

#### Food And Civil Supply Department

 All the Deputy Commissioners to ensure that there is no household without a Gas Connection if eligible for Ujjwala Yojana and assistance must be given to him/her. The Department has requested vide letter dated 07.12.2022 to State Level Coordinator, Indian Oil Corporation, Panipat Refinery to provide Gas connection under Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana out of the balance funds as spent by the State Govt. to those BPL, AAY and OPH families in Haryana who don't have Gas connection in their names.

#### **Forest Department**

- (i) CS directed to obtain opinion of LR immediately and to remove the trees on the canal banks which obstruct the flow of water.
- (ii) Hon'ble MP Sh. Dharambir desired to provide 50-60 hectares Social Forestry Land for the construction of Sohna-by-Pass road.
- Opinion of LR has been taken and detailed order has been issued by Principal Chief Conservator of forests (HoFF) Haryana vide Endst. No. PS/PCCF/1203-04 dated 10.02.2023 in compliance of issue relating to removal of trees spending of on inner slope of notified canals, branches, distributaries, major, mines, drains, water-channels etc. to all the concerned.
- Report has been asked from Chief Conservator of Forests South Circle, Haryana regarding Issue no. 2 Surplus forest land is not available in South Haryana. Even the development project are held up due non-availability of degraded forest land for Compensatory Afforestation land in said area. Hence, procurement of 50-60 ha. Social forestry is not possible for this project.

#### Irrigation Department & Water Resources Department

- To expedite laying of pipelines to fill tanks.
- Irrigation & WR department only provides outlets on Canals to Public Health Engineering Department (PHED) but laying of Pipelines up to tanks for filling of tanks is done by PHED itself.
- To identify the specific locations where water is exhausted before next rotation.

As per Water Works tanks fillings status of last end PO, report stating status of Filled/Partially filled/Not filled tanks attached. Filling status other than 100% are indicating probable locations where water scarcity exists in filling of Water tanks. As per availability of water, priority is always given by IWRD for filling of tanks of PHED however if there is any particular issue relating to capacity of tanks, that is required to be looked after by PHED. Also, whatsapp groups have also been created in which PHED officers are also members. All the tank filling issues are sorted out by irrigation officers immediately as and when intimated.

• To integrate with the An amount of Rs. 28.16 crore has been disbursed against the target of Rs. 30.23 crore for the Year 2022-23 under PMEGP.

#### **Health Department**

The Chairman desired to 100% complete 2<sup>nd</sup> administration of dose of COVID vaccine.

 To ensure to handover & start all the new hospitals which have been completed.

• Status of COVID Vaccination: As on 28th November 2022, out of estimated 2.30 Crore target beneficiaries more than 2.36 Cr (103%) first doses have been administered. Further more than 1.98 Crore (86%) beneficiaries have been vaccinated with 2nd dose. Apart from this more than 19.43 lakh precaution dose have also been administered. Altogether more than 4.54 crore COVID Vaccination dose have been administered.

#### To improve the pace of vaccination for 2<sup>nd</sup> dose, following activities were carried out on priority basis:-

- District task force meetings were organized by involving representatives from Education Department, Panchayati Raj Department, Women & Child Development Department and Urban Local Bodies.
- Identification and mobilization for vaccination of remaining precaution dose beneficiaries and second dose due beneficiaries are being done by Front line workers, by involving influential persons of villages in urban and rural areas
- Special workplace vaccination camps are being operationalized at big office complexes (public & pvt.), Industrial Establishments, Railway Stations, Inter-State Bus stations etc.
- Special vaccination camps are being organized in Schools and Colleges. All Covid vaccinations are being captured on CoWIN portal.
- Near home covid vaccination camps organized to cover senior citizens, Divyangjan and other persons who could not travel to far off vaccination centers.
- Special sessions were organized for prison inmates, shelter homes, schools etc.
- Wide publicity was done regarding this initiative in print,

electronic, social & mass media.

- Frequent review of progress are being done at all levels.
- Two rounds of 'HAR GHAR DASTAK' have been carried out in which special focus was given to mobilize due beneficiaries of 2nd dose. Under this campaign every household was visited for mobilization.
- With the objective to cover daily wagers and workers Sessions with flexible timing (early morning and evening sessions) were organized.
- Special sessions during Navratri in the temples and in Gurudwars were organized.

**Present Scenario**: COVID 19 fresh cases are being reported all time low after the pandemic breakout and so is vaccination. Around 500 doses per day are being administered in the state. Further, COVID Vaccination is completely voluntary in the light of the guideline from the MoHFW GOI. Further, Hon'ble Supreme court has also passed judgment that vaccination to be on voluntary basis and not mandatory.

#### Housing for All Department

Under PMAY-U, the implementing agency must immediately release the 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3rd instalments to the beneficiaries and, if required, assistance from the State Budget may be taken while waiting for release of funds from Govt. of India.

Proper mechanism is in place at district level as well as State level and

will find out solution to raise the underground water level.

- Appropriate action is being taken collectively by all the members of the DLTF Committees as well as SLTF Committees to curb incidents of illegal mining in the State.

PMGSY-III Scheme has been launched Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India and at present an indicative allocation of length of 2500 Kms has also been made by the Ministry of Rural Development for a period of 5 years (2019-2024). The Detail of Nos. of roads alongwith length taken under PMGSY-III (Batch I, II and III) is as under-

- ➤ (Batch-I)-83 Nos. Road Works with a length of 688.937 Kms costing Rs.383.58 Cr. with a scope of improvement of road, widening and strengthening.
- ➤ (Batch-II)-120 Nos. Road Works with a length of 1216.946 Kms costing Rs.549.51 Cr with a scope of improvement of road, widening and strengthening.
- ➤ (Batch-III)-56 Nos. Road Works having a length of 590.448 Kms costing Rs.282.92 Cr with a scope of improvement of road, widening and strengthening.
- ➤ Out of 2496.331 kms, 176 Nos. of works with a length of 2018.237 Kms has been completed. Remaining 83 Nos. works with a length of 478.09 Kms shall be completed shortly.
- ➤ The matter for taken up additional length of road for widening under PMGSY Scheme was discussed with DG NRIDA and it was intimated by DG NRIDA that target of 2500 Kms shall be completed first and after that matter for the grant of extra length of roads under PMGSY shall be taken up.

# Development & Panchayats (now transferred to Rural Development Deptt.)

  - ✓ Operational Expenditure includes wages of manpower (Driver

- of Hopper Tipper Dumper) and Fuel charges etc.
- Procurement of Hopper Tipper Dumper will be done through rate contracts through Director General Supplies and Disposal (DGS&D).
- ✓ The budget for procurement of Hopper Tipper Dumper will be provided by the State Government.
- ✓ Hopper Tipper Dumper will be provided to all MahaGrams (GP wise) and other GPs where population is more than 10,000 as per PPP Data.
- ✓ Solid Waste Management sheds will be constructed in MahaGrams and other GPs where population is more than 10000 as per PPP data which do not have SWM sheds.
- ✓ Funds for construction of Solid Waste Management sheds will be provided from SBM-G share and State Budget.
- ✓ For the operation of the project, only driver would be accounted for through HKRN ensuring that the driver is from that MahaGram itself.
- ✓ The already existing Safai Karamcharis within the GP would be engaged for door to door collection along side with the Hopper Tipper Dumper while second already existing Safai Karamcharis would be engaged in the operation and maintenance of the Solid Waste Management Sheds.
- ✓ For the operations of the project, the State Government will give a grant of 20% while balance 80% of the funds have to be borne by the GPs themselves.
- ✓ After 6 months, the department would access the best performing MahaGram of each district and would replicate that model in the entire district using that MahaGram name.
- ✓ User chargers of Rs. 10 would be collected from the households.

Under the "Accessible India Campaign" scheme of the Government of India, it was decided to make the constructed buildings located in Gurgaon and Faridabad accessible for disabled people. Scheme was started in 2007-08 and revamped in 2018 as RKVY-RAFTAAR (Remunerative Approaches for Agriculture and Allied Sector Rejuvenation) aiming at making farming a remunerative economic activity through strengthening the farmer's effort, risk mitigation and promoting agri-business entrepreneurship. Objective of the Scheme includes to strengthen the farmer's efforts through creation of required pre and post-harvest agri-infrastructure that increases access to quality inputs, storage, market facilities etc. and enables farmers to make informed choices. To promote value chain addition linked production models that will help farmers, increase their income as well as encourage production / productivity.

# Agenda PARAMPARAGAT KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (PKVY) Item No.4 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yajana was initiated during 2015-16 but in Haryana it was implemented during 2016-17 in 20 clusters, 11 districts (Gurugram, Hisar, Jind, Jhajjar, Kaithal, Kurukshetra, Mewat, Narnaul, Sirsa, Palwal & Panchkula) on an area of 1000 Acres for organic farming. The scheme was discontinued from 2017-18 to 2022-23.

But now, 3 year (2023-24 to 2025-26) Action Plan amounting Rs.26.28 Crore has been submitted to GoI for approval as per revised guideline of PKVY (Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana)

#### i. Human Resource Engaged by State Govt. in programmes:

In Action Plan of PKVY a provision of manpower at State ,District and Village level has been added with a Budget provision of 1.08 Crore/Year .

#### ii. Constraints and their solution for implementations of programmes:

As per earlier Scheme approach Constraints were:

- Farmers were reluctant to go for organic farming as the yield was not as the level of present farming with fertilizer & pesticides.
- Farmers were not getting better price for organic produce at that time. *Solution*: Organic product certification is needed to get better price.
- iii. Flow of Funds: This is Centrally Sponsored Scheme on 60:40 sharing pattern.
- iv. Timeline related constraints and resolution of any land issues: No land issue in this Scheme.
- v. Initiatives for effective delivery of assets: A budget provision of Rs. 10.80 crore as one time assistance will be provided to the farmers as DBT for value Chain Production.
- vi. Complaints/irregularities/misappropriation etc.: No issues regarding complaints/irregularities/misappropriation etc.

### Agenda SOIL HEALTH CARD (SHC) Item No.5 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

Centrally Sponsored Flagship Soil Health Card Scheme was launched by the Hon'ble Prime Minister on 19.02.2015 at Suratgarh, Rajasthan with the objectives to issue Soil Health Cards to the farmers, to diagnose soil fertility related constraints and to promote soil test based nutrient management in the Country.

During the year 2020-21, the Govt. of India has dropped the collection and testing of Soil Samples due to pandemic of COVID-19. However, 18972 numbers of soil samples tested which were received directly from the farmers. The Gol has issued target for organizing 1073 number of training camps and 3219 number of Demonstration plots in selected 1073 villages during the year 2020-21 which were organized successfully.

