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## INTRODUCTION

The Rehabilitation Council was initially set up under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 vide Resolution No. 22-17/83-HW.III dated 31st January, 1986 to have uniformity and to ensure minimum standards and quality of education & training in the field of special education and rehabilitation. It was given Statutory status by an Act of Parliament, viz., the Rehabilitation Council of India Act, 1992 (No. 34 of 1992) dated 1st September, 1992 effective from 22nd June, 1993. The RCI Act was amended by Parliament in 2000 to make it more broad based by enhancing the responsibilities of standardizing and regulating the training including a component on research in the area of rehabilitation and special education.

India has signed and ratified the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) which has given impetus to the activities for empowerment of persons with disabilities. This law has brought focus on the need for inclusion for persons with disabilities and all concerned to ensure that this law is implemented. During the period RCI on its part, organized various regional and national level seminars for spreading awareness about various provisions of UNCRPD and to draw strategies for its implementation. The syllabi and curriculum of the courses developed/standardized by RCI have been revised to facilitate inclusion as per the spirit of UNCRPD. Council also approved necessary amendments in the RCI Act & submitted to the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment for further action.

## OBJECTIVES OF THE COUNCIL

1. To regulate the training programmes in the field of rehabilitation of disabled persons.
2. To prescribe minimum standards of education and training for various categories of professionals dealing with persons with disabilities.
3. To regulate these standards in all training institutions to bring about uniformity throughout the country.
4. To make recommendations to the Ministry regarding recognition of qualifications granted by Universities, etc., in India for rehabilitation professionals.
5. To make recommendations to the Ministry regarding recognition of qualifications by institutions outside India.
6. To maintain Central Rehabilitation Register of persons possessing the recognized rehabilitation qualification.
7. To encourage Continuing Rehabilitation Education in collaboration with organizations working in the field of disability.
8. To promote research in rehabilitation and special education.

## FUNCTIONS OF THE COUNCIL

1. The qualifications granted by any University or other institution in India that are included in the Schedule shall be recognized qualifications for Rehabilitation Professionals.
2. Any University or other Institution which grants qualification for rehabilitation professionals not included in Schedule may apply to the Central Government to have any such qualification recognized and the Central Government, after consulting the Council

- may, by notification amend the Schedule so as to include such qualification therein and any such notification may also direct that any entry shall be made in the last column of the Schedule against such qualification only when granted after a specified date.
3. The Council may enter into negotiations with a recognized authority in any other country for setting up of a scheme of reciprocity for the recognition of qualifications. In pursuance of any such scheme, the Central Government may by notification, amend the Schedule so as to include therein any qualification which the Council has decided should be recognized, and by such notification may also direct that an entry shall be made in the last column of the Schedule declaring that it shall be a recognized qualification only when granted after a specified date.
  4. Registration of Rehabilitation Professionals in the Central Rehabilitation Register of persons possessing the recognized rehabilitation qualifications as per the Schedule attached to the Act.
  5. To prescribe the minimum standards of education required for granting recognized rehabilitation qualifications by Universities/Institutions in India.
  6. To prescribe the standards of professionals conduct and etiquette & code of ethics for rehabilitation professionals.
  7. To assess and grant approval to institutions/universities for the training of professionals in the field of rehabilitation and to facilitate their recognition and its withdrawal by the Government.
  8. The Council may appoint such number of visitors as it may deem requisite to inspect any University or Institution wherein education for rehabilitation professionals is given or attend any examination for the purpose of granting recognized rehabilitation qualifications.

## GENERAL COUNCIL

In accordance with Sub-Section (1) and (3) of Section 3 of RCI Act 1992 (34 of 1992), the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India, vide Notification No. S.O. 550 (E) dated 13th April, 2005 appointed Major General (Retd.) Ian Cardozo, AVSM, SM, Chairperson of the Council. The Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment re-constituted the General Council vide Notification No. S.O. 2479 (E) dated 15th October, 2008. The list of General Council members is placed at *Annexure A*.

### 33rd Meeting of the General Council

33rd Meeting of the General Council was held on October 21, 2011 at India International Centre, New Delhi wherein following decisions were taken:

1. Amendments in RCI Act: Members approved the amendment of the word 'Council' instead of 'Board' in the RCI Act, 1992. Accordingly, the Sub-Section (4) of Section 3 of RCI Act, 1992 will be read as:  
 "The office of member of the Council shall not disqualify its holder for being chosen as, or for being, a Member of either House of Parliament".
2. Proposal for Twelfth Five Year Plan, 2013-17 submitted by the Council to the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment was approved by the members.
3. The following syllabi were approved :
  1. Integrated B.A./ B.Com./B.Sc./B.Ed. Special Education
  2. Foundation Course in Learning Disabilities through E-Learning Mode
  3. Certificate Course for Community Resource Workers in Disability Rehabilitation
4. The minutes of the 61st Executive Committee meeting were taken note of by the members of the Council.
5. The members approved the proposal for hiring/purchase of residential accommodation for the staff of the Council.
6. The Revised Estimate (RE) for the year 2011-12 amounting to Rs. 4.50 crore under Plan and Rs. 1.66 crore under Non-Plan and the Budget Estimate (BE) for the year 2012-13 for Rs. 1.70 crore under Non-Plan were approved.
7. The members perused the audit report of C.&A.G. for the year 2010-11 and approved the 24th draft Annual Report of the Council for the year 2010-11 for publication.



8. Dr. Manoj Kumar, Education Officer, UGC spoke about qualifications being granted by the Council for a number of courses. It was brought out by the Member Secretary that all training programmes of the Council are professional courses and the qualification granted are as per international standards to maintain the uniformity in nomenclature across the world. The Council has come out with the qualification which is universally accepted. The point was well understood by the representative of UGC.
9. The Amendment of RCI Act, 1992 is still pending. The Govt. should take necessary action to immediately amend the Act so that the UNCRPD is fully implemented.
10. To improve research, the Ministry needs to provide necessary funds not only to the Council but to all training institutions to carry out some action based research in the area of disability.
11. *E-Journal*: The members suggested that the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment under their scheme should incorporate budget for provision of E-Journal for training institutions who are conducting recognized courses of the Council.
12. Dr. S. Y. Kothari from Ministry of Health & Family Welfare informed the Board members that the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare has taken up the initiative of sensitizing Anganwadi and other grass root functionaries under the prevention aspect related to disabilities. He also requested the Council to provide him the details regarding inclusion of disability component in the syllabus of MBBS training programme for taking up the matter with Medical Council of India.
13. *National Board of Examination*: The Chairperson of the Council brought to the notice of the members that at present the Examination Cell in the Council is managing exams through IGNOU, however, in future an independent Board needs to start functioning.
14. *Allowances to the Chairperson, RCI*: Dr. Kripa Ram Arya brought out the point related to allowances not being given by the Govt. to the Chairperson, RCI till date whereas the Board had approved it in the year 2005. Member Secretary explained that Govt. is considering the allowances to the Chairperson, however, it has not been communicated to the Council. The members felt that the issue needs to be taken up on a priority basis. The Govt. is free to decide the amount of allowance to be paid to the Chairperson. The Council will accept the amount fixed by the Ministry in this regard.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

To fulfill the purpose of the RCI Act, the General Council as per the powers conferred under Sub-Section (1) of Section 7, the Chairperson, RCI constituted the Executive Committee from amongst the General Council Members. The Executive Committee is responsible for the management and administration of the affairs of the Council. List of the Executive Committee Members is placed at Annexure B.

