

National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation

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Executive Summary

Cabinet approved the proposal of establishment of the National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation (NIMHR) at Schore, Madhya Pradesh, which has been registered as a society under the Madhya Pradesh Society Registration Act, 1973 on 28th May 2019, with the objectives of promoting mental health rehabilitation using an integrated multidisciplinary approach and developing trained professionals in the area of mental health rehabilitation.

It is being set up on a piece of 25 acre of land allotted by the Government of Madhya Pradesh along Bhopal-Sehore highway in Madhya Pradesh. NIMHR was functional since 30th September 2019 at a temporary accommodation provided by the Government of Madhya Pradesh at Old Zila Panchayat Bhawan, Sehore. On 13 March, 2024 the service block at permanent campus was inaugurated by Honourable Minister Dr. Virendra Kumar, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India. Since then NIMHR shifted to its permanent campus and has been providing rehabilitation and clinical services and also running a Certificate Course on Care Giving (CCCG) along with Diploma in Community Based Rehabilitation (DCBR) and Diploma in Vocational Rehabilitation - Intellectual Disability (DVR-ID) and Diploma in Indian Sign Language Interpretation (DISLI) and Post Graduate Diploma In Rehabilitation Psychology (PGDRP).

 presentation hall as per directives, inspiring them with the Prime Minister's message.








Introduction

Rationale and Cabinet approval:

According to India's National Commission on Macroeconomic and Health Report 2005, the prevalence of serious mental illness in Indian population is nearly 6.5% which roughly amounts to 71 million people (78 million in 2011). By the year 2020, the burden of neuropsychiatric disorders was expected to rise from the current level to 10.5%. Further, National Policy for Persons with Disabilities states about the need, to develop professionals in the field of disabilities so that rehabilitation strategies do not suffer for want of adequate manpower.

Though Government institutions such as the Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI), the National Trust for the welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation & Multiple Disabilities, Pt. Deen dayal. Upadhyaya. Institute for Persons with Physical. Disabilities (Divyangjan) (PDUNIPPD), New Delhi, National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Intellectual Disabilities (Divyangjan) (NIEPID)), Secunderabad, National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities (Divyangjan) (NIEPVD), Dehradun, National Institute for Locomotor Disabilities (Divyangjan) (NILD), Kolkata, National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD), Chennas, Swami Vivekanand National Institute for Rehabilitation, Training and Research (SVNIRTAR), Cuttack, Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of 'Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan) (AYJNISHD), Mumbai, etc., provide extremely valuable services to various categories of persons with disabilities (PwDs), even among them there is no institution which is focusing on services, training and academics exclusively on mental health rehabilitation.

Moreover, the National Institute of Mental Health & Neurosciences (NIMHANS), Bengaluru, under the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, is an institute which is predominantly involved only in the treatment related part for mentally ill persons. Other Institutes like Central Institute of Psychiatry (CIP), Ranchi, Institute of Human Behaviour & Allied Sciences (IHBAS), Delhi is also predominantly providing treatment related services. Therefore, it was felt that there should be an Institute that will be distinctly different from NIMHANS, IHBAS and CIP, and will be solely dedicated to the mental health rehabilitation.

Hence, it was felt that there is a need for developing capacity building in the area of mental health rehabilitation as the existing institutions are mostly engaged in treatment of mental disorders. With a view to meeting the requirement to cater to the needs of mental health rehabilitation in a focused manner, the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD) envisioned establishment of the National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation (NIMHR) to promote the rehabilitation of mentally ill persons using an integrated multidisciplinary approach.

While the Department was pursuing the matter in this regard, Hon'ble Union Finance Minister, in his Budget announcement for the year 2014-15, also declared Government's intention to establish NIMHR. Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, initiated a proposal to set up the National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation (NIMHR). Cabinet approved the establishment of NIMHR initially at Bhopal, and subsequently at Sehore in Madhya Pradesh in October, 2018.







Subsequently, NIMHR, Sehore has been established as a Central Autonomous Institute under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India. It is registered as a Society under the MP Societies Registration Act, 1973. It is a National Institute working in the area of mental health rehabilitation. Total approved initial project cost for the first three years is Rs. 179.4 crore which includes non-recurring expenditure of Rs. 128.54 crore and recurring expenses of Rs. 51 crores. Non recurring expenditure also provides for capital cost of construction of building of NIMHR @ Rs. 105.68 crore. The permanent site of the Institute is being set up on a piece of 25 acre of land allotted by the Government of MP at Sehore, along Bhopal-Indore highway in Madhya Pradesh.

