


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## **MESSAGE**

# MESSAGE


It gives me immense pleasure to write a message for the 17th Annual Report of the National Trust 2016-17.

My best wishes are with all the parents, persons with disabilities, officials of National Trust, representatives of registered organizations and all those who are associated with them in this noble cause.



# **Chairman's Report**

Welcome to the Annual Report 2016-17 of the National Trust.

The year 2016-17 has been a year of some programmes. I would like to mention a few.

Three National Workshops for training Master Trainers for assessment of Autism using lNCLEN and ISAA Tools were held in collaboration with Child Neurology Division, AIIMS for the professionals in the areas of Pediatrician, Psychiatrist and Clinical Psychologist. Professionals from different states participated in the Workshop. These Master Trainers will further train other professionals in their States to facilitate issuance of Certificate in Autism.

Cultural performances were given by Divyaangjan during the National Trust Foundation Day Programme. The amazing performance in every programme by including Divyaang Children and the encouragement of huge crowd of audience in the hall was heart touching.

The National Trust is in process to finalize the Early Intervention training programme of National Trust. In this regard, National Trust is preparing a course module for Trans-Disciplinary Workers and Key Workers. To finalize this module a 2 days meeting was held in the National Trust office.

The National Trust orgnised a "Talent Hunt - Autistic Marvels" contest to spot talented persons with Autism in the country. Hon'ble Minister Sh. Thaawarchand Gehlot and Ministers of state Sh. Krishan Pal Gurjar, Sh. Ramdas Athawale graced the occasion and honored the winners.

In collaboration with Muskaan - the Delhi State Nodal Agency Centre (SNAC) of the National Trust organized National Conference on Down Syndrome for observing the World Down Syndrome Day" More than 300 persons including Persons with Down Syndrome, Parents of Persons with Down Syndrome, Members of Civil Societies, Officials of Central and State Governments, Foreign Delegates etc were present.

In order to disseminate information on new/revised schemes, regional level workshops were organized in different states during the year. Officers from the National Trust attended the workshop as Resource Person.

The Inclusive India Campaign started by National Trust is a unique campaign. Registered organizations working with the National Trust will be the first vehicle of Inclusive India Mission. At the same time, the National Trust will work together with community organizations, government organizations and private sector organizations to create inclusion in education, employment and community.

I would like to thank Hon'ble Minister for SJ&E, Hon'ble Ministers of State for SJ&E, Secretary and officials of Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities from National Trust Board for their continuous support and cooperation in running the schemes and showing interest in our programmes. With their support, the National Trust is trying to touch these heights.

# Report of Joint Secretary & Chief Executive Officer



I welcome all the Trustees of the National Trust Board, Representatives of Organisations registered with the National Trust and other stakeholders.

I took over the charge of National Trust in November, 2016 when the new Scheme Management System and its new/revised schemes were launched by the Hon'ble Minister for Social Justice & Empowerment. The National Trust's main focus in organizing its activities during this year (2016-17) is access, inclusion, acceptance, respect, involvement, diversity and education.

The National Trust added a feather in its cap when Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India notified the Guidelines for Assessment of Autism for the purposes of issuance of disability certificate in consultation with Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. The long standing demand of people with this disability and their parents /guardians has been fulfilled. The Indian Scale of Assessment of Autism will provide the detailed assessment procedure and tools for assessing the extent of disability for persons with autism beyond 6 years ofage.

National Trust has not only stopped here in getting the Autism notified but it has organized three training workshops for Master Trainer in collaboration with Child Neurology Division, AIIMS for the professionals working in the area of Pediatrician, Psychiatrist and Clinical Psychologist etc. to train them as Master Trainers for assessment of Autism, using INCLEN & ISAA tools.

National Trust participated in a mega camp organized by Depaftment of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities in Vadodara in October, 2016. Approximately 300 beneficiaries of the National Trust under its different Schemes i.e. Niramaya Health Insurance Scheme, Vikaas and Disha Scheme were also present in the camp. One of the Niramaya beneficiaries was given Niramaya Health ID Card by the Hon'ble Prime Minister, which was generated through the New Scheme Management System of the National Trust. In the Awareness Camp organised Chhattisgarh Govt. where Hon'ble Governor of Chhattisgarh was the Chief Guest one of the Niramaya beneficiaries was given Niramaya Health ID Card by the Chief Minister, Chattisgarh which was also generated through the New Management System, in the Chhattisgarh State.

'Manthan', a Brain Storming Session on issues related to Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities and including Early Intervention and School Readiness, Education, Skill Development, Self Employment, Employment Generation, Assistive Technologies, Care facilities, Awareness Generation etc. was also organized. A number of action points including convergence of Early Intervention Services of the National Trust with the early intervention services of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare under Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK), convergence of Skill Development Programme for persons with these disabilities with the Skill India initiatives of the Govt. of India etc. were finalized.