Soil Health & Fertility (including Soil Health Card (SHC) and Soil Health Management (SHM) schemes) have been merged with Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY) w.e.f. financial year 2022-23. Accordingly, Annual Action Plan under RKVY for a total cost of Rs. 2680.80 lakh for the year 2022-23 was submitted to the Gol for approval. Out of which, an Annual Action Plan worth Rs. 2034.90 lakh (Rs. 1220.94 lakh as CS + Rs. 813.96 lakh as SS) was approved by the Gol during the year 2022-23 for taken up the activities relating to collection and testing of soil samples, establishment of Static STLs and strengthening of Quality Control Lab (Fertilizer) in the State. An amount of Rs. 305.23 lakh (25% of total approved AAP as Ist installment) was released by the Gol as its share during the year 2022-23.

- iii. Flow of funds The funding pattern for scheme between centre and state is 60:40.

PRADHAN MANTRI FASAL BIMA YOJANA (PMFBY)

Item No.6

(AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

The Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana is being implementing in the State from Kharif 2016. Paddy, Bajra, Maize and Cotton crops are covered in Kharif and Wheat, Mustard, Gram, Barley are covered in Rabi Season. The crop Sunflower has been included from Rabi 2018-19 and Moong has been included from Kharif 2022. The crop insurance scheme is being implementing in the State on cluster approach as State is divided in three clusters out of which first two clusters contains seven districts and third cluster contains eight districts. Under the scheme, farmers have to bare premium rate only 2 % of Sum Insured (SI) for Kharif, 1.5% of SI for Rabi and 5% for Cotton i.e. commercial/ annual crops. Following risks are covered in the scheme:-

- 1. Localized Calamities:- Hailstorm, Inundation, Cloud burst and lightening
- 2. **Standing Crop (Sowing to Harvesting)**:- Drought, Dry spell, Flood, Inundation, widespread Pests and Disease attack, Lightening, Storm/Hailstorm
- 3. **Post-Harvest Losses :-** Hailstorm, Cyclonic rains and Unseasonal rains

From kharif 2016 to Kharif 2022, total numbers of 90.7 Lakh farmers have covered under the scheme out of which 25.7 Lakh affected farmers have compensated with an amount of Rs. 6177.18 Crore for Crop loss.

#### 2. Vocational Education

Vocational education in Haryana has been implemented based on the National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF). Vocationalization of education refers to the inclusion of those practical subjects or courses, which shall generate among the students some basic knowledge, skills, and disposition that prepared them to think of becoming skilled workers or entrepreneurs. It serves as an instrument to bring about the connectivity between general and vocational education. Haryana has been pioneer in implementing vocational education in the state. From 2012-13 to 2022-23, Vocational education has been implemented in 1186 schools covering 1,96,028 students in 15 sectors/skills.

- ➤ Out of 1186 Schools, in 1074 schools Vocational labs are set-up and functional.
- ➤ Out of 2399 approved posts, 2180 Vocational Teachers are in position under Vocational Education.
- ➤ 05 days in service training cum faculty development programme of 2087 Vocational Teachers have been completed successfully with the support of Shri Vishwakarma Skill University (SVSU), Palwal, Haryana.

#### Best practices being followed under Vocational Education in Haryana:

- 50 Incubation Centres in 09 Sectors have been established in Govt. Schools of State Haryana. In these Incubation Centres, the students are provided exposure to working in an industrial environment. A total of 11249 (Girls 6346 boys 4903) students have successfully completed their 12 days of training (per day 06 hours) in these Incubation Centres. Training Certificates provided to these students through industry expert.
- In the academic session 2022-23, the pre-vocational education has been provided to 1074 Govt. Schools of the state from Class 6th to 8th. A total of 90,445 (Girls 46,926 boys 43,519) students are getting benefitted in the current year.
- Convergence of Inclusive Education for Differently Abled Children (IED) students into Vocational Education. Currently, 619 Students with Special Needs (CWSN) stand enrolled in vocational education.

This grant is released to Replace the non-functional school equipment and for incurring other recurring costs such as consumables, play material, game, sports equipment, laboratories, electricity charges, internet, water, teaching aids etc.

- Promote Swachh Bharat campaign and undertake activities under Swachhta Action Plan.
- To sanitize the Schools and provide necessary items in schools due to COVID-19 pandemic
  - **ii) Free Text Books:** Free Text Books (FTBs) have been provided to all students studying in classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> in Govt. schools. Under Samagra Shiksha an amount of Rs. 4804.14 lacs was approved and same was incurred to provide FTBs all students of classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup>.
  - **iii) Uniform grant** An amount of Rs. 7138.22 lakhs has been approved under Samagra Shiksha @Rs. 600 per student for providing uniforms to all girls, SC boys and BPL boys studying in classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup>. The state provides uniform to all students of classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> @ Rs. 800 per student and @ Rs. 1000 for classes 6<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup>. Thus this grant approved under Samgara Shiksha is transferred to Department of Elementary Education for transferring uniform grant to all students in DBT mode. Approved funds for uniform were transferred to bank accounts of students.

#### iv) Sports & Physical Education Grant

In the year 2022-23, an amount of Rs. 1519.10 lacs was approved by Gol for Sports and Physical Education. Out of this, order amounting to Rs. 1511.16 lacs was given to various firms for providing sports material in Govt. Schools. The material has been supplied in all primary, upper primary, secondary and senior secondary govt. schools.

#### v) Library Grant

In the year 2022-23, total funds approved by GOI was 1367.66 lakhs for total 14477 numbers of Govt. Schools. Out of this, library books worth Rs. 876.97 have been procured from the govt. agencies i.e. NBT & CIIL. The total expenditure till date is Rs. 907.13 lakh including the transport cost and amount for conducting workshop and selection of library books. open tender has been floated on 22.03.2023 for purchasing library books amounting to Rs. 460.53 from private publishers.

#### 4. Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalayas (KGBVs)

36 KGBVs have been approved by Ministry of Education (MoE). Out of total, 32 KGBVs are functional. 13 KGBVs are functional for classes 6 to 12 (these have been upgraded upto Sr. Sec. level) in the current academic session. Total enrolment in these KGBVs is 3690 in these KGBVs.

**5. Out of School Children (OoSC):** In the year 2022-23, total no. of OoSC identified are 22841(age 6-14 years) in all 22 districts of state of Haryana. Out of total identified, 18154 OoSC enrolled in 731 special training centers. Till 31<sup>st</sup> march 8027 number of children mainstreamed in schools. The process of mainstreaming is ongoing and will be completed by 31<sup>st</sup> April 2023. Books and stationary for bridging the learning gap have also been provided to all the special training centers.

- ➤ Digital Boards- HSSPP has supplied 422 digital boards in 342 Govt. Schools as approved for 2022-23 @ Rs. 194,500/- per digital board. Material has been supplied and installation is going on presently. MoE has approved the total 2910 Govt. schools for Smart Classrooms from 2020-21 to 2022-23 and only 98 schools are pending to implement and process is going on
- ➤ ICT Labs:- MoE has approved the ICT equipment's for 113 Govt. Schools for setting up labs for 2022-23 and total 913 Govt. schools has been approved by MoE from 2016-17 to 2022-23 under Samagra Shiksha. Out of these 913 Schools, Hardware equipment's of 400 labs has been supplied during 2022-23 to concerned schools and installation has also been completed for 268 ICT labs.
- ➤ Labs for 119 BRCs: MoE has approved the ICT equipment's for setting up labs for 119 BRCs for 2022-23. Digital boards @ 3 units per BRC for 119 BRCs has been supplied and installation is going on at BRC level.

- 8. Provision of Large Print Books: 786 sets of large print books has been provided to low vision divyang students of classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> through National Institute for Empowerment for Persons with Visual Disabilities (Disabilities), Dehradun.
- 9. **Providing Aids & Appliances:** Aids & Appliances has been provided to 2463 divyang students enrolled in Govt. Schools (2113 divyang students under classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> and 350 divyang students under classes 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup>) through ALIMCO.
- 10. **Stipend for Girls:** Stipend @ Rs. 200 per month for 10 months has been provided to 4032 divyang girls studying in classes 1<sup>st</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> and 1466 divyang girls studying in classes 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> in Govt. schools through DBT through PFMS.

#### 8. Other initiatives:

#### i. State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (SCPCR)

The funds of Rs. 7.234 lacs for the year 2022-23 sanctioned for providing support to the SCPCR for grievance redressal and protecting the rights of the child under the RTE Act were released to the Secretary HSCPCR.

As HSCPCR has given the mandate to look after matters pertaining to child rights and create awareness among community about the child rights and rules with regard to child rights under various provisions of law in the State to enforce.

#### ii. SEHAT Programme (Students' Wellbeing Program):-

All students of all government schools will be screened/ tested in two phases. The testing/screening of students of all government schools will be done on four components i.e. capturing Hemoglobin, Weight, Height, Visual Acuity and Dental conditions.

- The funds of Rs. 634.9333 lacs for 11108 schools and Rs. 192.1147 lacs for 3361 schools for Elementary and Secondary respectively has been approved by the Ministry.
- A total of 19,663 Health and Wellness Ambassadors have been nominated and trained by the Mobile Health Teams of NHM in the last week of December 2022 and first week of January 2023.
- All 14469 schools have been provided funds of Rs. 303.849 lacs for the installation of Snellen chart, Weighing scale and Stadiometers.
- SEHAT Programme has been launched by Hon'ble Governor of Haryana on 05.09.2022.
- SEHAT Module has been integrated in Avsar Portal to capture and digitized health records of students and module for teachers has been developed.
- The team of doctors from NHM are visiting schools to screen the children under Phase I.
- Total 546091 screened students health data uploaded on the portal till 07.04.2023

# iii. Learning Enhancement/Enrichment Programme LEP (Class VI - VIII) (Remedial Teaching):-

- Project UDAAN was launched by Hon'ble EM on 27.04.2022.
- UDAAN Project is a reformative education program to provide support to students to cover up their learning losses through a structured remedial program.
- The Baseline survey has been conducted on 26.08.2022 & 27.08.2022 in selected schools of all the blocks in the State.
- The funds of Rs. 8.31 lacs were released to the districts to conduct the Baseline survey.
- Content of the remedial teaching program for classes 6 to 8 have already been developed by the SCERT Subject Experts and Coordinators.
- A 3 days Mentor Orientation workshop of BRPs and ABRCs has also conducted at SCERT to cascade learning on improving the quality of mentoring in schools.

#### 9. Promotion of Science:

a) Activities to Support Science & Mathematics: (For students of Class 3<sup>rd</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>)

Budget amounting to Rs. 285.75 lacs and Rs. 336.1 lacs has been approved by PAB 2022-23 and these have been transferred to schools. These funds were utilized by the schools in preparing science activities, models, role-play/ drama, poster-making etc. as part of competition to be organized under Science Exhibitions at different levels and to purchase material for the Science labs of the school.

b) Exposure Visit Out of the States: (For students of Class 10<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup>). Budget amounting to Rs. 11.00 lacs has been approved by PAB 2022-23 for visit of students to scientific value place outside the State. Academically brilliant students in the subject Science of Class 10<sup>th</sup> &12<sup>th</sup> (Science stream) visited Bangalore from 19-26 December 2022 in batches and various scientific value places like Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL), National Science Centre & Museum (NSCM), Science innovation Centre etc. were visited by the students.