At present, the Institute is made functional from September, 2019 in a temporary accommodation provided by the Govt. of M.P. in Old Panchayat Bhawan at Sehore. It is being set up on a piece of 25 acre of land all officed by the Government of Madhya Pradesh along Bhopal-Sehore highway in Madhya Pradesh. On 13 March, 2024 the service block at permanent campus was inaugurated by Honourable Minister Dr. Virendra Kumar, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India. Since then NIMHR shifted to its permanent campus and has been providing clinical and rehabilitation services along with academic programmes like, Certificate course of care giving was initially started by the Institute in 2019 and Diploma in Community Based Rehabilitation (DCBR) & Diploma in Vocational Rehabilitation-Intellectual Disability (DVR-ID) will be started in 2020. Clinical services through OPD (Psychotherapeutic Intervention, Psychological Assessment), tele-counselling and outreach OPD started during the year. Outreach programmes & mental health awareness activities at grass root level are being taken up.

Major Objectives of the Institute:

- To promote mental health rehabilitation using an integrated multidisciplinary approach.
- To promote and undertake capacity building and to involve in developing trained professionals in the area of mental health rehabilitation.
- To engage in research and development and policy framing towards promoting mental health rehabilitation services.

The Institute serves people with mental health challenges and is involved in training of manpower. In future it would be involved in advanced research and policy making and will also work for planning & programme development for effective mental health rehabilitation. It will play a major role in developing public education programmes on mental health in association with clients with mental illness, their caregivers, mental health professionals, non-governmental agencies and media. Most importantly, the Institute will engage in spreading awareness about mental health in vernacular and popular languages through various forms of media (traditional print, electronic and social). It will also work with community leaders, NGOs, public/ private sector organizations, healthcare professionals, prospective employers, legal experts, police, industry representatives, teachers, students and other relevant stake holders to reduce stigma related to mental health and facilitate successful community re-integration of clients with mental health related issues.

- Start of New Academic Programs: To initiate new Diploma, Undergraduate, Postgraduate and M.Phil programs in the field of Clinical Psychology, Psychiatric Social Work, Rehabilitation Psychology, and Vocational Rehabilitation. This will cater to the increasing demand for trained professionals in the field of mental health rehabilitation.
- Workshops and Training Programs: Organize National and International workshops, training programs, and seminars on contemporary issues in mental health rehabilitation.
- Continuing Education Programs: Develop and offer Continuing Rehabilitation Education (CRE) programs
 for professionals working in the field of disability and mental health to ensure continuous skill upgradation.
- Student Exchange Programs: Establish student and faculty exchange programs with national institutions, to
 promote a global perspective on mental health rehabilitation practices.
- e-Learning and Distance Education: Develop e-learning platforms for remote learning offering certification courses
 and online modules on mental health rehabilitation, disability management, and social reintegration.

Services:

- Enhanced Clinical Psychology Services: Focus on delivering evidence-based quality services through the Clinical Psychology and Psychiatric Social Work Department, introducing advanced interventions like cognitive-behavioural therapy, neurofeedback, and psychotherapeutic interventions.
- New Units for Holistic Care: Establish new departments such as Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatry, Occupational Therapy, and Vocational Rehabilitation to provide multidisciplinary care to individuals with mental health conditions.
- Telehealth and Outreach Programs: Expand the reach of services through telehealth platforms and community outreach programs aimed at underserved rural and remote areas. Incorporate mobile mental health units for providing onsite psychological and rehabilitative care.
- Information, Education, and Communication (IEC): Develop information, education, and communication (IEC) materials on mental health rehabilitation for use by professionals, caregivers, and the general public, focusing on creating awareness and reducing stigma associated with mental illness.
- Free Medicine: To provide psychiatric medicines free of cost for all beneficiaries.

Library facilities:

Library facilities are also being provided to the students studying in NIMHR. The library has books and journals of disciplines like psychology, general medicine, psychiatry, vocational education, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, sociology, Special Education, Social Work, Community Rehabilitation, Medical Basic Books, Nursing, Disabilities, Autism, Mental Retardation, Speech Teaching, Speech Hearing, Sign Language and many books related to other subjects and courses are available. Along with these subscriptions of local and leading newspapers and magazines of both Hindi and English language is available for the students in the library. Books are also issued to students for reading at home.





