A National Consultation workshop on Skill Development Livelihood for Persons with Disabilities was organised to finalize strategy and plan for skill development of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) in collaboration with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC). Representative from the Industries, professionals in the sector, representatives from concerned department organizations etc. participated in the day long workshop.

National Trust has launched "Inclusive India Campaign", for achieving this. The Campaign will work in three important areas of "Inclusive Education", "Inclusive Employment" and "Inclusive Community Life".

The Campaign was launched in a conference inaugurated by Shri Thaawarchand Gehlot, Hon'ble Minister, Social Justice and Empowerment 6tn June, 2017, in presence of Minister HRD, Shri Javadekar, CEO, Niti Ayog, Shri Amitabh Kant and other dignitaries.

While In the areas of "Inclusive Education" and "Inclusive Employment" we are planning to organize a series of workshops and training conferences for schools and employers respectively, we are trying to bring the "Inclusive Community Life" by actually organizing many such inclusive events across the country.

I would like to thank Hon'ble Minister for Social Justice & Empowerment Shri Thaawarchand Gehlot, Hon'ble Minister of States for SJ&E Shri Krishan Pal Gurjar, Shri VijaySampla and Shri Ramdas Athawale and Shri N.S. Kang, Secretary, DEPwD for their support innotification of INCLEN and Autism Tool, for financial support in running schemes and also fortheir presence in many events of the National Trust.

During the year with the support and participation of all our stakeholders we could achieve and cover additional milestones. In the coming years, the focus will be on how to generate additional resources for our schemes. Active steps are continuing by requesting Ministry of Finance to increase Grant Amounts received by the National Trust.

I am sure National Trust has been able to build trust in persons with disabilities and parents of the persons with these disabilities. Let us join hands in accomplishing our task and fulfilling the objectives of the National Trust.



# 3. Introduction

The National Trust is a statutory body constituted by an Act of Parliament namely The National Trust for the Welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities Act, 1999.

The objectives of the National Trust are as follows:-

- To enable and empower persons with disability to live as independently and as fully as possible within and as close to the community to which they belong;
- ii. To strengthen facilities to provide support to persons with disability to live within their own families;
- To extend support to registered organizations to provide need based services during period of crisis in the family of persons with disability;
- iv. To deal with problems of persons with disability who do not have family support;
- v. To promote measures for the care and protection of persons with disability in the event of death of their parent or guardian;
- vi. To evolve procedures for the appointment of guardians and trustees for persons with disability requiring such protection;
- vii. To facilitate the realization of equal opportunities, protection of rights and full participation of persons with disability; and
- viii. To do any other act which is incidental to the aforesaid objects.

The National Trust has been set up to discharge two basic duties- legal and welfare. Legal duties are discharged through Local Level Committees and providing Legal Guardianship. Welfare duty is discharged through the Schemes. The activities of the National Trust inter-alia include training, awareness and capacity building programmes and shelter, care giving & empowerment. The National Trust is committed to facilitate equal opportunities, protection of rights and full participation of persons with disabilities (Divyangjan), covered under the Act.

The Schemes highlight and the projects sanctioned under New/Revised schemes, which were launched in November 2015 are as under:

#### I. Disha (Early Intervention and School Readiness Scheme)

This is an early intervention and school readiness scheme for children in the age group of 0-10 years with the four disabilities covered under the National Trust Act and aims at setting up Disha Centres for early intervention for Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) through therapies, trainings and providing support to family members. RO should provide day-care facilities to PwDs (Divyangjan) for at least 4 hours in a day (between 8 am to 6 pm) along with age specific activities. There should be a Special Educator or Early Intervention Therapist, Physiotherapist or Occupational Therapist and Counsellor for PwDs (Divyangjan) along with Caregiver and Ayas in the centre.

The revised Early Intervention Scheme has provision to cover 0 to 10 years of age group of children in place of 0 to 6 years of age group as envisaged in the earlier scheme. The set up cost has been increased from Rs.



50,000 to Rs. 1.55 lakh. Similarly, the yearly grant has been increased from Rs. 1.55 lakh to Rs. 5.40 lakh.

During the year 2016-17, under Disha scheme, 48 Projects have been sanctioned and Rs.3.12 crore has been released. The comprehensive list of all project holders under the scheme is available on the website.

