"Bhoomi National Conclave 2025"

Kerala Sets the Stage for Digital Land Governance 25th to 28th June 2025 at Thiruvananthapuram

The **Bhoomi National Conclave** was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Chief Minister, Shri. Pinarayi Vijayan, in the presence of key Cabinet Ministers and was supported by the Hon'ble Revenue Minister, Shri. K. Rajan. The event held from June 25th to 27th 2025 in Thiruvananthapuram, brought together senior officials and experts from 22 states to spotlight Kerala's pioneering initiatives in digital land governance. The conclave concluded with insightful closing remarks by the Hon'ble Speaker of the Kerala Legislative Assembly, Shri A. N. Shamseer.

The event also witnessed the participation of industry leaders and representatives from the World Bank, underscoring its global relevance and the growing interest in Kerala's integrated, transparent and citizen-centric land administration model.

At the heart of the conclave was Ente Bhoomi, Kerala's flagship digital resurvey initiative launched in 2022 aimed at resurveying all 1550 villages using advanced geospatial technologies and a community-driven verification model. Nearly one-third of villages have already been covered by a growing team of over 5000 professionals.

The vital role of NIC Kerala in developing and supporting ILIMS & related digital infrastructure under the leadership of Dr. Suchitra Pyarelal, DDG & SIO Kerala was formally recognized and appreciated.

A major milestone discussed was the launch of the Integrated Land Information and Management System (ILIMS)—India's first unified digital platform connecting Revenue,

Registration and Survey departments. It enables seamless access to services like registration, mutation, survey and revenue management.

The event served as a knowledge-networking platform, aligning with global best practices. Delegates from states such as Gujarat, Assam, Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh and Karnataka shared their experiences and learned from Kerala's scalable digital land governance model.

A key highlight of the Bhoomi National Conclave was the wealth of insights gained by participants from across India into Kerala's **Ente Bhoomi** digital land reform initiative, widely acknowledged as a global benchmark in digital land management. Delegates explored the state's Integrated Land Management System (ILMS) and the Ente Bhoomi portal which seamlessly integrates the Registration, Revenue and Survey departments offering transparent and citizen-centric land services. The conclave provided a deep understanding of Kerala's fully digital survey process, known for its accuracy, robust software and simplified, template-based land documentation. Emphasis was also placed on citizen engagement, with participants recognizing how public participation—facilitated through grievance redressal and verification tools on the Ente Bhoomi portal—has been vital to the reform's success. The event offered a practical roadmap of scalable best practices, positioning Kerala's model as a replicable and forward-looking framework for other states pursuing transparent and efficient land governance.

The BhuNaksha module which serves as the core component of the Ente Bhoomi system was widely recognized and appreciated by various speakers and panelists at the conclave. Its role in delivering accurate, parcel-level cadastral mapping and enabling transparent land demarcation and visualization was highlighted as a model for other states to emulate.

NIC officials also actively participated in the field demonstration organized by the Survey Department on the third day of the conclave, assisting delegates in understanding the onground implementation of digital survey technologies and workflows under the Ente Bhoomi mission.

The conclave reaffirmed Kerala's vision: "Land for all, records for all land, all services smart" and set a national benchmark for transparent, inclusive and citizen-centric land administration.
