployment rate stood at 2% in cds compared to 3% for males while in the urban areas, female unemployment rate in the cds was nearly 13% which was 9 % higher compared to male unemployment rate.

## CHAPTER – 1

### INTRODUCTION

Employment is the burning issue in our country where population is very high. In order to have an idea about employment and unemployment situation, which will be helpful for manpower generation and planning purposes, the National Sample Survey Office (NSSO) has conducted a number of surveys on employment and unemployment to assess the volume and structure of employment and unemployment, starting from the 9<sup>th</sup> round (May-September, 1955). Based on concepts and definitions recommended by the Dantwala Committee, seven detailed surveys on employment and unemployment have been undertaken once in every five years in the 27<sup>th</sup> (October,1972-September,1973), 32<sup>nd</sup> (July,1977-June,1978), 38<sup>th</sup> (January-December,1983), 43<sup>rd</sup> (July, 1987-June,1988) 50<sup>th</sup> (July, 1993-June,1994), 55<sup>th</sup> (July, 1999 – June, 2000), and 61<sup>st</sup> (July, 2004 – June, 2005) rounds. Apart from these quinquennial surveys, NSSO has been regularly collecting information on certain key items on employment and unemployment, as a part of annual series from a smaller sample of households in each round since its 45<sup>th</sup> round (July, 1989-June, 1990) through the schedule on Household Consumer Expenditure (Schedule 1.0). In the annual rounds, ‘usual activity status’ and ‘current weekly activity status’ of the household members, along with the industry of work (at 2 digit level of NIC code) only were collected in the demographic block of the consumer expenditure schedule.

**1.2** A survey on the situation of employment and unemployment and migration particulars was carried out during NSS 64<sup>th</sup> round (July, 2007 to June, 2008). The collection of information on the employment and unemployment part of the schedule particulars was as a part of the annual series of the National Sample Survey Office which was started in NSS 60<sup>th</sup> round and repeated in NSS 62<sup>nd</sup> round. In this round, the scope of the survey on employment and unemployment was further widened with the collection of information on migration particulars of the households, of the household members and of the out-migrants. In this survey, an enquiry was conducted in a moderately large sample of households to provide estimates on various characteristics pertaining to employment and unemployment and migration.

**1.3 Sources of migration data:** Census of India is the single largest source of data on migration characteristics for the people of India. Various surveys conducted by NSSO are also the important sources of migration data. To assess the volume and structure of migration in India, NSSO, starting with the 9<sup>th</sup> round (May-August, 1955), conducted a number of surveys to collect data on migration as part of its employment and unemployment enquiries. In the 9<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> ( August, 1956 to January, 1957) and 12<sup>th</sup> rounds (March-August,1957) of survey, migration particulars were collected for the labour force population only. From the 13<sup>th</sup> round onwards, more detailed information on migration has been collected. In the 18<sup>th</sup> round, survey on migration was conducted on a much larger scale. In the NSS 28<sup>th</sup> round survey on birth, death, morbidity and disability, migration particulars of the usual members of the sample households were also collected. In the 38<sup>th</sup> round, collection of migration data was integrated with the regular quinquennial survey on employment and unemployment. The same approach was followed during the 49<sup>th</sup> round also. Data on migration was collected during the 49<sup>th</sup> round survey through the schedule 1.2 which had a comprehensive coverage including, inter-alia, housing condition and migration. In the sixth quinquennial survey on employment and unemployment during NSS 55<sup>th</sup> round information on migration particulars was collected for each household member of the sample household through the employment-unemployment schedule.



## **1.4 Scope of the present survey**

**1.4.1 Subject Coverage:** The 64<sup>th</sup> round (July 2007-June 2008) of NSS was earmarked for survey on 'Employment-Unemployment and Migration', 'Participation and Expenditure in Education' and 'Household Consumer Expenditure'. The present report is based on the data collected in this round in the state sample on the subject 'Employment-Unemployment and Migration'.

**1.4.2** As in the quinquennial round surveys, in the present survey also, data was collected on some characteristics, based on which, estimates of employment and unemployment, measured in terms of three basic approaches viz., usual status, current weekly status and current daily status can be obtained. The reference period for these approaches differ-it being 365 days preceding the date of survey for 'usual status', seven days preceding the date of survey for 'current weekly status' and each day of the seven days preceding the date of survey for 'current daily status'.

**1.4.3** Data was collected on the activity status of all persons, i.e. for workers, for those seeking or available for work and also for those who are out of labour force. A worker could be self-employed or enjoy regular salaries/wages or be employed on casual wage basis. Data on this aspect, along with the industry of work of the worker and his/her occupation, besides information on several correlates pertaining to it in order to reveal the multi-dimensional features of the employment-unemployment situation, was also gathered. In addition, probing questions were put to the persons who were unemployed on all the seven days preceding the date of survey in order to understand the numerical magnitude of new entrants into the job market and reasons for becoming unemployed for those who were ever employed.

**1.4.4** Regarding migration particulars, information was collected on household migration, out-migrants, migrants and seasonal short-term migrants. In the present survey, migration particulars of the households which have migrated to the place of enumeration during the last 365 days, such as location of last usual residence, pattern of migration and reason for migration, were collected. Particulars of out-migrants who migrated out to other village/town, from the household, any time in the past, such as present place of residence, reason for migration, period since leaving the household, whether presently engaged in any economic activity, whether sent remittances, number of times and amount of remittances sent during last 365 days were collected. Information on the use of remittances received by the households during last 365 days from the members who migrated out any time in the past was also collected. From each of the sample migrants, information on reason for migration, period elapsed since migration, location of last usual place of residence, usual activity pursued at the time of migration, whether a return migrant, etc., was collected. In this survey, to assess the short duration movements of the people, for the household members who had tayed away, during the last 365 days, for employment or in search of employment for a period of 30 days to 6 months, number of spells of duration of 15 days or more, destination for longest spell and industry of work, if worked were collected.

## **1.5 The survey outline**

**1.5.1 Method of data collection:** The survey used the recall-based interview method using a schedule for data collection from a sample of randomly selected households. The sample design on the basis of which the selection of households was made is stated in brief in the following sub-section.

**1.5.2 Period of survey and work programme:** The fieldwork of 64<sup>th</sup> round of NSSO started from 1<sup>st</sup> July,2007 and continued till 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2008. As usual, the survey period of this round was

divided into four sub-rounds of three months duration each to spread the survey workload uniformly. The sub-rounds were as follows:

## 1.6 Sampling design

**1.6.1 An outline of the sampling design:** A stratified multi-stage design was adopted for the 64<sup>th</sup> round survey. The first stage units (FSU) were the 2001 census villages in the rural sector and Urban Frame Survey (UFS) blocks in the urban sector. However, for the newly declared towns and out growths (OGs) in census 2001 for which UFS were not done, each individual town/OG was considered as an FSU. The ultimate stage units (USU) were the households in both the sectors. In case of large FSUs i.e. villages/towns/blocks requiring hamlet-group(hg)/sub-block (sb) formation, one intermediate stage was the selection of two hgs/sbs from each FSU.

**1.6.2 Sample Size – first stage units:** A total number of 240 samples termed as First Stage Units (FSUs) were allotted to Haryana State by NSSO, Govt. of India to conduct this survey. Out of this, 144 samples were allotted for rural areas and 96 samples were for urban areas.

**1.6.3 Sample Size – second stage units:** For Schedule 10.2, a sample of 10 households was planned for survey from each selected village and urban block. In Haryana State sample, households were actually surveyed - 1430 in rural areas and 960 in urban areas. As regards the actual number of persons surveyed, it was 6972 in the rural sector and 4272 in the urban sector.

**1.7** Chapter 2 sets out the concepts and definitions and some of the important procedures, followed in the Employment-Unemployment survey. The results obtained on Employment-Unemployment are discussed in Chapter 3. Appendix A gives detailed tables and Appendix B is a facsimile of the Employment-Unemployment and Migration schedule (Schedule 10.2) that was canvassed in the surveyed households.

## CHAPTER - 2

### CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

The concepts and definitions of some important terms used in the survey and which are relevant to this report viz., those used to generate the tables and estimates on household employment-unemployment are explained in this section.

#### **Household and related concepts**

**2.1 House:** Every structure, tent, shelter, etc., is a house irrespective of use. It may be used for residential or non-residential purpose or both or even may be vacant.

**2.2 Household:** A group of persons normally living together and taking food from common kitchen constitute a household. The word 'normally' means that temporary visitors are excluded but temporary stay-aways are included. Thus a son or daughter residing in hostel for studies is excluded from household of his/her parents, but a resident employee or resident servant or paying guest (but just not a tenant in the house) is included in the employers/host's household. 'Living together' is usually given more importance than 'sharing food from a common kitchen' in drawing the boundaries of a household. In case the two criteria are in conflict; however in special case of person taking food with his family but sleeping elsewhere (say, in shop or a different house) due to space shortage, the household formed by such person's family members is taken to include the person also. Each inmate of mess, hotel, boarding house, etc. is considered as single member household but a family living in a hotel is considered to be one household only; the same applies to residential staff of such establishments.

**2.3 Household Size:** The size of a household is the total number of persons in the household.

**2.4 Monthly per capita consumer expenditure:** For a households, this is the total consumer expenditure over all items divided by the household size and expressed on a per month ( 30 days) basis. A person's MPCE is understood as that of the household to which he or she belongs.

**2.4.1** In the present survey on employment-unemployment and Migration Particulars (schedule 10.2), data on consumption expenditure was collected through a separate work-sheet which was integrated with schedule 10.2. The work-sheet is an abridged version of the detailed schedule used for collecting information of household consumer expenditure in the consumer expenditure survey. The estimate of MPCE derived based on worksheet may not coverage to the corresponding estimates derived through main enquiry schedules of household consumer expenditure. The abridged work-sheet was used to reduce the respondent fatigue. Bsed on the abridged work-sheet, monthly per capita consumer expenditure was worked out for each sample household, which is expected to serve as a close proxy for income and facilities ordering the households and persons thereof in the hierarchy of their level of living.