#### ii. VIKAAS (Day Care)

This is a Day care scheme for Divyangjan attaining the age of 10 years and above, primarily to expand the range of opportunities available to a person with disability for enhancing interpersonal and vocational skills as they are on a transition to higher age groups. The centre will also offer caregiving support to Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) during the time the Divyangjan are in the Vikaas centre. In addition, it also helps in supporting family members of the Persons with disabilities covered under the National Trust Act to get some time during the day to fulfil other responsibilities. RO should provide day-care facilities to Divyangjan for at least 6 hours in a day (between 8 am to 6 pm) along with age specific activities. Day care should be open for at least 21 days in a month.

During the year 2016-17, under Vikaas Scheme 78 Projects have been sanctioned and Rs.6.27 crore has been released. The comprehensive list of all project holders under the scheme is available on the website.

#### iii. Samarth (Respite Care Residential Scheme)

The objective of Samarth scheme is to provide respite home for orphans or abandoned, families in crisis and also for Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) from BPL & LIG families including destitute with at least one of the four disabilities covered under the National Trust Act. It also aims at creating opportunities for family members to get respite time in order to fulfil other responsibilities. This scheme aims at setting up Samarth Centres for providing group home facility for all age groups with adequate and quality care service with acceptable living standards including provision of basic medical care from professional doctors.

Samarth Scheme has provision of work center. Per beneficiary monthly recurring cost has been revised from Rs.1600 p.m. to Rs.7000 p.m. The Scheme has full time support in place of tapering grant.

During the year 2016-17, under Samarth Scheme, 20 Projects have been sanctioned and Rs.2.49 crore has been released. The comprehensive list of all project holders under the scheme is available on the website.

#### iv. Gharaunda (Group Home for Adults)

The objective of Gharaunda scheme is to provide an assured home and minimum quality of care services throughout the life of the persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities. The scheme also facilitates establishment of requisite infrastructure for the assured care system throughout the country, encourage assisted living with independence and dignity and provide care services on a sustainable basis.

GHARAUNDA Scheme has 1:1 ratio for LIG (including BPL) and above LIG PwDs (Divyangjan), (which will be paid seats for Registered Organisations) in place of 5:1. There will be monthly recurring fund of Rs. 10,000 per PwD (Divyang) in place of onetime payment of Rs. 8 lakh per PwD (Divyang). In addition, there will be one time set up fund of Rs. 2.50 lakh, crisis fund of Rs. 10 lakh and fund for setting work center ranging from Rs. 25,000/- to 1,00,000/-.

During the year 2016-17, under Gharaunda Scheme, 24 Projects have been sanctioned and Rs.3.66 crore has been released. The comprehensive list of all project holders under the scheme is available on the website.



#### v. Niramaya' Health Insurance Scheme

The scheme is to provide affordable Health Insurance to persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities. The enrolled beneficiaries get a health insurance cover upto Rs.1.0 lakh, by paying a nominal fee.

During the year 2016-17, 76,670 beneficiaries have been enrolled. Total 6915 claims have been settled. Total expenditure under the scheme is worth Rs.4.63 crore. At present, the scheme is being implemented through M/s. Oriental Insurance Co. Ltd., w.e.f. April, 2015.



#### vi. Sahyogi (Care Associate Training scheme)

This scheme aims at setting up Care Associate (Caregiver) Cells (CACs) to provide training and create a skilled workforce of Care Associates to provide adequate and nurturing care for Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) and their families who require it. It also seeks to provide parents an opportunity to get trained in care giving, if they so desire. This scheme will provide a choice of training through two levels of courses primary and advanced to allow it to create care associates suited to work both with Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) families and other institutions catering to the needs of the Divyangjan (NGOs, work centres etc.).

There is a provision of training cost of Rs.4,200 per trainee, for primary course and Rs.8,000 for advanced course. Also, stipend for trainee @ Rs.5,000 for primary and Rs.10,000 for advanced course has been introduced in the scheme.

During the year 2016-17, under Sahyogi Scheme, 39 Projects have been sanctioned for training of Caregivers for which Rs.46.82 lakhs has been released. The comprehensive list of all project holders under the scheme is available on the website.

#### vii. Gyan Prabha (Educational Support)

Gyan Prabha scheme aims to encourage people with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities for pursuing educational courses like graduation courses, professional courses and vocational training leading to employment or self-employment. The courses applied for should be recognized by the competent State or Central Authority. For applying under the scheme, the eligibility under the scheme is:
(i) Divyangjan should have one of the disabilities under the National Trust Act, 1999; (ii) no age and income limit; (iii) should not be enrolled under Gharaunda, Samarth, Disha or Vikaas, if he or she is applying for vocational course from the same Registered Organisation; and (iv) should be enrolled only under one course under Gyan Prabha at a particular point of time

The National Trust provides a specific amount per course to a Divyangjan, which covers fees, transportation, books, out of pocket expenses (OPEs) etc.

The revised scheme covers wide range of courses in place of only vocational training / skill development courses.