Organizational Structure




Human Resource Development

Given the fact that almost 1% of the population, i.e., about one crore persons in the country undergo mental health treatment, and there is hardly any follow up of these cases after treatment is provided, our country is facing an acute shortage of trained professionals in the field of mental health services and rehabilitation. Existing ratio of rehabilitation professionals to the population is 1:50,000. Families/caregivers who are the main sources of support are not properly trained and equipped psychologically and professionally to handle these persons with mental illness.

So, to cater to the need for the increased demand of human resources in the field of mental health rehabilitation as well as to develop skilled and trained staff in the field of mental health rehabilitation, NIMHR. Sehore started with the Certificate Course on Care Giving in the academic year 2019-2020, and initiated the process of starting other 2 diploma level courses for the coming academic year i.e., 2020-2021. Since the year 2024-25 two more diploma level courses have also started. The details are as follows: -

Courses running at NIMHR:

- 1. Certificate course in Care Giving (CCCG): Caregivers are playing a key role in the care of persons with mental health issues. NIMHR started an RCI recognized Certificate Course for Care giving (CCCG) -Mental Health, on pilot basis in October 2019. Persons who have passed 10th class from recognized board, and have completed the age of 21 years and are fully healthy, are eligible for this course. After training, they will be able to provide care services at home, community and institutions to the persons with disabilities and having mental illness. There are 30 seats in this 1 year full-time course, in which reservations are applicable as per Rules, the objectives of the proposed course will be:-
- To prepare the cadre of trained care givers to provide basic care for persons with disabilities, chronic illness, geniatric population etc. at home, community, and institutions.
- To address various challenges that care givers should be familiar when they work with PWDs, mental health, chronic illness and geriatric population
- To develop the skills to communicate effectively.
- 4. To develop appropriate etiquette when working with the PWDs and the persons need care.
- To develop the time management and organizational skills necessary to provide efficient care for cli-
- To make them aware about the inclusive technology used for the persons who need appropriate ser-Vices.






2. Diploma in Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR-ID):

It is a one-year diploma programme recognized by Rehabilitation Council of India, New Delhi.

Overall aim of the course is to prepare a cadre of trained personnel to provide services in the area of vocational rehabilitation, including adult independent skills, in persons with intellectual disabilities, functioning at various levels to lead them towards independent life as far as possible. More specifically, the objectives of the proposed course will be:

- To acquire required knowledge on various aspects such as medical, psychological, educational, technology, community work, and management related to vocational rehabilitation, and adult independent living of persons with intellectual disabilities.
- To demonstrate skills to assess, plan, implement and evaluate vocational training programme for persons with intellectual disabilities individually and in groups, at various work settings.
- 3. To develop competencies to contact employers, identify suitable jobs, prepare job analysis and learn possible trades in a professional manner so as to enable to train the persons with intellectual disabilities in suitable jobs for placement.
- 4 To acquire the basic skills to prepare jigs and fixtures and transform the technical knowhow to develop suitable adaptive devices and TLMs for vocational rehabilitation and adult independent living
- 5. To demonstrate skills necessary for providing training to persons with intellectual disabilities in adult living skills irrespective of their intellectual levels, in various environments such as home, community and work place. Minimum educational qualifications for admission to the course will be successful completion of the ten plus two or equivalent examination in general education. There will be 30 seats in this Iyear full-time course, in which reservations are applicable as per rules.








3. Diploma in Community Based Rehabilitation (DCBR):

It is a two-year diploma programme recognized by the Rehabilitation Council of India, New Delhi. This proposed programme aims to develop skilled personnel to work at the community level. Young men and women can start rehabilitation services at the community level especially in the rural, tribal areas and urban impoverished areas. This will not only provide rehabilitation services to the unreached, but will also create new career opportunities. More specifically, the objectives of the proposed course will be

- To understand and assist in the planning and implementation of community-based rehabilitation programmes.
- 2. To develop linkages with appropriate agencies and groups of individuals and to promote action for the prevention of disabilities.
- To be able to identify persons with disabilities and their rehabilitation needs.
 To make functional assessment of individuals with disabilities.
- To provide support for inclusion of persons with disabilities in all development programs/ poverty alle-
- To advise family members and community regarding interventions with disabled people. Minimum educational qualifications for admission to the course will be successful completion of ten plus two or equivalent examination in general education. There will be 30 seats in this lyear full-time course, in which reservations are applicable as per rules.



