The Ministry of Rural Development superseded the State Vigilance & Monitoring Committee with State Level DISHA Committee on 27.06.2016 for monitoring and implementation of various Centrally Sponsored Schemes. Besides monitoring, the aim is accelerated development through convergence. As per the guidelines, the details of State Level DISHA Committee and District Level DISHA Committee are as under:-

A. State Level DISHA Committee

The State Level DISHA committee of 18th Lok Sabha has been constituted and notification issued on dated 17.2.2025. The Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India has nominated names of 6 MPs vide their letter dated 28.11.2024.

Objective

- To ensure quality of expenditure, particularly in context of optimization of public funds spent under different programmes of Central Govt.
- State & District level Vigilance and Monitoring Committee will monitor the implementation of programmes.
- Elected Representative of people will play the crucial role in reviewing the implementation of programmes
- An effort to improve development, coordination and monitoring within the constitutional framework of responsibility assigned to central, state and local Govt.

Nodal Department

Rural Development Department

Terms of references

As per the guidelines, the State Level Committee will monitor the implementation of various programmes of different Ministries as per the following terms of references:-

- To review the status of decisions taken in District Level DISHA Committee.
- ii. Human Resource Engaged by State Govt. in programmes.
- iii. Constraints and their solution for implementations of programmes.
- iv. Flow of funds.
- v. Timeline related constraints and resolution of any land issues.
- vi. Initiatives for effective delivery of assets.
- vii. Complaints/Irregularities / Misappropriation etc.
- viii. Implementation of DBT and Aadhar seeding.
- ix. Issues concerning to the Central agencies.
- x. Matters pertaining to the Disha committee for MoRD for coordination with other Ministries.

B. District Development Coordination & Monitoring Committee (DISHA)

All the Districts Development Coordination and Monitoring Committees have been constituted with the concerned Hon'ble MPs as Chairperson and Deputy Commissioner as Member Secretary. Following are the members-

- All Members of the State Legislative Assembly elected from the district.
- One representative of the State Govt.
- All Mayors/the Chairpersons of Municipalities (inclusive of at least two women)
- Chairperson of Zila Panchayat
- All Chairpersons of Intermediate Panchayats in the district.
- District level Nodal functionaries of the DISHA Committee.

The Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India vide their letter dated 01.08.2025 has amended certain provisions of DISHA guidelines and also suggested a list of 101 schemes out of which 94 schemes are being implemented in the State to be reviewed in the meeting. A copy of the modifications have been circulated to all the Hon'ble Members of Parliament (MPs), Hon'ble Members of Legislative Assembly (MLAs), Deputy Commissioners (being Member Secretary of the DISHA Committee) and all the Chief Executive Officers, District Rural Development Agencies recently to review the schemes as per the list of suggested schemes in the District Level Disha Committee meetings.

Number of Meetings to be convened:

- The State Level DISHA Committee meeting is to be convened once in every Six months. The last meeting of State Level DISHA Committee was held on 19.02.2025.

- The Chairman highlighted the need to review the agenda, the number of beneficiaries who have availed benefits, the applications in the pipeline for Bee-Keeping and the number of loans sanctioned and subsidies provided for Agri-Clinic & Agriculture **Business** Center.

Animal Husbandry Deptt.

- Coverage under the National Livestock Mission (NLM) needs to be increased and the monitoring mechanism must be enhanced.
- Harvana Livestock Development Board the implementing agency for National Livestock Mission in the State. Department of Animal Husbandry & Dairying Haryana has conducted various trainings and seminars of Deputy Directors, Sub-Divisional Officers and Veterinary surgeons regarding Entrepreneurship Development Schemes under National Livestock Mission (NLM) through Haryana Trainers Training Institute, Hisar for awareness and sensitized the officers to identify eligible beneficiaries to adopt entrepreneurship development schemes under NLM. The lead bank managers of the State also being made aware and sensitized by the department in State Level Bankers Committee meeting and District level Bankers Committee meeting. Moreover, quarterly workshops are also being conducted.