### 61st Meeting of the Executive Committee

61st Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Rehabilitation Council of India was held on July 22, 2011 at RCI, New Delhi. Following decisions were taken in the Meeting:

1. Follow up action taken on the Minutes of the 60th Meeting was approved. However,

on the issue of duration of the D.Ed. (SE-ASD), D.Ed. (SE-Db) & D.Ed. (SE-CP) courses which had been changed from a one year course to two years, Dr. Divya Jalan suggested that the Council should first obtain the details from institutions and find out why students are not taking interest to join the two year programme. Same can be put up in the next meeting.

2. Member Secretary briefed the members of the Committee on the problems being faced in the examinations at certificate and diploma level conducted by IGNOU and the feedback in this regard from certain States. He stated that some of the issues raised by these States could be resolved if these examinations could be conducted by the State Boards of Examination. The Members agreed with this suggestion but stated that till the new system through State Boards functioned effectively, the conduct of examination by IGNOU should continue.
3. The issue of salary and allowances of the Chairperson, RCI and issues concerning other members of the staff of RCI which were pending with the Ministry for a very long time was once again raised. Mr. S.K. Pattanayak from Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment said that these matters were being looked into by the Ministry and he hoped that they would soon be resolved.

### 62nd Meeting of the Executive Committee

62nd Meeting of the Executive Committee was held on March 2, 2012 at RCI, New Delhi. Following decisions were taken in the meeting:

1. Follow up action was unanimously approved by the members. One of the items in follow up action related to the conduct of examinations by IGNOU. The Chairperson apprised the members about the difficulties faced in the conduct of examinations as follows :-
  - I. Initially National Institutes were conducting examinations and declaring the results on their own. Similarly, other institutions were also conducting examinations on their own. The issue is that these institutions were themselves conducting diploma and certificate courses and, therefore, ethically it would not be appropriate to assign them the responsibility of conducting examinations.
  - II. The Council submitted the proposal to the Ministry for establishing an independent National Board of Examination in Rehabilitation. The Ministry sanctioned the proposal with a write up "Initially a small cell should be created and the work should be outsourced".
  - III. Manipal Academy of Higher Education (MAHE) was entrusted the work of conducting examinations but a lot of complaints were received in the Ministry as well as RCI that MAHE is charging very high fees and ultimately the burden falls upon the students. Therefore, the Ministry suggested to approach IGNOU to conduct our examinations.
  - IV. RCI entrusted the work of examinations to IGNOU which has proved incompetent as the results are pending since more than a year and students are protesting and going on hunger strike. The Chairperson, RCI approached



the Vice Chancellor, IGNOU but he has neither responded nor shown any desire to resolve the matter.

- V. The Regulations of the Council state that the institutions should approach the State Boards of Examination for awarding of Certificate / Diploma. However, the State Boards have not responded to our request and it will also be difficult for Non-Governmental Organizations which are very few in number to get affiliation from the State Board.
- VI. The last and final option is to upgrade the 'Cell' already sanctioned by the Ministry and to allow it to function independently. The Chairperson informed the board members that with their approval, the Society has already been registered and now is in a position to move forward to conduct examinations.

Therefore, after exploring all the alternatives stated above, the Council may be given permission to start the functioning of the National Board of Examination for examination work to award diploma and certificate. Member Secretary, RCI apprised the Members that the Examination Cell presently has a fund of Rs. 80 lakhs approx. to meet the expenditure on pay and allowances, hiring of office and other office expenses, etc., which could be adequate to start functioning of the National Board of Examination. The Dy. Secretary (DD-III), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment requested that a proposal in this regard may be sent to the Ministry for consideration and approval.

- 2. *Vision 2020 of RCI:* The Chairperson briefed the members about the draft Vision 2020 developed by the Council. This Vision document is a start point for the next decade. He also explained the strategy, infrastructure, mission, plan, objectives, activities, etc., as given in the Vision document. The final document will be discussed at the next meeting of the General Council.
- 3. Institutions located in North East and some other States do not have adequate infrastructure to run our courses. Therefore, to encourage institutions to come forward for running RCI approved courses, relaxation in norms like core faculty, equipment, library, etc., may be granted. The Members agreed to the proposal of relaxation of norms for such States/districts lacking training facilities. However, the Council will get the opinion of experts regarding quantum of relaxation for these States.
- 4. Member Secretary, RCI informed the Members that no institution is interested to run four-year duration Integrated course like BA/B.Com/B.Sc./B.Ed Special Education due to lack of financial support from the Government. Therefore, the Ministry may allocate and release at least Rs. 01 crore to every interested institution to run the programme. The Dy. Secretary, DD-III, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment requested to send a proposal to the Ministry in this regard.
- 5. Member Secretary, RCI apprised the members that charging of fee can be fixed for conducting diploma/degree/certificate courses as suggested by RCI. The criteria has been fixed as per the general education system. This will stop malpractice among institutions. The members went through the proposal and after necessary clarifications about fees structure prevailing in other institutions, approved the fees structure as proposed.

6. The proposal for enhancement of age of retirement for rehabilitation professionals, as mentioned in the RCI Act, working in institutions approved/recognized by RCI has been approved by the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee considered the prescribed criteria of UGC for their faculty members, i.e., upto 65 years and further extendable upto 70 years depending on the employer and fitness of the employee.
7. Member Secretary informed that minimum experience required for nominating an Inspector is 3 years. However, if an Inspector is having experience over and above three years, he/she will be given preference to conduct inspections. The Members approved the panel of experts for inspection with the condition that every expert should mention his/her registration number.
8. The Members appreciated the launching of Foundation Course in Learning Disabilities through E-Learning Mode.
9. The Members approved the proposal of implementing MACPS to RCI employees after obtaining necessary declaration/undertaking.
10. The Members requested Dy. Secretary DD-III and Dy. Secretary (IFD) to expedite the issue relating to the salary and allowances for the Chairperson, RCI which is pending for the last six years. The issue is being raised every time at the meetings of General Council/Executive Committee and the standard reply is that the matter is under consideration. The members requested the representatives of Ministry of SJ&E to expedite the matter.

## EXPERT COMMITTEES OF THE COUNCIL/ CORE COMMITTEES

To carry out the purpose Council has constituted various Expert Committees under Sub-Section (1) of Section 7 of the RCI Act. The list of Expert Committees is placed at *Annexures C to O*.

1. The Expert Committee recommends the courses, period of the course, subjects for examination and standards of the proficiency to be obtained in any University or Institution for grant of recognized rehabilitation qualification.
2. To recommend to the Council the standards of staff, equipment, accommodation, training and other facilities for study or training of the rehabilitation professionals.
3. Any other matter related to the above field.

The details of the meetings of the Expert Committee/Core Committee of Experts conducted during the period is given below:

### Meeting to Review PG Diploma in Developmental Therapy (Multiple Disabilities: Physical & Neurological) and Basic Developmental Therapy Courses Held at RCI, New Delhi on April 19, 2011

The meeting started with a presentation on the background, rationale and syllabus of the revised/proposed P.G. Diploma Course in Developmental Therapy by AADI, New Delhi. The members appreciated the efforts of AADI in revising the syllabus of P.G. Diploma in Developmental Therapy and discussed the same at length.



