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INTRODUCTION

Sustainable Development holds the promise that we leave our future generation a world better than today's. The seventeen cross-cutting SDGs, also known as the Global Goals, are a universal call to action to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure that all people enjoy peace and prosperity. At the state level, the Government of Haryana is committed to work towards achieving these goals. To this end, in 2017, the Government of Haryana published its Vision 2030 which was aligned with SDGs; and in 2018-19, the State Government undertook a detailed assessment of its budgetary allocations towards these goals. Taking a step forward, the Government of Haryana has introduced the Output-Outcome Framework for the Yearly Budget Outlay. The Output-Outcome Framework serves as the foundational step for aligning the state government's public spending, development policies and welfare efforts with SDGs.

OUTPUT-OUTCOME FRAMEWORK

Haryana is one of the first few states to adopt the Output-Outcome Framework at the state level. The implementation of the Output-Outcome Framework Report is a result of the Government of Haryana's consistent focus on nurturing an open, transparent, and citizen-centric governance model by transitioning from mere outlay reporting to providing detailed information about how public money will be spent on various development works, delivery of government services, and creating infrastructure in a financial year. The report also provides the long-term impact

and effectiveness of the government schemes and projects in terms of improving the well-being of the citizens of Haryana. Ultimately, implementing this framework, the Government of Haryana intends to:

- Build a deeper understanding about the Government's welfare and development activities among all the stakeholders .
- Enable various government departments to keep track of their progress against the goals set by them at the beginning of the year.
- Provide an integrated framework for the achievement of SDGs in Haryana.

Herein, outputs refer to the products, capital goods, and services which result from the work done by the government under various schemes. On the other hand, outcomes are the progressive development changes that the outputs are likely to produce in mid-to-long term. It is worthwhile to note that the framework eschews the conventional wisdom of focusing only on money and moves towards the idea that monitoring the outcomes of government schemes is what will allow for the sustainable development of Haryana.

The Output- Outcome Framework gives importance to citizen welfare rather than just accounting for welfare expenditure. It shifts the focus from merely spending money to achieving SDG outcomes and Vision 2030 of the Government of Haryana.



SUMMARY OF THE REPORT

The Output-Outcome Framework Report in Haryana has been issued for the fifth year for the Budget 2023-24. Accordingly, the scope of this report is limited to major development and welfare schemes of various departments, having an estimated outlay of more than INR 5 Crores. However, in some cases, schemes with smaller outlays are also covered wherever they were found to be highly relevant in terms of development priorities for Haryana. For FY 2023-24, the report covers development and welfare schemes from 42 departments, which amount to almost 95% of the state's total

development expenditure. To draft this report, a series of inter-departmental sessions were conducted to build awareness about the framework and how departments should set targets which are realistic, measurable, and for synchronise with works that they have planned for 2023-24. Moreover, every development and welfare scheme operational in the state (be it a Central Sponsored Scheme, State-Sponsored Scheme, or Central Share Scheme) has been linked to one (or more) SDGs to map the contribution of scheme-level outcomes to the achievement of SDGs.

STRUCTURE OF THE REPORT

The report contains the outputs-outcomes and physical targets of the scheme and budget estimates for FY 2023-24 as well as physical achievements against expenditure for FY 2022-23.

The outputs-outcomes and physical targets of schemes are aligned with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), SDG-Targets, and SDG-Indicators.

Further, all concerned departments and their interventions have been categorised under the following 8 budgetary thematic areas:

1. Agriculture & Allied Sector, Environment & Natural Resource Management
2. Food & Cooperative Sector
3. Regional Development and Local Self Government
4. Human Development and Social Welfare
5. Growth Enablers and Infrastructure Development

1. Diversification:

- A total of 11277 acre area has been diversified in Horticulture.

2. Technology Achievements:

- Three new Centres of Excellence are being established at Gignow (Bhiwani), Pinangawan (Mewat) & Munimpur (Jhajjar) for technology demonstration and 131 Villages of Excellence have been adopted to transfer the techniques to the farmers.
- Honey Trade Centre has been established at Integrated Beekeeping Development Centre (IBDC), Ramnagar (Kurukshetra).
- Quality Control Lab for Honey has been approved with an amount of Rs. 20 crores to be established at IBDC.
- 5280 samples are being drawn across the Haryana State for determination of pesticide residue in produce, soil and water.
- Vegetable mini kits as a special project on Low-Cost Vegetable Seeds has been started for varieties developed by CCS HAU.
- 89 machineries & equipments under seven categories have been included under

mechanization program with enhanced subsidy rates.