- ⇒ *Final Examination of Batch 2023-25 are scheduled in June 2025.
- ⇒ *Final Examination of Batch 2024-26 will tentatively be conducted in June 2026.






4. Diploma in Indian Sign Language Interpretation (DISLI):

It is a two years diploma programme accredited by Rehabilitation Council of India New Delhi. The course has distributed over four semesters, to be completed in maximum 3 years from the date of admission to the programme. The main objective of the programme is to train Indian Sign Language Interpreters to provide communication access to Deaf and Hard of Hearing people in various settings in real life. An Indian Sign Language Interpreter is responsible for helping deaf individuals understand what is being said in a variety of situations. An Indian Sign Language Interpreter must understand the subject matter of discourse so he or she can accurately translate what is being spoken into Indian Sign Language. An Indian sign language interpreter may be present to translate during an office meeting, in a courtroom, or at a political speech. Interpreters may also be used in one-on-one situations to help two parties communicate with each other. Indian Sign Language interpreters might use technology to provide services from a remote location.

More specifically, the objectives of the proposed course will be:

- The main objective of the programme is to train Indian Sign Language interpreters to provide communication access to Deaf and Hard of Hearing people in various settings in real life.
- Explore Deaf culture and society and study the structure and use of Indian Sign Language (ISL).
- Increasing understanding of the principle, ethics relating to ISL interpretation in the field.










5. Post Graduate Diploma in Rehabilitation Psychology (PGDRP):

This is a one-year full-time diploma programme approved by the Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI), New Delhi and affiliated by Barkatullah University, Bhopal. The primary objective of the course is to develop a cadre of trained professionals equipped to deliver psychological and rehabilitative services for persons with disabilities, enhancing their functional independence, emotional well-being, and community participation. The programme emphasizes practical competencies in real-world rehabilitation settings, including schools, clinics, institutions, and community-based environments. The intake capacity of 20 seats is available for this one-year full-time course. Reservations will be applicable as per Government of India norms. The candidate can take the admission who has Bachelor's degree in Psychology (Hons) through regular mode, or Master's degree in any branch of Psychology through regular or distance mode, all qualifications must be obtained from a UGC-recognised university

More specifically, the objectives of the course are:

- To build foundational knowledge in key domains such as psychological assessment, behavior management, therapeutic interventions, disability legislation, inclusive practices, and family and community-based rehabilitation.
- To develop applied skills in assessing, designing, implementing, and evaluating psychological interventions tailored to the unique needs of individuals with various disabilities across different settings.
- To cultivate professional competencies in liaising with families, collaborating with interdisciplinary teams, advocating for rights and inclusion, and designing psychoeducational tools and awareness programs.
- To gain proficiency in administering psychological tests, maintaining case documentation, writing comprehensive reports, and applying ethical standards in rehabilitation psychology practice.
- To deliver targeted psychological support focusing on life skills training, social-emotional development, adaptive functioning, and mental health promotion for persons with disabilities across the lifespan.





Free coaching:

National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation (NIMHR), Sehore, in the month of August 2024 has started a Free Coaching under the scheme of DEPwD for Divyangjan with benchmark disabilities (having a minimum of 40% disability) to enable them to appear in competitive examinations for government jobs. This free coaching is for Staff Selection Commission (SSC)/State Selection commission exams for entry to various state government jobs/Railway Recruitment Board Exams. The Free coaching batch intake capacity is of 20 students. In the very first batch, NIMHR has successfully enrolled 15 students for the scheme.







Department of Psychiatry



Psychiatric Services Unit

Department of Psychiatry is concerned with medical management of persons with mental illnesses. As a part of this, initial workup of persons suffering from ailments like Schizophrenia, Bipolar Disorder, Depression, Anxiety, Somatoform Disorder, OCD etc. is done. Treatment with medicines is provided along with advice for different brochemical and radiological investigations. Apart from this, patients with Dementia, Epilepsy, Migraine are also treated. A comprehensive management plan is prepared where patients are referred for psychological evaluation/management, psychiatric social work intervention, speech therapist etc. as per the needs.