#### c) TECH-BEE Program

- HSSPP in partnership with HCL has started an earn and learn program for students of Class 12th with mathematics as a subject.
- Under this program, students will be benefitted with job at HCL after a series of tests & interviews being in Class 12th. While doing the job, students will earn a s um of Rs. 1.20 -1.80 lacs (@ Rs. 10,000- 15,000 per month). In addition to the job, students will also complete their graduate courses from renowned college/ universities like BITS Pilani, SASTRA University, and AMITY University etc. HCL will also pay 50 -70% fee of these graduate courses of the selected students.
- 400 students from various government & Government aided schools of Haryana have been shortlisted.
- "<u>Jyotirgamay</u>" Program was organized on 23<sup>rd</sup> August 2022. Sh. Kanwar Pal, Hon'ble Education Minister, Haryana had felicitated the students with Achievement Certificates under this program to 263 students who had agreed to join the HCL for earn & learn course under Tech-Bee Program.

#### d) Tinkering Labs:

- For students of Class 9th-12th
- 16 Tinkering Labs under CSR funding from Sumangal Foundation have been set up in schools of Gurugram, Mewat, Panchkula, Faridabad.
- In addition to equipping the labs with models & material that will help in nurturing creativity of students in the subject Science, **skilled professionals** are also deployed in these labs. They will help students in guiding the students about utilization of various materials provided in the lab.

### ITEM No.8 (EDUCATION DEPARTMENT)

National Programme of Nutritional Support to the Primary Education, known as Mid-Day-Meal Scheme is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme and under this Scheme hot cooked food is provided to the children of Primary Classes (I-V) and Upper Primary classes (VI-VIII) in all the Government, Local Bodies and Government Aided Privately managed Primary Schools which was *launched* in the entire State on 15<sup>th</sup> August 2004. This Scheme is being implemented in compliance with the orders dated 20-4-2004 passed by the Hon'ble Supreme court of India. The main objective of the scheme is to boost universalism of Primary Education by increasing enrolment, retention and attendance and simultaneously improving nutritional status of students of the primary classes. Under the scheme free food grains (Wheat/Rice) is provided by the Government of India through Food Corporation of India @ 100 grams for primary children and 150 grams for upper primary children, per child per school per day. Freshly cooked food of these cereals is provided to children.

ITEM No.10 (FOOD CIVIL SUPPLIES & CONSUMER AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT)

The Government of India has launched Prime Minister Ujjwala Yojna (PMUY) from 1st May, 2016 under which LPG connection issued with a subsidy of Rs. 1600/- per family. Some beneficiaries were not covered under the PMUY scheme, such beneficiaries have been provided the gas connection from State Government funds. 7,65,593 gas connections have been released under PMUY with centre subsidy and 1,88,304 gas connections have been released under PMUY with state subsidy of Haryana. Thus total 9,53,897 gas connections have been released under PMUY in the State of Haryana.

All the Deputy Commissioners, State Level Coordinator, Indian Oil Corporation Limited, Haryana, Panipat and District Food and supplies Controllers have been requested to issue LPG connections to the remaining eligible household in their respective district.

Divisional LPG Head, Karnal Indane DO, Indian Oil Corporation Ltd. vide e-mail dated 8th December, 2022 has intimated that they have more than 6 lakh applications for remaining numbers and hence connections are released based on pending applications and percentage coverage of LPG. Any application left will be considered for further releases as and when the scheme is extended.

## AGENDA IMPLEMENTATION OF NATIONAL FOOD SECURITY ACT, 2013 ITEM No.11 (FOOD CIVIL SUPPLIES & CONSUMER AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT)

Under NFSA the subsidized items are being distributed to the eligible beneficiaries after Aadhaar based biometric authentication through Point of Sale Devices. The Government of India launched Pradhan Mantri Awaas Yojana-Gramin w.e.f. 01.04.2016 with the objective to provide financial assistance to all the families reside in rural area and not having their own house as per the list of the beneficiaries identified from SECC-2011.

#### **Unit Cost:**

- Rs. 1.38 lakh (Rs. 1.20 lakh in 3 installments + Rs.18,000/-Top up amount)
- Rs. 12,000/- for construction Toilet under SBM Scheme).
- Additional Assistance (90 unskilled man-days wages under MGNREG Scheme).
- The beneficiaries may (optional) also avail a bank loan upto Rs.70,000/-.

#### **Funding Pattern:**

- The scheme is share in the ratio of 60:40 by the Government of India and State Government respectively.
- The financial assistance is released to the beneficiary in three installments through DBT.

### Achievement (as on 25.05.2023):

- Against the target of 21,673 houses allotted by Government of India for the year 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2020-21, 21688 houses have been sanctioned. Out of sanctioned houses, 21054houses have been completed and 614 houses are in progress.
- Further, GoI has allotted target of 8038 houses for the year 2021-22, out of which 7775 houses have been sanctioned, out of which 2236 houses have been completed and 263 remaining houses will not be sanctioned as the Ministry has freezed the sanctioning of houses w.e.f. 01.05.2023.
- Financial assistance of Rs.36720.69 lakh has been disbursed through DBT.

#### Complaints/irregularities/misappropriation

• Grievance redressal mechanism exists at district and State level.

#### Issues

- The Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India has closed the site of Awaas-Plus for the registration of beneficiaries since 07.03.2019 whereas, around 1.68 lakh applications were registered on Awas-Plus. Out of 1.68 lakh applicants, 0.78 lakh have been found eligible after verification. The State Govt. is receiving many requests from eligible beneficiaries to get assistance for the construction of their houses. The Ministry has not opened the site so far.
- Govt. of India was requested to allocate target of 20000 houses for the Year 2022-23 but no target was allocated for the Year 2022-23. However, Govt. of India has again been requested to allocate target atleast 20,000 houses for the Year 2023-24.

## AGENDA PRADHAN MANTRI AWAAS YOJANA-URBAN (PMAY-U) ITEM No.14 (Housing for All Department)

The Government of India has launched Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-Urban (PMAY-U) with the objective of assisting the beneficiaries of Economically Weaker Section (EWS) and Low Income Group (LIG) categories of urban area in new construction/purchase or upgradation/enhancement of existing house for their use. The PMAY (U) is divided into following four major verticals:

- i. Subsidy for beneficiary-led individual house construction.
- ii. Affordable Housing in Partnership.
- iii. "In situ" Slum Redevelopment-using land as a resource with private participation.
- iv. Credit Linked Subsidy-Interest subsidy for EWS/LIG and Middle Income Group (MIG) for new/incremental housing.

In view of the weak financial position of most of the urban poor, the State Govt. has decided to provide State Financial assistance @ 40% in proportion to Central assistance to all the eligible beneficiaries. Thus, the total financial assistance under different components may be availed by beneficiaries as under:

### **Progress**

Survey was conducted in year 2017 to assess the demand of housing, wherein 2,48,657 applicants were found eligible out of which 1,18,016 (AHP=50,000+BLC(N&E) = 67,649+ISSR=367) houses have been targeted to be completed within the mission period of PMAY-U.

### **Beneficiary Led Construction (BLC)**

Against the target of 67,649 houses under BLC vertical, 30126 houses have been grounded
(14620 completed and 15506 are under construction houses) and concerned beneficiaries
have been provided financial assistance of Rs. 521.45crore for construction of their houses.
Letter of Intent (LoI) issued to 33,580 beneficiaries of BLC vertical.

#### Steps taken to facilitate construction of houses:

- In view of the weak financial position of most of the urban poor, the State Govt. has decided to provide State Financial assistance uptoRs. 1.00 lac in addition to Central assistance of Rs. 1.50 lac to all the eligible beneficiaries.
- One-time exemption given to BLC and CLSS beneficiaries from depositing development charges, building plan scrutiny fee and off-line approval of building plan/map.
- One time exemption to BLC beneficiaries for construction of their house according to suitability of dimension/size of plot.
- It has been decided to give one time permission to the approved applicants of BLC-PMAY(U), whose houses/plots are located in those unapproved colonies, which are currently under consideration of Urban Local Bodies Department for regularization.
- As per the eligibility criteria fixed earlier, a beneficiary should not have availed the benefit of other housing scheme earlier. It has been observed that there are some beneficiaries, who have availed some benefit of housing scheme earlier but their houses are presently in dilapidated condition and not worth living and such beneficiaries are not in position to construct new house due to their weak financial position. Therefore, it has now been decided to allow such approved applicants to avail full benefit under BLC-PMAY(U) so as to enable them to construct their pucca house.
- As per earlier instructions, 1st installment of financial assistance was released only after construction of house upto level of plinth. However, to speed up progress under the scheme it has now been decided to release 1st instalment of Rs.1.00 lakh for new construction and Rs.0.60 lakh for enhancement immediately after issuance of Letter of Intent (LoI) under BLC vertical.

- Like-wise, earlier 2<sup>nd</sup> instalment was used to be released after completion of construction of houses upto roof level, but now it has been decided to release 2<sup>nd</sup> instalment immediately after completion of construction upto lintel and before laying of roof of the house.
- There are many applicants not having title proof in their name or having joint/undivided title thus depriving them from the benefit of the scheme. It has been decided to allow the benefit of BLC-PMAY(U) to such approved applicants provided he/she furnishes an affidavit to the effect that joint holders/property holders have no objection for construction of house and subsequently they shall have no rights on the constructed house. However, the beneficiary must have clear title over the property including joint title.

#### Affordable Housing Scheme (AHP)

• State has prepared two fresh affordable housing policies and amended existing Affordable Housing Policy-2013. In addition, House Allotment Rules of Housing Board Haryana for giving preference to the approved applicants of AHP-PMAY(U) have also been amended. However, there is relatively less response shown by builders/developers as cost of land is very high in comparison with other States. Thus, Govt. of India, MoHUAhas been requested to allow State Government to cover the target of 50,367 houses of AHP and ISSR under BLC vertical of PMAY-U.

#### In Situ Slum Redevelopment (ISSR)

 The Detailed Project Reports of two slums (i.e. DehaBasti, Assandh and Tapriwas Colony, Jind) were approved in 43<sup>rd</sup>CSMC by Govt. of India. RFP were floated by the Urban Local Bodies concerned but no proposal was received. M.C Assandh and M.C, Jind have again been requested to refloat RFP.

### **Credit Link Subsidy Scheme (CLSS)**

 Home Loan of Rs. 8069.21croreSanctioned to 41,909 beneficiaries and interest subsidy of 918.88crore disbursed under Credit Linked Subsidy Scheme (CLSS) vertical.Govt. of India has not extended the periodicity of CLSS beyond 31.03.2022.