The application can be submitted online (<u>www.thenationaltrust.gov.in</u>) by the PwD and he/she can also get in touch with the nearest RO, in order to seek guidance in applying for the scheme. Registered Organisation can help or facilitate the PwD for successful completion of the application form.

During the year 2016-17, under Gyan Prabha Scheme, 8 beneficiaries have been paid scholarship fund amounting to Rs.1.74 lakh.

#### viii. Prerna (Marketing Assistance)

Prerna is the marketing assistance scheme of the National Trust with an objective to create viable and widespread channels for sale of products and services produced by Persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) covered under the National Trust Act. This scheme aims at providing funds to participate in events such as exhibitions, melas, fairs, etc. to sell the products made by PwDs. The scheme also provides an incentive to the Registered Organisations (ROs) based on the sales turnover of the products made by PwDs. The National Trust shall fund RO's participation in National, Regional, State and District level events such as fairs, exhibitions, melas etc. for marketing and selling products and services prepared by PwDs. However, at least 51% of



employees of these work centres should be Persons with Disabilities covered under the National Trust Act.

#### ix. Sambhay (Aids and Assistive Devices)

This is a scheme to setup additional resource centres, one each in each city of the country with population greater than 5 million (As per 2011 census), to collate and collect the Aids, software and other form of assistive devices developed with a provision of display and demonstration of the devices. The scheme also includes maintaining information, pertaining to aids and assistive devices present at Sambhav centre, on the National Trust website. These centres aim to provide information and easy access to devices, appliances, aids, software etc. for betterment and empowerment of Divyangjan of the National Trust disabilities.

During the year, under the scheme, one (1) project sanctioned to Action for Ability Development & Inclusion (AADI), New Delhi.

#### x. Badhte Kadam (Awareness and Community Interaction)

This scheme shall support Registered Organisations (ROs) of The National Trust to carry out activities that focus on increasing the awareness of The National Trust disabilities. Aim of scheme is to create community awareness, sensitisation, social integration and mainstreaming of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan). The National Trust shall sponsor maximum of 4 events for each RO per year. Each RO should conduct at least 1 event either for community, educational institutes or medical institutes, in a year.

During the year 2016-17, under Badhte Kadam Scheme, 95 organizations have registered and Rs.63.94 lakhs has been released. The comprehensive list of all project holders under the scheme is available on the website.

#### 4. Local Level Committee

Under Section 13 of the National Trust Act 1999, a Local Level Committee is required to be constituted in every district of the country for a period of three years or till it is reconstituted by the Board consisting of following members:-

- ✓ An officer of the Civil Service of the Union or of the State not below the rank of District Magistrate or a District Commissioner of a District;
- ✓ A representative of an organization registered with the National Trust; and
- ✓ A person with disability as defined in Clause (t) of Section 2 of the Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995(1 of 1996)

The function of Local Level Committee is to screen appoint, monitor and remove legal guardians. LLCs also promote activities such as Awareness generation, convergence and mainstreaming of persons with disabilities.

In order to make Local Level Committee more accountable, the online process for functioning of Local Level Committees has been started. The Login ID and password of all the DC/DMs/LLC Chairperson, have been sent, so that they can start doing online processing of cases under Legal Guardianship. For LLC membership, the NGO (registered with the National Trust) and PwD member have to apply online and after uploading the required documents they can submit the application. The Constitution / Reconstitution Order can be downloaded after the approval of the Competent Authority of the National Trust.

So far, 651 LLCs have been constituted covering all the districts of the country (excluding the State of J&K) with DC/DM as Chairperson LLC.



# 5. Appointment of Legal Guardians

- (i) Section 14-17 of The National Trust Act, 1999 elaborates on Guardianship for persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities to be given by the Local Level Committee. Guardianship is a need based enabling provision.
- (ii) A guardian is a person who is appointed to look after another person or his property. He or she assumes the care and protection of the person for whom he/she is appointed the guardian. The guardian takes all legal decisions on behalf of the person and the property of the ward.
- (iii) Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities are in a special situation as even after they have acquired 18 years of age, they may not always be capable of managing their own lives or taking legal decisions for their own betterment. Therefore, they may require someone to represent their interests in the legal areas throughout their lives. However, in cases of cerebral palsy and multiple disabilities, there may be a need for only limited guardianship because of the availability of enabling mechanisms and/or scientific facilitations which enable such persons to function with varying degrees of independence.
- (iv) Under section 14 of the National Trust Act, the Local Level Committee headed by the District Collector is empowered to receive application in Form A under Rule 16(1) & appoint guardians in Form B under Rule 16(2) for persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation & Multiple Disabilities. It also provides mechanism for monitoring and protecting their interests including their properties.

New system has been generated for applying for Legal Guardianship and 431 legal guardians appointed through new Scheme Management System.