- The Chairman suggested exploring the possibility of competitions among bulls.
- The department has organized State Livestock Shows from time to time under extension activities where elite animals of livestock farmers of the state participate for competition under various categories. However, there is no provision of organizing competition among high quality genetic breed bulls under Progeny Testing (PT) and Pedigree Selection (PS) component of Rashtriya Gokul Mission (RGM) as under the projects the High Genetic Merit male calves are procured and reared for breeding purpose under bio-secured zone. The young bulls under PT and PS project of RGM are under the control of Govt. of India and thereof distribution in young age throughout the country by the Bull Distribution Committee is under the control of Secretary DAHD, Govt. of India. Moreover, the High Genetic merit bulls of private breeders are not covered under Progeny Testing (PT) and Pedigree Selection (PS) component of Rashtriya Gokul Mission (RGM). The Private breeders can use their high genetic breeding bulls for breeding purpose and can sell semen of these bulls after opening private Semen Banks by fulfilling the statutory provisions of "Minimum Standard Protocol for Semen Stations for Prevention and Control of infectious and Contagious Disease through Semen rules, 2023" under the "Prevention and Control of infectious and Contagious Disease in Animals Act, 2009".

- A proposal for a new scheme should be formulated for farmers with an income of less than ₹1,80,000/-, ensuring linkage with PPP. Regular community feedback should be collected and tagging of good-quality cattle must be carried out.
- Following schemes have been covered under Mukhyamantri Antyodaya Parivar Utthan Yojana(MMAPUY)for the farmers with an income of less than Rs.1,80,000/-which are mentioned below:
 - **1.** Providing Employment Opportunities by Establishment Piggery, Sheep & Goat Units (General)
 - 2. Establishment of Backyard Poultry Units
 - **3.** Providing Employment Opportunities to Scheduled Castes
 - **4.** Establishment of Hi-Tech Dairy Units

Under the MMAPUY, the department has established 17644 dairy units of 2 milch animals, 18546 sheep/goat units/ piggery under SCSP, 635 sheep/goat units/piggery under General component and 452 backyard poultry units for the extremely poor families of the state till date. All the above said schemes are on the SARAL portal and for applying under scheme Parivar Pehchan Patra (PPP) ID is mandatory. PPP ID of Beneficiaries has been made mandatory for availing the benefits of Artificial Insemination, OPD and other Departmental services. All Deputy Director, ICDP/AH&D in the State have been directed to collect the regular community feedback from beneficiaries about Departmental schemes so that the same may be sent to Government from time to time, if required.

During the establishment of livestock units under departmental schemes and for insurance of animal and vaccination, regular tagging has been carried out. Furthermore, to identify good quality animals under Department "Scheme for Conservation and Development of Indigenous Cattle and Murrah Development", all the high quality animal recorded under different categories are mandatorily tagged.

Education Department

- Field verification of dropout students to be carried out by teachers and school staff in all districts to identify the reasons for dropouts. They should further be encouraged to rejoin schools, and efforts should be made to reduce the dropout rate through bridge courses.
- In the year 2024-25, a total of 31,068 dropout children were identified. Out of these children:

18,796 were provided special training at 882 centers and 15,386 children were mainstreamed in schools.

For the year 2025-26, to identify dropout students in all districts, surveys were conducted twice- (from 1st to 15th January 2025 and from 1st to 15th April 2025).

Total 33938 school children were identified. These children will be provided training in special training centers in all districts in the State. Some of these centers have been made operational w.e.f. September 2025. After completion of the special training (bridge course) these children will be mainstreamed.

- Emphasis was also laid on teachers to direct students to open bank accounts to avail funds for uniforms.
- In government schools from Class 1 to 8, all students are provided the benefit of cash assistance in lieu of uniforms every year. For this, the Department issues directions to schools at the time of student enrollment to collect complete details related to bank accounts and family ID.

From time to time, the Scholarship Section of the Department also issues directions to all districts to ensure to complete student data on the 'One School App Portal'. This includes completing the procedure of linking with family ID and opening student bank accounts.

- It was mandated that Madarsas and private schools be affiliated with the Bhiwani Board.
- Framing of rules for Madarsas and Gurukuls is in process. Once they will be notified, Madarsas will be given recognition and will be affiliated with Bhiwani Board.

Out of 8499 recognized private schools, 5481 schools are secondary and Senior Secondary level which require Board affiliation. Out of these 5481 schools, 3551 schools are registered with Board of School Education Bhiwani

 The Chairman directed the Education Department to identify and verify dropout rates on a monthly basis and take regular action in case of dropouts.