Classes for various courses running in the institute are regularly taken. In addition, training is provided to mental health and other relevant professionals. Research for areas of mental health are also under process. This will help in increasing the knowledge in the field of mental health and advocacy.

- Addressing the psychosocial aspects of rehabilitation: Psychiatrists recognize that rehabilitation involves more than just medical treatment; it also includes psychosocial aspects like emotional support, relationship-building, and coping strategies.





Department of Clinical Psychology

The Department of Clinical Psychology at NIMHR plays a pivotal role in advancing mental health rehabilitation through a combination of academic training, clinical services, and community outreach. During the year, the department actively contributed to the Post Graduate Diploma in Rehabilitation Psychology (PGDRP) program by providing rigorous academic instruction and supervised clinical training aligned with RCI guidelines. The clinical team offered psychological assessments, individual and group therapy, psychoeducation, and mental health counselling through the institute's OPD services. Additionally, the department supported awareness programs, capacity-building workshops, and collaborative initiatives aimed at enhancing psychological well-being among diverse populations. Efforts are also underway to strengthen the department's infrastructure and faculty base for future academic expansion.

Department of Psychiatric Social Work

Psychiatric Social Work (PSW) services at the National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation (MIMHR), Schore, form an essential component of its multidisciplinary approach to mental health care and psychosocial rehabilitation. These services are deeply rooted in person-cantered and rights-based principles, addressing the complex needs of individuals with mental illness and psychosocial disabilities. The Psychiatric Social Worker is actively involved in patient care, psychosocial assessment, counselling, rehabilitation planning, family interventions, and community reintegration, all of which require a high level of professional commitment and coordination.

In addition to clinical responsibilities, the PSW unit plays a vital academic and administrative role within the Institute. With the launch of the MA in Social Work (Disability and Action) program from the current academic year, there has been a significant expansion in the teaching and mentoring responsibilities. Alongside this, the department is expected to organize faculty development programs, conduct training for counsellors and special educators, and coordinate a range of outreach initiatives including awareness day programs and mental health camps. These tasks involve considerable planning, follow-up, documentation, and collaboration with various stakeholders both within and outside the institution





Department of Speech and Hearing

The Department of Speech and Hearing (SH) extends its services toward fulfil the objectives of NIMHR. The department provides services to individuals of all age groups having issues related to Communication, Speech, Hearing, Balance, Feeding and Literacy. The department conducts Trans-disciplinary group therapy sessions which is the first of its kind at an international level and a pioneer model for our country.

Speech and Language Assessment Unit

Departmental activities

The department of SH has two major units: Speech Language Pathology and Audiology. In the Speech-language pathology unit, the clinical services delivered are the assessment and management of speech and language disorders for all age groups. Speech disorders broadly includes articulation disorder, fluency disorder, voice disorder, dysarthria and apraxia. Language disorder includes developmental and acquired language autism (aphasia) disorders. Individuals identified to have speech and language disorders are assigned for follow-up speech and language therapy services. In the Audiology unit, assessment of hearing and balance issues for clients of all age range using state of the art equipment and tests such as the Pure tone Audiometry are carried out. Based on the type and the degree of hearing loss suitable management options and auditory training follow-up sessions recommended & provided.

Speech and Language Pathology

The speech-language pathology unit has assessment and intervention services for all speech, language, swallowing and early literacy-related problems in children like learning disability and adults. Clients with feeding difficulty, especially children with cerebral palsy and autism spectrum disorders are assessed for their posture, oro motor and sensory abilities and intervened for the same.





Centre for Education, Vocational Training and Fine Arts

The Department of Centre for Education, Vocational Training and Fine Arts is functioning since 2019. It has a determined vision on developing an appropriate Special Educational service delivery model that ranges from providing clinical services to meeting the specific requirements of Children with Special Needs. Special education is an integral part of education which designed for students with special needs. It aims to provide education according to their specific needs to those students who are not able to learn successfully in the general education system. Special education is different from general education system because it is tailored to the individual needs of students. In this, students are provided help and guidance according to their specific learning difficulties, physical or mental disabilities, or other special needs. For example, if a child has difficulty in reading, special education can help him to use special strategies and techniques for reading. If a child has a hearing problem, special education can help him to use hearing aids and other assistive devices to hear the voice from surrounding area.

The benefits of special education often include positively impacting children's lives, meeting their specific needs, and providing them with equal opportunities. Special education helps students reach their full potential, allowing them to gain confidence and actively contribute to society. The main objective of special education is to provide education and support to children with disabilities according to their individual needs, so that they can reach their full potential and participate actively in society.