# 6. Registration of Organizations

- (I) As per section 12(1) of the National Trust Act, any voluntary organization, the association of parents of persons with disabilities or the association of persons with disabilities, working in the field of autism, cerebral palsy, mental retardation and multiple disabilities" already registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860(21 of 1860), or section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956(1 of 1956), or as a Public Charitable Trust and under Persons With Disability Act, 1995 in the concerned state, can apply for registration in the National Trust. The registration of such organization shall be necessary with the Trust for availing benefits under the schemes of the Trust.
- (ii) On the new website of the National Trust, which has been launched on 24.11.2015 along with the 10 new / revised Schemes, the entire process right from applying to processing and approving or rejecting is online. Registration fee is also to be deposited electronically. The NGO has to enclose all the documents with the on-line application. It is not only on-line but also very transparent as each applicant automatically receives an email alert informing the status of application. Registration of Organizations is done all around the year.
- (iii) The NGOs who are registered with the National Trust and whenever their PWD Act registration expires, shall be given a grace period of 6 months to one year, for getting new registration under PWD Act.

During the year 2016-17, 238 Registered Organizations (ROs) have done online registration and since launch of new system w.e.f. 24.11.2015 to 31.3.2017 the total number of Registered Organisations in the New Management System is 506. The list of ROs can be seen State-wise and District-wise, on the website.

# 7. Revision of State Nodal Agency Centre (SNAC) Guidelines



The State Nodal Agency Center (SNAC) is an existing scheme of the National Trust, started during 2003-04 on a pilot basis, after due approval of the Standing Finance Committee (SFC), for the period of two years. After successful implementation of the scheme, the scheme has been revised and improved to reach the remote area of the country. The 23rd Board Meeting of the National Trust held on 14.6.06 also suggested for the modification and extension of the scheme.

The National Trust found that information sharing through State Nodal Agency Centers has been very successful in terms of taking off the activities of National Trust and hence has been expanded to include State Nodal Agency Partners (SNAPs) alongwith SNACs. In 2007-08 new scheme came in to existence in which 32 SNACs were set up for two years. In addition to SNAC, 37 SNAPs were also set up in almost every state for two years. The SNAP has been made in the manner of 1 SNAP per 10 districts of a State for helping the SNAC to work properly and in close proximity of National Trust and State Governments for creating awareness in the remotest corners of each State.

From April 2011 onwards SNAPs tenure was not extended but SNACs period was extended for 2 more years till March 2013. The period of SNACs was extended till March 2014. Again the 32 SNACs were appointed in April 2014 which completed their tenure in March 2017.

In 2016-17, the SNAC guidelines has been revised. The salient features of the revised SNAC guidelines is as under-

#### (I) Roles

#### A. Convergence with State Governments

- The SNAC should be required to create awareness in the State with government functionaries about National Trust and its activities. SNAC shall coordinate with the Chief Secretary of the State and conduct quarterly meeting with Secretaries of Social Welfare and other related Departments.
- ii. Create synergy between National Trust and State Govt. Schemes.
- iii. To coordinate and liaison with different State authorities and officials for ensuring convergence with various State & Central scheme and programmes for PwDs.
- iv. To work as vibrant "knowledge centres" for disability related information, best practices, research and development and other issues of your state. Aware the Registered Organisation time to time about the State Govt. initiatives / schemes for the welfare of PwDs.
- v. To work for sensitization & awareness generation in the community and empowerment of PwDs.

#### B. Data/Information & Resource Centre

- i. The SNAC will be required to maintain a regular database which shall be updated regularly, relating to the beneficiaries of these four disabilities in the State.
- ii. Quarterly report to be submitted by the SNAC to the National Trust giving all relevant data.
- iii. Facilitation of LLCs SNACs shall liaison with all members of the LLCs and their legal guardians. They will encourage activities for creating awareness in LLCs.
- iv. Visiting of all Registered Organisations in their respective state and mentoring to the small NGOs.
- v. Sensitization of professional groups and government officials, LLC members.

#### C. Desirable responsibilities

- i. Conducting of professional training programmes.
- ii. Inspection of NGOs, as per the instructions of the National Trust.



#### (II) The Criteria for selection of a lead NGO/SNAC – one in each State

- i. Must be a registered organization under Society Act and also registered with the National Trust.
- ii. Must be registered under PwD Act.
- iii. Have been in existence for more than 7 years.
- iv. Be a legally Constituted Body not running for profit to any individual and body of individuals.
- v. Have proven track record in running other projects and running atleast two National Trust existing schemes.
- vi. Preferably, be receiving grants from Disability Division, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment.
- vii. Must not have been blacklisted by the State / Central Govt. / Other Govt.
- viii. Have qualified and experienced staff as service providers, trainers and administrators.