# Agenda Mission for Integrated Development of Horticulture (MIDH) Item No.15 (Horticulture Department, Haryana, Panchkula)

A. This is a center scheme andthis scheme was started in the year 2004-05. There is a provision of 25% to 100% subsidy under this scheme. In 2005-06, Govt. of India launched National Horticulture Mission (Centrally Sponsored Scheme) on sharing pattern of 85:15 (GoI:State), which was renamed as Mission for Integrated Development of Horticulture (MIDH) in 2014-15. In 2015-16 sharing pattern of MIDH was changed to 60:40(GoI:State). In Haryana, Mission is being implemented by Haryana State Horticulture Development Agency (HSHDA) through District Horticulture Mission Implementation Units in the district. ### B. <u>Scheme: "Silk Samagra" Integrated Scheme for Development Silk Industry (ISDSI)</u>

Sericulture activities in the state were closed down by DOH, Haryana From 1997-98 onwards. Infrastructure/buildings created under NSP were handed over to state Govt. to continue the sericulture activities in the Stare. On the state Govt., CSB has established one Sub REC in Panchkula. CSB from the beginning emphasized that state should also take up the sericulture development program by utilizing the infrastructure /building created under National Sericulture Project and should not remain over dependent on CSB. DOH, Haryana had also taken

up some initiatives reintroduce sericulture in the state by introducing sericulture activities in Panchkula and Yamuna Nagar. Sericulture in Haryana State is under the administrative control of the Directorate of Horticulture, Govt. of Haryana with the head quarter at Panchkula. Sericulture activities are spread over in Panchkula & Yamuna Nagar areas.

The new Central Sector Scheme "Silk Samagra" —Integrated Scheme for Development of Silk Industry (ISDSI for the year 2017-18 to 2019-20 has been started by CSB, Govt. of India. There are potential for horizontal and vertical expansion of Sericulture industry in the state. Popularization of bivoltine cocoon production is also thrust area of the State. The scheme is being implemented in three districts of Haryana i.e. Panchkula, Ambala and Yamuna NagarIn this scheme the provision for subsidy is 90% (CS: 50%+SS: 40%+Ben: 10%) for General Farmers and 90% (CS: 65%+ SS: 25%+ Ben: 10%) for SC Farmers. The details are:

## AGENDA Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana (PMKSY)-Har Khet Ko Pani ITEM No. 16 (IRRIGATION & WATER RESOURCES DEPARTMENT, HARYANA)

There are 4 major components under PMKSY i.e. AIBP, HKKP, PDMC and Watershed. Irrigation & Water Resources Department Haryana and MICADA, Haryana is concerned with AIBP, HKKP and PDMC components. The status of the concerned components is as under:

### 1. PMKSY- Har Khet Ko Pani (HKKP)

During the mid of 2015 Government of India intimated that release of central assistance to Command Area Development and Water Management (CADWM) programme shall be made under the newly introduced scheme of "Har Khet Ko Pani" (HKKP) under the umbrella scheme of PMKSY.

In the month of December, 2016, GoI, MoWR, RD&GR suddenly discontinue the scheme of "Command Area Development & Water Management (CADWM)" and informed vide D.O. letter dated 16.12.2016 that Government has decided for taking up Command Area Development & Water Management (CADWM) works / projects through a new Scheme of (ISBIG) Incentivization Scheme for Bridging Irrigation Gap between Irrigation Potential Created (IPC) and Irrigation Potential Utilized (IPU). Further, GoI advised the States to submit the project proposals for approval and inclusion under ISBIG.

Accordingly, Haryana state had prepared and submitted following 6 projects with estimated cost of Rs. 3742.61 crore to construct 3756 watercourses vide letter dated 08.02.2018 for approval and inclusion under ISBIG to the Ministry of Water Resources, River Development and Ganga Rejuvenation, Government of India which earlier pertains to CADWM works. But, since 2016 – 17 the scheme of ISBIG is under the process of approval with Gol.

Since then the matter is being regularly followed up by the State Government at various level. Accordingly, a D.O. letter was written by the Hon'ble Chief Minister Haryana to Hon'ble Minister of Water Resources, River Development and Ganga Rejuvenation, Government of India on dated 11.01.2018 for early clearance of ISBIG scheme at the level of Government of India, so that objectives of "Har Khet Ko Pani" can be achieved. In response to the above said D.O. letter, Hon'ble Minister for Jal Shakti, Government of India vide D.O. letter dated 09.07.2019 has informed that "ISBIG is under process of approval. Expenditure Finance Committee has approved it for a restricted CCA extent of 50 lakh ha. at an estimated cost of Rs. 30,485 crore. The process for obtaining Cabinet approval was accordingly initiated. Once the Cabinet approval is obtained, the ISBIG Scheme shall become operational".

Hon'ble Chief Minister Haryana again written a D.O. letter to Hon'ble Minister for Jal Shakti, Government of India on dated 14.01.2020 for early clearance of ISBIG scheme at the level of Government of India, so that objectives of PMKSY-"Har Khet Ko Pani" can be carry forward. In response to the above D.O. letter, Hon'ble Minister for Jal Shakti, Government of India vide D.O. letter dated 24th June, 2020 has informed that "In the wake of COVID-19 and the emerging unprecedented demand on public financial resources Government of India has decided that no new proposal for a scheme/sub-scheme, whether under delegated powers to Administrative Ministry including SFC proposals or through EFC would be initiated this year (FY 2020-21) except the proposals announced under the Pradhan Mantri Gareeb Kalian Package, Atma Nirbhar Bharat Abhiyan package and any other special packages/announcement. Hence the case for Cabinet approval of ISBIG will be taken up by the Ministry as soon as COVID-19 situation gets normalized."

However, PMKSY-HKKP component is being implemented by MICADA through state fund. During the last Financial Year 2022-23, an amount of Rs. 128.74 crore were spent with physical achievement of about 80 thousand acre area against the approved outlay of Rs. 215.10 crore and physical target of 90 thousand acre area. An outlay of Rs. 200.00 crore has been approved by Finance Department for implementation of regular activities of MICADA during the current financial year 2023-24.

### 2. PMKSY-Per Drop More Crop (PDMC)

Micro irrigation started in Haryana under mission mode in 2006-07. From the April, 2021 the micro irrigation component of PMKSY-PDMC is being implemented by MICADA. Earlier this scheme was implemented by the Horticulture/Agriculture Department.

MICADA has introduced a Watercourse Policy 2021 and On-Farm Water Tank Policy 2021 which has been approved by the Government. Accordingly, it has been decided that all the watercourses will be constructed/ rehabilitated according to the Watercourse Policy. To implement the schemes, a unified portal has been launched and Water Users Association (WUA)/ farmers who want their watercourses constructed can apply on the portal. It has also been decided that Government will bear all the expenditure of auxiliary infrastructure of Micro Irrigation component i.e. cost of On-Farm Water Tank, Solar Pump and MI Systems; farmers shall have to pay only 15% of the cost of micro irrigation equipment for the works to be executed under project mode.

In case, farmer/ group of farmers opts to excavate the On-Farm Water Tank at his/their own level, then 70% / 85% subsidy is to be provided to him/ them as per the On-Farm Water Tank Policy-2021. Similarly, on installation of Solar Powered Pump 75% subsidy of the total cost and for installation of Micro Irrigation System, 85% subsidy of the total cost will be provided to the farmers.

As per Haryana Government Policy, there is a subsidy of 85% upon the cost invested/spent by the farmers for micro irrigation implements. The details are tabulated as under:-

The projects could not taken up during 2020-21 due to COVID-19 situation and non-cooperation of majority of farmers for adoption of 100% Micro Irrigation in the CCA of outlet on single tank based system. Therefore, to attract small group of farmers, an On-farm Water-Tank Policy-2021 has been formulated for farmers having land 5 acres to 50 acres (2 acres to 50 acres as per amendment proposed in policy) individually or in a group (assistance @ 85% for community tank and @ 70% for individual farmer) for promotion of MI System taking into consideration of the fact that the farmers are willing to constitute small groups instead of larger

group. Similarly, the MICADA has introduced a Watercourse Policy-2021 for efficient use of surface water through Micro-Irrigation.

The MICADA has developed unified portal i.e. <a href="https://micada.haryana.gov.in">https://micada.haryana.gov.in</a> for providing one step solution to the farmers in a transparent manner for providing assistance on watercourse, on-farm water tank, solar pump and MI equipments. The Water Users Associations (WUAs) who want to get their watercourse constructed can apply online on the portal. It is made mandatory that WUA shall cover minimum 30% of their CCA of outlet on Micro Irrigation; only then their watercourse shall get constructed. Government further decided that it will bear all the expenditure of auxiliary infrastructure of MI Component i.e. cost of on-farm pond, solar pump & MI systems, farmers shall have to pay only 15% of cost of MI systems plus GST for the works to be executed under project mode. The project wise status is as under:-

# i) <u>Project for Installation of Community Based Solar/Grid Powered Integrated Micro Irrigation Infrastructure with On-Farm Micro Irrigation in existing canal commands in various districts of Haryana under NABARD.</u>

To promote micro irrigation system in the fields of farmers, a micro irrigation project with an estimated cost of Rs 189.46 crore for bringing 22,555 acre CCA of 13 districts namely Hisar, Fatehabad, Sirsa, Bhiwani, Kaithal, Karnal, Kurukshetra, Sonipat, Rohtak, Jhajjar, Jind, Rewari and Mahendragarh under Micro Irrigation Fund — NABARD was approved by NABARD on 30.06.2020. But projects could not taken up during 2020-21 due to COVID-19 situation and non-cooperation of majority of farmers for adoption of 100% Micro Irrigation in the CCA of outlet on single tank based system. Now, new outlets have been identified and Administrative approval for execution of work on 28 outlets has been received from Government. The works of 28 outlets costing to Rs. 190.08 crore have been awarded to the successful bidders and work on these sites is under progress.

## ii) Project for installation of Community Based Solar/ Grid Powered Micro-Irrigation Infrastructure in Kheri Distributory under PPP Mode.

The micro irrigation project under PPP Mode with an estimated cost of Rs. 399.97 crore was approved under the MIF. Under this project, 57,353 acre CCA of Hisar, Fatehabad and Sirsa district was to be brought under micro irrigation. The beneficiaries of the area are using canal water as flood irrigation and reluctant to adopt the concept of Micro Irrigation over their farm fields. As per the survey conducted by MICADA only 14 % farmers have given consent for installation of Micro Irrigation (Drip/Sprinkler sets) over their fields. Because of the reason it is

very difficult to execute this project on the approved outlets. Therefore, MICADA have identified new outlets where farmers are willing to adopt micro irrigation on their fields. Administrative approval for execution of work on 72 outlets has been received from Government with an estimated amount of Rs. 392.20 crore. The works of 42 outlets costing to Rs. 223.53 crore have been awarded to the successful bidders and work on these sites is under progress.

# iii) Project Estimate for installation of community based solar / grid powered integrated micro irrigation infrastructure with on farm micro irrigation of existing STPs in various Districts of Harvana State.