The dropout rates in the year 2024-25 have decreased substantially in comparison to the previous years as an effort of the steps mentioned below:

- Enrollment drives are conducted in April.
- Linking all enrolled students with their family ID (PPP).
- Data of all students is captured on U-DISE and the State MIS Portal.
- Surveys for tracking Out of School Children conducted
- Hostel facility for girls in rural areas-KGBVs
- Free transport facility scheme for student.
- Girls' transport facility scheme.
- Transport facility in remote areas
- Scholarship for Scheduled Caste (SC) students
- Girls' Education Promotion Scheme
- A committee comprising the Principal Secretary to Government, Haryana, School Education Department; Deputy Commissioner, Faridabad; CEO, Town & Country Director, Planning; and School Education Department be constituted evaluate school Faridabad having more than 5,000 students.
- It was also decided that the committee would transfer HSVP/HUDA land adjacent to the school to the Education Department and initiate construction of a new school.

 For the construction of new school building of Government Senior Secondary School at Sector -37 Faridabad, proposal for land allotment has been approved by the Hon'ble Chief Minister on 21-04-2025 as follows:

"CM has approved the proposal that HSVP may provide the land for construction of School building first and school may be constructed and shifted. The present site of school may be given by HSVP in exchange of the land."

A letter dated 22.04.2025 written to the Chief Administrator, 8 HSVP regarding handing over possession of the proposed land as approved by Hon'ble Chief Minister Haryana.

Now vide office Memo No. 1202 dated 18.09.2025 possession certificate has been issued by HSVP Faridabad and Budget Estimate for construction of new building is under process.

Agenda for the meeting of the State Level DISHA Committee

- Once the new school is constructed, the old school building site would be transferred to HSVP/HUDA.
- Once the school is shifted in new school building, old school building will be transferred to HSVP.
- Identify avenues to increase enrollment in Government schools.
- In the year 2023–24, total enrollment in government schools was 21.78 lakh, which in the year 2024–25 became 21.49 lakh. In the year 2025-26, total enrolment in Govt. schools is 21.68 lakh. Following efforts have been made to increase enrollment in government schools:
- i) 250 PM SHRI schools, 218 Model Sanskriti Schools, and 1420 Primary Model Sanskriti Schools have bene established.
- ii) Free textbooks and uniforms.
- iii) Super 100 programme
- iv) Foundational Literacy and Numeracy
- v) SC and BC students are provided with scholarships.
- vi) Vocational Education in 1381 schools

Citizen Resources Information Department

- 100% of CSC centers to be equipped with broadband.
- The Chairman stressed that review meetings must be conducted regularly to expedite works.

Food Civil & Supplies Deptt.

- Under the Har Ghar Har Grehni Yojna, registration is quite low and must be expedited on priority.
- For the registration of the beneficiaries, a portal (https://epds.haryanafood.gov.in) has been developed.
 To get benefits under the scheme, at present, out of 40.66 lakh, approximate 17.66 lakh beneficiaries have registered themselves on the portal.

An amount of Rs. 107.50 Crore as LPG subsidy has been released to 14.34 lakh BPL/AAY families (approx) into their registered bank accounts who have registered themselves on registration portal and got refill cylinder upto 15.06.2025. Process to release the subsidy amount for 16.6.2025 to 15.08.2025 has been started and will be released shortly.

- The benefits available under the scheme should be advertised through posters, banners, social media, and gas distribution agencies.
- Village level camps are also being organized in all the districts in coordination with concerned Gas Agencies, Banks, CSCs for awareness of beneficiaries.

Health Department

- The Chairman emphasized that TB Mukt Haryana should be achieved by December 2025.
- The TB Mukt Bharat Abhiyan in Haryana has made significant progress in its efforts to eliminate tuberculosis.
- *Vulnerable Population Screening: Approximately 33 lakh individuals have been screened since December 7.
- Screening and Diagnostic Tests:
- X-rays: 1,25,186 individuals have undergone X-ray for screening of active TB
- Microscopy and NAAT: 5,77,915 individuals have been tested using microscopy and Nucleic Acid Amplification Tests (NAAT) for detection of TB.Total 62632 patients has been diagnosed from Jan to Aug 2025 and 94% has been started on treatment.
- TB Mukt Panchayat Initiative: Around 2,500 Panchayats have been identified under this initiative, promoting community involvement in TB elimination efforts.
- Treatment Regimens: 388 patients have been initiated on the newer BPaLM DR-TB regimen, which includes Bedaquiline, Pretomanid, Linezolid, and Moxifloxacin, offering a more effective treatment option for drugresistant TB patients.