Cross Disability Early Intervention Centre (CDEIC)



Introduction:

Early intervention provides specialized support and services for infants and young children atnisk or developmental delays to help their families
participate in the community. Cross Disability Early Intervention Centre (CDEIC) in NIMHR Schore
provide services to children from birth to 6 years
of age with a variety of special facilities. It is not
only limited to children with developmental delays
and disability, it provides a comprehensive group
and individual Early Intervention services, Parent
participation group, Individual sessions and Preschool programs; depending upon the child's individual needs.

Cross Disability Early Intervention Centre was started in the National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation from 17 January 2025 in which 2 Special Educators, Clinical Psychologists, Occupational therapists, Physiotherapists, Speech therapists, Nurses and 3 trained caregivers were appointed. So that through all these professionals, the developmental delay of children from 0 to 6 years can be identified and proper treatment can be done through therapy at the right time.

 Early identification of infants at risk and developmental delays.



Services Offered by The CDEIC



I. REGISTRATION AND FACILITA-TION UNIT:

Orients the clients about the services offered and to enrol the new clients for the services and enter the follow-up session details. UDID, Government benefits and orientation to the visitors. Organizes programs related to early intervention ophthalmology, ENT, psychiatric, Neurology, PMR, Paediatric dentist, Nutritionist etc.

II. Physical Examination Services:

Physical Examination means examining the body of the child to find out the health condition. During physical examination, various types of tests are done by the nurse on the child such as weight of the child, body temperature, oxygen level, respiratory rate, checking height according to age, nutrition and development and measuring head circumference, psychiatry, neurology, nutritionist etc.

Behaviour Modification & Consultation Unit

III. BEHAVIOUR MODIFICATION & COUNSELLING SERVICES UNIT:

Facilitates the psychological intervention support to parents and family members of children at risk or developmental delays. This unit provides Assessments, individualized and group-based behaviour modification therapy. Combining these approaches, a counselling unit can use behaviour modification techniques to facilitate positive change while providing a supportive environment for individuals to address their concerns.

IV. OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY SERVICES UNIT:

Offers assessment and intervention for developing, recovering or maintaining the meaningful activities among children by use of self-care, play activities and assistive technology to promote and maintain health, prevent disability, increase independent function, and enhance development. Therapy is provided both in individualized session and small group session. It also offers occupational therapy which focuses on each fine motor and gross motor skills and provide sensory diet.

V. PHYSIOTHERAPY UNIT:

Restores, maintains and maximizes the strength, function, movement, and over all well-being of the children. The individual or small group session focuses on optimal physical development by means of Neuro-developmental therapy, mobilization exercise, stretching exercise, therapeutic exercise, postural training and gait training. It helps people recover from injuries, illnesses, or disabilities by improving movement and function.







VI. SPEECH & LANGUAGE THERAPY UNIT:

Addresses speech, language and communication issues faced by the child due to his/her disability or developmental delay. Audiological evaluation-based hearing aids will be provided if necessary, along with training for the use of hearing aid. Alongside in individual or small-group settings, as per requirement the strategies/ techniques for drooling-control; feeding issues and oro motor training; Auditory Verbal Therapy; Augmentative Alternative Communication are used.

VII. MULTI-SENSORY INTEGRATION SERVICES UNIT:

Multisensory Integration refers to how information from the different sensory modalities (such as sight, sound, touch, smell, self-motion and taste) may be integrated by the nervous system. It also deals with how different sensory modalities interact with one another and after each other's processing. Provides multisensory therapeutic environment to enhance and stimulate sensory development and cognitive function.

VIII. TRANS-DISCIPLINARY THERAPY SERVICES UNIT (GROUP);

Trans-disciplinary group activities are best way to deal with children having developmental delays, as peer interaction plays a major role in learning skill. The specific areas like turn taking, Joint Attention, Imitation, Group communication, self-control is concentrated in this along with the major units like motor, communication, socialization, cognitive, socioemotional skill. Parents are also involved in this intervention to emphasize the need for group intervention.

RECREATIONAL ACTIVITY:

Recreational activities for special needs students can include sensory play, music therapy, art and crafts, adaptive sports, and outdoor adventures. These activities can promote sensory integration, enhance communication and social skills, and provide opportunities for physical and emotional well-being.