- 2130 acres have been brought under open field vertical farming through low-cost bamboo stacking system.
- 434 acres have been brought under protected greenhouse cultivation technology.
- 1.50 crore quality hybrid vegetable seedlings & 60000 grafted fruit plants have been provided to the farmers.
- 139 farm water ponds have been established to promote water conservation.
- New Centre of Excellence on Post Harvest Management is being established & an MoU was signed with UK Government on 29.09.2022.
- Under Bee Keeping policy, which was approved in 2021, a total of 10620 quality bee boxes, 11774 bee colonies & 40490 equipments have been provided to the beekeepers.

3. Risk Mitigation:

- To mitigate the risk of farmers, Horticulture Insurance Scheme registration started in July 2022 & 46 crops covered under this scheme.
- 22686 farmers were registered & a compensation of Rs. 9.05 crore is being given to the farmers under Bhavantar Bharpayee Yojana.

4. Farmer Aggregation:

48 Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) have been formed during 2022-23 and as of now a total of 731 FPOs have been formed in the State.

- Under Skill and Horticulture Human Resource Development programme:
- 27 Agri Business Workshop conducted for farmers FPOs.
- 209 weekly training programs covered 4729 farmers.
- 18 qualifications packs of 2 to 3 months skill programs provided to 257 trainees.
- 189 webinars covered 7861 attendees.
- 1 international, 1 national, 4 state level and 1 district level consultation conducted that covered 250 beneficiaries.
- 4 State-level exposures on vegetable, potato, mango & agri-tech were organized.
- 17 officers were sent aboard on advance training program in 3 batches & 50 officers were sent to 5 different institute of the country.

5. Infrastructure & Policy Initiatives:

- A seed policy has been launched to target one lakh acre area under Seed Potato Technology up to 2030.
- Haryana FPO Policy, Fruit Evaluation Policy are under consideration.
- 17 MoUs have been signed with 13 FPOs by back arrangement for Agri-Business activities.

6. Market Linkages:

- Under Crop Cluster Programme, complete Horticulture Supply Chain is being established, so far 33 Integrated Packhouses have been established & 41 are under establishment stage.
- For creation of complete Horticulture Supply Chain, a project of Rs. 3796 crores has

- 1518 SC beneficiaries received financial assistance for establishment of 2 Milch Animals Dairy/Sheep/Goat/Piggery units and additionally provided financial assistance to 8002 SC beneficiaries under MMAPUY.
- 98 General beneficiaries received financial assistance for establishment of Sheep/Goat/Piggery units and additionally provided financial assistance to 264 beneficiaries included under MMAPUY.
- 1026 beneficiaries received backyard poultry units (consisting of 50 chicks+2 drinkers+2 feeders).
- 1615 beneficiaries under Indigenous cattle and Murrah development programme received incentive money ranging from Rs. 5000-30000 each.
- The Government has notified 22 infirmaries in the State to provide care and treatment to the ill and infirm animals.
- The Department has provided an amount of Rs. 13.71 crore to the Gaushalas of the State as fodder assistance and Rs. 1.15 crore for capital infrastructure.




Key Focus Areas and Major Interventions 2022-23

- 43,82,000 and 10,96,000 vaccinations to livestock owned by general and SC, respectively, were given to reduce the risk of infectious diseases like HS, FMD, Brucellosis etc.
- 1,12,446 and 54,104 animals owned by General and SC category, respectively, were insured to improve risk management of livestock.

- The Department will start 70 Mobile Veterinary Units to provide Veterinary Services to the livestock owners at their doorsteps in PPP mode. Each Mobile Veterinary Unit will cover the livestock population of 1 lakh animals. A Call Centre will be established to control and monitor the services of mobile vans and provide Tele-Medicine services to livestock farmers.
- 2 State of Art Government Veterinary Pet Clinics in Gurugram and Faridabad to provide advanced diagnostic and treatment services to the pet owners of the area.
- 40 new Government Veterinary Institutions (GVHs or GVDs) in the districts where veterinary services coverage is less in proportion to the livestock population of the area.
- The State Government will bring a Policy / Act to promote and regulate the poultry sector in the State.
- Financial assistance to Antyodaya families of the State for establishing livestock units to raise their family income.
- Risk Management to livestock farmers through subsidized livestock insurance (4,00,000 animals) under National Livestock Mission.
- Establishment of 70 Pashu Sanjeevani Seva Kendra and 100 Call Centres.

Created permanent infrastructure to tackle the problem of water logging and submergence during monsoon to reduce risk of natural disaster.