- A utility report of ventilators procured during COVID-19 should be prepared and nonfunctional ventilators must be made operational in a timely manner.
- During the COVID-19 pandemic, ventilators were not procured directly by the Department as per the following:-

A significant number of ventilators (727 Nos.) were received through CSR initiatives, donations, PM CARES, and other sources during the COVID-19 outbreak. Out of 727 Nos., 509 nos. are functional and 218 nos. are non –functional. From 1st April 2024 to till date, 1565 number of patients was put on ventilators (Ambala-30, Gurugram-777, Narnaul-28, Panchkula-480, Panipat-26, Yamunanagar-111, Sonepat-2, Rohtak-5 and Sirsa-106). Some Ventilators are not optimally utilized and non-functional due to various reasons r:-

- Non availability of local technical/ maintenance/troubleshooting support (Foreign Aid/CSR). For the same, data is being collected from the districts for finding any alternate source though HMSCL to ensure centralized maintenance.
- Some Ventilators received from various sources are having basic/limited features and not reliable for Critical Care Patients.
- 3. Lack of adequate manpower and infrastructure.

District-wise/institution-wise availability and current utility status of ventilators is at **Annexure - H**

Housing for All Deptt.

- DCs to ensure a review with CEOs, ZP for the completion of geo-tagging and verification of all permanent waiting list beneficiaries.
- The Chairman directed that funds be transferred to all verified beneficiaries on 10th March 2025 and all verification must be completed by then.
- The Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India has allocated a target of 69,325 houses for the FY 2024-25.
 After verification of Permanent waiting list and completion of Geo-tagging of all the eligible beneficiaries,
 1st installment disbursed to 40288 & 2nd installment disbursed to 12,289 beneficiaries.

Further, GoI has been requested for releasing of necessary funds so as to achieve the allocated target.

Irrigation Department (MICADA)

- All pending projects under MICADA must be completed on priority.
- Currently, MICADA is not implementing any projects under the Command Area Development and Water Management (CADWM) Programme, as the scheme has undergone a strategic transformation and has been renamed as the Modernization of Command Area Development (MCAD). The restructured scheme is presently in its pilot phase. According to the Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India, this scheme is expected to be launched in full operational capacity from the upcoming financial year.
- The Chairman encouraged the use of sprinklers and drip irrigation systems.
 - Presently, MICADA is implementing only one Centrally Sponsored Scheme, namely "Per Drop More Crop (PDMC)" under the umbrella of the Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY) since April 2021. 106,637 farmers have been benefited under this scheme so far. To encourage farmers to adopt MI systems in their fields, upto 85% subsidy is being provided to the beneficiaries.
- A State-Level Action Plan should be devised for the strengthening of Khaal (watercourses).
- MICADA has been entrusted with the comprehensive mandate for construction, extension, rehabilitation, and remodeling of watercourses across the state. The Government has formulated and implemented the "Watercourse Policy-2021," which serves as the strategic framework governing all watercourse development activities. This policy ensures systematic standardized approaches to watercourse management while maintaining responsiveness to grassroots requirements. All developmental works are being executed in strict compliance with the established policy guidelines and are prioritized based on the specific demands and requirements received from the farming community, thereby ensuring a farmer-centric approach irrigation water distribution infrastructure development. As soon as Gol MCAD Programme is finalized and approved, comprehensive State Level Action Plan shall be prepared.

- The Chairman directed that a list of MICADA projects be provided to all public representatives and that a pilot project be initiated in Bhiwani District.
- All field units of MICADA have been directed vide letter dated 04.04.2025 to provide a list of MICADA projects to all public representatives immediately.

Pilot Project for Bhiwani District

A Pilot Project under newly introduced MCAD Programme for the installation of Community-Based Micro Irrigation Schemes in the canal command areas of Bhiwani District, Haryana has been prepared at a cost of Rs.126.66Crore to bring an area of about 4375 hectares benefitting 1184 farmers under Micro Irrigation. This project has already been presented before the Empowered Committee of GoI on 26.08.2025 and is principally approved by the Empowered Committee. After receiving the formal approval and further allocation of funds by the Government, works will be executed.

Labour Department

Tagging of the Labour Community under the Mukhyamantri Awaas Yojana should be carried out.