**2.5 Decile classes of MPCE:** The first decile of the distribution of MPCE over the population of any region or domain is the level of MPCE below which 10% of the population lie, the second decile, the level below which 20% of the population lie, and so on. Thus the population can be divided in 10 "decile classes of MPCE" as follows: from zero MPCE to 1<sup>st</sup> decile of the MPCE distribution, from the 1<sup>st</sup> decile to the 2<sup>nd</sup> decile, from the 2<sup>nd</sup> decile to the 3<sup>rd</sup> decile, and so on. Averages of other variables of interest, computed separately for the 10 decile classes, help to portray the variation of such variables with variation in MPCE.

**2.6 Quintile classes of MPCE:** Similarly, the population of any region or domain can be divided into five quintile classes of MPCE, where the first quintile of the distribution of MPCE means the level of MPCE below which 20% of the population lie, the second quintile, the level below which 40% of the population lie, and so on. In this round quintiles are estimated separately for the distribution of MPCE in the rural and the urban sector.

**2.7 Educational level:** It refers to the different stages of educational attainment. It is the highest level a person has completed successfully. It may be noted that if a person has successfully

passed the final year of a given level, then and only then will he/ she be considered to have attained that level of education. For example, for a person studying in Class IX the educational level will be middle and not secondary.

**2.8 Level of current attendance:** It refers to the different stages of educational attainment also but in this case the current educational level where a student is pursuing his current education is to be considered. For example, the level of current attendance of a person studying in Class IX will be secondary.

**2.9 Literate:** A person is considered literate if he/she can read and write a simple message in at least one language with understanding.

**2.11 Nature of Institution:** This refers to whether the institution is recognized or not. A recognized school/ institution is one in which the course(s) of study followed is/ are prescribed or recognized by the Government or a university or a Board constituted by law or by any other agency authorized in this behalf by the central or state government. It also satisfies one or more of the authorities, e.g. Directorate of education, Municipal Board, Secondary Board, etc., with regard to its standard of efficiency. It runs regular classes and sends candidates for public examination, if any.

**2.12 Type of Institution:** This refers to the type of management by which the institution is run. It may be run by Government, a Local Body or a private body either receiving or not receiving government aid. Thus, the four types are: (a) Government, (b) Local Body, (c) Private aided and (d) Private unaided. All schools/ institutions run by central and state governments, public sector undertakings or autonomous organizations completely financed by the government are treated as government institutions. All institutions run by municipal corporations, municipal committees, notified area committees, zilla parishads, panchayat samitis, cantonment boards, etc., are treated as local body institutions. A private aided institution is one, which is run by an individual or a private organization and receives maintenance grant from a government or a local body. A private unaided institution is one, which is managed by an individual or a private organization and is not receiving maintenance grant either from a government or from a local body

**2.13 Medium of instruction:** It is the language used for the instruction in the course for which a student is enrolled. In case, more than one language are used while teaching different subjects then the language used for teaching largest number of subjects is to be treated as medium of instruction.

**2.14 Attendance and enrolment:** The current attendance status refers to whether a person is currently attending any educational institution or not. While every person, who is attending an educational institution, is necessarily enrolled in that institution, it may so happen that a person, who is enrolled is not currently attending the institution. While most of the official educational statistics are based on enrolment, the NSSO Survey, because of its household approach, bases its analysis on the current attendance status.

**2.15 Dropout/ Discontinuance:** An ever-enrolled student currently not pursuing the education may be due to either: (i) he/ she has discontinued after completing the last level of education for which he/ she was enrolled or (ii) he/ she has discontinued education before attaining a specific level. For the first category, for example, if a person has completed the middle level but does not enroll for the next higher level of education, he/ she is not considered as a dropout. It is considered as a case of discontinuation. However, if the person enrolls for the secondary level but does not complete it, then he/ she is considered a dropout. For this survey, dropouts and discontinuance will be treated alike.

**2.16 Economic activity:** The entire spectrum of human activity falls into two categories: economic activity and non-economic activity. Any activity that results in production of goods and services that adds value to national product is considered as an economic activity. The economic activities have two parts - market activities and non-market activities. Market activities are those that involve remuneration to those who perform it, i.e., activity performed for pay or profit. Such activities include production of all goods and services for market including those of government services, etc. Non-market activities are those involving the production of primary commodities for own consumption and own account production of fixed assets. The full spectrum of economic

activities as defined in the UN System of National Accounts is not covered in the definition adopted for the Employment and Unemployment surveys of NSSO. Production of any good for own consumption is considered as economic activity by UN System of National Accounts but production of only primary goods is considered as economic activity by NSSO. While the former includes activities like own account processing of primary products among other things, in the NSS surveys, processing of primary products for own consumption is not considered as economic activity. However, it may be noted that 'production of agricultural goods for own consumption' covers all activities up to and including stages of thrashing and storing of produce, for own consumption, comes under the coverage of the economic activities of NSSO. The term 'economic activity' in the Employment and Unemployment survey of NSSO in this round will include:

(i) all the market activities described above, i.e., the activities performed for pay or profit which result in production of goods and services for exchange,

(ii) of the non-market activities,

(a) all the activities relating to the primary sector (i.e., **industry Divisions 01 to 14 of NIC-2004**) which result in production (including free collection of uncultivated crops, forestry, firewood, hunting, fishing, mining, quarrying, etc.) of primary goods, including thrashing and storing of grains for own consumption. and

(b) the activities relating to the own-account production of fixed assets. Own account production of fixed assets include construction of own houses, roads, wells, etc., and of machinery, tools, etc., for household enterprise and also construction of any private or community facilities free of charge. A person may be engaged in own account construction in the capacity of either a labourer or a supervisor. By convention, as in earlier rounds, the activities like prostitution, begging, etc., which may result in earnings, will not be considered as economic activities. In earlier rounds, activities under 'smuggling' were kept outside the economic activity. In assigning the activity status of an individual in the field, probing is perhaps not extended to ascertain whether the production of goods and services is carried out in the form of smuggling. Thus, in practice, production of goods and services in the form of smuggling have actually been considered as economic activity in NSS surveys. In view of this, activity status of a person may be judged irrespective of the situation whether such activity is carried out illegally in the form of smuggling or not.

**2.22 Activity status:** It is the activity situation in which a person is found during a reference period, which concerns the person's participation in economic and non-economic activities. According to this, a person will be in one or a combination of the following three status during a reference period:

(i) Working or being engaged in economic activity (work), (ii) Being not engaged in economic activity (work) and either making tangible efforts to seek 'work' or being available for 'work' if the 'work' is available and (iii) Being not engaged in any economic activity (work) and also not available for 'work'. Activity statuses, as mentioned in (i) & (ii) above, are associated with 'being in labour force' and the last with 'not being in the labour force'. Within the labour force, activity status (i) above is associated with 'employment' and that of (ii) above with 'unemployment'. three broad activity statuses have been further sub-divided into several detailed activity categories. These are stated below:

(i) working or being engaged in economic activity (employed):

(a) worked in household enterprise (self-employed) as an own-account worker

(b) worked in household enterprise (self-employed) as an employer

(c) worked in household enterprise (self-employed) as 'helper'

(d) worked as regular wage/ salaried employee

(e) worked as casual wage labour in public works other than National Rural Employment Guarantee (NREG) public works

(f) worked as casual wage labour in National Rural Employment Guarantee (NREG) public works

(g) worked as casual wage labour in other types of works

(h) did not work due to sickness though there was work in household enterprise

(i) did not work due to other reasons though there was work in household enterprise

(j) did not work due to sickness but had regular wage/ salaried employment

(k) did not work due to other reasons but had regular wage/ salaried employment

(ii) not working but seeking or available for work (unemployed) :

(a) sought work

(b) did not seek but was available for work

(iii) not working and also not available for work (not in labour force) :

(a) attended educational institution

(b) attended domestic duties only

(c) attended domestic duties and was also engaged in free collection of goods, tailoring, weaving, etc., for household use

(d) recipients of rent, pension, remittance, etc.

(e) not able to work due to disability

(f) others

(g) did not work due to sickness (for casual workers only).

The various constituents of 'employed', 'unemployed', 'labour force', 'out of labour force' are as explained below:

(a) **Workers (or employed):** Persons who, during the reference period, are engaged in any economic activity or who, despite their attachment to economic activity, have temporarily abstained from work for reasons of illness, injury or other physical disability, bad weather, festivals, social or religious functions or other contingencies constitute workers. Unpaid helpers who assist in the operation of an economic activity in the household farm or nonfarm activities are also considered as workers. All the workers are assigned one of the detailed activity status under the broad activity category 'working or being engaged in economic activity'.

(b) **Seeking or available for work (or unemployed):** Persons, who, during the reference period, owing to lack of work, had not worked but either sought work through employment exchanges, intermediaries, friends or relatives or by making applications to prospective employers or expressed their willingness or availability for work *under the prevailing condition of work and remuneration* are considered as those who are 'seeking or available for work' (or unemployed).

(c) **Labour force:** Persons who are either 'working' (or employed) or 'seeking or available for work' (or unemployed) during the reference period together constitute the labour force.

(d) **Out of labour force:** Persons who are neither 'working' and at the same time nor 'seeking or available for work' for various reasons during the reference period are considered to be 'out of labour force'. The persons under this category are students, those engaged in domestic duties, rentiers, pensioners, recipients of remittances, those living on alms, infirm or disabled persons, too young or too old persons, prostitutes, etc. and casual labourers not working due to sickness.

It may be noted that workers have been further categorized as *self-employed, regular wage/salaried employee and casual wage labourer*. These categories are defined in the following paragraphs.