The project at a total cost of Rs. 490.53 crore for coverage of 58,397 acre area under MI was approved under the MIF during the year 2020-21. The projects could not taken up during 2020-21 due to COVID-19 situation and non-cooperation of majority of farmers for adoption of treated water through STP for irrigation. Now, Administrative Approval of all the 27 STP's has been accorded by the Government and tender for 20 STPs amounting to Rs. 285.00 crore have been approved and work stand started on the ground. The tendering work of remaining STPs is under process.

## iv) Project for On Farm Water Management through installation of micro irrigation systems in Haryana under Micro Irrigation Fund (MIF).

Project for On Farm Water Management through installation of micro irrigation systems in Haryana under Micro Irrigation Fund (MIF) was approved with an estimated cost of Rs 112.84 crore for bringing 1,02,445 acre area under MI during 2019-20 to 2020-21. The pilot projects to be executed at HLRDC Farm Hansi and at Baroji village of Nuh district with a cost of Rs. 15.00 crore and Rs. 2.06 Crore were not started by the Agriculture Department in the year 2020-21. As the PMKSY scheme has been transferred in the I&WR Department and now being implemented by MICADA. These projects were could not be implemented as per schedule due to various reasons. The pilot project which was executed at HLRDC Farm Hansi Farm has been recommended to be dropped due to some administrative /technical reasons. MICADA has also proposed to extend the project period upto 31.03.2024.

Another part of the project for providing additional top-up subsidy for 1,02,445 acre area was also approved at a total cost of Rs. 95.78 crore as MIF. Out of which, an amount of Rs. 46.26 crore has been claimed under MIF as top up subsidy for an area of 59053 acre. The claim for Rs. 24.62 crore has been submitted to Government of India for releasing the same against the physical achievement of 64,905 acre area and process for claiming of remaining amount has been processed.

## AGENDA Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP) ITEM No. 19 (Industries and Commerce Department)

Government of India has launched Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme on 15<sup>th</sup> August 2008. The main objectives of this scheme are to provide employment opportunities for setting up venture in Micro Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME). This scheme is implemented through State Director, Khadi and Village Industries Commission, Ambala Cantt., State Khadi and Village Industries Board and District Industries Centers in the State by the Directorate of Industries & Commerce. Under this Scheme 25% of the project cost in rural area and 15% of the project cost in urban Area will be provided as subsidy to the General categories applicant, 10% of the project cost will be contributed by the beneficiary of the general category as an equity participation, 35% of the project cost in rural area and 25% of the project cost in urban area will be provided as subsidy to the SC/ST/ OBC, Minority, Ex-Serviceman, Woman, Physical Handicap. 5% of the project cost is to be contributed by the beneficiary as equity participation.

District level Monitoring Committee (DLMC) under the Chairmanship of District Magistrate/Deputy Commissioner/Collector will be setup in each district to monitor Performance of PMEGP in their district on quarterly basis and submit report to Administrative Secretary Industries. The Committee will be constituted with following composition:

#### ITEM No. 20 (MINES & GEOLOGY DEPARTMENT)

 a. In this point/decision 03 issues has been mentioned. The reply on the same issue wise is as under;

#### A. Illegal Mining:-

- The State Government to control/curb the incidents of illegal mining and to review the action taken on the incident of illegal mining vide orders dated 28.03.2007 has constituted District Level Task Force Committee (DLTFC) under the Chairmanship of District Collector Concerned. The SP, TFO, ROHSPCB, DTO are the members of the Committee and Mining Officer is the Member Sectary. The following are the function of the DLTF Committee;
  - To collect/review the information/cases to be issue relating to the illegal mining within their jurisdiction
  - The action taken in this regard to be communicated to the Chairman
  - To ensure the compliance of the terms and conditions of the auction notices, agreement deed and also the working as per scheme of mining by the contractors within their jurisdiction
  - Any other work assigned by the State Government/State level Task Force.
  - II. The State Government in order to monitor the function /working of the District Level Task Force vide orders dated 30.12.2009 has constituted the State Level Task Force Committee under the Chairmanship of Chief Secretary Haryana. The Administrative Sectaries of Environment Department, Transport Department, Forest Department, Mines and Geology Department, DGP Haryana, Regional Controller Indian Bureau of mines of the Committee and the Director Mines and Geology is the member Secretary of the committee. The following are the functions of the State Level Task Force.
    - Review the action taken by the District Level Task Force constituted under the Chairmanship of respective Deputy Commissioners for checking the incidents of illegal mining in their respective jurisdiction.
    - Action taken by the State Government on the cases of illegal mining referred by the Indian Bureau of Mines or any other authority, public complaint and new item or court order, if any.

### Agenda for the meeting of the State Level DISHA Committee

- Review the coordination between the various departments on the pending issues relating to mining/illegal mining in the State.
- Any other relevant matter or issues referred by the Central Government or State Government related to mining.
- III. In the light of above, it is submitted that to control illegal mining proper mechanism in its place at district level as well as State level. Hence, appropriate action is being taken collectively by all the members of the DLTF Committee as well as SLTF Committee to curb incidents of illegal mining in the State. The summary of the total vehicles seized in the offence of illegal mining throughout the State w.e.f. 28.08.2019 to 28.02.2023 is as under and district wise detailed is attached (Annexure A).

# B. To prevent the falling of water table due to mining and piezometer should be installed at mining site.

- i. The Mining Department as per the provisions Haryana Minor Mineral Concession, Stocking, Transportation and Prevention of Illegal Mining Rules, 2012 grants the mineral concession through transparent mode of competitive bidding process. The mineral concession at present is being granted for riverbed mining as well as for stone mining. The following is discussed and this behalf;
  - a) Riverbed mining:- in case of riverbed mining, mining is allowed only within the central 3<sup>/4th</sup> width of the river/rivulet and is allowed only upto a depth of 3 meters from the un-mined bed level at any point of time.
  - b) Stone alongwith associated with Minor Mineral Mine:-In case of stone / hillock mining, is allowed up to 2 meter of the ground water table and no mining is allowed below this level (2 meter above ground water) unless a specific permission is obtain from the competent authority by the mineral concession holder.

- ii. In the light of above it is submitted that the falling of water table due to mining operations is factually incorrect as has been stated above that no ground water table is intersected while undertaking mining operations.
- C. Installation of piezometer at mining site: The piezometers are required to monitor the ground water level table in any area. It is submitted here that as per the condition of Environment Clearance granted by the competent authority in respect of mining operations being undertaken in stone along with associated minor mineral areas/ mine, as per one of the condition of EC the project proponent is required to monitor and maintain the ground water level by installation of new piezometer in consultation with Central Ground Water Authority/ State Ground Water Department. Hence, this subject matter pertains to HSPCB as well as Irrigation Department-being ground water cell as its sister concerns.
- D. Finding solution to raise the underground water table- As has been stated above, that while undertaking mining operations, the ground water table of the area is not being intersected unless permission from the Central Ground Water Board/ State Ground Water Board is obtained. Therefore, change of general ground water level of any area pertains to Ground Water Department/Irrigation Department being technical department in this behalf.
- b. To construct road along mines areas up to 5 km to be maintained by contractors of the mines- The State Government as per the provisions of the mines and mineral (Development and Regulation) Act, 1957 has framed the Haryana District Mineral Foundation Trust, 2017 on 19.12.2017. As per which District Mineral Foundation Trust have been constituted under the Chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner concerned, in the districts where mining operations are being carried out by the mineral concession holders. The DMF account have been opened in an interest bearing account of the nationalize banks. The mineral concession holder till 03.05.2021 were under obligation to deposit an additional amount of 10% of the contract money/dead rent/ royalty payable by them to "Mines & Mineral's Development, Restoration & Rehabilitation Fund" (MMDR &RF). Apart from this the State Government also contributed 5% of the amount received by it on account of dead rent/royalty/contract money in any financial year to this fund.

The 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the total amount received under MMDR Fund in respect of minor mineral was being transfer to the respective DMF/DMF-District. However, after 03.05.2021 with the amendment in State Rules now the Mineral Concession Holder have to deposit

7.5% of the due contract money/dead rent/royalty in the R&R Fund and 2.5% in the respective DMF and similarly the State has to contribute 2.5% of the total amount of dead rent/contract money/ royalty received, towards R&R Fund and 2.5% towards DMF.

Coming to the objective of the DMF, it is submitted that the objective of DMF is to undertake works related to welfare of people of mining affected areas and person which is in principle have the objective of the Central Government Yojna namely "Pradhan Mantri Khanij Khetra Kalyan Yojna" and the funds of the DMF are being broadly utilized for the same purpose. The DMF Trust of the district review and approve the works to be undertaken in any mining affected areas at their own, however, the department vide DO letter dated 28.07.2022 have requested all the Deputy Commissioners for utilizing of DMF Fund for the development and repairmen of the roads with in radius of 5 Km of the mining areas so that local people don't suffer on account of damages to the roads due to transportation of mining material by heavy vehicle.

c. To ensure 10% share of gram panchayat to be given in all district to cover up the mining charges- In this regard it is submitted that here the 10% share is being referred to the compensation amount being settled mutually between the surface owner and the mineral concession holder. In this regard, it is submitted here that as per the provisions of the State Rule, 2012 contained under Chapter 9 "Payment of rent and compensation to the landowners and determination" thereof has been given.

As per rule 63 under the said chapter of the State Rules, 2012, Mutual settlement of rent and compensation for the land used for mining is in place. The amount of annual rent and the compensation is to be settled mutually between the landowner and the mineral concession holder.

63A. Fixation of annual rent and compensation by Government.— In case where no agreement is reached by way of mutual settlement between land owner and mineral concession holder, the Government may fix and notify the rate of annual rent and compensation, to be paid by the mineral concession holders to the landowners for area granted on mineral concession for mining under these rules."

As per rule 64. Determination of fair market rent, if not mutually settled between the parties.

(1) Where no agreement is reached by way of mutual settlement between the landowner and the mineral concession holder regarding the rate of rent, the mineral concession holder shall offer to pay an amount equal to two percent of the Collector

rate or at such rate as may be notified by the Government as per rule 63A in respect of such land /area, whichever is higher, as rent.

