NATIONAL LOK ADALAT

During the quarter (April to June, 2025) National Lok Adalat was organized on 10th May, 2025 across the State of Uttarakhand as per NALSA's Annual Calendar. National Lok Adalat plays a crucial role in bridging the gap between litigants and Justice. It ensures speedy and cost-effective dispute resolution, promotes social harmony and community cohesion, and enhances public trust in the judicial system.

Pre-litigation Cases and Matters: By including pre-litigation cases in the National Lok Adalat framework, potential disputes were resolved at an early stage, preventing them from escalating into formal Court proceedings. This approach promotes quicker and more accessible Justice, reducing the burden on the judicial system. In National Lok Adalat, dated 10-05-2025, total 5566 Pre-Litigation cases were taken-up and out of them **5565** cases were settled amicably and ₹ 20,37,76,443/- was the settlement amount.

In the said National Lok Adalat total 27926 **Pending cases** were referred and out of them total **27922** cases were settled amicably and a sum of ₹ 41,20,16,524/- was the settlement amount.

National Lok Adalat was also organized in the Quasi-Judicial Courts such as Consumer Courts on 10-05-2025. Total 26 cases were referred in such Quasi-Judicial Courts and out of them **26** were settled and ₹ 92,42,324/- was the settlement amount.

MULTI - PURPOSE LEGAL SERVICES AND AWARENESS CAMPS

During this period 02 Multi-Purpose Legal Services and Awareness Camps were organized by the DLSA, Pithoragarh and DLSA, Nainital on 11.05.2025 and 18.05.2025 respectively.

Both Multi-Purpose Legal Services and Awareness Camps were organized in the dignified presence of Hon'ble Mr. Justice Manoj Kumar Tiwari, Executive Chairman, UKSLSA, Nainital and Hon'ble Mr. Justice Alok Mahara, Judge High Court of Uttarakhand.

These camps were attended by the Judicial Officers of the District, Members and Advocates from Bar Association Pithoragarh, DM and SP Pithoragarh and District Administration Officials, Members from Vyapar Mandal, teachers and students from various schools of the district, PLV/Adhikar Mitras and the respected public from all the areas were also present in the programme.

The Hon'ble Executive Chairman of UKSLSA addressed the public, emphasizing that organizing this camp will yield beneficial and far-reaching results for the community. He stated that such camps play a vital role in effectively promoting legal services among the general public and in making essential facilities accessible to them. The functioning and outreach of legal services institutions span across various parts of the district, and through these multipurpose camps, legal awareness is being disseminated to every household, ensuring that no individual is left without access to the benefits of legal services.

Hon'ble Mr. Justice Shri Alok Mahara said that holding such camps will greatly benefit the community. He added that these camps are a good way to spread legal services and make important facilities easily available to people.

At the camp, the Hon'ble Executive Chairman of UKSLSA distributed various items to beneficiaries as part of the welfare initiatives. Cheques under different welfare schemes were provided to six individuals, including representatives from Asian Academy Schools. Additionally, five persons received blankets, seven individuals with disabilities were given wheelchairs, and five others were provided with crutches. 05 **women provided** Mahalaxmi Kit, 10 **people provided** Farmer Tool Kit, 13 children were benefited by providing HP Computer System and School Bags.

In the camp people were benefited by providing ration kits, Mahalaxmi kits, assistive devices, sewing machines and pension certificates to beneficiaries, facilitating on-spot services like Aadhaar, ration card, UCC and certificate and arranging free medical and eye check-up.

During the visit of the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, UKSLSA, Nainital, various departments set up stalls to provide information on government schemes and services related to social welfare, women and child protection, agriculture, tourism, employment, and food security, including initiatives like Matri Vandana, Nanda Gaura, Maha Lakshmi Kit, organic farming, self-employment and farmer support schemes, as well as processes for Aadhaar, ration card, and certificates. The District Legal Services Authority, Pithoragarh, also participated by setting up a stall and distributing Saral Kanooni Gyan Mala booklets to spread legal awareness among the public.





CAMPAIGN ON सड़क सुरक्षा : जीवन रक्षा

ON THE SCHEME "**RAH-VEER**" A NATION-WIDE GOOD SAMARITAN INITIATIVE LAUNCHED BY THE MINISTRY OF ROAD TRANSPORT & HIGHWAYS

Road accidents have become a pressing global concern, claiming thousands of lives every day and causing irreversible harm to families and communities. In India alone, various road accidents were reported, leading many fatalities every day. These tragic events are not just numbers, they reflect lives lost, futures destroyed, and a significant burden on society.

Road accidents continue to pose a grave concern in the State of Uttarakhand, **particularly in areas with challenging geographical conditions. The problem is especially acute in regions, where roads wind through hilly terrains, as well as along National and State highways that traverse densely populated and high-speed corridors.** In both scenarios, official emergency services often face delays in reaching the accident site. Consequently, it is frequently the local residents or bystanders who arrive first and are in a position to render immediate assistance to the injured.