Department examined the matter of Geo-tagging of labour communities under the Mukhya Mantri Awas Yojana (MMAY). The existing housing loan scheme of HBOCWWB could not be operationalised due to procedural and practical difficulties and consequently no Geo-tagging could be undertaken. To address this gap, a proposal has been prepared to align the scheme with the Housing for All Department by converting it into a direct financial assistance model under CM Awas Yojana. Proposal has been submitted to the Hon'ble Chairman-cum-Labour Minister for approval and shall also be placed before the Board in its forthcoming meeting for ex-post facto sanction. Upon approval, the scheme will be implemented through the Housing for All Department, which will also undertake the Geo-tagging of sanctioned cases of BoC workers.

Mines & Geology Department

 Deputy Commissioners of Bhiwani, Charkhi Dadri, Yamuna Nagar, and Mahendergarh were directed to hold meetings with District Mining Officers for the utilization of funds. •

Public Health & Engineering Department

For Gram Panchayats where underground pipes are being laid, the Gram Sabha must provide a resolution ensuring that the site is restored to its original condition; only then the payment will be made to the contractor.

Based on the certificates received from all subordinate circle officers, payments related to the work have been made only after obtaining the satisfactory resolution letters from the village Gram Panchayats regarding restoration of streets and roads to a condition suitable for vehicle movement where drinking water and sewer pipelines have been laid in the schemes implemented by Public Health Engineering Department. The relevant certificates are attached.

Public Works Department (B&R)

The Chairman directed that a proposal for the widening of roads for Dhanis be prepared in order to seek Central assistance.

Under PMGSY-IV guidelines, unconnected habitation with a population of 500+ in plain areas, 250+ in hilly states and 100+ in special category areas based on census 2011 will be covered. Currently as per PMGSY-IV guidelines, Haryana state is not eligible as there are no eligible unconnected dhanis/habitations.

Further under PMGSY-III, against the allocated lengths of 2500 km a length of 2496.331 kms has been sanctioned. The state has already completed 2461.526 kms and the balance length would also be completed shortly. Subsequently the case for allocating additional length under PMGSY-III was sent to MoRD. However, the same was turned down by MoRD. In view of this, no proposal can be sent to MoRD for seeking central assistance under PMGSY-III &PMGSY-IV.

Revenue Department

The pilot project underway is to be replicated for 20 villages in each district.

Each district has identified 20 additional villages adjoining of the 22 pilot villages, thereby making a total of 440 villages for the next phase. Out of these 440 villages, data of 395 villages has been submitted to the Survey of India by the districts with the assistance of HARSAC. Consequently, the Survey of India has submitted data of 317 villages for uploading on the portal. Thus, the data of 4,168 villages (including 22 pilot villages and 395 additional villages) out of a total of 7,103 villages across the State has been submitted to the Survey of India after resolving issues related to area and adjoining village boundaries in accordance with the prescribed SoP. Out of these, 2,174 villages have been submitted by the Survey of India for uploading on the portal. However, as the source code of the online portal has not been received from the Government of India/MPSEDC, Government of Madhya Pradesh, the said villages could not be uploaded on the portal.

Rural **Development** Department

- The works that can be carried out under MGNREGS for small and marginal farmers will be dovetailed and shared with all public representatives.

Agenda RASHTRIYA KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (RKVY) Item No.3 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY), introduced in 2007-08, is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme with 60:40 Centre-State funding. From 2024-25, it has been restructured as Pradhan Mantri Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (PM-RKVY) by merging multiple schemes like Soil Health, Rain-fed Area Development, PKVY, Mechanization, Per Drop More Crop, Agro-forestry, and Crop Diversification Programme to enhance efficiency, avoid duplication, and ensure flexibility for state-specific agricultural priorities. The scheme aims to make farming more productive and remunerative.

In Haryana, no contractual staff is engaged, though regular state staff has been assigned duties, including 1 Additional Director, 1 Joint Director, 1 ADO, 1 Assistant, 1 DEO, and 1 Helper. Constraints include limited budget allocations under DPR, resulting in the dropping of some proposed projects. Fund sharing remains 60:40 between Centre and State, disbursed through SNA SPARSH.

Most projects are infrastructure and value-addition based, such as land reclamation, seed distribution, water harvesting, training infra, and research at CCS HAU Hisar, CSSRI, Sugarcane Research Institute Regional Station Karnal.

Agenda PARAMPARAGAT KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (PKVY) Item No.4 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT) (Centre 60: State 40)

Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY) was introduced in Haryana during 2016-17 across 20 clusters (50 Ha./Cluster) in 11 districts, for promoting Organic farming. A three-year Action Plan (2023-24 to 2025-26) worth Rs. 26.28 crore has been submitted as per revised guidelines, though no budget was released during 2023-24 to 2025-26.