- Various works amounting to Rs. 110.24 Cr. to improve the capacity of various pumps of lift. Irrigation System in District Rewari, Mahendragarh and Charkhi Dadri successfully completed.

- Work on 20 STPs to utilize treated wastewater started at full pace with financial assistance of NABARD under Micro Irrigation Fund.

- Reconstruction/Replacement of 41 bridges was successfully completed.

- 41 Works of Restoration, Revival and Rejuvenation of various old, dilapidated water bodies and village ponds was completed.

- Under Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana-Per Drop More Crop, subsidy provided for 23956 Ha. area to the MI beneficiaries.



Key Focus Areas and Major Interventions 2023-24

- Under Atal Bhujal Yojana, for the work of construction of 1669 Piezometers to measure of Ground Water Levels, 1669 Rain Gauges have been installed. 1669 Ground Water Level indicator has been supplied to 1669 Gram Panchayats and are already being used at the site. 1669 water quality testing kits have also been supplied to 1669 Gram Panchayats through which water testing is in progress.
- Under National Hydrology Project, for remote monitoring of Hathnikund Barrage & 20 number Pump Houses on JLN feeder, SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) system has been installed. Further RTDAS (Real Time Data Acquisition System) has been installed on 90 canals.





Providing modern, efficient system of land record management and citizen friendly, transparent services regarding land management; and also providing capability in form of both capacity building and infrastructure to pre-empt, act during disasters and ensure proper co-ordination for better disaster management.

- Providing citizen-centric services by bringing all citizen related services and information under a single roof.
- Building capacity of state in disaster management through resource strengthening, strategic learning, and knowledge-sharing.
- Reducing disaster risk reduction in the development activities of the State.

- Updating, maintenance and modernization of the processes by laying emphasis on computerization of records and digitization of maps using latest survey techniques.
- Consolidation of landholdings of the entire state.
- Enhancing disaster management capacity of the State by creating a culture of prevention, mitigation, preparedness, and response.

- An amount of Rs. 22,62,68,900/- at the rate of Rs. 6500/- per acre has been sanctioned as a special package to the Tehsil Khedi Jalab of district Hisar and Tehsil Alewa of district Jind for crop damage in Kharif 2021 due to heavy rain/water logging and pest attack.
- An amount of Rs. 109,64,75,321/- has been sanctioned to Deputy Commissioners Ambala, Yamuna Nagar, Kaithal, Nuh, Rewari, Hisar, Jind, Rohtak, Sonipat and Jhajjar for providing compensation to the affected farmers due to heavy rain/water logging during Rabi Crops, 2022.
- An amount of Rs. 41,77,33,250/- crore has been sanctioned to Deputy Commissioners Bhiwani and Charkhi Dadri for providing compensation to the affected farmers due to hailstorm during Rabi Crops, 2022.
- The consolidation work of 7 villages namely village Nangal in Karnal, village Kanhra, District Charkhi Dadri, villages Kairwali, Manglora Kadim, and Chogawain Karnal, village Sadpur, Khaika, in Nuh has been completed.
- 25,97,952 property records have been conclusively finalised by covering 6260 number of Lal Dora villages under the SVAMITVA.
- The State Government, for the convenience of the public has constructed composite office buildings known as Mini- Secretariat /Sub-Division complex/ Tehsil / Sub-Tehsil at district headquarters in the State.

Achievement
for 2022-23

- More than 91% of Emergency Response Vehicles (ERVs) achieved less than 20 minutes of response time.
- More than 90% victims were found satisfied from the Haryana 112 (ERSS) service in Haryana.
- A fleet of 23 Police ERVs added in the department which can provide instant support to the residents in distress. The ERVs comprise all essential components like Mini extrication kit, Crime scene protection, Rope, First-Aid-Box, MDT, Mobile, DMR sets, GPS, Adjustable lights, Camera, Water container, Lathi, helmet, and protection shield etc. which may require in case of any emergency. The manpower has been trained accordingly.
- System is enabled with an online defining of patrolling routes features of ERVs, which can be accessed through the MDT installed in ERV. ERV's locations are captured through GPS. It will track any misuse of ERV and the performance of ERV in terms of fuel.
- In a small span of time, since launch of the project, the Haryana ERSS number 112 has been popularized among the residents of Haryana. IEC material and branding of Haryana ERSS 112 have played an essential role in the same.
- The government had decided to establish women communication officers during inception of the project. It is an achievement that these women communication officers have successfully been performing their duties round the clock since the launch of project.

- Setting up forensic science laboratories (Hisar & Panchkula) to enhance the testing capacity.
- Construction of approximately 450 houses in police complex and many other construction work are under progress.