However, despite their proximity and willingness, **many hesitate to help** due to the fear of becoming entangled in legal or police procedures. It is imperative to recognize that assisting road accident victims is not only a humanitarian duty but also a legally protected act under Indian law. Prompt aid during the critical "**Golden Hour**", the first hour following a traumatic injury, can often mean the difference between life and death. However, the Good Samaritan Law protects helpers from such complications. It ensures that anyone who assists an accident victim is not harassed by police or hospital staff and cannot be forced to disclose their identity or appear as a witness.

In remote hilly regions, narrow roads and limited infrastructure result in longer response times for ambulances and rescue services. On highways, high-speed collisions often result in severe injuries, and the rapid flow of traffic makes timely **intervention by bystanders** even more crucial. In both contexts, local villagers, roadside dwellers, and fellow commuters can play a vital, life-saving role.

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, in its judgment dated 30th March 2016 in **SaveLIFE Foundation & Anr. vs. Union of India & Anr.**, categorically emphasized that accident victims require the fastest possible care and that such care is often best provided by those already present at or near the scene. The

Court underscored the importance of the "Golden Hour" and stressed that empowering bystanders is key to increasing victims' survival chances.

Keeping in view of the aforesaid, the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, Uttarakhand SLISA, Nainital has been pleased to direct the Legal Services Institutions in the State to launch a campaign **सड़क सुरक्षा : जीवन रक्षा** across the State of Uttarakhand and aware the people at large that don't be afraid - helping an accident victim is safe, **legal, and** can save a life.

Accordingly the legal services institutions aware the common mass about road safety rules, promotes responsible behavior on **roads, and reduce road accidents** and fatalities. The Rah-Veer Scheme (also spelled Raah-Veer) is a new and powerful initiative launched in April 2025 by India's Ministry of Road Transport and Highways. The scheme rewards ordinary citizens, who save the lives of roadside accident victims by personally taking them to a hospital within the critical "Golden Hour"—the first hour after the crash, when medical help is most effective. Also informed that your safety is in your hands – follow traffic rules; Speed thrills but kills; A helmet can save your head. A seatbelt can save your life; Don't drink and drive – Arrive alive; Be alert – accidents hurt. **About Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 (amended in 2019) which lays down comprehensive provisions to regulate road transport and ensure road safety.**

During the campaign **सड़क सुरक्षा : जीवन रक्षा** people at large were sensitized in length about the **Rah-Veer Scheme** initiatives launched by the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways to encourage citizens to assist road accident victims promptly.

The **common masses** were sensitized the aforesaid Scheme by mentioning different key point of the **Rah-Veer Scheme** initiatives such as:

What is Rah-Veer?: A reward-and-recognition scheme that provides cash incentives and certificates to individuals, who help accident victims by bringing them to a hospital within the critical Golden Hour.

Legal & Procedural Protection: Under Section 134A of the Motor Vehicle Amendment Act 2019, Good Samaritans get legal immunity—they won't face interrogation or legal hassles for helping.

District-level committees (headed by DM) verify and disburse awards.

Why It Matters: Most accident fatalities occur within the first hour—prompt help can be lifesaving. Offers financial incentive and legal protection **to motivate bystanders**. Reinforces a societal culture of care and collective responsibility.

It is also informed to the participants that how they can participate: Stop and help accident victims—don't worry about legal issues. Ensure ambulance or hospital transfer happens within the Golden Hour. Coordinates through hospitals and district authorities to receive the reward.

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During the said campaign, a total of **788 Awareness Camps and Programmes** were conducted under the **Comprehensive Campaign on सड़क सुरक्षा : जीवन रक्षा (Road Safety –Save Life)**, aimed at sensitizing the public on traffic rules and life-saving measures. Additionally, **26 Nukkad Nataks (street plays)** were organized to effectively engage and educate the common masses about the importance of road safety. The campaign witnessed active participation from **32,827 people** across the State. As part of the outreach, **2,349 banners** were displayed and **25,640 pamphlets and brochures** were distributed to create awareness among citizens, particularly about the **Rah-Veer Scheme**—a progressive initiative that **rewards ordinary citizens who save the lives of accident victims** by taking them to a hospital during the crucial “**Golden Hour**”, thereby significantly improving survival chances.

STATE-WIDE CAMPAIGN TITLED "NAYI ROSHNI" (नई रोशनी)

With reference to Meeting of Sub-Committee (Juvenile Justice Committee, Hon'ble High Court) held on 09.05.2025 and in compliance of the directions issued by the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, Uttarakhand SLSA, Nainital, all District Legal Services Authorities/TLSCs were carried out a **Statewide Identification Drive for Children with Disabilities (CwDs)** titled as "**Nayi Roshni**" during May, 2025 with the help of PLVs and in coordination with Departments of Social Welfare, Education and Health alongwith NGOs, working for the Disabled Children.

In compliance of the directions as a landmark initiative aimed at promoting inclusivity, empowerment, and social justice, the UKSLSA, Nainital in cooperation with DLSAs launched a Statewide Identification and Awareness Campaign titled "Nayi Roshni" for Children with Disabilities (CwDs) **during May, 2025 and June, 2025 and at least One Day in every month.** The campaign reflects the Authority's commitment to ensuring that children with disabilities are identified, supported, and integrated into the mainstream with dignity and equal opportunity.