Following decisions were taken:

- A. *P.G. Diploma Course in Developmental Therapy (Multiple Disabilities: Physical & Neurological)*
1. The course seems to be much more of a human rights course and lacks therapeutic and developmental aspects. Therefore, the course needs to be revised to put more emphasis on therapeutic and developmental aspects.
  2. Number of hours and number of marks to be given for each unit separately. RCI format for developing various curricula may be used for this purpose.
  3. 40 per cent time should be allotted to theory and 60 per cent to practical. Detailed practical guidelines to be added with allocation of marks and hours to different activities.
  4. Latest developments taking place worldwide in the area of therapeutics and technology may be added in the course contents.
  5. The skills to be acquired by the candidates should also be included in the syllabus clearly defining the role of the professional in the area of developmental therapy.
  6. The eligibility criteria for admission to this course may be changed to "a Graduate from a recognized University" and admission process to be made stringent for admitting motivated and competent candidates by conducting admission tests followed by group discussion and interview.
  7. AADI, New Delhi will modify the proposed revised syllabus in the light of discussions and the decisions taken in the meeting and send the same to RCI within a week for further necessary action.
  8. RCI to take up the matter with SSA authorities to include developmental therapy professionals to work as developmental therapists under SSA.
- B. *Diploma Course in Basic Developmental Therapy*
- It was decided that the existing course should be continued and a final decision can be taken after obtaining feedback/report/comments on the Course from the institutions currently offering this course.
- C. *Any other point with permission of the chair*
- RCI should prepare a policy framework to have a service delivery structure at various levels, viz., Panchayat, Block, District, State and Central level and to identify human resource required in the area of special education and disability rehabilitation covering the entire life span of persons with disabilities. This may form part of the RCI Vision: 2020.

### **Meeting of Expert Committee for Development of Training Programmes in the Field of Cerebral Palsy, Autism and Multiple Disabilities held at RCI, New Delhi on August 24, 2011**

Following decisions were taken in the meeting :

1. *Review of course curriculum of PG Diploma in Special Education (Multiple Disabilities: Physical & Neurological):* The members unanimously decided that status quo may be maintained with regard to PG Diploma in Special Education (Multiple Disabilities: Physical & Neurological) till the time the course curriculum of B.Ed. Special Education (Multiple

- Disabilities) is reviewed after which PG Diploma in Special Education (Multiple Disabilities: Physical & Neurological) will be discontinued and B.Ed. Special Education (Multiple Disabilities) will replace this course.
2. *Review of course curriculum of PG Diploma in Developmental Therapy (Multiple Disabilities: Physical & Neurological):* Following modifications were suggested in the course curriculum:
    - i) Preamble/introduction to be given in the beginning of the course curriculum.
    - ii) Aim is too broad and needs to be narrowed down.
    - iii) Skills of an entry level professional to be replaced by objectives. Sequence of objectives to be prioritized starting with 3, 5 and 7. Reasonable accommodation as mentioned in para 8 and elsewhere in the syllabus to be omitted. The objectives may include 'make appropriate recommendations....' instead of professional making changes for barrier free environment and such other activities where decision lies with the organizations' administrators and others (para 5).
    - iv) Eligibility criteria to include ... "preferably Science at the Senior Secondary level".
    - v) Medium of Instruction – English: 'The course to be conducted mainly in English'. Rest to be deleted.
    - vi) Theory papers to be restructured by merging some papers. Topics like tools of assessment, human development, action research, meta cognition, coping strategies (under medical and social aspects of health conditions) to be added in appropriate papers. Incidence to be replaced by prevalence.
    - vii) Instead of mentioning practical hours for each theory paper under course structure, practical activities can be mentioned separately under different broad activities such as hands on practical, placements, observations, case studies, visits, etc. and appropriate weightage in terms of hours can be assigned to these activities in the ratio of 40:60 for theory and practical respectively.
  3. *Review of course curriculum of Basic Development Therapy course for Children with Cerebral Palsy and Other Neurological Disabilities:* It was unanimously decided that BDT course should be discontinued as Diploma in Rehabilitation Therapy (DRT) is available which is cross disability and broad based.
  4. A presentation was made on behalf of KPAMRC, Bangalore on training programmes for general teachers and parents. The members informed that a Foundation Course is already available for general teachers. Parents training programme is also available through IGNOU. However, KPAMRC, Bangalore may offer a course for parents in affiliation with Bangalore University or any other university for which RCI approval is not required.

### **Meeting of Experts to Discuss the Role of RCI vis-à-vis Courses in Disability Studies Held at RCI, New Delhi on September 15, 2011**

At the outset, Maj. Gen. (Retd.) Ian Cardozo, AVSM, SM, Chairperson, RCI said that a lot of things are happening in India to change the destiny of persons with disabilities and it is important for us to take the Disability Studies forward to every University so that persons with disabilities are on equal platform with everybody else and they are dealt with in a dignified manner. He said that there is a growing acceptance and desire to include the component of disability studies in higher education in



every discipline and at every University and the University Grants Commission (UGC) is in the process of setting up Departments of Disability Studies in Central and State Universities and the Committee constituted by UGC under his chairmanship has already developed Guidelines for establishing Centres for Disability Studies in institutes of higher and professional education. A manual on Equal Opportunity Offices (EOOs) has also been prepared and submitted to UGC. This manual offers guidelines to colleges and universities for the setting up of EOOs in all colleges and universities to ensure that students with disabilities are on a level platform with non-disabled students in every aspect of life in colleges/universities.

Following decisions were taken:

1. The Post-Graduate Certificate Course in Disabilities Studies and Post Graduate Diploma in Disabilities Studies being offered by Guwahati University, Guwahati cannot be considered by the Council as these courses are of academic nature and not professional. The mandate of RCI is to approve only professional courses covered under the RCI. However, Guwahati University can be requested to develop the course curricula in Disability Studies as per RCI's format so that it could be forwarded to UGC for consideration.
2. Equal Opportunities Cells (EOCs) should be set up exclusively for students with disabilities and the staff should be fully equipped to look after the special needs of students with disabilities. The provision of services for persons with disabilities should also be made at the EOCs.
3. A special scheme needs to be developed by UGC for promoting Disability Studies in all Universities. Certain basic areas in the field of disability like advance research, leadership, advocacy, adaptation of various course curricula, promoting rights based social model of disability, disability specific modules should be covered under Disability Studies.
4. Various schemes of UGC for promoting special education teachers training programmes need to be popularised and more awareness needs to be created in all Universities on disability issues.
5. RCI should develop certain orientation modules in different disabilities which can be offered under Disability Studies on credit basis in various Universities so as to orient the students of other disciplines to disability issues. UGC should consider incorporating the credit system in all the disciplines to create knowledge and skills about disability issues.
6. UGC and RCI to mutually decide the issue of offering courses on Disability Studies, whereas the academic courses can be looked after by UGC, professional courses on Disability Studies can form part of RCI. RCI is, however, willing to collaborate with UGC in evolving the academic syllabi on Disability Studies.
7. UGC should take a policy decision to start the Disability Studies Programmes and issue the Guidelines.
8. RCI should request UGC to give grants/financial assistance to private colleges/institutions running B.Ed. (Special Education)/ M.Ed. (Special Education) courses under TEPSE scheme.