#### (III) Categories of SNAC

Based on the size & population of the States, the two categories are defined for SNACs. Category 'A' where the districts are more than 25 and Category 'B' where districts are less than 25.

#### (IV) Funding Pattern

Keeping in view, the inflation rate and desired outcome from the SNAC Coordinators, their honorarium has been revised

#### (V) SNAC Term

- 1. The tenure of the SNAC will be for 3 years.
- 2. Registered Organisation (ROs) is eligible to work as SNAC only for 2 consecutive periods only, and can reapply after the break of atleast 3 years.

During the year 2016-17, an amount of Rs.21,10,000/- has been released to the SNACs. The comprehensive list of all State Nodal Agency Centres (SNACs) is available on the website.

# 8. State Level Coordination Committee (SLCC)

Every State/UT Government has been requested to set up a State Level Coordination Committee (SLCC) for effective implementation and monitoring of the schemes of the National Trust. The Secretary of the State Government looking after disability affairs is the Chairperson and the respective SNAC is the convener of the Committee. So far, SLCCs have been constituted in 26 States / Union Territories.

# 9. Approval of additional grant to the National Trust

The Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwDivyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment has approved an additional grant of Rs. 6.48 crore for 2016-17 to the National Trust.

# 10. Board Meetings

Five Board meetings have been organized during the year and the minutes circulated expeditiously to all the Trustees of the Board and also affixed in the Minutes Register duly signed by the Chairperson and Member

Secretary of the Board. The dates of the Board Meetings are as under:-

#### 11. Information and Communication Technology (ICT) initiatives of the National Trust

- i. Website and Scheme Management System (SMS): Under the ICT initiatives of the National Trust in conformity with the 'Digital India' Initiative of the Govt. of India, a new interactive and user friendly website (www.thenationaltrust.gov.in) and a Scheme Management System (SMS) have been developed for providing an upto date information on the activities of the National Trust. The SMS enable online implementation of the schemes of the National Trust. Under the Scheme Management System (SMS), there is provision of online submission of proposals under all the schemes. Processing of these proposals are also done online and auto generated sanction orders are issued through the system. Similarly, eligible funds to be released to these scheme holders, every month, are displayed after filling details of beneficiaries and other information. Apart from this, up-to-date status of all the schemes on different parameters can be seen for monitoring purpose.
- ii. The flow of the application is given below:
  - a) Online registration process of the NGO is there.
  - b) After completing the online registration process, the NGO becomes Registered Organization of the National Trust and is eligible for the schemes of the National Trust.
  - c) The applicant Registered Organization (RO) submits its application to the National Trust, which is being handled first by the Dealing Assistant and if the Dealing Assistant is satisfied, the application is forwarded to the Dealing Officer; otherwise the same is sent back to the Registered Organisation for modification. If the Dealing Officer needs any clarification, the application is sent back to Dealing Assistant, for modification.
  - d) The Dealing Officer, after checking and verifying the application forward it to the JS&CEO / Competent Authority for sanction of fund to the RO, under the scheme. In case any clarification is required, JS&CEO sends back the application to the Dealing Officer.
  - e) The Set up Cost / Sustenance fund / Recurring fund process is also online and procedure is same as mentioned above.
- iii. Payment Gateway: A Payment Gateway for managing financial transactions under the Schemes has been integrated with the Scheme Management System. This has been done in collaboration with Axis Bank.



#### 12. Other Activites and various Conferences and Workshops of The National Trust

- i) National Workshop for training Master Trainers for assessment of Autism using INCLEN and ISAA Tools
- (a) 1st workshop from 31st August to 2nd September, 2016

The National Trust organized a 3 days National level Training Workshop from 31st August to 2nd September, 2016, in collaboration with Child Neurology Division, AIIMS for the professionals in the areas of Pediatrician, Psychiatrist and Clinical Psychologist, to train them as Master Trainers for assessment of Autism, using INCLEN & ISAA tools for issuance of Certificate in Autism. This Workshop on Autism Training is the first of its kind in India organized by the National Trust and was inaugurated on 31st August 2016 in Vigyan Bhawan by Shri Thaawarchand Gehlot, Hon'ble Minister (SJ&E) as Chief Guest, in the presence of Shri Krishan Pal Gurjar, Hon'ble Minister of State (SJ&E) as Guest of Honor. During the inauguration, Book on Autism and Tools, used as Modules for training were also launched by Hon'ble Minister (SJ&E). Prof. M.C. Mishra, Director, AIIMS and Prof. V. K. Paul, Head of Department of Pediatrics also attended the inaugural function and appreciated the effort of the National Trust and the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, for taking this initiative. Prof. Mishra also assured for their association and long term collaboration with the National Trust and the DEPwD. More than 75 Professionals from 18 states participated in the Workshop. These Master Trainers will further train other professionals in their States to facilitate issuance of Certificate in Autism.