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As part of the Statewide Campaign for the Identification and Support of Children with Disabilities (CwDs), a total of **273** camps and outreach programmes were organised across the districts of Uttarakhand under the aegis of the District Legal Services Authorities (DLSAs) and Taluk Legal Services Committees (TLSCs), in collaboration with concerned government departments and civil society stakeholders. These camps aimed to create awareness about the rights and entitlements of Cwds and to facilitate early identification, certification, and access to welfare schemes.

More than **12,121** individuals—including children, parents, school authorities, health workers, ASHAs, Anganwadi workers, and other community members actively participated in the campaign. Through screening and counselling conducted at these camps, **1,084** children were identified for further intervention, including disability assessment and certification, linkage with appropriate government schemes (such as scholarships, aids and appliances, inclusive education benefits, and health support), and referral to specialized services where necessary.

The campaign played a pivotal role in bridging the gap between the community and service delivery mechanisms, and contributed significantly towards building a more inclusive and responsive ecosystem for children with disabilities in the State.

During these programmes, children/persons with disabilities, along with their family members and caregivers, were extensively informed about their legal rights, entitlements, and the various government welfare schemes specifically framed for their benefit. These included provisions related to health care, education, financial

assistance, disability certification, and support services.

It is further informed that under Communication & IEC Outreach a total of **10,675** pamphlets and brochures were distributed among the general public during the campaign. These materials included simple explanations of disability categories, early-intervention checklists, contact numbers for welfare departments, and UDID enrollment steps.

26 large-format banners were professionally printed and installed at **prominent public locations** across the state. Strategic placement included district headquarters, Panchayat offices, Primary Health Centres, school gates, and major transit junctions—ensuring high visibility and message reinforcement. Using banners and hoardings is a recommended outdoor media strategy under Uttarakhand NHM's IEC framework. These placards helped sustain message recall, raise awareness about disability rights, and prompt follow-up actions after camps.

ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMMES FOR PRISONERS:

Legal Services Authorities regularly organized legal awareness programmes, jail visits, jail lok adalats, medical camps, workshops to reform prison system to strengthen prisoner's rights through a comprehensive and modern approach. The Legal Services Authorities organizes **Jail review days monthly to monitor** inmates legal status and welfare, supported by legal aid clinics that keep prisoners informed about their cases and assist with legal documentation. On-the-spot case settlements are facilitated by Jail Lok Adalats, while the UTRC reviews bail applications promptly. Health and hygiene are addressed through regular medical camps and vocational training programs to enable prisoners with skills for reintegration. This includes the implementation of the e-prison system for digital record-keeping, enhancing transparency and timely access to legal information for inmates. These measures provide a robust legal framework focusing on custody, correction, rehabilitation, and after-care services, reflecting the state's commitment to humane and rights-based prison management. After rejection of bail application, prisoners can appeal to the Hon'ble Supreme Court by filing a Special Leave Petition (SLP) or criminal appeal. Legal Services Authorities assist inmates in understanding this process, preparing petitions, and ensuring timely filing. This appellate route offers a higher judicial review of bail denial, protecting prisoners' rights under Indian law.

A total of 204 legal aid programs were conducted, benefiting 13,517 prisoners, including 4,140 under-trial prisoners who received legal assistance. Among those seeking bail, 60 accused were released with the support of legal aid, while 28 convicted prisoners were provided help in filing appeals. These programs, organized by Legal Services Authorities, have significantly improved prisoner's access to justice, promoting timely legal support and rehabilitation within the prison system.

CAPACITY BUILDING / TRAINING PROGRAMMES

- On 04 April 2025, the DLSA, Chamoli organized a Training Programme on 'NALSA Portal (LSMS and LAIS) and NALSA Scheme' at the auditorium of the District Court Campus, Gopeshwar. The objective of the training was to provide participants with practical knowledge about the functionalities of the NALSA Portal, particularly focusing on Legal Services Management System (LSMS) and Legal Aid Information System (LAIS), as well as the provisions under the NALSA Scheme. The programme was attended by 41 Para Legal Volunteers (PLVs) and 12 Panel Lawyers. The resource persons explained the features and applications of the portal, emphasizing its role in streamlining legal aid services, ensuring wider outreach, and facilitating effective monitoring of cases and beneficiaries. The sessions were interactive and aimed at strengthening the role of PLVs and Panel Lawyers in extending accessible and affordable legal services to the needy and marginalized sections of society.



- A Basic and Refresher Training Programme for PLVs/ Adhikar Mitras of DLSA Nainital was successfully organized on 18.06.2025. The programme focused on strengthening their legal knowledge, enhancing community outreach skills, and equipping them to effectively assist in spreading legal awareness and facilitating access to justice at the grassroots level.



- DLSA, Pithoragarh organized a Training-cum-Sensitization Session on NALSA (Legal Services to the Disaster Victims through Legal Services Authorities) Scheme, 2010 at the Meeting Hall on 14.06.2025. The session focused on disaster prevention measures, organic awareness programmes, and extending legal services to vulnerable and helpless persons. A total of 142 participants attended the programme.