**2.23 Self-employed:** Persons who operate their own farm or non-farm enterprises or are engaged independently in a profession or trade on own-account or with one or a few partners are deemed to be self-employed in household enterprises. The essential feature of the self-employed is that they have *autonomy* (i.e., how, where and when to produce) and *economic independence* (i.e., market, scale of operation and money) for carrying out their operation. The remuneration of the self-employed consists of a non-separable combination of two parts: a reward for their labour and profit of their enterprise. The combined remuneration is given by the revenue from sale of output produced by self-employed persons *minus* the cos of purchased inputs in production. The self-employed persons may again be categorised into the following three groups:

(i) **own-account workers:** They are the self-employed who operate their enterprises on their own account or with one or a few partners and who during the reference period by and large, run their enterprise without hiring any labour. They may, however, have unpaid helpers to assist them in the activity of the enterprise.

(ii) **employers:** The self-employed persons who work on their own account or with one or a few partners and by and large run their enterprise by hiring labour are the employers, and

(iii) **helpers in household enterprise:** The helpers are a category of self-employed persons mostly family members who keep themselves engaged in their household enterprises, working full or part time and do not receive any regular salary or wages in return for the work performed. They do not run the household enterprise on their own but assist the related person living in the same household in running the household enterprise.

There is a category of workers who work at a place of their choice which is outside the establishment that employs them or buys their product. Different expressions like 'home workers', 'home based workers' and 'out workers' are synonymously used for such workers. For the purpose of this survey, all such workers will be categorised as 'self-employed'. The 'home workers' have *some degree of autonomy and economic independence* in carrying out the work, and their work is not directly supervised as is the case for the *employees*. Like the other self-employed, these workers have to meet certain costs, like actual or imputed rent on the buildings in which they work, costs incurred for heating, lighting and power, storage or transportation, etc., thereby indicating that they have some tangible or intangible means of production. It may be noted that *employees* are not required to provide such inputs for production.

It may further be elaborated that the 'putting out' system prevalent in the production process in which a part of production which is 'put out' is performed in different household enterprises (and not at the employers establishment). For example, *bidi* rollers obtaining orders from a *bidi* manufacturer will be considered as home workers irrespective of whether or not they were supplied raw material (leaves, masala, etc.), equipment (scissors) and other means of production. The fee or remuneration received consists of two parts - the share of their labour and profit of the enterprise. In some cases, the payment may be based on piece rate. Similarly, a woman engaged in tailoring or embroidery work on order from a wholesaler, or making *papad* on order from some particular unit/contractor/ trader at her home will be treated as 'home worker'. On the other hand, if she does the work in the employers premises, she will be treated as *employee*. Again, if she is not undertaking these activities on orders from outside, but markets the products by herself/ other household members for profit, she will be considered as an own account worker, if of course, she does not employ any hired help more or less on a regular basis.

**2.24 Regular wage/ salaried employee:** Persons working in other's farm or non-farm enterprises (both household and non-household) and getting in return salary or wages on a regular basis (and not on the basis of daily or periodic renewal of work contract) are the regular wage/ salaried employees. *This category not only includes persons getting time wage but also persons receiving piece wage or salary and paid apprentices, both full time and part-time.*

**2.25 Casual wage labour:** A person casually engaged in other's farm or non-farm enterprises (both household and non-household) and getting in return wage according to the terms of the daily or periodic work contract is a casual wage labour. Usually, in the rural areas, one category of casual labourers can be seen who normally engage themselves in '*public works*' activities. The concepts related to '*public works*' are discussed later in this chapter.

**2.26 Different approaches for determining activity status:** The persons surveyed are to be classified into various activity categories on the basis of activities pursued by them during certain specified reference periods. There are three reference periods for this survey viz. (i) one year, (ii) one week and (iii) each day of the reference week. Based on these three periods, three different measures of activity status are arrived at. These are termed respectively as usual status, current weekly status and current daily status. The activity status determined on the basis of the reference period of 1 year is known as the usual activity status of a person, that determined on the basis of a reference period of 1 week is known as the current weekly status (cws) of the person and the activity status determined on the basis of each day of the reference week is known as the current daily status (cds) of the person. Identification of each individual into a unique situation poses a problem when more than one of three types of broad activity status viz. 'employed', 'unemployed' and 'not in labour force' is concurrently obtained for a person. In such an eventuality, unique identification under any one of the three broad activity status is done by adopting either the major time criterion or priority criterion. The former is used for classification of persons under 'usual

activity status' and, the latter, for classification of persons under 'current activity status'. If, by adopting one of these two criteria, a person categorized as engaged in economic activity is found to be pursuing more than one economic activity during the reference period, the appropriate detailed activity status category will relate to the activity in which relatively more time has been spent. Similar approach is adopted for non-economic activities also.

**2.27 Usual activity status:** The usual activity status relates to the activity status of a person during the reference period of 365 days preceding the date of survey. The activity status on which a person spent relatively longer time (major time criterion) during the 365 days preceding the date of survey is considered the *usual principal activity status* of the person. To decide the usual principal activity of a person, he/ she is first categorized as belonging to the labour force or not, during the reference period **on the basis of major time criterion**. Persons, thus, adjudged as not belonging to the labour force are assigned the broad activity status 'neither working nor available for work'. For the persons belonging to the labour force, the broad activity status of either 'working' or 'not working but seeking and/ or available for work' is then ascertained again on the basis of the relatively longer time spent in the labour force during the 365 days preceding the date of survey. Within the broad activity status so determined, the detailed activity status category of a person pursuing more than one such activity will be determined again on the basis of the relatively longer time spent.

**2.28 Subsidiary economic activity status:** A person whose principal usual status is determined on the basis of the major time criterion may have pursued some economic activity **for 30 days or more** during the reference period of 365 days preceding the date of survey. The status in which such economic activity is pursued during the reference period of 365 days preceding the date of survey is the subsidiary economic activity status of the person. In case of multiple subsidiary economic activities, the major activity and status based on the relatively longer time spent criterion will be considered. It may be noted that engagement in work in subsidiary capacity may arise out of the two following situations:

- i) a person may be engaged in a relatively longer period during the 365 days in economic (non-economic activity) and for a relatively minor period, which is not less than 30 days, in another economic activity (any economic activity).
- ii) a person may be pursuing an economic activity (non-economic activity) almost throughout the year in the principal status and also simultaneously pursuing another economic activity (any economic activity) for relatively shorter time in a subsidiary capacity. In such cases, since both the activities are being pursued throughout the year and hence the duration of both the activities are more than 30 days, the activity which is being pursued for a relatively shorter time will be considered as his/ her subsidiary activity.

**2.29 Current weekly activity status:** The current weekly activity status of a person is the activity status obtaining for a person during a reference period of 7 days preceding the date of survey. It is decided **on the basis of a certain priority cum major time criterion**. According to the priority criterion, the status of 'working' gets priority over the status of 'not working but seeking or available for work', which in turn gets priority over the status of 'neither working nor available for work'. *A person is considered working (or employed) if he/ she, while pursuing any economic activity, had worked for at least one hour on at least one day during the 7 days preceding the date of survey.* A person is considered 'seeking or available for work (or unemployed)' if during the reference week no economic activity was pursued by the person but he/ she made efforts to get work or had been available for work any time during the reference week though not actively seeking work in the belief that no work was available. A person who had neither worked nor was available for work any time during the reference week, is considered to be engaged in non-economic activities (or not in labour force). Having decided the broad current weekly activity status of a person on the basis of 'priority' criterion, the detailed current weekly activity status is again decided **on the basis of 'major time' criterion if a person is pursuing multiple economic activities.**



**2.30 Current daily activity status:** The activity pattern of the population, particularly in the unorganized sector, is such that during a week, and sometimes, even during a day, a person can pursue more than one activity. Moreover, many people can even undertake both economic and non-economic activities on the same day of a reference week. The current daily activity status for a person is determined on the basis of his/ her activity status on each day of the reference week **using a priority-cum-major time criterion** (day to day labour time disposition). The following points may be noted for determining the current daily status of a person:

i) Each day of the reference week is looked upon as comprising of either two 'half days' or a 'full day' for assigning the activity status.

ii) A person is considered 'working' (employed) for the entire day if he/ she had worked for 4 hours or more during the day.

iii) If a person was engaged in more than one of the economic activities for *4 hours or more* on a day, he/ she would be assigned two economic activities out of the different economic activities on which he/ she devoted relatively longer time on the reference day. In such cases, one 'half day' work will be considered for each of those two economic activities (i.e., 0.5 intensity will be given for each of these two economic activities).

iv) If the person had worked for 1 hour or more but less than 4 hours, he/ she is considered 'working' (employed) for half-day and 'seeking or available for work' (unemployed) or 'neither seeking nor available for work' (not in labour force) for the other half of the day depending on whether he was seeking/ available for work or not.

v) If a person was not engaged in 'work' even for 1 hour on a day but was seeking/available for work even for 4 hours or more, he/ she is considered 'unemployed' for the entire day. But if he/ she was 'seeking/ available for work' for more than 1 hour and less than 4 hours only, he/ she is considered 'unemployed' for half day and 'not in labour force' for the other half of the day.

vi) A person who neither had any 'work' to do nor was available for 'work' even for half a day was considered 'not in labour force' for the entire day and is assigned one or two of the detailed non - economic activity status depending upon the activities pursued by him/ her during the reference day. It may be noted that while assigning intensity, an intensity of 1.0 will be given against an activity which is done for 'full day' and 0.5, if it is done for 'half day'.

**2.31 Operation:** It is the type of work performed by a person during a reference period such as manual, non-manual, agricultural, non-agricultural, etc. Operation has been combined with activity status and industry corresponding to the work performed. Information regarding the type of operation is collected **only for rural areas and relating to current status only**. The different types of operations are - ploughing, sowing, transplanting, weeding, harvesting, others (manual) and others (non-manual). In the last two cases, the sector in which the work is performed is indicated by the industry. It may be noted, that for 'regular wage/ salaried employees' on leave or on holiday, the 'operation' relates to their respective function in the work or job from which he/ she is temporarily off. *Chapter* Similarly, for persons categorized as 'self-employed' but not working on a particular day in spite of having work on that day, the operation will relate to the work that he/ she would have done if he/ she had not enjoyed leisure on that day.