- (2) Where the land owner is not agreeable for a mutual settlement under rule 63 and is also not satisfied with the rent offered to be paid under sub-rule (1) above, the landowner or the concession holder may apply to the officer-in-charge of the concerned district to make a reference to the District Collector for determination of the fair rent payable in respect of such land.
- (3) Where either of the parties prefer a reference to the District Collector under subrule (2) above, the officer-in-charge of the concerned district shall forward the reference to the District Collector for determination of the fair market rent in respect of such land. The mining officer-in-charge of the district shall also require the mineral concession holder to deposit the rent for one year as prescribed under sub-rule (1) above as a tentative rent with the Collector. Upon so doing, the mineral concession holder shall be entitled to commence mining operations over the said land area.
- (4) Upon a reference from the mining officer-in-charge of the district concerned, the District Collector may call upon the parties to furnish the details of their claims and counter claims, inter alia, containing information on the parameters prescribed under sub-rule. (5) of this rule and afford an opportunity of hearing to the parties. As per rule 65. Determination of Compensation.
- (1) In addition to the rent settled between the parties under rule 63 or determined and payable under rule 64, the landowner would also be entitled to payment of a fair and reasonable compensation for any damage caused to such land in respect of the area under actual mining operations.
- (2) "In cases where the amount of compensation is not mutually settled between the parties under rule 63, the tentative amount of compensation shall be equal to an amount 0.5 % of the collector rate in case of riverbed mining and/ or 1% of collector rate in all other cases (except Riverbed mining) or at the rate of an amount of compensation, as notified by the Government under rule 63 A, whichever is higher.
- (3) Where the landowner or the mineral concession holder is not agreeable to accept the amount of compensation prescribed under sub-rule (2) above, either of them may seek a reference through mining officer-in-charge to the District Collector for determination of fair and reasonable compensation with reference to the damage or injury caused to such land. Pending a decision by the District Collector on such

reference by either of the parties, the mineral concession holder shall deposit the tentative compensation amount for one year with the District Collector in accordance with subrule (2) above, where after the concession holder shall be entitled to operate the area.

(4) Upon a reference from the officer-in-charge, of the district concerned, the District Collector shall proceed to determine the fair compensation amount on account of any damage likely to be caused to such land on account of the mining operations. The Collector shall invite claims, counter claims, and afford an opportunity of hearing to the parties before determining the compensation amount.

In view of above, it is submitted that the settlement of compensation and/or rent even in case of Gram panchayat is to be done mutually, however, in case of any disagreement either of the party can approach the concerned Deputy Commissioner through the mining officer for fixation of the same qua amount of compensation and/or rent and this department in general has no rule to play qua ensuring of the deposition of compensation amount.

The points directed to the department in the last meeting held on 22.08.2022 under the Chairmanship of Hon'ble Chief Minister, Haryana and Co-Chairman Hon'ble Development & Panchayats Minister, Haryana were conveyed to the Concerned Deputy Commissioner vide letter Memo. No. 2764 dated 19.05.2023 alongwith directions to strictly compliance of the points mentioned to the Assistant Mining Engineer/Mining Officer.

### AGENDA Chief Post Master General Haryana Circle, Ambala

#### ITEM No. 21 (Post and Telegraph Department, Ambala)

- 1. Construction of Building for Post Office:- One of the reasons for delay in construction of Post office buildings is approvals which are to be given by agencies of State Govt. For example, it is proposed to construct Post Office building in M Black, South City-I in Gurgaon. Approval for construction of building was pending from the year 2019 from HSVP, Gurgaon. This matter had been continuously taken up through correspondence and personal level too. After persistent visits of SSPOs Gurgaon, now HSVP Gurgaon has sought allotment letter. The matter of allotment of plot has now been taken up with HSVP Panchkula vide SSPOs Gurgaon DO number D/M-Block/South City-1 dated 09.03.2023.
- 2. Postal Services in Developing Cities:- Gurgaon, Faridabad etc cities are developing at a fast pace. Adequate space is required for construction/opening of Post Offices at these places. It has come to notice that developers provision space for post offices in these places but Department of Posts is not aware about these places. Department of Posts be provided suitable places for establishing post offices in these developing areas and provision of Post Offices be made in privately developed areas. Information be provided to the Department.
- 3. It is mandatory to install post boxes on the ground floor for all the occupants of multi-storied buildings as per Rule 9 of Haryana Municipal Building Bye Laws 1982. Multi-storied buildings in Gurgaon, Faridabad, Panchkula and such like cities are without post boxes which creates hinderance in delivery of mails. Necessary action for compliance of this rule be taken. This matter has already been taken up by this office on 12/12/2022. A meeting was also held with Additional Chief Secretary to Govt. of Haryana, Town, Country Planning and Urban estate Deptt. Govt. of Haryana, response is awaited.
- 4. Sukanya Samriddhi Account scheme under Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao:- This is a scheme for benefit of the girl child. Post Offices in some states have opened accounts of girl child by entering into agreement with State Govt. Accounts of all girl children are opened in Karnataka under 'Bhagya Lakshmi Yojna and State Govt. deposits a fixed amount in these accounts at least once a year. Girl child of Haryana can also be benefitted by following above practice.

Suggestion has been given to Government of Haryana vide this office letter no SBCC/SSA/Pro/2021-22-dated 27/02/2023.

### AGENDA NATIONAL RURAL DRINKING WATER PROGRAMME (NRDWP) ITEM No. 23 (PUBLIC HEALTH & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT)

Under Jal Jeevan Mission, Haryana State has provided water tap connections to all the 30.41 lac households in the rural areas by 06.04.2022. Haryana is one of the foremost states in this target, much before the National Target pegged at 31.03.2024.

The State is now engaged in strengthening the facilities wherever required to ensure functionality of water taps, supply drinking water at a minimum norm of 55 LPCD with quality conforming to BIS 10050 apart from ensuring regularity in supply of drinking water.

The functionality of the water taps is being monitored in the field and the Government of India has also engaged third party inspection across the State, so as to adjudge the functionality of water taps. The mandate of Government of India is to ensure adequate and safe drinking water access to all households in the villages. Socitial pressure has to be built up gradually and every family in the rural area needs to be made aware on the use of safe drinking water and its consequential health benefits, apart from leading to empowerment and economic growth.

ITEM No. 24 (PWD B&R Department)

#### Achievement in PMGSY-I Scheme:-

▶ 426 Nos. Road works were allocated under PMGSY-I Scheme, starting from Phase-I (Year 2000) to Phase IX (Year 2009) stand already completed. Further, PMGSY-I Scheme stands physically and financially closed. An expenditure of Rs.1394.43 Croreshave been incurred so for in PMGSY-I Scheme.Total length of Roads up-graded under PMGSY-I Scheme is 4565.224 Kms.

#### Achievement in PMGSY-II Scheme:-

- PMGSY-II Scheme was sanctioned by the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), Govt. of India on 5<sup>th</sup> May, 2014. The Scheme was consisting of 83 Nos. road works (involving length of 989.330 kms. at a cost of Rs. 877.93 Crores), and 18 Nos. Bridge Work (involving length of 653.200mts. at a cost of Rs. 39.52 Crores).
- Till now, 83 Nos. road works (length achieved 963.198 kms.) have been completed at an expenditure of Rs.747.28 Crores and 18 Nos. Bridge Works have been completed (length achieved 653.200 m.) at an expenditure of Rs. 33.86 Crores.

#### MoRD Sanction against Length Savings of PMGSY-II:-

MoRD had sanctioned **05 Nos. Road** Project proposals under **PMGSY-II** (Batch-I, 2016-17), involving length of **52.910 kms** at a cost of **Rs. 39.16 Crores**. Now, **5 Nos. Road** Works stand completed and a length of **52.540 kms** have been achieved at an expenditure of **Rs. 26.60 Crores**.

#### Achievement in PMGSY-III Scheme:-

- ➤ PMGSY-III Scheme has been launched by Hon'ble Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India, Sh. NarinderTomarHon'ble Minister of Rural Development on dated **17.12.2019**. An indicative allocation of length of **2500 Kms** has also been made by the Ministry of Rural Development for a period of **5 years (2019-2024)**.

- with a length of 1216.946 Kms costing Rs.549.51 Cr. (Centre Share Rs.328.43 Cr. & State Share Rs.221.08 Cr.) in 14 Nos. Districts.
- Further, Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India has issued the clearance letter No.17024/8/2019-RC (369627) dated 29th March, 2022. 56 Nos. Road Works having a length of 590.448 Kms costing Rs.282.92Crores (Centre Share Rs.166.78 Cr. & State Share Rs.116.14 Cr.) in15 Nos. Districts. Out of 56 Nos. Works, tenders for 48 Nos. Works standsallotted and tenders for remaining 08 Nos. Works are under the process of allotment.
- Against, the total sanctioned length of 2496.331 Kms (688.937 + 1216.946 + 590.448) stands allotted for Batch-I, Batch-II of 2020-21&Batch-I of2021-22, the length of 2018.237 Kms stands completed with an expenditure of Rs.889.03 Crores up-to 31.03.2023.

#### Agenda DIGITAL INDIA LAND RECORDS MODERNIZATION PROGRAMME (DILRMP)

### Item No.25 (REVENUE DEPARTMENT – LAND RECORDS) DILRMP Implementation in Harvana

#### 1. Introduction to Digital India Land Records Modernization Programme (DILRMP)

To improve accessibility, stop manipulation and enhance efficiency of the land record system. Govt of India has launched NLRMP (National Land Record Modernization Programme) in 2008-09; it was renamed as DILRMP (Digital India Land Records Modernization Programme) during 2014-15, with a primary objective of end-to-end computerization of land records and subsequently migration from existing presumptive titling system to conclusive titling system. The State of Haryana has integrated land records and registration process. The Integrated Property Registration System (HARIS) and Land Records Management System (HALRIS) have been implemented in all Tehsils/Sub-Tehsils. The uniqueness of Haryana's Integration is that the e-System on-line verifies the ownership and share of the Transferer. It is not possible to sell a same piece of land, multiple times, without sanctioning mutations.

#### 2. Web-HALRIS (Web Based Haryana Land Records Information System)

Haryana's Vision is to migrate from the existing 'presumptive land titling system' to the 'conclusive land titling system', where the government gives guarantee of the land title. Innovations in technology can help in making it easier to map, document and maintain records of rights of land with greater transparency and at lower costs, backed with appropriate governance & legal reforms.

To realize this vision, as a technological mile stone, the web based integrated Land Records and Deed Registration software (named as Web-HALRIS) has been developed, which covers integration of Jamabandi, Mutation, Nakal, Administration, KhasraGirdawari, Deed Registration, Deed Scanning, and Mutation Scanning. Web-HALRIS has been implemented in all the 143 Tehsils/sub Tehsils.