- The DLSA, Tehri Garhwal organized an Workshop-cum-Awareness Programme at the Bar Hall, District Bar Association, Tehri Garhwal, focusing on the Uttarakhand Compensation Scheme for Women Victims/Survivors of Sexual Harassment and E-Court Services. The programme was chaired by the Secretary, DLSA Tehri Garhwal, and also addressed by the Retainer Advocate.



- DLSA, Udham Singh Nagar organized a Disaster Management Training Programme for Para Legal Volunteers (PLVs) and Panel Lawyers under the "NALSA Scheme for Disaster Victims" on 27 June 2025 at Udham Singh Nagar. The training focused on the provisions of the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) and aimed at equipping participants with the legal and practical aspects of disaster preparedness and victim assistance. A total of 54 participants, including Panel Lawyers and PLVs from various DLSAs, actively attended and benefitted from the session.



- On 13 May 2025, the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA), Almora organized a training programme for Para Legal Volunteers (PLVs) under the guidance of the Secretary, DLSA Almora.

The training focused on the following key modules and subjects:

- e-True Copy Module
- e-Seva Kendra
- e-Filing of Cases
- Legal Services Management System (LSMS)
- Legal Aid Information System (LAIS)
- Provisions of the Prevention of Sexual Harassment (PoSH) Act



A total of 61 participants attended and benefited from the training. The objective was to enhance the digital knowledge and practical skills of PLVs, enabling them to assist litigants and citizens more effectively through online legal services and awareness on important legal provisions.

- An Orientation Session was organized by the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA), Nainital for the members of the SAATHI Unit with the objective of enhancing their understanding of legal rights, welfare schemes, and the framework of child protection laws. The session focused on equipping the members with knowledge about the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015, the role of various stakeholders in the rehabilitation and reintegration of children in need of care and protection, and the legal remedies available to vulnerable children. Resource persons from the legal fraternity and child welfare institutions addressed the participants, emphasizing the importance of early legal intervention, coordination with Child Welfare Committees (CWCs).



- On May 7, 2025, a three-day training program commenced in Dehradun for 24 newly appointed para-legal volunteers. The programme was inaugurated by Hon'ble District Judge Shri Prem Singh Khimal. The training aims to equip volunteers with foundational legal knowledge, ethics, and public service sensitivity. Key topics include the Indian Constitution, Cybercrime, POCSO Act, Domestic Violence Act, and Criminal Law.



- DLSA Chamoli conducted an "Orientation Training" on 23.05.2025 at the district court auditorium, Gopeshwar, focusing on the **SAATHI** Campaign. The training



aimed to familiarize participants with the campaign's provisions designed to secure the legal identity and rights of vulnerable children, enabling effective implementation and support at the district level. This initiative prepares the participants to contribute actively toward protecting and empowering destitute children through legal aid services.

CELEBRATION OF IMPORTANT DAYS

OBSERVATION OF "WORLD HEALTH DAY" ON 07th APRIL, 2025

World Health Day, celebrated every year on April 7, marks the founding of the World Health Organization (WHO) in 1948 and serves as a significant occasion to focus attention on pressing global health issues while mobilizing action for better public health outcomes. The 2025 theme, "Healthy Beginnings, Hopeful Futures," puts a spotlight on maternal and newborn health, launching a year-long campaign that urges governments and communities worldwide to end preventable maternal and newborn deaths and to prioritize the long-term health and well-being of women and infants. The campaign recognizes that improving maternal and newborn care is not only a medical imperative but also a societal and economic necessity, as healthier mothers and children form the foundation of thriving societies and sustainable development.

On 7th April 2025, PLVs of DLSAs organized Legal Literacy and Awareness Camps at various locations in the State on the occasion of **"World Health Day"**, sensitizing participants about health-related issues, the significance of World Health Day, vital government health schemes and the upcoming National Lok Adalat scheduled for 10th May 2025, while also distributing informational pamphlets and playing the NALSA theme song "Ek Mutthi Aasman" at the beginning and end of each session, thereby empowering the community with crucial knowledge about both health and legal rights.

During the observance of World Health Day on 07.04.2025, Legal Services Institutions, in collaboration with District Health Departments, successfully organized 79 extensive camps at strategic and community-centric locations such as Chief Medical Officer offices, hospitals, bustling marketplaces, villages, and prisons. This initiative, headed by the Secretary of DLSA along with the Retainer Lawyer, was aimed at raising widespread awareness about the crucial importance of maintaining good health and fitness. The camps offered not only health check-ups and consultation but also legal literacy on health-related government welfare schemes, thereby empowering the attendees with both health and legal knowledge. A remarkable total of 13,410 people actively participated and benefited from these camps, becoming more informed about personal health, fitness, and available public health resources aimed at improving quality of life.