### **Meeting of Experts to Decide Uniform Fee Structure for D.ED. (Special Education), B.ED. (Special Education) & M.ED. (Special Education) Held at RCI, New Delhi on December 19-20, 2011**

Following fee structure for D.Ed., B.Ed. & M.Ed. in Special Education Courses has been fixed from the academic session 2012-13 as per recommendations of the experts:

Following recommendations were made:

- There are following three types of recognized training institutions offering RCI approved courses:
  - Government run institutions/Universities;
  - Government aided private institutions; and
  - Self-financing private educational institutions without receiving any grant-in-aid from any source
- All the members unanimously agreed to fix maximum fee to be charged by private unaided training institutions operating on self-finance basis without receiving any grant-in-aid from any source, taking into consideration following items of expenditure:
  - Salary and allowances payable to teaching and non-teaching (administrative) employees prescribed for respective courses as per norms.
  - Cost of maintenance of laboratories including consumables.
  - Contingent expenditure including statutory requirements like audit fee, stationery, postage, telephone, etc.
  - Cost of acquisition of books and journals for library.
  - Maintenance of buildings and other assets including rent.
  - Development fee/Depreciation cost.
- Estimated expenditure was worked out under various heads of expenditure for running D.Ed., B.Ed. and M.Ed. Special Education courses. The expenditure may vary for institutions running more than one course, viz., D.Ed. + B.Ed. or B.Ed. + M.Ed.
- The maximum fee, consisting of two major components - tuition fee and development fee, calculated on the basis of expenditure for conducting RCI approved courses by the recognized unaided self-financing training institutions without receiving any grants-in-aid from any source, is given below:
 

(i) D.Ed. Special Education	Rs. 40000/- per student/per year
(ii) B.Ed. Special Education	Rs. 82500/- per student/1 year
(iii) M.Ed. Special Education	Rs. 96000/- per student/1 year



5. The salary of the faculty (teaching staff) will be equivalent to the Sixth Pay Commission recommendations including 30% HRA which will vary as per classification of a city and do not include DA and other allowances.
6. Norms for faculty as prescribed by RCI for respective course(s) must be followed in toto.
7. Administrative staff as prescribed by RCI for respective course(s) may be outsourced and paid on an average consolidated amount of Rs. 8000/- per month.
8. The items of expenditure statement / accounts in respect of the above D.Ed./ B.Ed./ M.Ed. courses in Special Education of the institutions should be audited by Chartered Accountant and is open for audit by the Council.
9. These guidelines for charging fee by unaided self-financing training institutions will be effective from the academic session 2012-13.
10. These guidelines will be reviewed after every three years or till the time guidelines issued by respective State Governments come into effect.
11. It was informed by the experts that Universities are charging different and exorbitant affiliation fee for RCI approved degree courses like B.Ed. (Special Education) & M.Ed. (Special Education) and there is no uniformity in the amount of affiliation fee or periodicity of the affiliation. Therefore, it was suggested that RCI should take up the matter with UGC/Universities to fix a reasonable affiliation fee for the courses in special education and rehabilitation as the seats are lesser in number in the above courses as compared to other courses and also this field needs to be promoted in the interest of persons with disabilities.
12. It was informed that in some of the affiliating Universities, B.Ed. (Special Education) & M.Ed. (Special Education) courses are under the Department of Adult and Continuing Education, which should be brought under the Faculty of Education or Faculty of Special Education. RCI should take up the matter with concerned Universities so that the Universities do not charge exorbitant affiliation fee.
13. It was also suggested that RCI should take up the matter with the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment and/or Ministry of Human Resource Development for introducing a scheme for the payment of salary of the teaching faculty working in the recognized unaided training institutions operating on self-finance basis. Alternatively, the existing TEPSE scheme should be amended to include private institutions.

### **Meeting of Advisory Committee on Audiological Testing and Dispensing of Hearing Aids and Devices Held at RCI, New Delhi on December 8, 2011**

After detailed discussion on the issue of audiological testing and dispensing of hearing aids, following recommendations/decisions have been made:

1. Dispensing of hearing aids is a crucial issue for addressing the needs of persons with hearing impairment. Therefore, hearing aid dispensing should be done only by trained persons.
2. Audiologists and Speech – Language – Pathologists & ENT doctors should respect each others profession without overstepping into each others professional area. Complimentary role of both the professionals should be appreciated. Self regulation by all the stake holders is of paramount importance and should be practiced by all.

3. Need based tailor made training programmes must be developed for existing dispensers employed by manufacturers, Diploma holders in HL&S and ENT doctors.
4. A refresher course can also be designed for qualified trained audiologists.
5. RCI will constitute a Core Committee to develop the courses in hearing aid dispensing and chalk out the modalities to implement them.
6. A Competency Certification Examination (CCE) should be conducted by RCI for hearing aid dispensers. Certification of hearing aid dispensers will be done by RCI and not by manufacturers.
7. An estimate should be made of total number of unqualified hearing aid dispensers engaged/employed by various manufacturers in the country. Representatives of the manufacturers will send the estimated details of untrained persons working in the area of hearing aid dispensing in the country. They will also give suggestions with regard to the entry qualifications to be fixed for the hearing aid dispensers.
8. In rural areas/PHCs adequate infrastructure needs to be created for providing audiological services and dispensing of hearing aids.
9. Code of conduct/rules for dispensing of hearing aids need to be framed. MCI's rules need to be referred for judging its relevance and adequacy.
10. There is a need for creating job opportunities for trained audiologists in the country with suitable salary structure for attracting and retaining talented and committed professionals in the field in the country.
11. Post of Audiologist needs to be created at district hospitals so as to provide minimum audiological and hearing aid dispensing services in the rural and far flung areas. Ministry of Health & Family Welfare has made similar recommendations for 12th Five Year Plan.
12. Measures should be taken to check malpractices in dispensing of hearing aids by untrained persons and appropriate punitive action should be taken as provided in the RCI Act.
13. Prevention of deafness needs to be given priority by all the concerned departments.
14. Measures should be taken for the screening of new born babies for initiating early intervention programmes.
15. RCI will fix the time frame for implementation. It should be reviewed periodically for phasing out the training programmes and policies for hearing aid dispensing.
16. In the interim period status quo will be maintained. An appropriate communication may be issued by RCI to this effect.

### **Meeting of Advisory Committee on Audiological Testing and Dispensing of Hearing Aids and Devices Held at RCI, New Delhi on February 29, 2012**

Audiological Testing and Dispensing of Hearing Aids and Devices met to discuss the issue of starting a course on hearing aid dispensing for the existing hearing aid dispensers. The need for this meeting has arisen because of complaints from persons who are deaf and hard of hearing that unqualified persons are dispensing hearing aids to their detriment. The aim of this meeting was to protect persons who are deaf and hard of hearing from 'quackery' and to ensure that only qualified



persons be permitted to dispense hearing aids. The members of the Committee made the following recommendations unanimously:

