KVS Transforms Assessment Practices with Holistic Progress Card

What if a child's progress could be understood through much more than marks? What if a report card could tell us not only how well a child performed in an examination, but also how the child thinks, learns, collaborates, creates, and grows?

This is the idea behind the **Holistic Progress Card (HPC)**, envisaged in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. Moving beyond the traditional marks sheet, the HPC presents a broader picture of a learner's development across cognitive, socio-emotional, affective and psychomotor domains. Teacher observations, self-assessment, peer feedback, parental perspectives, and evidence of learning such as portfolios contribute to this picture.

For Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan, HPC provides an opportunity to look at assessment through a new lens. Instead of asking only, "How much did the child score?", it encourages us to ask, "What has the child learnt, how has the child grown, and what support is needed next?"

This shift is particularly significant in competency-based education. Learning is not merely about remembering information; it is also about applying knowledge, solving problems, thinking critically, communicating effectively, and developing appropriate values and attitudes. By tracking developmental goals and competency indicators, HPC helps teachers recognise individual strengths and identify areas requiring support.

The HPC also gives learners a more active role in assessment. **Self-reflection and self-assessment** encourage children to think about their own learning, while peer assessment and parental participation bring additional perspectives. Assessment thus becomes a shared process rather than something that happens only at the end of a term or examination.

Technology can further strengthen this transformation. KVS has developed its in-house digital platform, **SAMAGAM**, for the management and implementation of HPC. It provides a common platform for recording and organising learner progress, making the process more systematic and consistent across Kendriya Vidyalayas while reducing the burden of maintaining records manually.

Perhaps the most important change is in the nature of feedback. Instead of simply assigning grades, teachers can provide **specific, qualitative, and growth-oriented feedback** that helps learners understand their strengths and identify their next steps.

Ultimately, HPC is not merely a new report card. It represents a **change in the way we look at children and understand learning**. Supported by SAMAGAM, it can help KVS build an assessment culture that is holistic, competency-based, participatory, and focused on the continuous growth of every learner.



More Than just a Game: Sport, Strength and Spirit in KVS

At KVS, education extends beyond textbooks and classrooms. Sports, yoga, physical and health education, and self-defence are integral to the learning experience, helping students grow into healthy, confident and well-rounded individuals. Aligned with NEP 2020, KVS places physical activity, fitness and well-being alongside academic learning. Through Sports Integration, traditional and indigenous Indian games are also incorporated into the educational experience, fostering physical fitness, cultural awareness and a spirit of participation.

Scheduled Time for Sports and Yoga

Dedicated periods for sports and yoga are provided across KVs. For Classes XI and XII, Physical and Health Education is an additional subject. Every KV has a Sports Teacher, while Yoga Experts are engaged on a contractual basis.

Sports Facilities and Infrastructure

KVS provides facilities for a diverse range of sporting activities. Outdoor facilities include football, cricket, volleyball, kho-kho, kabaddi and hockey, while indoor facilities include badminton, table tennis, taekwondo, boxing, shooting and yoga, wherever available. Students selected to represent KVS at regional, national and SGFI-level competitions are provided with sports uniforms and equipment.



Sports Training

Training and coaching camps are organised at school, regional, and national levels. Experts and coaches provide guidance in technical skills, sports strategies, physical fitness, mental strength, and competition preparedness.

Celebrating Sports

National Sports Day is celebrated annually on 29th August across KVs. Annual Sports Days and Mini Sports Days for primary students encourage participation, teamwork, and sportsmanship.

Multi-Level System of Competitions

Sports competitions follow a pathway from inter-house and school levels to regional and national levels. Talented players get opportunities to represent

KVS in National School Games organised by SGFI.

National & International Levels

Students receive opportunities to participate in sports and yoga activities nationally and internationally through sports federations. They also participate in Khelo India School Games and Khelo India Youth Games.

Monitoring System

A structured sports administration system operates through the Sports Department, Regional Sports Cells, and the National Sports Cell at Headquarters. These mechanisms oversee calendars, competitions, player selection, training, and participation.

Awards and Incentives

Excellence is recognised through awards and incentives. Gold, silver, and bronze winners at KVS National Sports Competitions and SGFI-level competitions receive cash awards, encouraging excellence.

The goal goes beyond producing athletes: it is about nurturing healthy, confident, responsible young citizens, equipped with strength of body, clarity of mind, resilience, and values needed to contribute to nation-building.

10 KVs Secure Five-Star Rating under SHVR 2025–26

Ten Kendriya Vidyalayas have secured the prestigious Five-Star Rating under the Swachh Evam Harit Vidyalaya Rating (SHVR) 2025–26, bringing distinction to the Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan. Of the 191 schools across the country recognised with the Five-Star Rating, 10 are Kendriya Vidyalayas.



The achievement reflects the sustained efforts of Kendriya Vidyalayas towards promoting cleanliness, sustainability, healthy practices and holistic student development. A total of 1,275 Kendriya Vidyalayas participated in SHVR 2025–26, demonstrating the organisation’s strong institutional commitment to the objectives of Swachhata and environmental sustainability.