Disability certificate for person with Autism is a primary requirement for availing benefits from the National Trust and other government agencies. In the absence of certificate, they would be deprived of their empowerment and their inclusion in the society.

Though the Government had notified Autism as a disability in 2001, it had not been issuing certificates. The Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, under MSJE has notified guidelines on 26<sup>th</sup> April 2016 to pave the way for constitution of boards and issuing of Disability Certificates for Autism. This 3 days training workshop is a step forward in the direction of facilitation of certification of persons with Autism.







Currently there is dearth of experts to appropriately manage and diagnose persons with Autism in the absence of trained man power. The 3-day Workshop was organized with a team of Resource Persons and faculties from AIIMS and NIMH under the leadership of Prof. Sheffali Gulati, Head, Child Neurology Division, Deptt. of Pediatrics, AIIMS, provided detailed theoretical knowledge and hands on training, video shows, interaction with parents with children with Autism, on 3<sup>rd</sup> day of the training. Training material, guidelines on INCLEN and ISAA Tools were also provided to the trainee professionals, along with reference material on Autism with soft copy in the Pen Drive.





(b) 2<sup>nd</sup> workshop from 9th February to 11<sup>th</sup> February, 2017

The National Trust, in collaboration with Child Neurology Division, Department of Pediatrics, AIIMS, New Delhi organized the 2<sup>nd</sup> three-day Workshop for Training Master Trainers in Autism Tools-INCLEN & ISAA, from 09-Feb-2017 to 11-Feb-2017 in Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi.

Though the workshop started on 9<sup>th</sup> Feb., 2017, it was formally inaugurated on 10<sup>th</sup> Feb, 2017 by Sh. Thaawarchand Gehlot, Hon'ble Minister, Social Justice & Empowerment. On this ocassioin, Sh. N. S Kang, Secretary, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Sh. Mukesh Jain, Joint Secretary & CEO, National Trust, Prof. Balram Airan, Director, AIIMS along with a large number of officials from Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, AIIMS, New Delhi, doctors, NGOs and professionals in the field were present.











This workshop was organized for Northern and Eastern states of India in which more than 53 doctors from Government Hospitals from 10 States and Union Territories attended. This include 29 doctors from various Government hospitals of Delhi, 5 from Punjab, 4 from West Bengal, 3 each from Bihar and Chandigarh, 1 each from Assam and Meghalaya. Similarly, the 3<sup>rd</sup> workshop has been planned for Southern and Western states on 31<sup>st</sup> March, 1<sup>st</sup> April & 2<sup>nd</sup> April, 2017 in Delhi.





The aim of the workshop was to train the health care professionals (pediatricians, psychiatrists and psychologists) to diagnose and certify Autism correctly using INCLEN and ISAA tools, which are the basis for issuing Certificate for Autism. The participants in the workshop were trained as Master Trainers who in turn will train other professionals in their States / UTs using INCLEN and ISAA tools to diagnose and certify Autism. This will ensure homogeneity in Autism diagnosis and certification, and enable individuals and families to avail the privileges.



#### ii) Brainstorming session 'Manthan' on issues related to persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities and SNAC Review Meeting

A Brainstorming Session 'Manthan' on issues related to Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities held in Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi on 16.12.2016 by the National Trust. The Chairman, Joint Secretary & Chief Executive Officer, 2 Board Trustees, the National Trust, Deputy Director General, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment alongwith officials of the National Trust, State Nodal Agency Centres (SNACs) of the National Trust, experts in the field and representatives from the Registered Organizations of the National Trust were present in the session.









Wide range of issues including Early Intervention and School Readiness, Education, Skill Development, Self Employment, Employment Generation, Assistive Technologies, Care facilities, Awareness Generation etc. were taken up for discussion. It was generally felt that there is a need for convergence of all the services and facilities provided to persons with these disabilities and have a good networking among the agencies providing these services. It was also felt to adopt the Digital India initiatives in service delivery to these persons. Use of Assistive Devices and Technologies for making the quality of life of these persons better was another key area for discussion.







A number of action points including convergence of Early Intervention Services of the National Trust with the early intervention services of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare under Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK), convergence of Skill Development Programme for persons with these disabilities with the Skill India initiatives of the Govt. of India etc. were finalized.