**2.32 Manual work:** A job essentially involving physical labour is considered as manual work. However, jobs essentially involving physical labour but also requiring a certain level of general, professional, scientific or technical educations are not to be termed as 'manual work'. On the other hand, jobs not involving much of physical labour and at the same time not requiring much educational (general, scientific, technical or otherwise) background are to be treated as 'manual work'. Thus, engineers, doctors, dentists, midwives, etc., are not considered manual workers even though their jobs involve some amount of physical labour. But, peons, chowkidars, watchman, etc. are considered manual workers even though their work might not involve much physical labour. A few examples of manual workers are cooks, waiters, building caretakers, sweepers, cleaners and related workers, launderers, dry cleaners and pressers, hair dressers, barbers, beauticians, watchmen, gate keepers, agricultural labourers, plantation labourers and related workers

**2.33 Rural Labour:** Manual labour working in agricultural and/ or non-agricultural occupations *in return for wages* paid either in cash or in kind (excluding exchange labour) and *living in rural areas*, will be taken as rural labour.

**2.34 Agricultural labour:** A person will be considered to be engaged as agricultural labour, if he/ she follows one or more of the following agricultural occupations in the capacity of a wage paid manual labour, whether paid in cash or kind or both:

(i) farming

(ii) dairy farming

(iii) production of any horticultural commodity

(iv) raising of livestock, bees or poultry

(v) any practice performed on a farm as incidental to or in conjunction with farm operations (including forestry and timbering) and the preparation for market and delivery to storage or to market or to carriage for transportation to market of farm produce. Further, 'carriage for transportation' refers **only to the first stage of the transport** from farm to the first place of disposal.

**Working in fisheries is excluded** from agricultural labour.

**2.35 Wage-paid manual labour:** A person who does manual work in return for wages in cash or kind or partly in cash and partly in kind (excluding exchange labour) is a wage paid manual labour. Salaries are also to be counted as wages. A person who is self-employed in manual work is **not treated** as a wage paid manual labour.

**2.36 Cultivation:** All activities relating to production of crops and related ancillary activities are considered as cultivation. Growing of trees, plants or crops as plantation or orchards (such as rubber, cashew, coconut, pepper, coffee, tea etc.) are not considered as cultivation activities for the purpose of this survey. In general, the activities covered under NIC-2004 sub-classes 01111, 01112, 01113, 01115, 01119, 01121, 01122 and 01135 (excepting plantation of pepper and cardamom) are to be considered as cultivation.

**2.37 Earnings:** Earnings refer to the wage/ salary income (and not total earnings from other sources) receivable for the wage/ salaried work done during the reference week by the wage/ salaried employees and casual labourers. The wage/ salary already received or receivable may be in cash or kind or partly in cash and partly in kind. For recording the wages and salaries:

i) The kind wages are evaluated at the respective current retail price.

ii) Bonus (expected or paid) and perquisites evaluated at respective retail prices and duly apportioned for the reference week are also included in earnings.

iii) For any economic activity, amount received or receivable as 'over-time' for the additional work done beyond normal working time is excluded.

**2.38 Procedure for determining Household principal industry and occupation:** To determine the household principal industry and occupation, the general procedure to be followed is to list all the occupations pertaining to economic activities pursued by the members of the household excluding those employed by the household and paying guests (who in view of their staying and taking food in the household are considered as its normal members) during the one year period preceding the date of survey, no matter whether such occupations are pursued by the members in their principal or subsidiary (on the basis of earnings) capacity. Out of the occupations listed that one which fetched the maximum earnings to the household during the last 365 days preceding the date of survey would be considered as the principal household occupation. It is quite possible that one or more members of the household may pursue the household occupation in different industries. In such cases, the particular industry out of all the different industries corresponding to the principal occupation, which fetched the maximum earnings, should be considered as the principal industry of the household. In extreme cases, the earnings may be equal in two different occupations or industry-occupation combinations. By convention, in such cases, priority will be given to the occupation or industry-occupation combination of the senior most members.

**2.39 Public works:** 'Public works' are those activities, which are sponsored by Government or Local Bodies, and which cover local area development works like construction of roads, dams, bunds, digging of ponds, etc., as relief measures, or as an outcome of employment generation schemes under the poverty alleviation programme such as National Rural Employment Guarantee (NREG) public works, Sampoorna Grameen Rozgar Yojana (SGRY), National Food for Work Programme (NFFWP), etc. The coverage of schemes under 'public works' is restricted to those schemes under poverty alleviation programme, or relief measures through which the Government generates wage employment. It may be noted that the names of these schemes signify the Budget Heads under Plan from which funds are released for carrying out various 'types of works'. The types of works that are generally undertaken through these schemes, are watershed development, drought proofing, land leveling, flood control, laying pipes or cables, sanitation, water harvesting, irrigation canal, development of orchard, road construction, building construction / repair, running crèche, etc. There may be some schemes sponsored by the Government and in operation, which are conceived as self-employment generation schemes. Some such schemes of the Government are Swarnjayanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana (schemes under erstwhile IRDP merged with this), Rural Employment Generation Programme (REGP), Prime Minister's Rozgar Yojana (PMRY), Valmiki Ambedkar Awas Yojana (VAMBAY), etc. Employment generated through these schemes is not to be considered within the purview of 'public works' sometimes, the Government may undertake various programmes, viz., Accelerated Rural Water Supply Programme (ARWSP), Rural Sanitation Programme (RSP), Drought Prone Areas Programme (DPAP), Desert Development Programme (DDP), Integrated Wastelands Development Programme (IWDP), Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY), etc. The main objective of such programmes is on infrastructure development rather than poverty alleviation and generation of employment. Moreover, these programmes are executed as projects through contractors. Employment generated through these programmes, which are executed through contractors, is also kept outside the domain of 'public works'. However, if similar activities relating to rural water supply, rural sanitation, desert development, wastelands development, etc. are undertaken by the State Government or Local Bodies to provide wage employment and without employing any contractor for its execution, those are to be considered under 'public works'. Classification of individuals as 'casual labour in *public works*' requires that the work in which they participate is '*public works*' as defined above. To distinguish between '*public works*' and works not classifiable as '*public works*', some broad characteristics of '*public work*' have been identified, viz. the primary objective is generation of wage employment and poverty alleviation, and creation of community asset as an outcome in achieving those main objectives. These features of *public works* along with the description of some wage employment generation schemes given above will be helpful in identification of '*public works*'. A short description of the three schemes sponsored by the Central Government, which are in operation either in rural areas or in urban areas, and are covered under '*public works*' is given below:

- (i) **National Rural Employment Guarantee (NREG) Public Works:** The National Rural Employment Guarantee Act, 2005 (NREGA) is an important step towards the realization of the right to work and to enhance the livelihood security of the households in the rural areas of the country. It extends to the whole of India except the state of Jammu & Kashmir. According to this Act, Rural Employment Guarantee Schemes (REGS) are formed by the State Governments. The Scheme provides at least one hundred days of guaranteed wage employment in every financial year to every household whose adult members volunteer to do unskilled manual work. Adult means a person who has completed his/ her eighteen years of age. Unskilled manual work means any physical work which any adult person is capable of doing without any special skill/ training. The implementing agency of the scheme may be any Department of the Central Government or a State Government, a Zilla Parishad, Panchayat/ Gram Panchayat or any local authority or Government undertaking or non-governmental organization authorized by the Central Government or the State Government. If an applicant for employment under the scheme is not provided employment within 15 days of receipt of his application seeking employment or from the date on which employment has been sought, the applicant will be entitled for getting daily unemployment allowances.

- (ii) **Sampoorna Grameen Rozgar Yojana (SGRY):** The primary objective of the Sampoorna Grameen Rozgar Yojana (SGRY) is to provide additional wage employment in all rural areas and thereby ensure food security and improve nutritional levels. The secondary objective is the creation of durable assets and infrastructural development in rural areas. This scheme was announced by the Prime Minister on 15.8.2001 and launched in September 2001. The schemes of Jawahar Gram Samridhi Yojana (JGSY), Employment Assurance Scheme (EAS) have been merged under this programme w.e.f. 1.4.2002. The SGRY is open to all rural poor who are in need of wage employment and desire to do manual and unskilled work in and around the village/ habitat. The programme is self-targeting in nature. While providing wage employment preference is given to agricultural wage earners, non-agricultural unskilled wage earners, marginal farmers, women, members of Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes, parents of child labour withdrawn from hazardous occupations, parents of handicapped children or adults with handicapped parents. The programme is implemented through the Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs). Thirty percent of employment opportunities are reserved for women under the programme. The programme is implemented on cost sharing basis in the ratio of 75:25 between the Centre and the States for the cash component of the programme. However, food grains under the programme are provided to the States free of cost. Five per cent of the funds and food grains under SGRY are retained in the Ministry of Rural Development for utilization in areas of acute distress arising out of natural calamities or by taking up preventive measures in the chronically drought or flood affected areas. In addition, a certain percentage of the allotted food grains under the SGRY is reserved for the Special Component to be used in any Central or State Government scheme with wage employment potential to meet exigencies arising out of any natural calamity. The remaining funds and food grains under SGRY are distributed among the Zilla Parishad, Intermediate Panchayats and Village Panchayat in the ratio of 20:30:50. Wages under the programme are paid partly in the form of food grains and partly in cash. The States and UTs are free to calculate the cost of food grains paid as part of wages, at a uniform rate, which may be either BPL rate or APL rate, or anywhere between the two rates. The workers are paid the balance of wages in cash so that they are assured of the notified minimum wages. Under the programme, priority is given to works of soil and moisture conservation, minor irrigation, rejuvenation of drinking water resources and augmentation of ground water, traditional water harvesting structures, desiltation of village tanks/ ponds, durable assets such as schools, kitchen sheds for schools, dispensaries, community centers, and Panchayat Ghars. Development of Haats, which are labour intensive, is also to be given priority. The size, cost and nature of the work should be such that they may be completed within a period of one year and in exceptional situations within a maximum period of two years.
- (iii) **National Food for Work Programme (NFFWP):** The National Food for Work Programme (NFFWP) is being implemented in 150 most backward districts of the country from November, 2004. The objective of the programme is to provide additional resources to 150 most backward districts of the country so that generation of supplementary wage employment and provision of food security through creation of need based economic, social and community assets in these districts is further intensified. Food grains are provided to the States free of cost. Works are taken up under the programme in accordance with the Five Year Perspective Plan. The Collector is responsible for preparation of the Perspective Plan and for programme implementation. The above three schemes are sponsored by the Central Government for generation of wage employment. These apart, there may be similar schemes sponsored by the State Government or Local Bodies to provide wage employment, which are also to be considered under ' *public works*' .