CELEBRATION OF “EARTH DAY” ON 22nd APRIL, 2025

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OBSERVATION OF "WORLD NO TOBACCO DAY" ON 31st MAY, 2025

Each year, World No Tobacco Day is observed on 31st May to draw global attention to the health risks associated with tobacco use and to advocate for effective policies to reduce tobacco consumption. This day serves as a crucial reminder of the devastating impact tobacco has on individuals, communities, and public health systems worldwide. Tobacco use is one of the leading causes of preventable death globally. It kills millions of people annually, millions of these deaths resulting from exposure to second-hand smoke. In India alone, tobacco-related diseases claim around 1.35 million lives every year.

Tobacco, in all its forms- smoked, chewed, or sniffed is one of the most dangerous substances legally available in the world today. While it might seem harmless at first glance, tobacco is a slow and silent killer, responsible for millions of deaths each year. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), tobacco kills more than 8 million people annually,

Keeping in view of the aforesaid and as per directions of the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, Uttarakhand SLISA, Nainital vide approval dated 09th May, 2025 the **World No Tobacco Day** was observed by the Legal Services Institutions in the periphery of the State of Uttarakhand.

As per the aforesaid directions of the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, Uttarakhand SLISA, Nainital the Legal Services Institutions have organized legal awareness camps/programmes across the State of Uttarakhand. These camps were organized in Schools & Colleges, Primary Health Centers, District Hospital, Community Hall, District & Sub-Jails, Tehsil areas and in far-flung areas of the State in collaboration with Health Department, Local NGOs and Educational Institutions.

The awareness camp was organized with the goal of Educating the public, especially youth and students about the harmful effects of tobacco use. Spreading awareness about the legal framework regulating tobacco in India. Encouraging individuals to quit tobacco and adopt a healthier lifestyle.

Key Activities carried out during the campaign:

- The attendees were highlighted the importance of observing World No Tobacco Day and protecting the younger generation from addiction.
- Doctors from the Health Department and NTCP officials delivered presentations on the health risks of tobacco (oral cancer, lung disease, cardiovascular issues),
- Second-hand smoke exposure and its dangers.

Guardians also informed that second-hand smoke is just as dangerous. Children exposed to it are at greater risk of Asthma, ear infections, and respiratory tract infections, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), Delayed lung development. Tobacco cultivation involves the use of pesticides and deforestation, harming biodiversity. Cigarette butts are the most commonly discarded waste item globally, polluting land and water bodies.

All participants took a pledge to: Stay away from tobacco; Help others to quit; Promote tobacco-free homes and institutions. IEC Material such as Pamphlets, posters, and stickers with messages on quitting tobacco and information on helplines were distributed.

In order to aware the common mass about the fatal effects of tobacco consumption, theme of World No Tobacco Day "**Exposing the Appeal**" which aims to expose the industry's strategy on tobacco and nicotine products and also that smoking is not just a habit but a slow poison, which weakens your body from inside, tobacco smoke damages the lungs, which leads to death, **posters, banners, pamphlets, brochures** were also distributed amongst the common mass.

The **World No Tobacco Day** campaign witnessed overwhelming and spirited participation from more than **12207** individuals, encompassing students, faculty members, administrative staff, and members of the local community. The event was further enriched by the proactive involvement of representatives from various environmental organizations and non-governmental organizations (NGOs), whose collaboration and advocacy significantly contributed to the campaign's impactful outreach and resounding success.

These initiatives reached approximately **12207** individuals, sensitizing them about the severe health risks associated with tobacco use, such as oral cancer, lung disease, cardiovascular issues, and overall reduction in life expectancy.

To further amplify the message **65** informative banners and posters were printed and strategically displayed, while around **9850** pamphlets and brochures containing vital anti-tobacco and environmental awareness content were distributed among the public.

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REPORT ON CELEBRATION OF "WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY" ON 05th JUNE, 2025

The 2025 events include awareness campaigns, workshops on urban nature-based solutions to protect nature. The day is marked by various activities including clean-ups, tree planting, educational programs, social media campaigns, and conferences aiming to foster collective action against plastic pollution and broader environmental challenges. In summary, World Environment Day 2025 is a pivotal global event focusing on ending plastic pollution, highlighting innovative strategies and international cooperation toward a sustainable future.

As per directions of the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, Uttarakhand SLSA, Nainital, the 2025 **"World Environment Day"** was celebrated **on 05th June, 2025** by all the Legal Services Institutions by organizing Legal Awareness Camps and with record sapling plantations across the state.

During the campaign saplings were also planted across the State under the **"Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam"** initiative, which honors mothers by encouraging tree planting to promote environmental conservation. Legal Awareness campaigns and Plantation Drive brought together public at large, students, officials and environmentalists to promote innovative solutions against plastic waste.

During World Environment Day 2025, Legal Services Authorities conducted a comprehensive multi-level campaign emphasizing tackling plastic pollution as a national priority. During the campaign **265** Legal Awareness Camps were organized across the State to educate the public on preventive environmental measures. The camps focused on the benefits of tree plantation, control of air and plastic pollution, and legal rights and responsibilities concerning environmental protection.