It is further submitted that the Govt. of India has launched the National Mission on Natural Farming as a Standalone Centrally Sponsored Scheme with overall financial outlay of Rs. 36.92 crore. NMNF, natural farming will be initiated in 18,000 Acre across 150 clusters with the objective of promoting natural farming practices across the State.

Agenda SOIL HEALTH CARD (SHC) Item No.5 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

The Soil Health Card (SHC) Scheme, launched on 19th February 2015 at Suratgarh, Sri Ganganagar district of Rajasthan, is a major initiative of the Government of India under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme for Soil Health and Fertility (RKVY). Agriculture being the backbone of India's economy is directly linked to soil quality, and this scheme aims to ensure that farmers should be benefitted through soil test-based nutrient Management.

The main objectives of the scheme are to address nutrient deficiencies in soil, provide Soil Health Cards to farmers in every three years, strengthen Soil Testing Laboratories (STLs), diagnose soil fertility constraints, and promote efficient use of fertilizers. All districts of Haryana are covered under this scheme.

Agenda PRADHAN MANTRI FASAL BIMA YOJANA (PMFBY) Item No.6 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

The Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY) has been implemented in Haryana since Kharif 2016, covering Paddy, Cotton, Bajra, Maize, and Moong in Kharif and Wheat, Gram, Barley, Mustard, and Sunflower in Rabi. Farmers contribute a subsidized premium—2% for Kharif crops, 1.5% for Rabi crops, and 5% for commercial crops (Cotton), while the balance is shared equally by the Centre and State (50:50). Since inception, the State has consistently released its share of subsidies to insurance companies, while the Centre directly transfers its share. Since 2016-17 to 2024-25 total budget allocated Rs. 3091.66 crore and subsidy released to insurance companies for farmers is Rs. 3083.96 crore.

From kharif 2023 to Rabi 2024-25, the scheme covered 12.17 lakh farmers across 46.77 lakh acres, benefitted over 1.94 lakh farmers.

Since inception of the scheme i.e. from 2016 to 2025, the scheme covered 1.17 crore farmers across 380.7 lakh acres, benefiting over 33 lakh farmers. Farmers contributed Rs. 2,404 crore, while the Centre and State together contributed Rs. 6,217 crore as subsidy. Insurance claims worth Rs. 9,076 crore have been paid, making PMFBY an essential support mechanism for Haryana's farmers against crop losses.

Agenda AGRICULTURE INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDS SCHEME (AIF) Item No.8 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

The Agriculture Infrastructure Fund (AIF) is Rs.1 lakh crore scheme, with Rs. 3,900 crore allocated to Haryana, aimed at developing farm infrastructure and reducing post-harvest losses. Beneficiaries include farmers, FPOs, PACS, SHGs, startups, entrepreneurs, cooperatives, APMCs, and government agencies. The scheme offers 3% annual interest subvention on loans up to Rs. 2 crore, with credit guarantee support from Credit Guarantee Fund Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises (CGTMSE). Project duration is 7 years (including up to 2 years' moratorium), requiring only 10% promoter contribution.

Agenda Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi (PM-KISAN) Item No.9 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)

This scheme, launched on 1st December 2018, provides Rs. 6,000 annually to farmers in three equal instalments of Rs. 2,000 each, directly transferred via DBT. The scheme supports all eligible farmers with cultivable land to ensure minimum financial support for their agriculture and household needs. During the 20th instalment (April–July 2025), a total of Rs.16.77 lakh farmers in Haryana received Rs. 353.69 crore.

Under the PM-KISAN Scheme, cultivable landholding is primary eligibility criteria to receive benefit of the Scheme subject to some certain exclusions relating to higher income status.

AGENDA e-NATIONAL AGRICULTURE MARKETS (e-NAM) Item No.10 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT)- implementing by Haryana Marketing Board

e-National Agriculture Market is a Pan-India electronic trading portal which networks the existing APMC mandis to create a unified National Market for agricultural commodities. It was launched on 14th April 2016 with objective of creating online transparent competitive bidding system to facilitate farmers with remunerative prices.