**2.40 Procedure followed for collecting employment and unemployment particulars indifferent NSS rounds:** In the annual rounds from 45th (July 1989-June 1990) to 59th (January to December 2003), only activity status and industry of work according to usual principal status, subsidiary status and current weekly status approach were collected through a few columns of the

demographic block of the Consumer Expenditure Schedule (Schedule 1.0). Particulars of employment and unemployment according to the usual principal status and usual subsidiary status were collected in the annual rounds by following a similar approach as in the quinquennial rounds. In the quinquennial rounds, particulars of current daily status of the household members are collected and current weekly status is derived from them, whereas in the annual rounds, current weekly status has been obtained through a direct query. In the 60<sup>th</sup> round (January-June 2004), a separate schedule on employment and unemployment was canvassed for the first time in an annual round and particulars on employment and unemployment was collected in the same manner as that of the quinquennial rounds. In NSS 62nd round (July 2005 - June 2006) also a separate schedule, similar to the one canvassed during NSS 60th round, on employment and unemployment was canvassed and in this round also particulars on employment and unemployment was collected in the same manner as that of the quinquennial rounds. In the NSS 64th round (July 2007-June 2008) a separate schedule was also used to collect data on employment and unemployment. The scope of the schedule was further enhanced with the inclusion information on the some particulars of the migrant households, migrant household members and out-migrants. In this round also particulars on employment and unemployment was collected in the same manner as that of the quinquennial rounds.

**2.41 Labour force participation rate (LFPR):** LFPR is defined as the number of persons/person-days in the labour force per 1000 persons /person-days

**2.42 Worker Population Ratio (WPR):** WPR defined as the number of persons/person-days employed per 1000 persons/person-days.

**2.43 Proportion Unemployed (PU):** It is defined as the number of persons/person-days unemployed per 1000 persons/person-days.

**2.44 Unemployment Rate (UR):** UR is defined as the number of persons/person-days unemployed per 1000 persons/person-days in the labour force (which includes both the employed and unemployed).

**2.44.1 Usual status adjusted UR:** Unemployment rates for the reference period of 365 days, i.e., in usual *principal status (ps)* approximates an indicator of chronically unemployed. Some of the persons categorized as unemployed according to the *usual principal activity status* might be working in a subsidiary capacity. Therefore, another estimate of the unemployed excluding those employed in a subsidiary capacity during the reference period can be derived. The former is called the usually unemployed according to the principal status (ps) and the latter, the usually unemployed excluding employed in subsidiary status or usual status adjusted i.e., us (adjusted), which would conceptually be lower than the former.

## CHAPTER-3

### HOUSEHOLD AND POPULATION

The survey of this round was conducted during July, 2007 to June, 2008. To study the employment-unemployment situation of the State, it is necessary to look into the socio-economic structure of the household and the demographic pattern of the population of the State. Therefore, some information on socio-economic condition of sample household and demographic data of the surveyed individuals was collected in this survey. In this chapter, the main findings pertaining to these aspects have been analyzed. The estimates have been prepared with an effort to present a more detail picture at the State level.

#### 3.1 Number of households surveyed:

**3.1.1** The information is collected from 2390 sample households of which 1430 households belong to the rural sector and the rest 96 households to the urban sector. A total of 10994 persons have been surveyed out of which 6972 resides in the rural sector sample households and rest 4272 persons in the urban sector sample households covered during the survey.

#### 3.2 Population structure:

**3.2.1** Table 3.1 presents some basic characteristics of population estimated from the state sample data in rural and urban areas in Haryana.

**3.2.2** The above table reveals that there were about 38.22 lakh households with an average household size of 4.9 persons during the above said period. Out of the total households 26.77 (70%) lakh were in rural and 11.45 (30%) lakh in urban areas. The average household size was 5.0 persons in rural area and 4.5 persons in urban areas. The sex ratio in rural sector was 802 and it was found 826 in urban sector. The overall sex ratio was 808. The average number of persons gainfully employed per household was estimated to be 1.42.

### 3.3 Household Type:

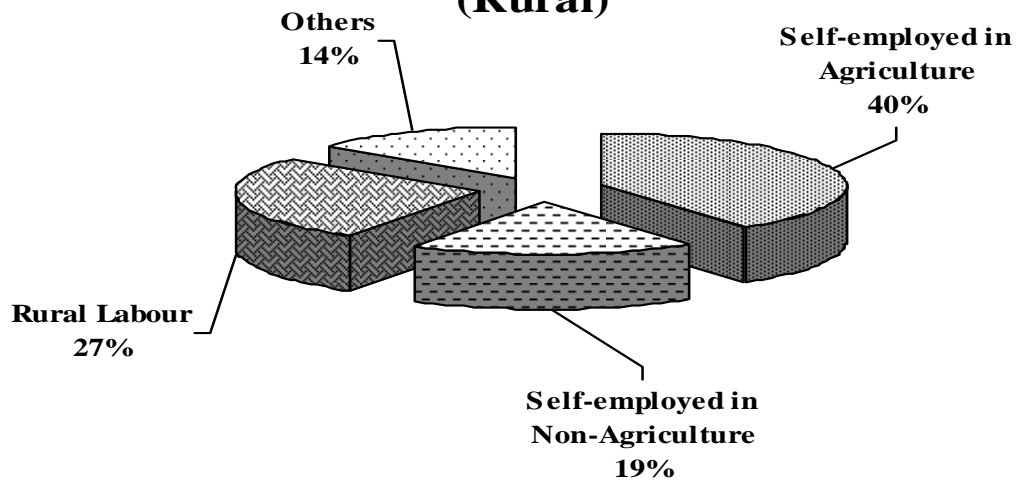
3.3.1 The nature and type of work from which a household derived its major income is an important indicator of the activity pattern of its members. In the survey, every sample household was, therefore, categorized into household types, depending on the economic activity of the members of the household during the 365 days preceding the date of survey from which major income of the household was generated. Table 3.2 and graphs 1 & 2 shows the distribution of population by household type in rural and urban sectors of the State.

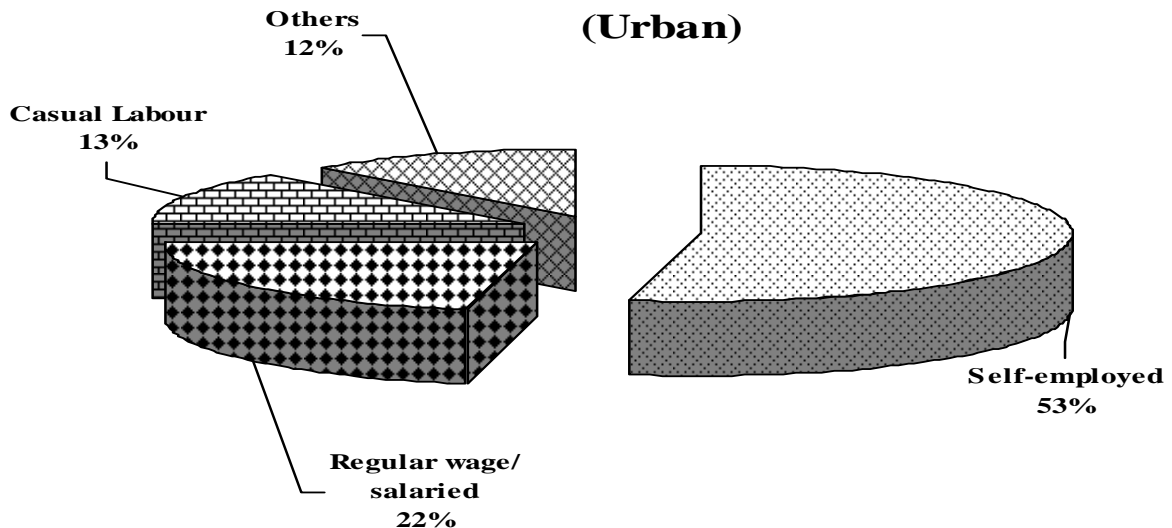

3.3.2 The table reveals that during July 2007 to June 2008, 59% of rural population was dependent on self employment either as self employment in agriculture (40%) or as a self employment in non-agriculture (19%). Another 27% of the rural population belonged to rural labour households. The casual labour households in urban areas accounted for about 13 % of population. On the other hands, among urban household, about 53% of the population major activity was “self employed”, followed by 22% “regular wages/salaried” and remaining 25% population was “casual labour/others”.

### 3.4 Age distribution of Population

**3.4.1** Age and sex distribution of the population are two important demographic characteristics that enhance the understanding of labour force indicators. In table 3.4, the distribution of rural and urban population by 5 year age-groups is presented for males and females separately.

**3.4.2** The rural-urban differences in the age-distribution of population are clearly evident from table 3.4. About 34% of males and 29% of females in rural areas belonged to the age-group 0-14 years compared to nearly 33% of males and 27% of females in urban areas. The working age population (15-59 years) comprised about 60% of males and 64% of females in rural areas and about 60% of males and 67% of females in urban areas. The percentage of elderly women, that is, women in age 60 years and above, tends to be higher than that of elderly man, particularly in urban areas.