These initiatives empowered citizens with actionable knowledge on environment protection, knowledge about laws and proactive roles they can play in conservation efforts. A multi-pronged approach addressed plastic waste, urgent need for uniform enforcement of plastic bans and pollution control norms, improved urban waste management, innovative waste treatment technologies, including launching the National Plastic Waste Reporting Portal for better waste management oversight, technologies to replace single-use plastics.

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CELEBRATION OF "INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY" 21ST JUNE, 2025

Every year on 21st June, the world comes together to celebrate **International Yoga Day**, a day dedicated to one of India's most treasured gifts to humanity 'Yoga'. This day highlights the ancient practice that unites body, mind, and spirit, and promotes holistic health and well-being across the globe.

The idea of dedicating a day to Yoga was first proposed by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India, Shri Narendra Modi, during his address at the United Nations General Assembly on 27th September 2014. The proposal received overwhelming support, with various countries co-sponsoring the resolution—making it one of the most widely supported initiatives in UN history. Since then, **21st June**, the day of the summer solstice and the longest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere, has been observed as International Yoga Day.

International Yoga Day is celebrated across the world with mass yoga demonstrations, workshops, seminars, and cultural events. From the banks of the River Ganga in India to the lawns of the United Nations headquarters in New York, from schools and universities to parks and community centers millions participate enthusiastically in this global event.

In view of the aforesaid and as per directions of the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, UKSLSA Nainital, as well as NALSA, New Delhi and in line with the 2025 theme - **"Yoga for One Earth, One Health"**, the Legal Services Institutions in the State has actively participated through coordinated activities.

As per the directions of NALSA, all District Legal Services Authorities (DLSAs) and Taluk Legal Services Committees (TLSCs) organized Yoga Sessions at various places across the State of Uttarakhand. Post-yoga, Legal Awareness Sessions were organized by the Legal Services Institutions, wherein NALSA Schemes, legal aid services, and helpline details were highlighted with the support of PLVs, LADCs, and Panel Lawyers. Videos and photographs of the activities have been shared on digital and social media platforms using the hashtags: #YogaSeNyayaTak | #YogaDay2025 | NALSAForWellness, as directed by NALSA.

On the occasion of the 11th International Yoga Day, a special Yoga Session was organized under the auspices of the District Legal Services Authorities. The event was graced by the presence of the District Judge/Chairman, DLSA, Judicial Officers, Court Employees, and Advocates, who actively participated in the programme with great enthusiasm.

The central theme for this year's International Yoga Day, "Yoga for One Earth, One Health", was highlighted during the session. In his address, the Hon'ble District Judge emphasized that this theme underlines the inseparable connection between individual health and the health of our planet. He observed that while Yoga

is traditionally understood as a physical exercise, in reality, it is a holistic system and way of life that harmonizes the body, mind and soul.

He explained that regular and mindful practice of Yoga leads not only to physical fitness but also to mental clarity, emotional balance, and spiritual well-being. The adaptation of Yoga in daily life also contributes to a healthier society and sustainable lifestyle, thereby benefiting both individuals and the environment. The Judge further encouraged all participants to adopt Yoga as a routine practice for enhancing efficiency, reducing stress, and promoting positivity in professional as well as personal life.

Following the address, a qualified Yoga Instructor conducted practical Yoga sessions. All Judicial Officers, staff members, Advocates, Panel Lawyers, LADCs & Staff, PLVs actively took part in a series of Asanas (postures), Pranayama (breathing techniques), and Dhyana (meditation practices), which were specially designed to demonstrate the therapeutic value of Yoga for physical health and inner balance. The instructor explained the importance of each practice, stressing how regular Yoga enhances immunity, focus, stress management, and overall vitality.

The event concluded with an interactive discussion where participants shared their experiences, expressing how the session renewed their awareness of adopting Yoga as a long-term wellness practice. The collective spirit of the day reflected the true essence of the International Yoga Day theme — “One Earth, One Health.”

During the campaign, the Legal Services Institutions organized **213** Yoga Sessions, Legal Awareness Camps, and Programmes, which were attended by approx. **96,223 persons**. The participants were sensitized about the importance of yoga, highlighting that it offers a wide range of physical, mental, and emotional benefits. These include Physical Health – improving flexibility, strength, and posture while reducing the risk of lifestyle diseases; Mental Well-being – reducing stress, anxiety, and depression by calming the mind; Spiritual Growth – promoting mindfulness, self-discipline, and inner peace; and Holistic Lifestyle – encouraging harmony with nature, sustainable living, and self-care. Also informed that in today’s fast-paced world, yoga serves as a remedy for modern lifestyle disorders like hypertension, diabetes, and obesity, while also nurturing emotional balance. Radio Show was also organized by the PLVs at Legal Aid Clinic in District Jail Almora.

