1. Read the following text.

1. The economic condition of low-income regions remains one of the most pressing challenges of the modern world. Their advancement is of vital importance not only for humanitarian and political reasons but also because sustained growth in these regions can significantly enhance global economic expansion and prosperity. Recognizing this, many high-income nations have implemented major aid initiatives, both directly and through international cooperation, to support development in poorer countries. They have also sought to encourage freer trade through the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), allowing special arrangements that address the needs of developing economies. Nevertheless, if low-income countries are to achieve satisfactory growth, a much faster expansion of trade with high-income nations is required.
2. This statement focuses on the trade policies of high-income countries toward low-income nations. Its recommendations stem from the belief that a fairer distribution of global resources and more efficient use of labor benefit all. A liberal trade policy by wealthy nations not only supports the progress of poorer ones but, after necessary adjustments, also strengthens their own economies. Yet, it must be acknowledged that while high-income countries can provide assistance, the primary responsibility for development rests with the low-income nations themselves. Progress will be greatest where developing countries demonstrate commitment, discipline, and effective use of the aid and trade opportunities offered to them.
3. To achieve lasting growth, low-income countries must apply lessons learned from past experience. Inflation has caused serious harm, and stable financial policies are essential for encouraging domestic savings, investment, and attracting foreign capital. Prudent fiscal and monetary management, combined with an efficient financial system, can mobilize resources for productive investment and sustain faster growth. Equally important, governments must pursue policies that provide economic opportunities broadly and reduce severe social inequalities, as this fosters greater public participation in national development.
4. Development strategies have often focused too narrowly on industrial expansion. However, industrial growth cannot proceed without parallel progress in agriculture, where most of the population in low-income countries is employed. Rising agricultural productivity is crucial not only to feed growing cities and ease dependence on food imports but also to create markets for emerging industries. As agricultural surpluses in high-income countries decline, it becomes even more urgent for low-income nations to raise farm output. Greater success in agriculture will also encourage trade among developing nations themselves and boost their exports to wealthier economies.
5. The world food problem adds to the urgency. Adequate nutrition is vital for both adults and children, yet in many poor countries food production lags behind population growth, threatening chronic famine. Resolute efforts are needed to improve food production, storage, and distribution so that these nations can secure a sustainable and sufficient food supply.

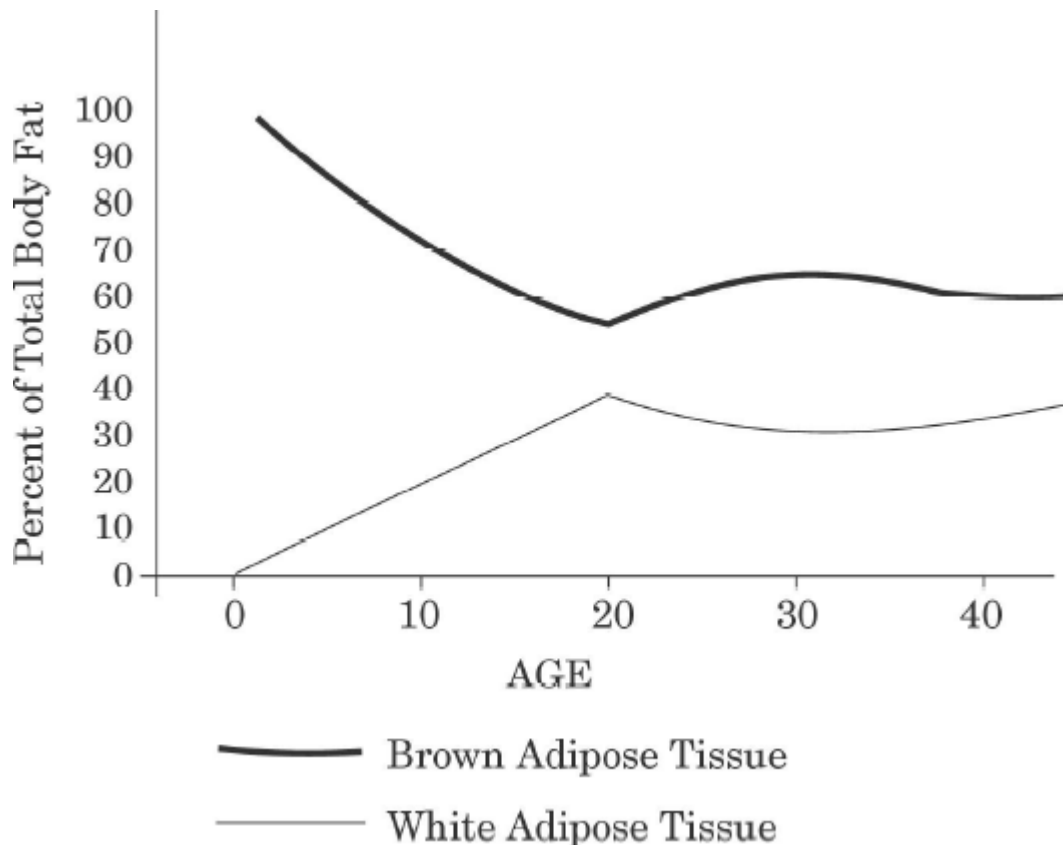

2. Read the following text.

- Research by a team of scientists has uncovered a surprising way to stimulate the development of healthy fat in humans. In the long-term, the team’s findings may have implications for the development of weight loss medication. These scientists found that the kind of stress that accompanies third degree burns may induce the human body to convert normal fat cells into brown fat, which burns calories at a higher rate. If future research can determine how and where the body accomplishes this conversion, it may be possible to develop drugs that induce artificial yet remarkably rapid fat burning in obese patients.
- White adipose tissue (normal, white fat) accounts for most of the fat in the bodies of most mammals. Small mammals and newborn humans, however have a high proportion of brown fat. The difference between the two types led scientists to believe that brown fat has the potential to combat obesity. This is because brown fat contains excess of mitochondria: the structures within body cells that are responsible for producing energy. This means that brown fat burns more calories and releases more heat when it burns. After all, the function of naturally occurring brown fat is to generate heat in small animals, or in human infants, who do not yet have the ability to shiver.
- The research began with the observation that patients with severe, widespread burns needed to consume more calories each day in order to maintain their weight. On studying the fat cells of 48 severe burn patients throughout their treatment, analysis of the fat samples revealed that what was once white adipose tissue had ‘browned’, acquiring many characteristics similar to brown fat. This included its ability to burn fat at a high rate.

4. Of course, we are still a long way from the practical applications of these findings. This research however indicates the possibility of converting white fat into brown and reveals something about the conditions that catalyze such a conversion.