#### **SNAC Review Meeting**

A review meeting of the State Nodal Agency Centres (SNACs) of the National Trust was also held in which it was decided to organise a series of disability camps including two camps by 31.1.2017 for issuance of Disability Certificate to persons with these disabilities. It was also decided to organise a meeting of State Level Coordination Committee (SLCC) headed by the Secretary, Social Welfare Department of the States / UTs and coordinated by the SNAC in the month of January or February 2017 to highlight the issues related to persons with these disabilities in the State. The following decisions were taken:

- 1. SNAC, to organize 2 Disability Camps by 31.3.2017.
- 2. 1 SLCC meeting to be organized in the month of January and February.
- 3. Letter of Chief Secretaries regarding BPL certificate to be sent to respective SNACs for follow up.

Till 31-3-2017, 11 Disability camps were organized in 8 states in which Disability certificates issued to 3136 Divyangjan. Similarly, meetings of SLCC organized in 7 states.

#### iii) Celebration of National Trust Foundation Day

The National Trust was established on 30<sup>th</sup> December, 1999 and to observe its foundation day, a programme was organised in the Constitution Club of India on 30.12.2016. The Hon'ble Minister Shri Thaawarchand Gehlot inaugurated the function, alongwith Shri Krishan Pal Gurjar, Hon'ble Minister of State. For the workshop, former Chairpersons of the National Trust, Joint Secretary&CEO, officials of the Social Justice & Empowerment of the DEPwD and other persons / organisations associated with it were also invited, alongwith the role models and achievers.







#### iv) Consultation Meeting to Bring Synergy on Early Intervention programme of the National Trust

A Consultation meeting to bring Synergy on Early Intervention Programme of the National Trust held on 17-1-2017 under the Chairmanship of the JS&CEO, National Trust. Experts from AIIMS, M/o Health and Family Welfare, M/o Women and child Development, former Chairperson, National Trust and representatives of NGOs were present. It was felt that there is a need to have a comprehensive Early Intervention in the country jointly by the National Trust, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare under RBSK programme, Ministry of HRD under ICDS programme, NGOs and other concerned Stake holders. It was decided to start the pilot project of Early Intervention in 10 Districts where District Early Intervention Centre (DEIC) under RBSK and Disha centres of the National Trust are functioning. Further action on the Pilot Project and training of professionals will be taken by the officials of concerned Ministries and Experts in the field of Early Intervention involved in the Consultation Meet.

The National Trust is in process to finalize the Early Intervention training programme of National Trust. In this regard, National Trust is preparing a course module for Trans-Disciplinary Workers and Key Workers. To finalise this module a 2 days meeting was held in the National Trust office on 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> March 2017. In the Meeting Sh. Mukesh Jain, JS &CEO, National Trust, Mrs. Poonma Natarajan, former Chairperson, National Trust and various Early Intervention experts namely Ms. Namita Jacob, Ms. Abha Ranjan, Ms. Meera, Dr. Geeta Chopra from Delhi University, Dr. Himanshu Das from NIEPMD, Ms. Deepak Kalra from Umang, Rajasthan Ms. Radhika Alkazi from Arth Aastha, Delhi and Sh. Navnit Kumar, Programme Officer participated.

#### v) Workshop on Social Role Volarization

The JS&CEO, the National Trust attended the Workshop on Social Role Volarization, organized by KeyStone India and Hans Foundation, in Kolkata on 12<sup>th</sup> January, 2017. Various issues in the proposed Development of India's future in designing, supporting and in visioning responsive, respectful and individualized support to Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjans) to have access to full and meaningful lives, were discussed.











vi) National Consultation Workshop on Skill Development and Livelihood for Persons with Disability on 03.02.2017

The National Trust had organized a National Consultation workshop on Skill Development Livelihood for Persons with Disabilities on 3<sup>rd</sup> February, 2017 in India Habitat Center, Juniper Hall, New Delhi. The main objective of the workshop was to finalize strategy and plan for skill development of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan).







The workshop was organized in collaboration with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) focusing Intellectual Disabilities in addition to other disabilities. Representative from the Industries, professionals in the sector, representatives from concerned department/ organizations etc. participated in the day long workshop.





Further to the discussions on 3<sup>rd</sup> February, 2017 regarding the way forward for skill development of persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities, to discuss on an actionable plan for implementing the suggestions which were put forward in the workshop, a follow up meeting for finalizing action plan on skill development and employment of persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities was organized on 22-2-2017 at the National Trust office.





vii) "Talent Hunt-Autistic Marvels"

The National Trust orgnised a "Talent Hunt – Autistic Marvels" contest to spot talented persons with Autism in the country. This was decided in a meeting called on 13-1-2017 to decide on celebrating World Down Syndrome Day on 25<sup>th</sup> March, 2017 and Autism Awareness Day on 3<sup>rd</sup> April, 2017 in the National Trust. The National Trust sent an email to all its registered organizations for sending nominations for the contest. By end of the last date, a total 102 entries received.