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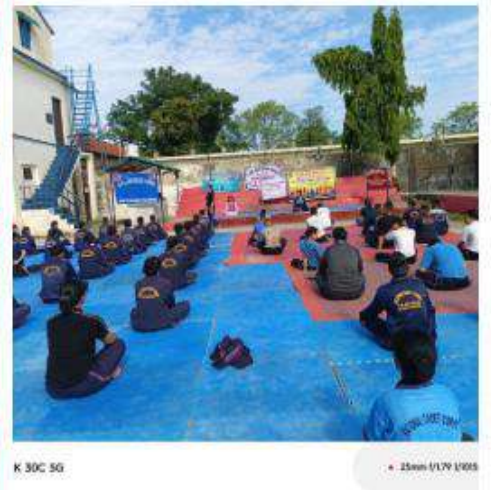
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STATE WIDE CLEANLINESS DRIVE ON 22nd JUNE, 2025

Clean atmosphere is a fundamental right and Under Article 21 of the Constitution the Right to Life has been interpreted by the Supreme Court to include the right to a clean and healthy environment. Articles 47 and 48A of the Constitution provides for improving public health and protect the environment. Additionally, Article 51A(g) of the Constitution imposes a fundamental duty on every citizen to keep the environment clean and safeguard natural resources. These provisions collectively underline the constitutional importance of cleanliness for ensuring health, dignity, and sustainable living.

Cleanliness is essential for maintaining good health, preventing diseases, and ensuring overall well-being. It promotes a hygienic environment by reducing the risk of infections caused by germs and bacteria. Cleanliness also fosters mental clarity, discipline, and a sense of orderliness, contributing to a positive and productive lifestyle. In public places, homes, workplaces, and institutions, cleanliness reflects respect for oneself and others, enhances safety, and creates a welcoming and dignified atmosphere. Moreover, it plays a crucial role in environmental conservation and is fundamental to personal and community development.

Cleanliness of surroundings is essential for maintaining a healthy and hygienic environment. It helps prevent the spread of diseases, promotes physical and mental well-being, and creates a pleasant and dignified space for living and working. Clean surroundings also reflect discipline and responsibility within a community, encourage environmental sustainability, and contribute to the overall quality of life. In institutions like shelter homes, schools, and jails, cleanliness is particularly crucial to safeguard the health of residents and uphold their basic right to live in a safe and sanitary environment.

In view of the aforesaid and as per the directions of the Hon'ble Executive Chairman, Uttarakhand State Legal Services Authority, Nainital, a State-wide Cleanliness Drive was organized by the Legal Services Institutions on **22nd June, 2025** (Sunday) from 07:00 AM onwards for aduration of three hours. The objective of the drive was to undertake **"Shram Daan"** by collecting garbage and waste materials from the local areas.

In furtherance of the State-wide Cleanliness Campaign, the following directions were issued to ensure its successful implementation and meaningful impact:

All concerned Government Departments/Offices, Educational Institutions (Schools and Colleges), Non-Governmental Organizations (particularly those engaged in waste management and environmental protection), as well as local residents, were requested to actively participate in the cleanliness drive so as to maximize community involvement and to inculcate the spirit of collective responsibility towards maintaining hygiene and sanitation.

Local Bodies and the concerned District/Town Administration of the respective areas were requested to extend full cooperation by arranging and providing the necessary tools and equipment required for the drive—such as gloves, masks, brooms, dustbins, garbage bags, ploggers, etc.—to facilitate safe and efficient garbage collection. In addition, they were also requested to make arrangements for vehicles to transport the collected waste to designated disposal sites, thereby ensuring proper handling and management of the waste.

As part of the preparatory measures, the Secretary, DLSAS in collaboration with the Nagar Nigam organized advertisement campaigns and loudspeaker announcements at **457** different locations on 21st June, 2025, so as to ensure maximum public participation in the forthcoming **Mega Cleanliness and Awareness Drive scheduled for 22nd June, 2025**. The primary objective of this campaign was to spread awareness among local residents about hygiene and sanitation and to encourage their active contribution towards the initiative.

On 22nd June, 2025, the State-wide Cleanliness Drive was conducted at the District Headquarters with active participation from all sections of society. The event witnessed the enthusiastic involvement of Government employees, Social workers, Judicial Officers, Advocates, Students, as well as members of Civil Society. The cleaning activities commenced from the District Court Buildings and gradually extended to nearby localities.

The campaign achieved significant momentum as various Government and Non-Government Organizations, including the Bar Association, Trade Unions, and NGOs, joined hands in this collective effort. All participants took a solemn pledge to keep the District clean and beautiful, highlighting their shared commitment towards the cause.

The programme concluded successfully with the cooperation of all stakeholders. At the valedictory session, the Chairman and Secretary of the DLSAs addressed the gathering and expressed heartfelt gratitude to all participants, institutions, and organizations that extended their support. They further encouraged the citizens to carry forward the cleanliness efforts on a continuous basis.

To spread awareness among the general public and to encourage widespread participation, the media was requested to extend its support in giving wide coverage and publicity to the cleanliness drive. Through print, electronic, and social media platforms, citizens were to be sensitized regarding the importance of cleanliness and motivated to contribute to this collective initiative.

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PREVENTION OF SALES OF EXPIRY ITEMS:

To ensure consumer safety and public health, Legal Services Authorities across Uttarakhand are actively conducting awareness drives against the sale and distribution of expired items. In collaboration with Food Safety Officers and Drug Inspectors, monthly review meetings are held by DLSAs to monitor enforcement.