#### **Computerization of Registration**

Under Computerization of Registration, Haryana has integrated following functionalities:

a) E-Registration Web enabled Appointment Management System: Implemented e-Registration, like in Passport/Visa Seva across the State. This system facilitates Issuance of Appointments for Deed Registration, online appointment through Internet, appointment through CSCs (Atal SewaKendras), and a provision of Tatkal Appointments. Established Help Desks regarding Stamp Duty & Collector rates, facility for deed preparation using Standard Deed Templates. Regular monitoring & review with DCs has helped in achieving same day

- delivery of registered deeds as per RTSA. The delivery of registered deeds in the State during FY 2021-22 was almost 99.9%. State has achieved the average delivery same day.
- b) e-Stamping in e-Registration: HARIS got integrated with e-GRAS (Government Receipts Accounting System). Citizen can pay stamp duty using Internet Banking, Debit/ATM Cards, by paying in Bank and generate e-Stamp paper using e-GRAS web portal. e-Stamping has been mandated for all registrations across Haryana, with effect from 1st March 2017, having stamp value more than Rs. 100/-. The Property Registration system verifies & fetches the details of e-Stamp and Government Receipt Number (GRN) number from e-GRAS server. After the deed registration, the e-Stamp and GRN number are defaced automatically (unique facility not available in other States). e-Stamping Rules and SoP (Standard Operating Procedure) for using e-Stamping has been notified. The e-Stamping in deeds during FY 2022-23 was 100% in the State.
- c) Citizen Services Portal: Online access to the scanned registered deeds. Information about Property Registration, Collector Rates, Registered Deeds, Jamabandi, Mutations, Revenue Collection and Urdu terminology glossary etc. Search facility for ULB, HUDA, HSIIDC urban properties. All documents downloaded from <a href="https://www.jamabandi.nic.in">www.jamabandi.nic.in</a> have been made legally valid.
- d) **Stamp Duty Calculator:** A stamp duty calculation software has been developed and hosted in public domain for the investors under EoDB, on the web portal <a href="http://jamabandi.nic.in">http://jamabandi.nic.in</a>. The software also facilitates calculation of Registration fee.
- e) Integration of Area Under Section 7A of Haryana Development and Regulation of Urban Areas Act, 1975: The Software got developed in consultation with Town & Country Planning Department, provision of Haryana Development & Regulation of Urban Areas Act, 1975 and amendments of April 2017 and September 2020, got integrated with HARIS, to meet the requirements of NoC under said section 7-A. The software has been rolled-out in all districts.
- f) It is a matter of pleasure that for making the registration process simpler via e-application mode, for registration of agricultural land in rural areas; land registration process in urban and rural areas commenced in August, 2020.
- g) Stamp fees have been reduced from Rs.2000/- to Rs.100/- for farmers exchanging credit from banks, giving tremendous relief to farmers.

### 3. Web-HALRIS (Integrated Land Records & Registration System) Recognitions & Achievements

- 1) Haryana has become the front runner state in India, in integration of Property Registration with internal and external entities to facilitate EoDB (Ease of Doing Business), enhancing authenticity and security of data and bringing utmost transparency in the system. The impact of this integration are:
  - a) The system has improved the quality of service in Tehsils by reducing the total time taken by the Tehsils staff for registration. Now documents are returned same day to the public earlier sometimes it took weeks/months to get a registered deed.
  - b) On-line availability of Updated Nakal of ROR (Record of Right) to the public helps in reduction of litigations and frauds, as now it is not possible to sell a same piece of land to multiple parties/peoples. All documents downloaded from <a href="https://www.jamabandi.nic.in">www.jamabandi.nic.in</a> have been made legally valid.
  - c) The system has also reduced undervaluation of deeds under section 47-A of Indian Stamp Act, 1899, as amended by Haryana State in the year 2020to a considerable extent. It was a common practice to register an undervalued deed, which has since been curtailed.
  - d) System has also reduced the mutation pendency to great extent as in online environment, one cannot sell the land without sanctioning the mutation. So, this has stopped the practice of doing the deed registration on the basis of registered deeds.
  - e) System has also helped the patwaris in the preparation of new jamabandis on time. Earlier, it took months to prepare and check the new jamabandi but now it is matter of 10-15 days only.

#### 2) Transactions Volumes:

- a) During 2018-19, the department has issued 7,68,393 e-Appointments, and 6,46,733 deeds were registered. 100% registered deeds were delivered.
- b) During 2019-20, department has issued 8,40,145 e-Appointments and 6,79,740 deeds were registered. 100% registered deeds were delivered. 99.97% delivery of the deeds was within the RTSA (Right to service Act) time lines.
- c) During 2020-21, department has issued 7,04,552 e-Appointments, and 5,09,563 deeds were registered. 100% registered deeds were delivered. 99.99% delivery of the deeds was within the RTSA (Right to service Act) time lines.

- d) During 2021-22 (01.04.2021 to 31.03.2022), 9,68,556 appointments were issued, 9,30,314 deeds were registered, 100% registered deeds have been delivered.
- e) During 2022-23 (01.04.2022 to 31.03.2023), 10,71,281 appointments were issued, 7,49,123 deeds were registered, 100% registered deeds have been delivered.

#### 3) Financial Savings:

- a) Income under Head 0030-Stamp & Registration for the year 2018-19 to 2022-23.
- b) The collection of registration fee & stamp duty in the year 2018-19 was Rs. 5679.45 Crore, which was Rs. 1414.27 Crore higher than 2017-18 (more than 33%).
- c) During the financial year 2019-20, an amount of Rs.6100.26 Crore have been collected till 31/03/2020, which is Rs. 420.81 Crore higher than 2018-19,(more than 7%), showing a positive trend, even after lockdown and stoppage of deeds registration in June, 2020 for updation of new Web-HALRIS.
- d) During the financial year 2020-21, an amount of Rs. 5139.30 Crores have been collected till 31/03/2021, which is Rs. 960.96 Crore lower than 2019-20 (Lower than 15%), due to COVID and implementation of Web-HALRIS updation.
- e) During the financial year 2021-22, an amount of Rs. 8490.57 Crores have been collected till 31/03/2022, which is Rs. 3351.27 Crore higher than 2020-21 (more than 65%), Income increased due to implementation of Web-HALRIS and proper implementation of Collector rates.
- f) During the current financial year 2022-23, an amount of Rs. 10394.25 Crore have been received till 31/03/2023, which is Rs. 1903.68 Crore higher than 2021-22 (more than 22%), The trend of income is on higher side due to proper monitoring by the Revenue Department to review of Collector rate and link with Web-HALRIS with other department such as ULB, T.C.P, HSVP, HSIIDC, Housing Board etc.
- 5) The component-based Web-HALRIS received BW Business world Digital India Award-2019 on 28<sup>th</sup> June 2019.
- 6) The Web-HALRIS has also been published as Best Practice of India by Department of Administrative Reforms & Public Grievances, Government of India in its e-Book, titled, "Minimum Government Maximum Governance".
- 7) The Web-HALRIS received the national e-Governance Awards 2019-20 of the Computer Society of India Special Interest Group (CSI SIG) on 17<sup>th</sup> January, 2020 at Bhubaneswar (Orissa).

8) A delegation of the administrative officers of the Government of Bangladesh visited Haryana (Jhajjar) on 05<sup>th</sup> September 2018 to study the Web-HALRIS. The delegation appreciated the system.

#### 4. Tablets based e-Girdawari

- The e-Girdawari Mobile Application was developed. The Sim-card-based Tablets have been given to all Patwaris for conducting e-Girdawari. Using these Tablets, Kharif 2018 season Girdawari was conducted in one Tehsil of each district covering 500+ villages.
- 2) Training was imparted by NIC-DICs (District Informatic Centres) to all Patwaris and required preparedness has been completed. One Assistant was provided to all Patwaris for assisting in Tablet based e-Girdawari.
- 3) Thereafter, in the Rabi 2019 & Kharif-2019 seasons, the e-Girdawari was extended to cover all Tehsils and Sub Tehsils.
- 4) The innovation in the e-Girdawari App was that it captures GPS coordinates, ensuring, and actual physical presence of Patwari at the field, which can help in reduction of compensation disputes.
- 5) Now, e-Girdawari has been implemented in all Tehsils and Sub Tehsils.
- 6) e-Girdawari data is also shared with the MFMB.

#### 5. DILRMP State Level Data Centre:

- The hosting requirements (Compute Servers & System Software and SAN storage) for Web-HALRIS at HSDC (Haryana State Data Centre) & Manpower resources were worked out, amounting to Rs. 4.33 Crores.
- 2) For establishment of Co-Location Land Records State Data Centre at HSDC (Compute-Servers & System Software and SAN Storage, the required infrastructure for hosting Web-HALRIS at HSDC, in a cloud environment has been procured by the Revenue Department, from state funds.
- 3) The DR (Disaster recovery) site & Data Centre Management professional Manpower are also being arranged by the office of DLR Haryana.

#### 6. Modern Revenue Record Room

#### 6.1 Benefits MRRRs at District Level & State Head Quarters

Various Revenue Records like Jamabandis, Mutations, Part Sarkar, MislHaqiyat, Field Books, Musavvis, Revenue Court Cases Judgments & Orders etc. in various sizes and various languages etc. arein existence. In order to preserve this valuable land records, the Government of Haryana

has initiated the project of establishment of Modern Revenue Record Rooms and conversion of physical revenue records into digital format. There will be two broad processes to carry out (i) Setting up of Modern Revenue Records Room (MRRR), (ii) Weeding out, Scanning, Indexing, Digitization, storage, and retrieval of the land records.

The Modern Revenue Record Rooms are being set up at each District level of the State and two places at the State Head Quarter in Chandigarh. After scanning/ digitization of Revenue Records, the physical documents are stored in Galvanized Metal Boxes and placed in Heavy Duty Customized Racking System for longer preservation of physical (paper) records. The MRRR will have e-mail facility, access control, CCTV, Fire Safety System, Racking System and Software for easy and fast tracking of Cartons/Documents using Bar Coding system.

Further, the records lying at Tehsils/ Sub Tehsils, PatwarKhanas, Commissionerate's, DLR & Consolidation Office, Rehabilitation Branches etc. are also scanned and digitized. The Government of Haryana has approved a sum of Rs. 77.00 Crore for this project. The following are the main benefits of scanning/ digitization of records and setting up of Modern Revenue Record Rooms: -

- 1. Safety of valuable records from fire accidents, insects, thefts, and natural calamities like flood etc.
- 2. Security against tampering; once the record is digitized it cannot be temper with.
- 3. The MRRR will have e-mail facility, access control, CCTV, Fire Safety System, Racking System and Software for easy and fast tracking of Cartons/Documents using Bar Coding system.
- 4. The work involves setting up of Modern Revenue Record Room (MRRR), ensuring safe and secure upkeep of the physical records in fire-proof cartons, scanning & digitization of old records, bar coding of records for easy retrieval, retrieval of records in electronic form and supply of original records/scanned copies, as and when demanded by the citizens.
- 5. This will not only help citizens in accessing their old records online but also maintenance of the archival records in a dust free, safe and easily accessible environment.
- 6. No unauthorized access to MRRR; access with secure and well monitored environment.
- 7. Instant access to the records; the physical as well as digital record can be available with a click of mouse.
- 8. To provide time-bound services to the citizens under G2C domain in the form of online delivery of requested copies of records of rights through Internet / Intranet.
- 9. Increased efficiency by reducing the response time to users.
- 10. Preserving physical record for a longer time by proper storage in Galvanized Metal Boxes.
- 11. Detection of old / missing files.
- 12. To get the desired information instantaneously.
- 13. To implement and streamlining the process of Quick Management System (QMS) at the Base Level of Revenue Administration.
- 14. Online e-Services delivery from MRRRs through RRRMS.

