

NIC Telangana: ** Seminar on Implementation of New Criminal Laws (NCL) in Telangana & Experience Sharing by the Police Personnel **

A one-day seminar titled "**Implementation of New Criminal Laws (NCL) in Telangana: Experience Sharing**" was conducted on **29 December 2025** at the **Central Detective Training Institute (CDTI), Hyderabad**, which functions as a pivotal training arm under the **Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPR&D), Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India**. This event was organised in collaboration between **BPR&D** and the **Telangana Police**.

It was inaugurated by **Ms Charu Sinha, IPS, Additional Director General of Police (CID), Telangana**, with senior police officials also present at the event were **Shri S. Sambasiva Reddy, Director of Prosecution; Shri Narayan Naik, IPS, Deputy Inspector General (CID); and Shri Salmantaj Patil, IPS, Director of CDTI Hyderabad**.

The seminar witnessed active participation from **police officers across all Police Commissionerates within Telangana State**, alongside representatives from the **Prisons Department and Public Prosecutors from the Department of Prosecution, Telangana**, accompanied by their respective teams.

A request was received from the **Director, CDTI**, to the **SIO & DDG, NIC Telangana State Unit, Shri Guntuku Prasad**, to nominate an expert officer from NIC to attend and moderate the sessions. Based on the request, **NIC Telangana State Centre** nominated **Shri Kartik Krishna Vijayasharadhi, Joint Director (IT) / Scientist 'D'**.

Shri Kartik Krishna Vijayasharadhi, in his presentation, centred on discussions focused heavily on various applications and systems developed by **NIC-HQ (MHA-II division and ePrisons Project division)** and supported by **NIC-Telangana in the state for implementation of the New Criminal Laws like National Fingerprint Identification System (NAFIS) and Criminal Procedure Identification (Cr.PI)**.

He explained how these tools collect fingerprints, iris scans, photographs, palm prints, DNA, etc. and help in solving crimes at various stages. He further explained the uses of the **specialised databases** like **Integrated Monitoring of Terrorism (iMot)**, **National Integrated Database on Arrested Narco-Offenders (NIDAAN)**, **National Database of Sexual Offenders (NDSO)**, **Investigation Tracking System for Sexual Offences (ITSSO)**, **National Database of Human Trafficking Offenders (NDHTO)**, and **National Database of Foreign Offenders (NDOFO)**.

He also emphasised NIC's role in **development, maintenance, training, and increased adoption, promising ongoing support.**

The Ramagundam Commissionerate team also introduced the core objectives of the three new laws— **Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS)**, **Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS)**, and **Bharatiya Sakshya Adhinyam (BSA)**—aimed at speedy justice, victim protection, and transparency, highlighting the role of technology like **CCTNS, ICJS, e-Forensics, and various databases.**

Teams from various departments delivered presentations, sharing practical challenges encountered at ground level. Solution experts, nodal officers, and moderators participating in the sessions addressed queries and assisted in resolving the issues raised.

The seminar served as a platform for experience sharing and resolving issues, strengthening coordination among stakeholders to enable **smoother NCL implementation**