1. A Certificate Course on Hearing Aid Dispensing should be developed by RCI.
2. The Course would be of 3 months duration in face to face mode.
3. The Course is meant only for existing hearing aid dispensers, including ENT doctors who are also rendering services of hearing aid dispensers.
4. The Course would be implemented for a fixed period of three years from the date of launching of the Course or till the existing Dispensers are trained, whichever is earlier. The programme would be reviewed thereafter to decide the future course of action. It is a one time measure to train the existing hearing aid dispensers only.
5. The Certificate Course on Hearing Aid Dispensing would be conducted under the aegis of RCI at the selected recognized training institutions offering BASLP/MASLP course. Training Institutions would be identified by RCI on the basis of norms to be developed by RCI.
6. The candidates from the commercial sector who are registered with the Hearing Industries Association/Hearing Aids Traders Association would apply for admission to the Certificate Course on Hearing Aid Dispensing through their respective hearing aid manufacturer and forward their names certifying their academic qualifications and experience. Application for admission would be sent directly to the respective training centres and a list of such candidates would be sent to RCI. These Associations will be responsible and accountable for the names that they will submit.
7. Minimum eligibility criteria for admission to the course by the existing hearing aid dispensers would be 10+2 or equivalent qualification in any stream with minimum of two years experience in hearing aid dispensing.
8. RCI would issue an advertisement publicising the Certificate Course in Hearing Aid Dispensing for information of existing hearing aid dispensers to join the course.
9. Maximum fee for the Certificate Course in Hearing Aid Dispensing has been fixed at Rs. 30,000/- per candidate.
10. Experts present in the meeting will submit the course content to RCI latest by 15th March, 2012 which would be sent to Dr. K. Mandke who has volunteered to compile the course curriculum received from the experts and sent to RCI latest by 7th April, 2012. Draft final syllabus will be circulated for approval to the members of Expert Committee of RCI for development of training programmes for the professionals/personnel, namely, Audiologists & Speech Pathologists, Hearing Aid and Earmould Technicians.
11. Cut off date to join the course would be 2 years prior to commencement of the course.
12. List of suggested reading material will be sent by Dr. M. Jayaram after the finalization of contents. Mr. Anup Narang from ALPS will send their Manual on Hearing Aid Dispensing which can be used as study material.

### **Meeting to Discuss the Plan of Action for Implementation of Communication Options Held at AYJNIHH, Mumbai on March 14, 2012**

In the meeting the following recommendations were made unanimously for the implementation of Communication Options:

1. A proposal to be developed by the end of April 2012 for consideration of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment for implementation of Communication Options countrywide with the support of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment and State Governments.
2. RCI does not provide funds for conducting training courses. Therefore, either the courses in Communication Options should be made self-supporting or resources should be tapped to support such courses.
3. A mechanism may be developed to link courses in Communication Options and Braille for teachers of Deaf & Hard of Hearing and Visual Impairment respectively for renewal of their registration with RCI.
4. RCI will organize a Workshop at a suitable venue for school heads and also for those Course Coordinators who could not attend Chennai Workshop held in November-December 2011. Based on 21 responses received from institutions out of total 85 regarding Communication Options, it was felt that most of the institutions are not yet clear about the Communication Options being followed at their respective model schools. Therefore, this orientation workshop is required.
5. Structure of training programmes for Communication Options proposed was discussed and it was felt that 2 to 3 batches of training courses for master trainers and in-service teachers can be conducted in a year through the selected training institutions recognized by RCI. A uniform structure of training courses should be developed across all the three options.
6. While revising the course curricula of existing syllabi of D.Ed. Spl. Ed. (D&HH), B.Ed. Spl. Ed. (HI), more weightage will be given to three options in Theory as well as Practical. It was also recommended that the teacher training programmes should be modified to suit deaf teacher trainees by offering optional papers in lieu of papers on Audiology & Speech.
7. Father Ronald De Souza of Navvani School, Varanasi will translate the Manual on Communication Options in Hindi by May, 2012 and Dr. Asmita Huddar will coordinate the translation work in Marathi. RCI will meet the translation cost as per rules.

### **Meeting Held at RCI, New Delhi on March 27, 2012 to Finalize the RCI's Vision 2020 Document**

After thorough discussions on the draft Vision document, following decisions were taken:

1. RCI Vision 2020 document needs to be re-structured in the light of discussions held in the meeting.
2. Structure of the revised Vision document may include introduction, situational analysis, international and national commitments, approaches, vision statement, strategies as per RCI's objectives, administrative reforms, future plans, recommendations, etc.
3. Activities envisaged in the Vision document must flow from the objectives and mandated role of RCI.
4. Stress to be laid in the Vision document for ensuring a strong monitoring mechanism for inspection, recommendation for recognition, monitoring of admissions, conduct of examinations, continuing rehabilitation education programmes, registration of professionals/ personnel and stringent monitoring of distance education programmes.
5. There is a need to strengthen training courses by updating the faculty / master trainers for training institutions.



6. An improved system of accreditation of recognized institutions being followed by other regulatory bodies needs to be introduced.
7. Reference to amendments in the PWD Act, RCI Act and micro details about the activities to be avoided in the document.
8. Provision for reciprocal recognition of foreign degrees based on the procedure followed by other similar regulatory bodies may be included in the Vision document.
9. Emphasis to be laid in the Vision document on promotion of research in disability, use of technology for training of professionals and establishment of institutions of higher learning specifically in rehabilitation science.
10. Following details of the Vision document were finalized:

### **Vision**

An environment that facilitates the highest standards in human resource development based on principles of human rights and inclusion in disability rehabilitation.

### **Mission**

To ensure enhancement in quality of existing and emerging human resource development programmes in disability rehabilitation, to address the life cycle needs of persons with disabilities across the country, including those from remote and less-served areas.

### **Overall Objective**

To develop multi-level and multi-sectoral human resources for ensuring accessibility and inclusion of persons with disabilities.

### **Specific Objectives**

- (i) To develop, enforce and regulate essential and desirable standards for human resource development in the disability sector throughout the country
  - (ii) To develop /strengthen and implement stringent monitoring mechanisms
  - (iii) To collaborate and coordinate with relevant government & non-government bodies, academic and professional institutions to integrate disability issues in all policies and programmes.
  - (iv) To involve the participation of people with disabilities at all levels of planning, implementation and monitoring of HRD programmes.
  - (v) For the realization of Vision 2020, to take such measures as may be necessary to ensure that adequate human, material, financial, community and infrastructural resources are made available to facilitate the needed systemic changes in the governance of the Council.
  - (vi) To bridge the existing human resource gaps in unreached areas and thereby evolve strategies for up scaling and expanding HRD programmes across the country.
  - (vii) To promote research in the area of disability.
11. The Council will finalize the Activities for each Specific Objectives. Revised Vision document, including activities under each specific objective will be sent to all the members to give their comments/suggestions latest by 23rd April, 2012.

## STANDARDIZATION OF TRAINING COURSES

Council develops and standardizes training courses to meet the human resource requirement for various categories of Professionals/Personnel. These courses are reviewed, revised and updated from time to time. At present 81 (60 regular mode and 21 distance mode) are operational training courses in the area of disabilities adopted by Universities/Institutions are shown at *Annexure P*.

Following revised Diploma Courses were implemented from 2011-12 academic session:

1. D.Ed. Special Education (ASD) – 2 years
2. D.Ed. Special Education (CP) – 2 years
3. D.Ed. Special Education (Db) – 2 years

Following new Courses were also launched during the year:

1. Post Graduate Certificate Course in Auditory Verbal Therapy
2. M.A. Social Work in Disability Studies and Action
3. M. Sc. (Early Intervention)

## INSPECTION & RECOGNITION OF INSTITUTIONS

The Council conducts inspection and evaluation of institutions and on fulfillment of prescribed norms, recommends to Government for recognition to run training courses in the field of rehabilitation and special education.

During the year, inspection teams were deputed to conduct inspection of 456 programmes (336 old and 120 new programmes). The total number of recognized/approved institutions increased from 393 to 426 as on March 31, 2012. List of recognized approved institutions is placed at Annexure Q.