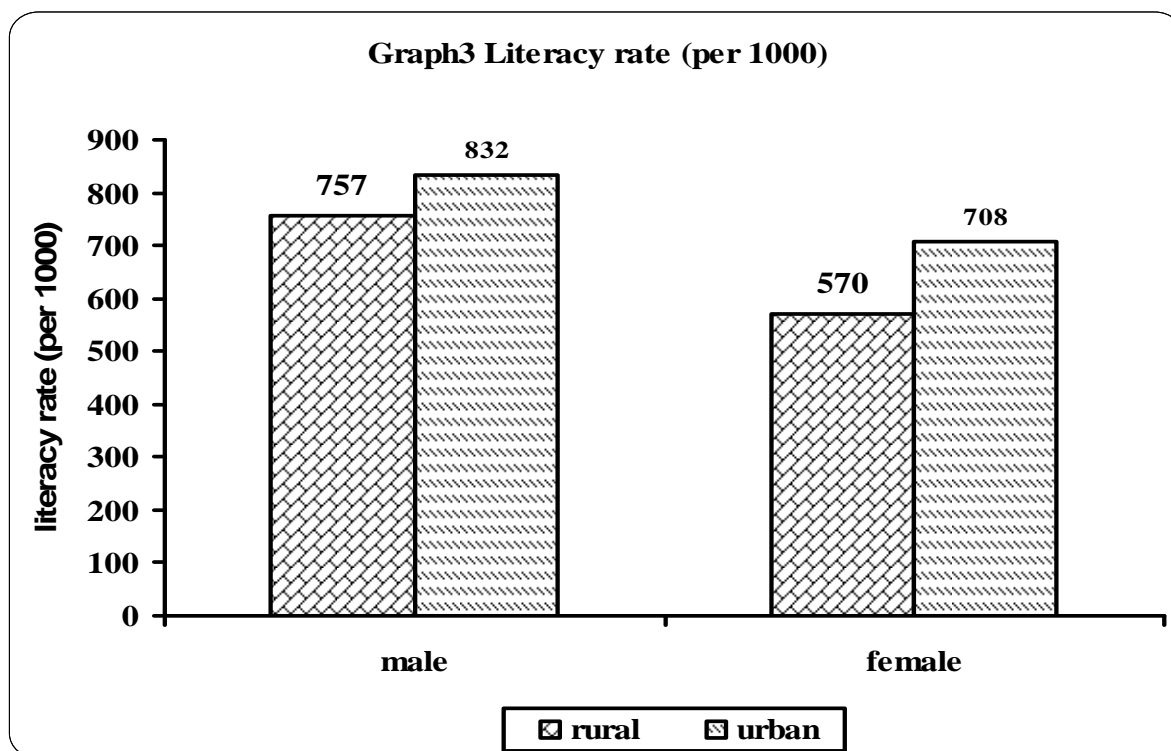
### 3.5 Educational Status of Population

3.5.1 Literacy rate: Literacy, together with educational attainment, determines the quality of population and is extremely relevant to study the aspects of labour force and its participation in economic activities. For the purposes of this survey, a person who could read and write a simple message in any language, with understanding, was considered literate. Literates were further classified according to their levels of educational attainment. Literacy rate (per 1000 persons) is presented in table 3.5 and graph 3.

3.5.2 It is observed that about 70% population of the state were literate i.e. they can read and write a simple message in any language. Gender wise, about 48% male and 61% females were estimated literates. In rural, literacy rate was estimated 67%, whereas rural male and female were 76% and 57% respectively. It is observed that in urban area male was in a better condition, the male literacy was estimated 83% in comparison to 76% in rural areas. The literacy rate of rural females was very low as only 57% in comparison to 71% for urban females.

3.5.3 Educational level: The distribution of males and females of age 15 years and above by level of general education attained as estimated from the present survey on employment and unemployment is presented separately for rural and urban in table 3.6

3.5.4 Figures presented in the above tables reveal that about 28% population of the state was illiterate. About 72% of the population has achieved education at any level and 18% at primary upper level, 17% at primary/middle level, 21% at secondary, 8% at higher secondary, 2% diploma/certificate and remaining 6% graduate and above. In rural areas only 3% of the persons of age 15 years and above had general educational level graduate and above. This was 14% for the urban. The gender differential in the level of higher education is significant. In the rural areas, nearly 4% of the males had achieved general educational level graduate and above and for females it was nearly 2%. In the urban areas, nearly 16% of the males had achieved general educational level of graduate and above. This was 12% for the females.

3.2.5 Level of technical education: In this survey, the degree in professional courses like engineering, medicine, agriculture, etc., a diploma or certificates in agriculture, engineering/technology, medicine, crafts, etc. was included under technical education. The data collected according to the level of technical education successfully completed by the persons make a distinction between different levels of technical education such as technical degree of graduate level or postgraduate and above level. Similarly, for the diploma in technical education three types of levels were distinguished, viz, below graduate level postgraduate, and above level. Per thousand distribution of persons of 15 years and above by level of attainment of technical education. are described in Table 3.4 .

The above table reveals that only 0.3 % of the persons of age group 15 years and above in the rural areas and 1 % in urban areas had some technical education. It is observed that in both the rural and urban areas, most of the persons having technical education were having diploma/certificate below graduate level or graduation. In rural areas almost all of these who had some technical education through diploma/certificate (0.2 %) and in the urban areas nearly 1 % had attained technical education through diploma.

## CHAPTER-4

### Labour Force

#### 4.0 General

4.0.1 Labour force, or in the other words the ‘economically active’ population, refers to the population which supplies or seeks to supply labour for production and therefore includes both “employed” and “unemployed” persons. Four different estimates of the labour force have been obtained based on the three approaches adopted in the survey for classification of the population by activity status viz usual status, current weekly status and current daily status. These are:

- (i) Number of persons in the labour force according to the usual status (ps) i.e. by considering usual principal activity only,
- (ii) Number of persons in the labour force according to the usual status (ps+ss) i.e. by considering usual principal and subsidiary activity together,
- (iii) The current weekly number of persons in the labour force according to the current weekly status approach, and
- (iv) Number of person-days in the labour force according to the current daily status approach.

4.0.2 The estimates of the labour force according to the usual principal status gives the number of persons who either worked or were looking for work for a relatively longer part of 365 days preceding the date of survey. The labour force considering both usual principal status and the subsidiary status includes the persons who (a) either worked or were looking for work for a relatively longer part of the 365 days preceding the date of survey and (b) also those persons from among the remaining population who had worked at least for 30 days during the reference period of 365 days preceding the date of survey. The labour force measured in term of current weekly status give the average picture of the labour force particular in a short period of one week during the survey period. The estimates of labour force according to the current weekly status provides the number of persons who worked for at least one hour or was seeking/available for work for at least one hour on any day during the 7 days preceding the date of survey. The labour force measured in terms of current daily status gives the average picture of the number of person-days in the labour force on a day during the survey period. For each person, 7 person days were assigned for 7 days preceding the date of survey and the estimate of the person days in the labour force during the reference week was obtained by considering the number of person days worked or was available for work during the week by adopting current daily approach. The number of person-days in the labour force on a day during the survey period is obtained by dividing the person-days in the labor force in a week by 7.

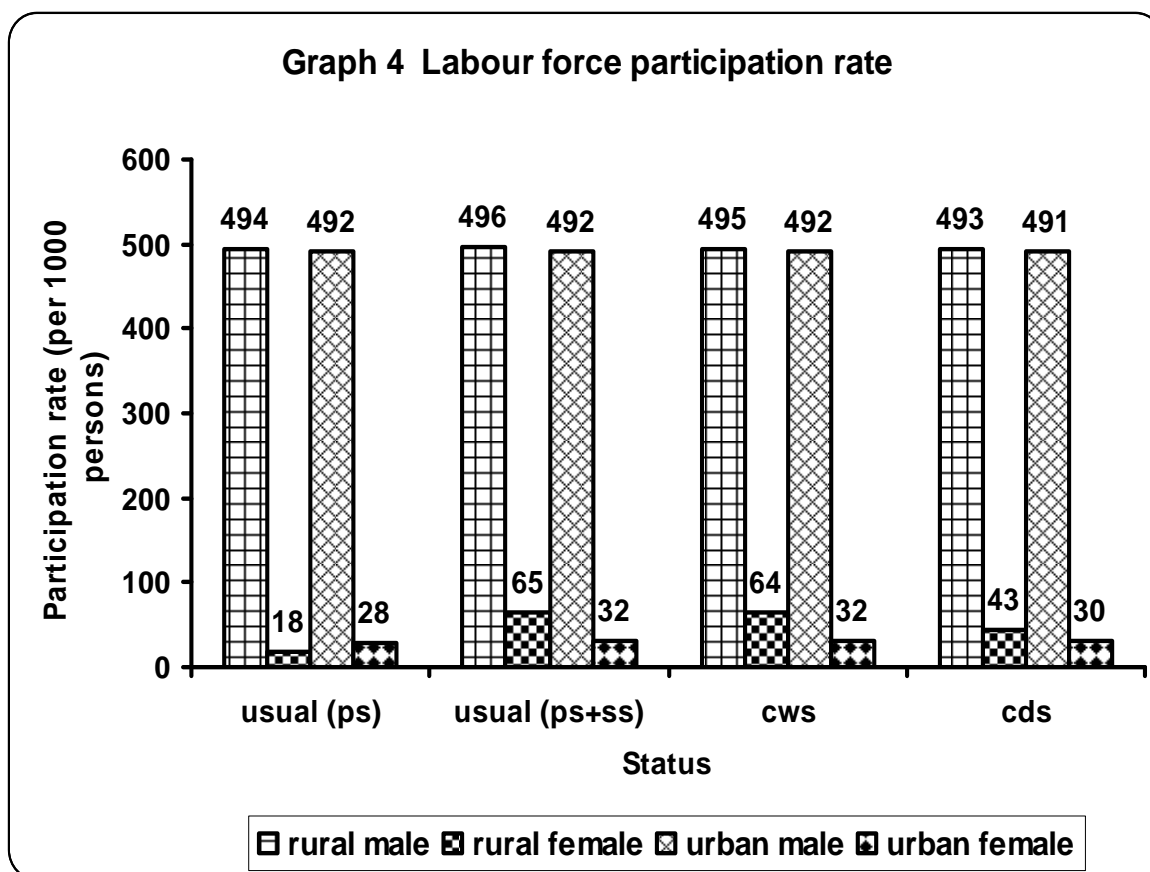
#### 4.1 Labour Force Participation Rates (LFPR):

4.1.1 The Labour Force Participation Rate (LFPR) is defined as number of persons/person-days in the labour force per thousand persons/person days. Estimated labour force participation rates according to usual, current weekly and current daily approaches is depicted in table 4.1 and graph 4.