IX. SERVICES OF PREPARATORY SCHOOL:

1. PREPARATORY CLASS 1 - (3 to 5 years)

This class will cater the children with special needs (cross-disability) in the age range of 3-5 years. The education will be focused to lay an early year's foundation, through maintenance of good health and wellbeing, encouraging effective communication, physical, personal and socio-emotional development. Readiness for learning literacy (pre-Literacy) and expressive arts and design.



2. PREPARATORY CLASS 2 - (5 to 6 years)

A group of children with special needs (10 nos) age range of 5-6 years will attend this class, the education is focused on the development of memory, vocabulary, understanding, readiness for learning literacy (Pre-Literacy), readiness for learning Mathematics (Pre-Mathematics) and environmental science.



Introduction:

Artificial Limbs Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO) is a Schedule 'C' Miniratna Category II Central Public Sector Enterprises, registered under Section 8 (Not for Profit motive) of the Companies Act 2013, (corresponding to Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956) is functioning under the Administrative Control of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities. It is 100% owned Govt. of India Central Public Sector Enterprises with an objective of benefiting the persons with disability to the maximum extent possible by manufacturing Rehabilitation Aids for persons with disabilities and by promoting, encouraging and developing the availability, use, supply and distribution of Artificial Limbs and other Rehabilitation Aids to the disabled persons of the country. Profitability is not the motive of the operations of the Corporation and its main thrust is in providing better quality of Aids & Appliances to larger number of disabled persons at reasonable price.

In endeavour to enhance outreach of benefits of ADIP scheme by providing aids and assistive devices to Persons with Disabilities across the country, ALIMCO has started the opening of Pradhanmantri Divyasha Kendra (PMDK) at National Institutes (NIs) and Satellite/ Regional Centers working under DEPwD. Govt. of India on PAN India basis.

ALIMCO is the only manufacturing company producing various types of assistive devices under one roof to serve all types of disabilities across the country.



PMDK

Pradh an Mantri Divyasha Kendra (PMDK) was established in November 2024-25 in the campus of National Institute of Mental Health Rehabilitation (NIMHR) Schore (MP) and since then this center is being continuously operated by Artificial Limb Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO). The objective of this center is to provide assistive devices for Divyangjan's and senior citizens.




















COMPOSITE REGIONAL CENTRE

Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Bhopal



1. Introduction

Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for Skill Development, Rehabilitation & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Bhopal is a service model initiated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt of India, established on 14th August, 2000, the Centre is functioning under the administrative control of NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF MENTAL HEALTH REHABILITATION-SEHORE, since AUGUST 2024. The Centre's building is National Award winner for Barrier Free Environment and is built on land measuring 3.63 acres and its plinth area is 1675 sq.mt.

2. Objectives

CRC aims to empower persons with disabilities (Divyangjan) to live independently and contribute to the community like everyone else. The primary objective of setting up CRC is to create the infrastructure required for training and manpower development, research, and providing services to persons with disabilities, particularly in those parts of the country where such infrastructure is lacking. CRC has following objectives:







- To serve as a resource centre for rehabilitation and special education of persons with disabilities.
- To establish linkages with existing medical, educational, and employment services, following the principles of community-based rehabilitation and offer extension services in rural areas.
- To stimulate the growth of services by encouraging and supporting voluntary organizations, parent groups, and self-help groups.
- To undertake human resource development by training rehabilitation professionals, village level workers, multi-rehabilitation workers, and other functionaries in the government and non-government sector required for providing services to persons with disabilities.
- To develop strategies for delivering rehabilitation services suitable to the socio-cultural background of the region.
- To undertake research and development with specific reference to the needs of diverse groups of people with disabilities, keeping in view the nature and severity of disability in the region.
- To undertake public education programs for the creation of awareness in the parents and the community.
- To undertake designing, fabrication, and fitment of aids and appliances to help individuals overcome their disability.
- To conduct the service of education and skill development leading to the enhancement of opportunities for employment, rehabilitation, mobility, communication, recreation, and integration in society.

3. Activities

CRC, Bhopal was established with the purpose to create infrastructure required for training and services for all categories of persons with disabilities of all ages. The Centre has professionals from medical, paramedical and rehabilitation disciplines to undertake and execute the following seven activities to serve all types of PwD as defined in the RPWD Act, 2016.