Launched by the Ministry of Education on 29 July 2025, SHVR is aligned with the vision of NEP 2020 and seeks to promote clean, green, healthy, inclusive, and sustainable school environments. The rating framework assesses schools across

60 indicators, covering areas including Clean Water, Toilets, Handwashing with Soap, Operation and Maintenance, Behaviour Change and Capacity Building, and Mission LiFE activities.

The Five-Star recognition is a testament to the collective efforts of students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders in embedding cleanliness, responsible practices and sustainability into everyday school life. The 10 recognised Kendriya Vidyalayas will receive a Certificate of Merit, a cash award of ₹1,00,000 and other recognitions.

The achievement provides an encouraging benchmark for other Kendriya Vidyalayas and reinforces KVS’s commitment to creating campuses that are cleaner, greener, healthier and more sustainable. The recognition is expected to inspire schools across the Sangathan to further strengthen their efforts towards Swachhata, sustainability and excellence.



Minds in Motion

From Arrangement Periods to a Culture of Reasoning

What if an arrangement period becomes more than simply “free time”? What if a few minutes of purposeful thinking help students become better questioners, problem-solvers and decision-makers?



“Building Reasoning Skills among Students” is a focused initiative for 3,320 Class IX students in the KVS RO Ranchi. It transforms arrangement periods into meaningful opportunities to think, question, analyse and reason—without adding another subject or increasing academic pressure.

Rooted in the competency-based vision of NEP 2020, the initiative takes learning beyond remembering facts to understanding, applying, evaluating and creating.

Through age-appropriate questions, puzzles, situations, patterns, case studies and real-life problems, students practise different forms of reasoning. They do not simply answer “What?” but also explore “How?”, “Why?” and “What makes you think so?”

The approach follows a continuous cycle:

Assess → Practise → Observe → Reflect
→ Improve → Reassess

A baseline assessment identifies students’ existing reasoning abilities, while regular activities help strengthen logical thinking, interpretation, inference, analysis, evaluation, evidence-based judgement and problem-solving.

Teachers act as facilitators of thinking, encouraging students to explain their ideas, consider alternatives, question assumptions, learn from mistakes and support conclusions with logic and evidence.

Existing resources, including library materials, reference books and reasoning resources, are thoughtfully adapted to create Class IX practice sets, worksheets and competency-based activities.

The larger vision is simple yet powerful: reasoning becomes a habit, not an occasional exercise.

A period becomes an opportunity.
A question becomes an inquiry.
An answer becomes a reasoning process.
And the classroom becomes a space for thinking.

Crack the Code and Solve It

The Ultimate Riddle Challenge at KVS RO Mumbai

The Riddle Challenge, an innovative academic initiative of KVS Regional Office Mumbai, begins with a simple yet powerful question: *Can a riddle become a doorway to deeper thinking?* The answer unfolds every time a student pauses, observes, questions, and attempts to solve the seemingly simple problem before them.

The initiative recognises that meaningful education goes beyond marks and academic performance. It creates an engaging space where curiosity, conceptual clarity, analytical ability and confidence grow through the joy of solving.

From First Riddle to a Growing Tradition

The journey began with the first Riddle Challenge on 1 November 2025, organised for students of Classes VI to XII across Kendriya Vidyalayas of the Mumbai Region. Its fourth edition, held on 18 August 2026, reflects the growing interest in an initiative that turns thinking into an experience.

The Clue is in the Thinking

A riddle rarely gives away its answer. It makes students look again. Through carefully designed challenges, learners observe patterns, interpret symbols and numbers, connect ideas, identify relationships, question assumptions, and explore multiple possibilities. They learn that the first answer is not always the right answer, and that a different way of looking at a problem can open an entirely new path to its solution.



A Puzzle with a Purpose

The Riddle Challenge is not merely an entertaining break from conventional



learning. It nurtures logical reasoning, lateral thinking, observation, perseverance, and problem-solving. Every riddle becomes a small exercise in inquiry. Students test an idea, encounter a dead end, rethink their approach, and try again. In the process, even a wrong answer becomes valuable; it teaches reflection, persistence, and the confidence to begin again.

~ Every riddle solved is a step towards a brighter, smarter, and better tomorrow.

~ Sometimes the real challenge is not to solve the riddle. **It is to discover what the riddle teaches the mind to do.**

Connecting Minds Across Subjects

The strength of the challenge lies in its interdisciplinary character. Mathematics, science, language, logic, observation and imagination come together naturally.



Students draw upon knowledge from different areas, make unexpected connections, and apply what they know in unfamiliar situations. This makes the experience closely aligned with the broader educational vision of KVS, where learning is not confined to textbooks but encourages students to think, explore, connect, and create.

The Joy of Finding Out

Perhaps the greatest strength of the Riddle Challenge is its ability to make students curious about the *process* rather than simply the answer. A moment of confusion becomes an invitation to investigate. A difficult clue becomes a reason to persist. A solution becomes a moment of discovery. And that is where

the real learning happens.

One Riddle at a Time

The Riddle Challenge reminds us that a question can be as valuable as an answer. It encourages young minds to look beyond the obvious, challenge assumptions, and approach unfamiliar problems with curiosity and confidence.