4.1.2 **Usual status approach:** The above reveals that according to usual status (ps+ss), the LFPR was 30 %. The LFPRs for persons in the rural area was about 30 %, which is about 2 % higher than that in urban areas. In the urban areas, nearly 49 % males were in the labour force compared to 3 % females. In the rural areas, the gender differential also existed; nearly 50 % rural males were in labour force compared to 7 % rural females.

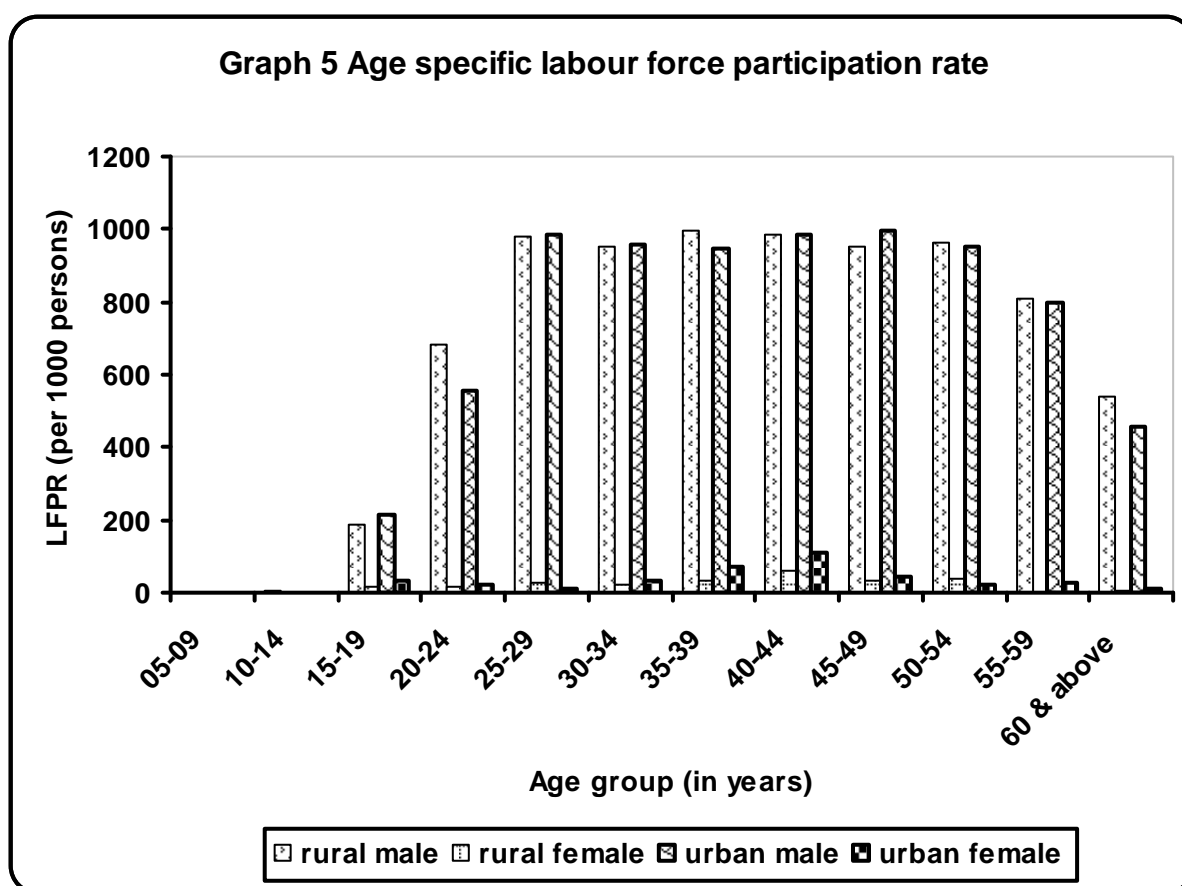
4.1.3 **Current status approach:** According to current weekly status (cws) same trend was observed in rural and urban areas about 49 % of male in both sectors were working or available for work. The corresponding ratios for females for rural and urban areas were 6 % and 3 % respectively. More or less, the same trend was observed in the current daily status.

#### 4.2 Age specific labour force participation rates:

4.2.1 Age specific labour force participation rates according to usual status (ps) separately rural, urban and combined are presented in table no. 4.2 and graph 5.

4.2.2 It is observed that maximum 56 % of the population in the age group 40-44 years were working or available for work, followed by 55 % in the age group 35-39 years. According to sex-wise age specific labour participation rate about 98 % male in the age group 40-44 years were working or available for the work, whereas considerable rates for females maximum 8 % was also observed in age group 40-44 years. It is also observed that 52 % of the aged males (60 years and above) were in the labour force.

### 4.3 Educational level specific LFPR:

4.3.1 Table 4.3 presents Education level specific usual status (ps+ss) Labour force participation rate (per thousand) for persons of age groups 15 years and above

4.3.2 It is observed that among rural males, LFPR was the highest among those with educational level post graduate and above (99%). This feature was observed for rural females also, the LFPR was the highest among those post graduate and above (18%). In case of urban males, LFPR was the highest among those with educational level post graduate and above (91%) and it was the lowest among those with education level diploma/certificate (54%). Among urban females, the FFPR was the highest for those with educational level post graduate and above (23%) and LFPR was the lowest among those with educational level middle (1%), closely followed by those with educational level higher secondary (2%).

## CHAPTER-5

### Employed (Work Force)

#### 5.0 General

5.0.1 The estimates of the work force or employed and its structure are explained in this chapter. The survey has generated four different estimates of the employed based on the three approaches used in classification of the activity statuses of the person surveyed.

- (i) Number of persons in the labour force according to the usual status (ps) i.e. by considering usual principal activity only,
- (ii) Number of persons in the labour force according to the usual status (ps+ss) i.e. by considering usual principal and subsidiary activity together,
- (iii) The current weekly number of persons in the labour force according to the current weekly status approach, and
- (iv) Number of person-days in the labour force according to the current daily status approach.

5.0.2 The estimates of employed or worker according to the usual principal status gives the number of persons who worked for a relatively longer part of 365 days preceding the date of survey. The work force considering both the usual principal status and the subsidiary status includes the persons who (a) either worked for a relatively longer part of the 365 days preceding the date of survey and (b) also those persons from among the remaining population who had worked at least for 30 days during the reference period of 365 days preceding the date of survey. The work force measured in term of current weekly status gives the average picture of the work force in a short period of one week during the survey period. The estimates of work force according to the current weekly status provides the number of persons worked for atleast one hour on any day during the 7 days preceding the date of survey. The work force measured in terms of current daily status presents the average picture of the number of person-days worked in a day during the survey period. For each person, 7 person days were assigned for the 7 days preceding the date of survey and the estimate of the number of person-days worked in the reference week was obtained on the basis of the person-days worked according to the current daily approach. The number of person-days worked on a day during the survey period is obtained by dividing the person-days worked in a week by 7.

5.0.3 The number of persons/person-days employed per thousand persons/person-days is referred to as work force participation rates (WFPR) or worker-population ratio (WPRs). This ratio is used in the following discussions on the employed.

#### 5.1 Age specific usual status worker-population ratio (ASWPR):

5.1.1 The number of persons usually employed in a particular age group per thousand among in that age group is defined as the age specific worker population ratio (ASWPR). The ASWPRs are estimated from this round data for age groups of five years class intervals for principal status (ps) workers and all workers (ps+ss). The relevant data are presented in table no. 5.1 separately for rural, urban and combined and graph 6.