- 15. Easy access to old records (once the record is digitized) without causing any damage to the physical records as in some cases the condition of the paper may brittle.
- 16. Overcoming shortage of storage space; proper utilization of space by systematically storage of record. Precious space can be utilized for other important requirements.
- 17. Flexible and fast retrieval of records regardless of archive size /period.
- 18. Ease in RTI compliance where searching of old record is very time consuming process.
- 19. Cost effective method of storage / retrieval and release of manpower deployed presently for the record storage purposes.
- 20. Destruction of old unrequired files / obsolete records from time to time as per the retention policy thereby making space available for other use.
- 21. Department officials have online view of the records.

#### 6.2 Inauguration of MRRR and progress of the project as on 25<sup>th</sup> July, 2022 is as below:

On 22nd November 2021, the modern revenue record rooms across the State were inaugurated in all the districts of Haryana State and have been dedicated to the public. Till 22<sup>nd</sup>May2023, about 33.60 crore pages of revenue records have been scanned all over Haryana, out of which about 29.80 crore pages have already been uploaded on NIC website. Thus scanning, verification and modernization has been completed for all the historical and recently updated records. Presently the documents created under or under updation i.e. Registered Deeds, Mutations and Jamabandi are being modernised.

The scanned documents are thoroughly verified by the revenue staff at the village level. To remove any discrepancy, 100 per cent records have been checked by revenue staff and 20 per cent records by District Revenue Officers, and 10 per cent records by HARTRON.

Now in the second phase of this project, the work of scanning and modernization of revenue records kept in Tehsils, Sub Tehsils, PatwarKhanas, Commissioner Offices and Directorate of Land Records and Consolidation Departmental is under process.

#### 6.3 Modern Revenue Record Rooms at Tehsils / sub-Tehsils levels.

1) At the Tehsil/Sub Tehsil HQ level, the funds were allocated under NLRMP@ Rs. 25 lakh / Tehsil, Sub-Tehsil for 116 Tehsils/sub Tehsils. Now, the Govt. of India has sent a revised rates of components under DILRMP. Thus, the funds of this component will be allotted @ Rs. 30 lakh as per revised rates of Gol. Out of this Rs. 1923.76 Lakh were released. The remaining amount of Rs. 1556.24 Lakh is required for completing for 116 Tehsils/SubTehsils as per the revised rates of Rs. 30.00 lakh for each Tehsil.

- 2) Further, the number of Tehsils / Sub Tehsils in Haryana have increased to 143. And additional funds @ Rs. 30 lakh are required for remaining new 27 Tehsils / Sub Tehsils (Rs. 810.00 Lakh).
- 3) Total funds for the Tehsil level MRRRs are required to the tune of Rs. 2366.24 Lakh (1556.24 + 810.00).

#### 7. Survey / re-Survey and Digitalization of Cadastral Maps.

The Scanning, Digitization of Cadastral Maps, Ground Troothing, Geo Referencing of Cadastral Maps, updating by incorporating all mutations, converting updated maps into Shape (.shp) files and Integration of Spatial &Textual Jamabandi Data is one of the major components of DILRMP. Under the NLRMP project, the scanning & digitization of cadastral records was outsourced to 4 GIS vendors.

The Satellite Imagery on 50 cm resolution were procured during Year 2011-12. The Primary and Secondary Ground Control Network (GCN) was setup in the entire state. The project could not proceed, due to arbitration with the outsourced vendors.

Leveraging the UAV (Unmanned Aerial Vehicle), commonly known as a drone, technology, after taking various approvals, the MoU was signed by Revenue department with Survey of India, for large scale mapping of entire Haryana covering all areas (44,212 square kilometres including Rural, urban, controlled areas and abadi-deh) using Drone imaging, Rovers and CORS Network being the first State of India, to do so, dated on 8<sup>th</sup> March, 2019. Thirty specialized Drones have been procured by SoI under HaLSMP. Government of Haryana has been released SoI for 90 Lakh for purchasing of 10 new drones and Rs. 6.00 Crore for smooth functioning and 9.30 crore has been released for hiring of drone as a Service under LSM Project for Haryana for the year 2021-22. Till now the Government of Haryana released 26.20 Crore for HaLSMP/ SVAMITVA project to Survey of India.

This mapping will facilitate the Government in accurate demarcation of land, detection of changes and identification of encroachments. Under the aegis of Hon'ble Chief Minister and Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister, the Revenue Department has extended this project by making Sirsi village of District Karnal as the first Lal Dora free village in the entire state as well as country. In village Sirsi, the "Title Deed of Property" in laldora had been distributed on January 26, 2020.

In village Sirsi, which is the first Lal Dora free village of the state and the country, on January 26, 2020, "Title Deed of Property" (registered document of land property) was distributed to the

villagers. With the village being made free of Lal Dora, the property situated in Lal Dora of the village has got a special identity, along with the land owners have also got the right of ownership, the disputes related to purchase of the property located in Lal Dora have also been curbed. Till now loans were not given by the banks on the immovable property located in Lal Dora, but due to the ownership rights and registered documents of the property to the land owners under the ownership project, now they will be given loan on the immovable property located in Lal Dora. Haryana is a forerunner in the country in SVAMITVA. Our State has completed drone-based imaging of all Lal Dora villages. Maps have been finalized for all 6260 Lal Dora villages, and 25,18,739 property titles have been conclusively finalized. Out of these 24,14,950 property cards have been distributed in 6259 Lal Dora villages till 24<sup>th</sup>May 2023 and these property cards have been linked with Parivar Pehchan Patra. There have been 51 registrations of sale of such properties within erstwhile Lal Doras. Banks are also recognizing these properties as assets while disbursing loans against them as collateral. Thus far, 136 loans have been disbursed by various banks. This is just the beginning of a new era in property valuation and recognition of these properties as valuable assets.

The Government of India has adopted the initiative of Haryana Large Scale Mapping Project of the State and Hon'ble Prime Minister has launched a nationwide scheme on 24 April, 2020 as 'SVAMITVA' project.

The Central Ministry of Panchayati Raj has initiated the 'SVAMITVA' project in 06 pilot States, i.e., Haryana, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Uttar Pradesh on 30 April, 2020.

On October 11, 2020, the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India had inaugurated the process of making 22 villages Lal Dora free out of 221 villages (one village from each district) of all the 22 district of Haryana state. The remaining 199 villages (Approx. 9 villages per district) were initiated on the same day by the Hon'ble Chief Minister, Haryana, Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister and other Hon'ble Ministers. The mapping and data processing of all 6260 villages Lal Dora has been completed in the State. Out of these, till 24<sup>th</sup> May 2023, 25,18,739 property titles have been conclusively finalized. Out of these 24,14,950 property cards have been distributed in 6259 Lal Dora villages. Efforts are on to expedite the registration process by conducting special drives and holding camps in the villages.

The Revenue Estate areas, i.e., agricultural lands of each village, also require mapping so that accurate location of murabba stones are determined and these are not lost upon land

movement due to any tectonic changes such as earth quakes, land slides etc. Till 23<sup>rd</sup>May 2023, drone based imaging has been completed in 6204 villages in agricultural area or revenue estate. The total project outlay is Rs. 150 Crore. Progress of the SVAMITVA in Haryana is as under: -

**Agenda Point 3:** Trends of Sex Ratio at Birth over the years under Beti Bachao Beti Padhao Programme.

- It was 923, highest so far in the State of Haryana during the year 2019 (January December) with the improvement 52 POINTS in SRB after launch of B3P. It was 871 in the year 2014, (Pre-B3P year).
- All this was considered "beyond imaginable" when this campaign was started aggressively in May 2015.
- 20 Districts had SRB of 900/900+ during year 2019 (except Bhiwani 894).
- Most of the districts now have SRB of 900/900+ except Charki- dadri (870) Narnaul (877),
   Bhiwani (875), Sonipat (879), Panchkula (881), Gurugram (889), Rohtak (894) and Karnal (899).

#### Agenda PRADHAN MANTRI MATRU VANDANA YOJANA (PMMVY)

#### Item No.43 (WOMEN & CHILD DEVELOPMENT)

#### 1. Introduction:

The Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana (PMMVY) is implemented in all the districts of Haryana w.e.f. 01.01.2017. This scheme is one of the flagship programme under which benefit of Rs. 5000/- in three installments is given to pregnant and lactating mother for their first live birth after fulfilling the conditions.

#### 2. Objective of the scheme

- To provide cash incentive for partial compensation for the wage loss so that the woman can take adequate rest before and after delivery of the first child.
- To improve health seeking behaviour amongst the Pregnant Women & Lactating Mothers (PW&LM).
- ▶ The scheme also seeks to promote positive behavioural change towards girl child by providing additional cash incentive for the second child, if that is a girl child.
- **3. Funding pattern**: Sharing basis between Centre and State 60:40

#### 4. Expansion of the scheme:

- (i) The scheme has been expanded by Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India w.e.f from 01.04.2022.
- (ii) The women can avail benefit for the first two living children provided that second child is a girl. In case of the first child the amount of Rs. 5000/- in two installments and for the second child, the benefit of Rs. 6000/- will be provided subject to the second child is a girl child in one instalment after the birth.
- (iii) The new PMMVY 2.0 portal is created by GOI for registrations of eligible beneficiaries in April 2023.
- (iv)This would contribute to improve the sex ratio at Birth and to prevent female foeticide.

#### 5. Implementation process

- AWW/AWH identifies and registers aadhar based data, uploading of relevant documents
  of the eligible beneficiary from their login ids provided by GOI on PMMVY 2.0 portal. The
  beneficiary cases are verified by Ministry WCD, GOI on portal at different levels/checks
  as per the norms of the scheme like validation of aadhar no., Bank account validation
  etc on wards submission to Supervisor.
- Supervisors verifies the data of eligible beneficiaries from their login ids on PMMVY 2.0 portal for onwards submission to WCDPOs.
- The WCDPOs verifies and approve the eligible beneficiary data for payment in portal from their login ids and submit to State Nodal Officer.

 The State Nodal officer approve and initiate the payment after verification from GOI/PFMS. The benefit is transferred through SNA Bank account to the beneficiary's bank account through PFMS (Public Financial Management System) in DBT mode.

#### 7. Grievance Mechanism:

- Complaints are dealt through Government portals like CPGRAM (GOI) and CM Window (State Govt. )
- Monitoring of the scheme has been done at State, District and Block level.
- The day-to-day complaints are handled through hearing of public at the District and block level.

#### 8. State initiative "Mukhya Mantri Matritav Sahayta":

• In Budget Speech 2022-23, Hon'ble Chief Minister has announced to extend the benefit under PMMVY scheme for second live birth @ Rs 5000/- per beneficiary from State Budget. "Mukhya Mantri Matritav Sahayta" scheme for providing maternity benefit to pregnant and lactating mother for the second live birth (boy) in the State. The scheme will be effective from 8.3.2022. The scheme has been approved by Hon'ble CM. The notification of the scheme has been issued vide order dated 21.03.2023. The benefit of the scheme will be given to eligible beneficiary through Saral portal of the State.