Key focus areas:

- Strict compliance with laws – Legal Metrology Act, 2009; Drugs & Cosmetics Act, 1940; Food Safety & Standards Act, 2006.
- Public awareness through street plays, pamphlets, and workshops.
- Consumer empowerment – encouraging checks on expiry dates, demanding bills, and reporting violations.
- Ethical trade practices to prevent health hazards and economic loss.

The campaign builds a preventive ecosystem safeguarding citizens while ensuring accountability of vendors and sellers. In alignment with public health and consumer protection objectives, a state-wide inter-departmental enforcement initiative was carried out to curb the sale of expired, substandard, and unlicensed consumable goods and drugs.

During **April to June, 2025, total 71** multi-stakeholder meetings were convened with Food Safety Officers, Drug Inspectors, and Anti-Drug Enforcement Teams to synchronize inspection protocols and review compliance frameworks. 187 surprise inspections were conducted across retail outlets, medical stores, wholesale markets, departmental stores **es and malls—ensuring random,** high-footfall, and sensitive-location coverage. Focus areas included expired drugs/foods, improper labeling, unauthorized drug sales, lack of batch-wise records, and violations of hygiene and cold storage norms. 211 samples were seized and forwarded for laboratory analysis, with concerned authorities directed to initiate strict legal action based on test outcomes.

This integrated effort underscores a zero-tolerance approach towards public health risks and unethical trade practices, while reinforcing consumer safety at the grassroots level.

COUNSELLING

Under the guidance of the Hon'ble Patron-in-Chief and Hon'ble Executive Chairman of Uttarakhand SLISA, two experienced counsellors, Ms. Rakhi and Mr. G.K. Tripathi, are currently providing specialized counselling services at the ADR Centre within UKSLISA, Nainital. Our institution is profoundly dedicated to meeting the psychological needs of individuals and families, with a particular focus on marital and family counselling. We pride ourselves on delivering comprehensive, evidence-based, and empathetic psychological support designed to assist individuals and families in effectively navigating complex relational challenges, fostering emotional well-being, and promoting healthy, sustainable relationships. Through these services, we aim to enhance the quality of life and interpersonal harmony of those we serve, reinforcing our commitment to holistic legal and psychological aid.

UKSLISA Counselling Centre addresses a broad spectrum of psychological and emotional challenges, including:

- Marital and family conflicts
- Psychological disorders and disturbances
- Child custody and co-parenting arrangements
- Emotional instability and mental overwhelm

Our counsellors report a significant rise in cases involving emotional dysregulation, anxiety, depression, social withdrawal, and psychological distress—often compounded by substance use, parental pressure, and suicidal ideation.

Key Achievements

Comprehensive Counselling Services: From April to June 2025, provided tailored guidance and support to over 57 cases, exemplifying clinical excellence and personalized care.

Group Counselling Sessions: Between April to June 2025, counsellors facilitated two group sessions, each attended by 20 participants. Key focus areas included:

- Strategies for maintaining mental, physical, emotional, and social well-being.
- Impact of workplace stress on job performance and overall health.
- Identifying and managing work-related stressors, particularly those linked to management.

Voluntary Cases: A total of **23 clients independently** sought counselling services, demonstrating their proactive engagement in addressing their psychological and emotional needs through professional support and guidance.

Students and Interns: Law interns from different Universities and Institutions visited to know all about counselling and related domains. Many sessions were organised to resolve their queries and valuable information were provided. In interactive sessions various aspect of legal pro-

fession, experiences were shared for expertise in profession. This can help them to clarify their roles, boost confidence and to develop essential skills in career.

Counsellors' efforts have resulted in positive outcomes across numerous cases, and we remain committed to their ongoing valuable contributions.

SUCCESS STORY

In a couple, husband is police personnel, he is supposed to perform his duties in different setup and domains. Wife lived alone for some time with son. Felt lonely, generated her own and negative thoughts. More or less husband also faced the same situations. In the initial phase of marriage couple lived together happily. The minor issues became more serious and influenced the relation negatively. Couple not decided their issues together, never expressed/shared their views, perspectives. This marriage is viable. After counselling couple expressed that they are missing each other, not shared their thoughts and emotions but presence of positive facial expressions was there. Both of them became agree for reunion and to withdraw their cases.



SUCCESS STORY

1. In District Jail Pauri, inmate Gulab Singh, son of Rajendra Singh, arrested under FIR No. 11/25, Section 651 BNS and 5/6 POCSO Act, Kotwali Pithoragarh, informed the Jail Superintendent that his family had not received any information about his arrest and hence could not contact him. The prisoner was made aware of his legal rights and the provision of free legal aid. On his request, an application was forwarded to the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA), Pithoragarh, and an advocate was appointed.

Subsequently, the prosecution examined witnesses, and a bail application was filed on behalf of the prisoner. After hearing both sides, the Hon'ble Court, on 27 June 2025, ordered his release on bail. The order was communicated to him through a Para Legal Volunteer (PLV). Later, the prisoner clarified that although his family members were pursuing the case, without the assistance of DLSA he would not have been aware of the updated status of his legal proceedings.