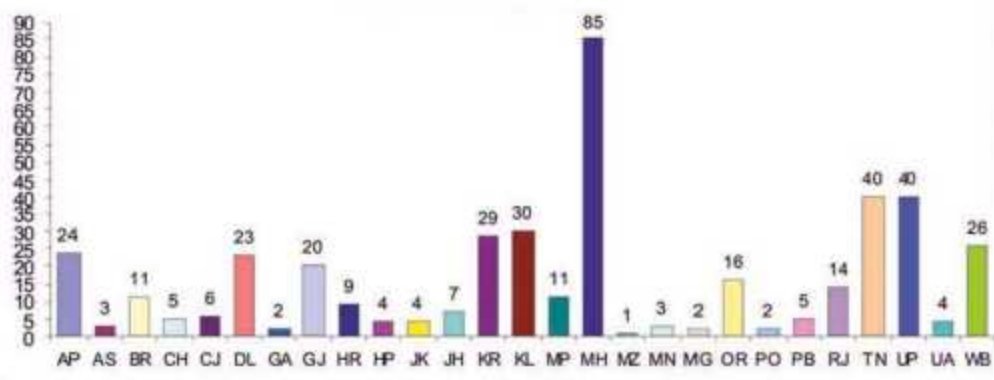

So far 68,923 professionals/personnel are registered with the Council.

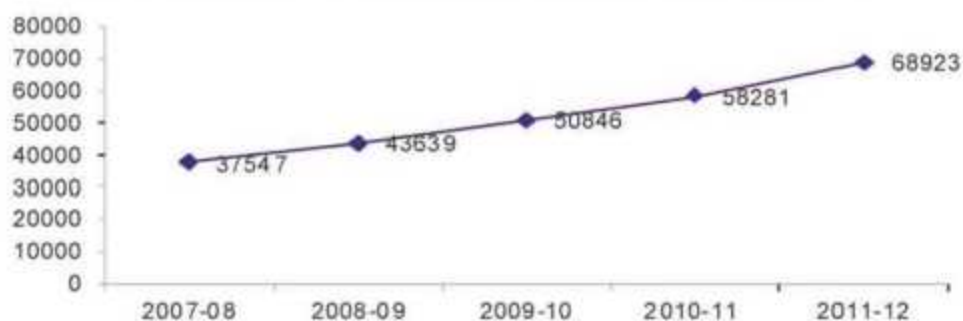
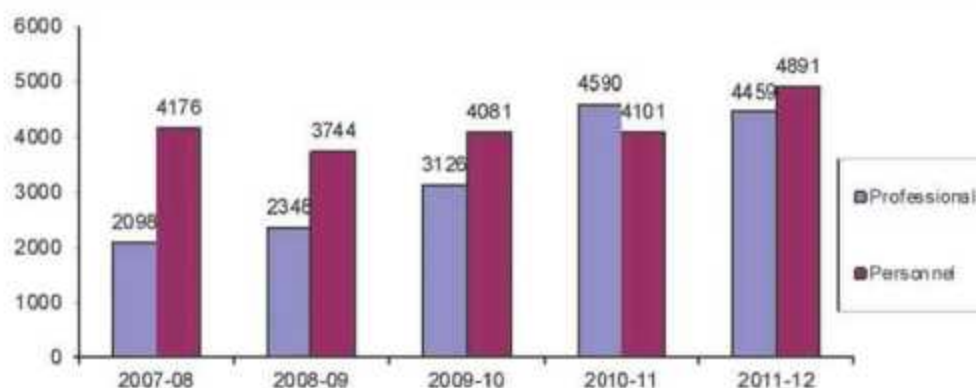

## CONTINUING REHABILITATION EDUCATION/ REFRESHER PROGRAMMES

To update the knowledge and skill of the professionals/personnel to provide quality services to the persons with disabilities, Council sponsors Continuing Rehabilitation Education (CRE)/Refresher Programmes being conducted by the recognized institutions. The CRE programmes make professionals/personnel eligible for renewal of their registration. The detail of CRE programme conducted is shown at *Annexure R*.

### Meeting of Experts to Review Topics and Guidelines of Continuing Rehabilitation Education (CRE) Programmes Held at ISIC, New Delhi on June 23-24, 2011

A Meeting of Experts to review the CRE Topics and Guidelines was held at the Indian Spinal Injuries Centre, New Delhi. Following decisions were taken in the meeting:

1. The efficacy and impact study of CRE programmes should be conducted.
2. A feed back form should be designed to get feed back directly from the CRE participants that can be utilized for further improvement of CRE programmes.
3. Inspection proforma of RCI may include a form to obtain feed back on the quality of service of professionals/personnel/special teachers who have undergone CRE programmes during the period of their valid registration/renewal with RCI.



4. Web based technology should be used to organize CRE programmes, particularly in rural areas where resource persons are not available.
5. Charter of duties of the Coordinator of CRE programmes should be framed by RCI.
6. The students of the host institution may be allowed to attend CRE programme as Observers.
7. RCI to make provision for receipt of online application for CRE programmes. Similarly, the CRE Report may also be accepted online.
8. It should be made mandatory to renew the registration within the validity period of five years failing which a hefty fine should be imposed for renewal.
9. Equal points should be given to all the authors for paper presentation, etc.
10. CRE programmes should be organized in Braille. Braille proficiency test should be conducted for teachers for visually impaired/professionals/personnel working in the area of visual impairment.
11. Out of 100 CRE points, 30 CRE points should be fixed for Braille proficiency for professionals/personnel in visual impairment field.
12. An examining body may be identified by RCI for conducting the Braille proficiency test.
13. Individual persons should not be given the responsibility of organizing CRE programmes. CRE programmes to be conducted only by the institutions.
14. CRE programmes to be encouraged in the areas like learning disability, dyslexia, multiple disabilities, etc.
15. Separate workshops on the pattern of CRE may be designed for medical professionals in different disability areas which can be funded by RCI.
16. Not more than 25 per cent participants should be allowed from the host institute to attend CRE programme.
17. Co-guide should be given equal number of CRE points as that of a Guide for the award of Ph.D. & M. Phil. degrees.

## NATIONAL BOARD OF EXAMINATION IN REHABILITATION

### Examination Cell

The examination cell was set up in 2005-06 at RCI to conduct, streamline, bring uniformity, avoid malpractices and use of unfair means in the examination of Diploma and Certificate level courses, both semester and annual examination system. The monitoring of the examination including surprise visits to the examination centre was done by the team constituted by RCI. The semester examination of Diploma in Education, Special Education (Deaf & Hard of Hearing, Mental Retardation and Visual Impairment) and 16 other Diploma and Certificate courses were successfully conducted through Manipal University (MU), Manipal and Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU), New Delhi.

In collaboration with the Examination Cell of RCI, the Manipal University successfully conducted the semester and term end examination of 21 RCI approved Diploma and Certificate courses in May and December 2011. A total number of 4,045 Diploma and 350 Certificate students took the examination. The answer script of different languages such as Bangla, Hindi, English, Gujarati, Marathi, Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, Malayalam were evaluated at the designated and approved evaluation centres and the results were declared in August, 2011 and February, 2012 for semester and term end examination respectively.

The examination work was subsequently entrusted to Indira Gandhi National Open University on the direction of Ministry from the academic session 2010-11 which conducted the semester and term end examination for 21 RCI approved Diploma and Certificate courses during February, 2011 and June 2011. A total number of 3,220 and 4,766 students took the examination in February and June respectively. The answer script of different languages such as Bangla, Hindi, English, Gujarati, Marathi, Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, Malayalam were evaluated at the designated and approved evaluation centres and the results were declared in August 2011.