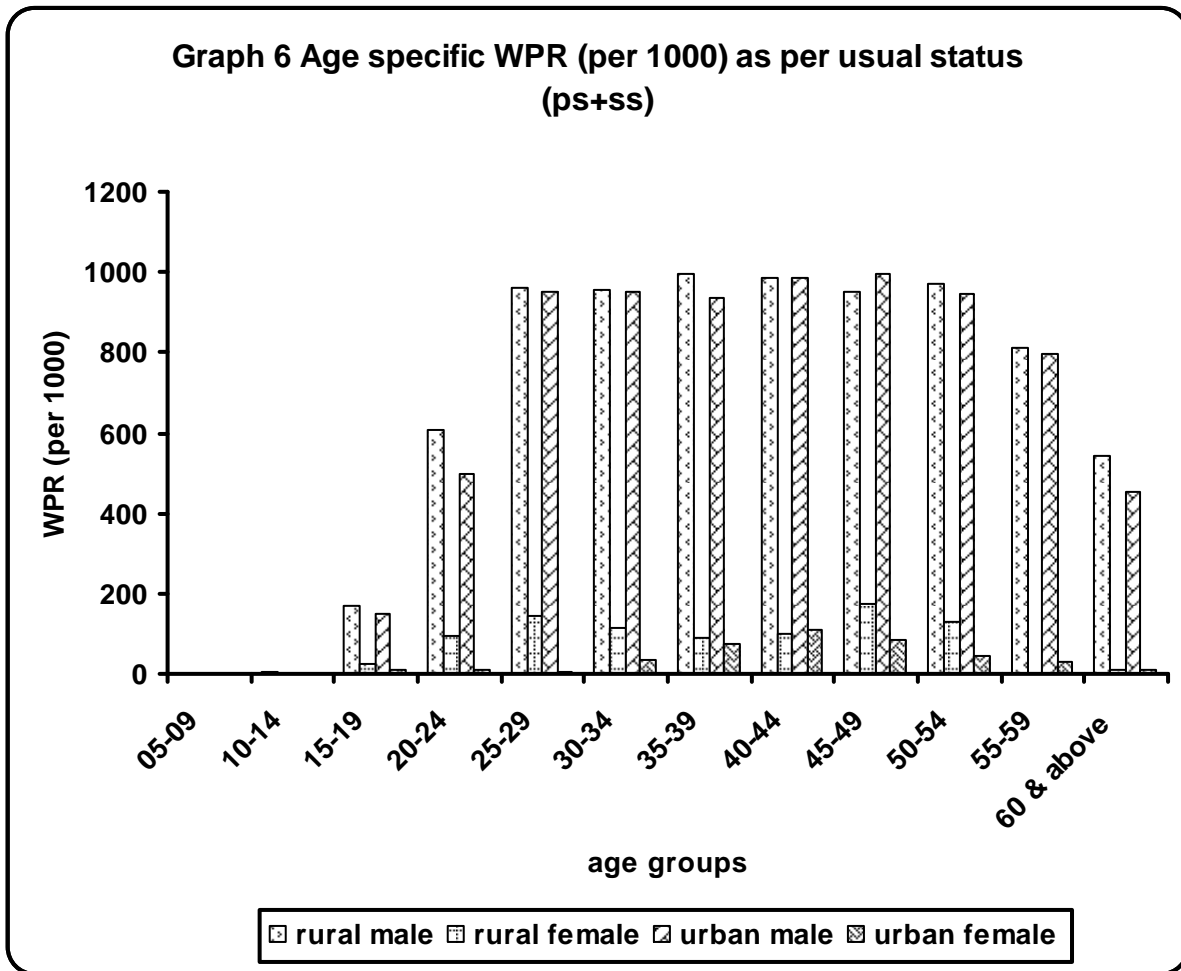

5.1.2 The above table reveals that 48% of males and 5% of the females were employed (ps+ss) at the State level. Almost same ratio was observed for rural males and urban males, whereas this was much higher for rural females (6%) as compared to the urban females (3%). It is noted that in both rural and urban areas, the WPRs of usual subsidiary status (ss) were much higher for females than male.



5.1.3 The above table reveals that 48% of males and 5% of the females were employed (ps+ss) at the State level. Almost same ratio was observed for rural males and urban males, whereas this was much higher for rural females (6%) as compared to the urban females (3%). It is noted that in both rural and urban areas, the WPRs of usual subsidiary status (ss) were much higher for females than male.

5.1.4 According to the age specific worker population ratio (ASWPR), about 81 % or more male population in age 25-59 years were employed usual status basis, whereas the ratio for females in age group 25-59 years was observed between 1% to 15%. About 52% of the aged males (60 years and above) were found in the work force in the State.

5.1.5 According to sector, about 54% of age males (60 years and above) in rural areas and about 48% of aged males in urban areas were found to be in the work force i.e. employed on the usual status (ps+ss) basis. For females it was 7% in rural and 3% in urban areas.

**5.2 Age composition of the usually employed :**

5.2.1 Table No. 5.2 depicts per thousand distributions of usually employed persons by age-group for both the principal status (ps) workers and all (ps+ss) workers.

5.2.2 It is observed that among all workers, about 78% usually employed were in the age group 20-49. The proportion of the males and females usually employed in this age group were 77% and 86% respectively. For the age group 20 to 49 years, the corresponding percentage of the usually employed males was 75% in rural areas and 78% in urban areas. For the females, it was 85% in rural and 83% in urban areas.

5.2.3 According to sector, out of the total male workers about 7% male workers were aged persons (60 years and above) in rural areas and only 1% in urban areas. The considerable rates for females in rural and urban areas were 1% and less than 1% respectively.

**5.3 Educational level specific usual status worker population ratio of persons of age 15 years and above**

5.3.1 Among persons of age 15 years and above, number of persons who are usually employed in a particular education category per thousand persons in that education category is defined as the education level specific worker population ratio. Table no. 5.3 presents Education level specific usual status worker population ratio of age 15 years and above by sex.

5.3.2 It is observed that there were substantial gender differentials in WPR for different levels of education in both rural and urban areas. In rural areas, nearly 65% of the males of age 15 years and above with education level of secondary and above were employed while only 5% for females of age 15 years and above were employed in the same category. In the urban areas, 68% males and 5% females with educational level secondary and above were employed in the same age group. Significant gender differential in WPRs existed even for those with higher level of general education, such as graduate or post graduate and above in both the rural and urban areas. In rural areas, among males with educational level graduate, 81% were employed and this was 14% for females. In urban areas, WPR for this level of general education was 74% and 7% respectively.

#### 5.4 Distribution of usually employed by status of employment

5.4.1 Employed persons are classified into three broad activity groups according to their status of employment. These broad groups are (i) self-employed, (ii) regular wage/ salaried employees and (iii) casual labour. Table No. 5.4 presents per thousand distribution of usually employed by these broad groups for all (ps+ss) workers.

5.4.2 It is observed that in rural Haryana, more than half of the usually employed (all workers) were self employed – 60% among males and 69% among females. In urban areas, though the share of the self-employed was considerably less compared to rural areas, majority of the workers were still engaged in self-employment status: 66% male workers and 32% female workers were self-employed. The proportion of regular wage/salaried persons in rural areas was 10% for males and 4% for females. Whereas in urban areas, these figures were 27% for males and 58% for females respectively. The share of the casual labour in total workforce was 30% and 26% for rural males

and female respectively. These figures stood at 13% for males and 10% for females in urban areas. It is seen that the share of regular wage/salaried persons in total employed are significantly lower for females than the corresponding share for males in rural areas.

## 5.5 Distribution of working person according to broad group of Industry

5.5.1 Information relating to the sector (industry) of employment in which a person was working has been collected for the persons categorized as employed. In case of usually employed, this information was collected for both the principal status (ps) as well as subsidiary status (ss) workers. For the purpose of the study, industry division (01-99) of NIC 2004 has been categorized as (i) primary (01-05), (ii) secondary (10-45) and tertiary (50-99). The table 5.5 and figure shows the distribution of the usually employed by industry, separately for usual 'principal status' workers and for 'all' workers.

5.5.2 The above table reveals that in rural sector, among 'all' usually employed, about 61% of males and 79% of females were engaged in agriculture sector. About 7% rural females were engaged in tertiary sector. In urban sector, about 70% of males and 68% of females were engaged in tertiary sector. About 15% urban females were engaged in secondary sector.

## CHAPTER-6

### Unemployed

#### 6.0 General:

6.0.1 As in the case of employed, for unemployment also, three kinds of estimates are obtained following the three different approaches used in classification of the activity statuses of the person. These are:

- (i) number of persons unemployed based on principal 'usual status' approach,
- (ii) number of persons unemployed on an average in a week, based on the current 'weekly status' (cws) approach, and
- (iv) number of person-days unemployed on an average, on a day during the reference period of seven days preceding the date of survey, based on the current 'daily status' (cds) approach.

6.0.2 The first estimate indicates the magnitude of the persons unemployed for a relatively longer period during a reference period of 365 days and approximates to an indicator of the chronically unemployed. Some of the unemployed might be working in a subsidiary capacity. We can get another estimate of the unemployed excluding those employed in a subsidiary capacity during the reference period. The former is called the usually unemployed according to the principal status (ps) and the later, the usually unemployed excluding those employed in subsidiary status or usual status adjusted i.e., us(adjusted), which would conceptually be lower than the former.

6.0.3 The second estimate is based on the current weekly status and gives the average weekly picture during the survey year. It includes both chronic unemployment and also seasonal unemployment of those categorized as usually employed caused by seasonal fluctuations in economic activity.

6.0.4 The third estimate based on the current daily status concept considers person-days and gives average level of unemployment on a day during the survey year. It captures three aspects of unemployment, viz.;

- (i) the unemployment days of the chronically unemployed,
- (ii) the unemployed days of the usually employed who become seasonally unemployed during the reference week by priority criterion and
- (iii) the (intra-week) unemployed days of those classified as employed according to the priority criterion of current weekly status approach.

This third measure of unemployed can be considered as the most inclusive rate of unemployment.

#### 6.1 Unemployment rate:

6.1.1 Unemployment rate is defined as the number of persons unemployed per thousand persons in the labour force. It is more refined indicator of the unemployment situation in a population than the proportion unemployed, which is merely the number of the unemployed per thousand persons in the population as a whole. Table 6.1 and graph 7 presents the unemployment rates (UR) according to usual status, current weekly status (cws), and current daily status (cds) approach. Proportion unemployed is identical to unemployment rate multiplied by labour force participation rates.

6.1.2 Some of the important points emerging from the above table are:

- (i) unemployment rate was nearly 3 % in the cds approach. The unemployment rate stood at nearly 3% in cws and 2% in the usual status approach, i.e., in usual (adj.);
- (ii) the unemployment rates were higher than rural unemployment rates. The unemployment rate for the urban areas in both usual (adj.) and cws was 4 % compared to 2% in the rural areas. The cds the rate was 4% in the urban areas and 3% in the rural areas and
- (iii) unemployment rates for females were higher than males in urban areas, whereas corresponding rates for females in rural areas were lower than males.

## CHAPTER-7

### Comparison of Haryana with India

#### 7.1 Comparison of Haryana with India

7.1.1 A brief status of Haryana in India on the basis of employment and unemployment and other related characteristics are discussed in this chapter. In this context, table no. 8.1 presents comparison of Haryana (State Sample) to all India results (Central Sample) of 64<sup>th</sup> round of National sample Survey. It is estimated that household employment size in Haryana was 1.49 in rural and 1.24 in urban in India respectively.

7.1.2 The female labour force participation rate (LFPR) according to the usual status (ps+ss) in rural and urban Haryana was obtained 6.5% and 3.2% respectively, whereas this rate at the all India level was 21.2% and 14.6% respectively.

7.1.3 Similarly, the female labour force participation rate (LFPR) according to usual status (ps+ss) of age 15 years and above in rural and urban Haryana was obtained 9.0% and 4.3% respectively, whereas this rate at the all India level was 42.6% and 19.6% respectively.