The Examination Cell conducted the second All India Online Aptitude Test (AIOAT) for admission to RCI approved Diploma and Certificate courses. A total number of 15,000 candidates applied for the AIOAT. Admissions to Diploma in Education Special Education (Deaf & Hard of Hearing, Mental Retardation and Visual Impairment) were made by the RCI recognized institutions out of the successful candidates of AIOAT.

The Examination Cell also framed and issued separate guidelines to the examination centres, examination superintendents, centre level observers and flying squads for smooth and fair conduct of the examinations.

The Examination Cell also introduced a Scheme of Examination for Certifying Clinical Competency (EC3) in Psychology for candidates with Master's in Psychology from recognized Universities and practicing Clinical Psychology without undergoing adequate clinical training.

### Review of Examination Scheme

A meeting of experts to review the scheme of Examination-2008 for Certificate/Diploma Courses in Special Education and Rehabilitation was held on February 28, 2012 wherein following decisions were taken:

1. The system of oral/verbal translation of question papers for final theory examination will be discontinued. Only translated written/taped question papers in respective regional language will be supplied to candidates. Translation in regional language will be done one hour before commencement of the examination in the presence of Central Level Observer (CLO) and Examination Superintendent. While dispatching the answer sheets for evaluation, a copy of the translated version of the question paper must be enclosed.
2. The examination centre should be located at a reasonable distance from the training centre.
3. The question papers will be composed as per following weightage:
 

i)	Objective type questions	:	10%
ii)	Answer in one or two sentences (5 questions, all compulsory)	:	20%
iii)	Short questions (4 questions out of 6)	:	30%
iv)	Long questions (2 questions out of 4)	:	40%

Following attendance will be compulsory for candidates to be eligible to appear in the final examination:

5% relaxation in attendance can be allowed by the head of institution for valid reasons.

Candidates must be informed about the status of attendance every two months. Examination forms of candidates having requisite attendance should be forwarded to the Examining body.

4. The paper setters/evaluators must be selected among the teaching faculty having minimum of 3 years of experience.
5. The results will be declared within two months after completion of the examination. Re-totalling of marks will be permitted within a period of one month only, from the date of declaration of results. A fee of Rs. 500/- per paper will be charged for re-totalling of marks.
6. There is no provision for re-evaluation. In exceptional cases, the decision for re-evaluation can be taken by RCI.
7. Candidates will be allowed 1 + 2 chances only for appearing in exams. For one year course, the chance to be availed within a span of 3 years and for the two-year course, the chances are to be availed of within a span of 5 years from the date of admission.
8. There will be no provision for improvement of marks.

9. Candidates must pass in three theory papers in the first year to be allowed to be promoted to the second year of a two-year course. In the one year course, minimum three papers have to be passed to be eligible to appear in the supplementary examination.
10. Following punitive action will be taken against the examination centre in case of mass copying/malpractices:
  - i) Examination(s) at the Examination Center will be cancelled.
  - ii) Centre/Institute will be debarred to serve as an Examination Centre in future.
  - iii) Invigilator(s), Examination Superintendent and CLO of the Examination Centre will be black-listed for any future assignment.
12. A Committee will be constituted by the Council to investigate the aspects of mass copying/malpractice and recommend necessary punitive action.
13. For unfair means by the candidates during examination, rules of the examining body will apply.
14. Diploma/Certificate will be awarded to the successful candidates by the Examining Body within a period of one month from the date of declaration of results. The format of Diploma/Certificate will be jointly decided by RCI and the examining body.

## OUTREACH DIVISION

As the annual turnover of professional manpower trained through the regular institutions could hardly meet the demand of trained manpower in the area of special education and rehabilitation, the Council envisaged its vision to render services to all people with disabilities in the country and providing them age and disability appropriate continuum of rehabilitation services, opted for the other mode of curriculum transaction, i.e., distance mode. The Outreach Division has been started in the Council to monitor the distance education programmes, inter-ministerial/departmental coordination, application of emerging technologies, project evaluation and assessment and resource generation.

### Distance Education

The Council to achieve its vision to provide for quality trained human resource in the area of rehabilitation and special education to render services to all people with disabilities opted for the parallel mode of curriculum transaction, i.e., distance mode. As a result, need based special education programmes were initiated through distance mode as a joint venture with different State Open / Central Universities since the year 2000-01. The demand for the courses was such that the students from many States started demanding it in their regional/local language, which resulted in launch of courses in five regional languages (Hindi, Bangla, Gujarati, Tamil & Kannada). Over a period of time more courses like FC-SEDE, CECSE, AWT, PGPD, PCPC, B.ED. SEDE, M.ED. SEDE, PGDDM were also launched through distance mode.

**Other Activities of Outreach Division**

1. The Apex Advisory Committee meeting to review the status of FC-SEDE/PGPD-SEDE/B.Ed-SEDE programme offered by Madhya Pradesh Bhoj Open University (MPBOU) was held on 6th July, 2011 at Bhopal. It was decided to withdraw permission to conduct all three special education programme from 2012-14 session.

2. The Council developed the Syllabus and Self Learning Material (SLM) for Foundation Course on Education of Children with Learning Disabilities (FCEDLD) through online.
3. The Council launched the following programmes through distance mode in collaboration with IGNOU:
  - (a) Post Graduate Diploma in Rehabilitation Psychology
  - (b) M.Ed- Special Education – Learning Disabilities
4. The MoU to conduct B.Ed.-SEDE (HI/VI/MR) in collaboration with Tamil Nadu State Open University has been renewed from 4th October, 2011 for another 5 years.
5. The Apex Advisory Committee meeting to review the status of B.Ed.-SEDE programme offered by TNOU was held on 4th October, 2011 at Chennai.
6. The third meeting of experts to finalize the syllabus of Bachelor in Special Education ( Four-Year Integrated) B.A./B.Com/B.Sc Special Education programme was held on 4-5 August, 2011 at RCI, New Delhi. The syllabus was finalized by the Committee. UGC & IGNOU have been approached to promote and launch the programme.
7. A National workshop on Quality Assurance and Promotion of Special Education Programmes was held from 26-28 July, 2011 at ISIC, New Delhi. A total of 125 candidates from all the Study Centers and Universities participated in the two-day workshop.
8. A Meeting of Programme Coordinators of all concerned Open Universities was held on 28th July 2011 at RCI to finalize the recommendations made during the National Workshop.
9. The Council launched the following programmes through Online Mode during the financial year 2011-12:
  - i) *Foundation Course on Education of Children with Disabilities (FCECD)* – Online was launched on 5th September, 2011. The duration of this course is 3 months (90 days) including 12 days Skill Training Programme (STP) comprising 84 hours. Till now 432 learners registered themselves, out of which 384 learners got enrolled in this course.
  - ii) *Foundation Course on Education of Children with Learning Disabilities (FCEDLD)* – Online was launched on 15th of March, 2012. The duration of this course is 3 months (90 days) including 7 days Skill Training Programme (STP) comprising 42 hours. In the first batch 116 students got enrolled and in the second batch 45 students were enrolled in the course.
10. The Council has collaborated with the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India and SSA to launch the FCSEDE Programme through Block Resource Centres across the country. The Block Resource Centres approved by the Council are as follows:

## ZONAL COORDINATION COMMITTEES

These Zonal Coordination Committees function as advisory in nature and act as a zonal chapter to the Council. The Zonal Coordination Committees in different zones of the Country have initiated the process of strengthening the training programmes under their zone by inviting professionals/personnel & NGOs in the workshop/sensitization programmes, etc., being conducted in their respective zones. The Council has been utilizing their services for effective monitoring of training institutes. They are also being encouraged to conduct short term programmes for grass root level functionaries apart from executives and legislatives. They are also involved in smooth conduct and monitoring of distance mode programmes.

During the year, all the seven ZCCs were instrumental in creating awareness about the programmes and policies in the area of disability rehabilitation and special education by organizing various workshops/seminars/sensitization programmes/conferences within their zone as per approved Action Plan of the Council approved by the Council.

## NAVSHIKHAR CHANNEL

The EDUSAT network was established in the month of July 2007 by setting up of Studio at RCI campus and installation of Direct Reception Systems (DRS) in the recognized institutes/centers in a phased manner. The setting up of studio, operations and programme generation was funded by MLA. ISRO has provided help in setting up of Uplink equipment for the Earth Station and access of bandwidth on EDUSAT satellite. The independent disability channel was inaugurated on October 05, 2007 by then Hon'ble Minister of Social Justice & Empowerment, Ms. Meira Kumar and named as "Navshikhar Channel". Since then regular transmission of programmes in various disability fields is being carried out.

### Teleconferencing Programmes

Live/recorded programmes were telecast on different topics in the field of disability to 470 institutions/centers where the Direct Reception System (DRS) facility has been provided by the Council from Monday to Friday between 10.30 a.m. and 05.00 p.m. List of live teleconferences conducted during April, 2011 to March, 2012 is placed at *Annexure T*.

### Uploading of Teleconference Programmes in Web-Portal

CDs of live teleconferences on various topics in the field of disability were made after compressing the data and handed over to Media Lab Asia for uploading on the web portal [www.punarbhava.in](http://www.punarbhava.in) and teleconference programmes were uploaded in the web portal from time to time.

Due to de-activation of EDUSAT satellite transponder, ISRO has allocated bandwidth of 3 Mhz on INSAT 3-A satellite to RCI. Accordingly reorientation of 381 DRS/ROTs completed. Purchase order for supply, installation and commissioning of 215 DRS for new institutes was placed and installation



of 185 DRS completed. Additionally purchase order for supply, installation and commissioning of 40 DRS in North Eastern Region was placed from MLA funds. Work for the installation is under progress.

## NATIONAL INTERACTIVE WEB PORTAL "PUNARBHAVA" ON DISABILITY

The Council in collaboration with Media Lab Asia started an interactive and informative web portal "Punarbhava" ([www.punarbhava.in](http://www.punarbhava.in)) on disability and rehabilitation in the year 2007. The purpose of the web portal is to fill the gap of availability of information and its dissemination for persons with disabilities. The web portal has opened new horizons for persons with disabilities. This is an innovative initiative where two government organizations have joined hands for reaching the unreached and providing them opportunities to fully participate in social life and become productive members of the society.

Punarbhava is an attempt to provide a gateway to information for persons with disabilities and all others concerned with this sector. It is a recognized fact that information holds the key to knowledge, which in turn enables and empowers people and this initiative of Media Lab Asia in collaboration with Rehabilitation Council of India, is envisioned as a medium for persons with disabilities and all related stakeholders to be empowered and to participate fully in the national mainstream.

Web portal was re-designed in March 2012 so as to adhere to Level AA of the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG 2.0) of the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C). Punarbhava has achieved linkages with other websites like National Trust, NIMH, NIIH to reach to maximum number of beneficiaries.

Latest and updated information was uploaded on Punarbhava regularly under different heads like national disability register, legal instrument resources/publications, RCI programmes, careers for persons with disabilities, national and international news in the field of disability, event calendar, research articles, assistive devices, data collection /NGO registration form, update on Navshikhar Channel, CDs on lecture series of Navshikhar, etc.

### Implementation of RTI Act, 2005

RCI has been following the directions/guidelines issued by the government from time to time for implementation of RTI Act, 2005. During the year, a total of 228 applications seeking information under the RTI Act were received out of which 8 applications were transferred to other concerned Departments/Organizations and 220 applications were disposed off. Council also received 08 First Appeals under the RTI Act which were disposed off by the first Appellate Authority and two Second Appeals were disposed off by CIC.

### Vigilance Awareness Week

The Council organized the Vigilance Awareness Week from 31.10.2011 to 05.11.2011 as per the instructions issued by the Government of India from time to time.

**Audit Report on the Accounts of the Rehabilitation Council of India, New Delhi for the Year 2011-12****Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) for the year ended 31st March 2012**

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Rehabilitation Council of India as at 31st March 2012, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payment Account for the year ended on that day under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 21(3) of the Rehabilitation Council of India, Regulations 1997. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (C&AG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practice, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Report/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
4. Based on our audit, we report that:
  - i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
  - ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account, and Receipts & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the Common Format of Accounts approved by the Ministry of Finance.
  - iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Rehabilitation Council of India as required under Section 21(2) of Rehabilitation Council of India Regulations, 1997 in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

- iv. We further report that:

**A. Balance Sheet**

**A.1 Liabilities**

**A.1.1 Current Liabilities & Provisions**

The Council has not made any provision for gratuity & leave encashment and the same are being accounted for on cash basis in contravention of the common format of account approved by the Government of India.

**A.2. Assets**

**A.2.1 Current Assets, Loans & Advances**

Accrued interest amounting to Rs.11.61 lakh (Rs.11.03 lakh on investments of GPF and Rs.0.58 lakh on NPS) was not depicted in the accounts. This has resulted into understatement of Current Assets and Income by Rs.11.61 lakh.

**A.2.2 Investments**

As per instructions issued by Ministry of Finance vide notification No.F.5(53)/2002-ECB & PB dated 14.08.2008, investments of Provident Fund should be made in various Government securities (upto 55%), debt securities (upto 40%), money market instruments (upto 5%) and share of companies (upto 15%). However, the Council had invested in Term Deposits in Nationalized Banks/Financial Institutions (97.25%) and Government securities (2.75%) which is not in accordance with pattern prescribed by the Government of India.

**B. Grants-in-aid**

Out of Rs. 398.63 lakh (Plan Rs. 258.63 lakh and Non-plan Rs. 140.00 lakh) received as grant-in-aid from Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Rs. 35.00 lakh under Non-Plan was received in March 2012. It had unspent balance of previous year of Rs. 40.37 lakh under Plan & Rs. 120.97 lakh under DRS Networking (Plan), Rs. 0.57 lakh under Grant from UGC & also internal receipt of Rs. 358.74 lakh. Out of the total funds available, the Council utilised a sum of Rs. 662.35 lakh, leaving an unspent balance of Rs. 256.93 lakh (Rs. 16.00 lakh & Rs. 110.75 lakh under Plan & DRS Networking (Plan) respectively and Rs. 130.18 lakh transferred to Balance Sheet as Income over Expenditure).

**C. Management Letter**

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Council through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account deal with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.



- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India.
- a. In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Rehabilitation Council of India as at 31 March, 2012, and
  - b. In so far as it relates to Income and Expenditure Account for the surplus for the year ended on that date.

2. The Rehabilitation Council of India, New Delhi is a Statutory Body set up under the Rehabilitation Council of India Act, 1992 (No. 34 of 1992). The Council is financed by the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India through Annual Plan & Non-plan Grants-in-Aid.
3. The Council as desired based on the observations of DGACR, New Delhi in the audit report 2003-04 prepared Annual Accounts in the common/revised format approved by the Govt. of India in consultation with the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG). As per these formats, the Council has to prepare following statements:
  - a. Balance Sheet
  - b. Income & Expenditure Account