Objectives: -

- ❖ To integrate markets across the country through a common online market platform, to facilitate pan India trade in agriculture commodities.
- Increase access to farmers for more markets Enhance competition and transparency in agriculture trade.
- Digital operations and online payment to sellers.
- ❖ To promote better marketing opportunities for farmers / sellers through online access to more buyers and markets.
- ❖ To establish quality assaying systems for quality assurance, to promote informed bidding by buyers.

Haryana has implemented e-NAM project in 108 APMCs in three phases out of the total 114 APMCs. The proposal for linking of rest of 6 APMCs with e-NAM Portal have been approved by the State Level Sanctioning Committee (SLSC) on 11.02.2025. The SLSC Committee was chaired by worthy Chief Secretary, Government of Haryana. The proposal approved by the SLSC Committee has further sent to the Government of India for linking 6 APMCs with e-NAM portal. The reply of Government of India is still awaited.

Progress in the performance and operation of Electronic-National Agriculture Market is as under (up to 31 Aug 2025):-.

For Haryana it is operated by CY Future Pvt. India ltd. and the KCC is situated in Mohali, Punjab, which covers farmers of Haryana, Punjab and Chandigarh. For Haryana, 32 Farm Tele Advisors are working.

Service Features

The helpline operates every day from 6:00 AM to 10:00 PM, making agricultural support available for extended hours for Haryana farmers. Farmers can call from any mobile or landline network, whether public or private, without any cost. The service is accessible in Hindi, ensuring farmers from Haryana can communicate easily.

Importance for Haryana

The Kisan Call Centre provides direct access to Haryana's Farmers for government schemes, helping to address problems related to crop diseases, pests and market information.

Agenda AGRI-CLINIC AND AGRIBUSINESS CENTRES SCHEME (AC&ABC) Item No.12 (AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT- Implemented by NABARD)

The Ministry of Agriculture and farmers welfare, Government of India, launched ACABC Scheme to take better methods of farming to each farmer across the countryon 2002. This programme aims to tap the expertise available in the large pool of students with Agriculture and Biological Sciences background and develop entrepreneurial skills in them.

AGENDA MID DAY MEAL SCHEME (Now PM POSHAN)-2024-25. ITEM No.21 (EDUCATION DEPARTMENT)

National Programme of Nutritional Support to the Primary Education, known as Mid-Day-Meal Scheme is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme and under this Scheme hot cooked food is provided to the children of Primary Classes (I-V) and Upper Primary classes (VI-VIII) in all the Government and Local Bodies Schools.

This scheme has been implemented in Upper Primary classes (VI-VIII) of all the Government and Local Bodies Schools from the year 2008. The main objective of the scheme is to boost universalism of Primary Education by increasing enrolment, retention and attendance and simultaneously improving nutritional status of students of the primary classes.

Under the scheme free food grains (Wheat/Rice) is provided by the Government of India through Food Corporation of India @ 100 grams for primary children and 150 grams for upper primary children, per child per school per day. Freshly cooked food of these cereals is provided to children.

AGENDA UTILIZATION OF BHARATNET ITEM No.24 (ELECTRONIC & INFORMATION DEPTT.- NOW CITIZEN RESOURCE INFORMATION DEPARTMENT) - CRID

The Bharat-Net Haryana project is being implemented with BSNL as the implementing agency, with the objective of covering all 6,222 Gram Panchayats (GPs) in Haryana and providing a total of 62,220 FTTH connections (approximately 10 FTTH connections per GP). The project will provide free-of-cost FTTH connections to key government institutions such as schools, healthcare facilities, post offices, and police stations.

Under this initiative, three types of connectivity have been provisioned for each connection for two years, with a maximum utilization capping of 900 GB and 2 Mbps beyond this limit. The connections are distributed as follows:

- a. 1 connection with 100 Mbps (preferably for Government Schools)
- b. 1 connection with 50 Mbps (preferably for Government Schools, Health Centres, or Police Stations)
- c. 8 connections with 25 Mbps (allocated to other remaining government offices)

At the district level, the Additional Deputy Commissioners (ADCs) are responsible for overseeing the progress of connectivity rollout within their respective districts. This includes providing a comprehensive list of locations where broadband connectivity will be extended, ensuring that all designated areas, such as Gram Panchayats and key government institutions, are covered as part of the project. The ADCs plays a key role in tracking the implementation, ensuring the effective and timely execution of the project in their regions.

The project is being implemented in 3 phases as mentioned under:

AGENDA IMPLEMENTATION OF NATIONAL FOOD SECURITY ACT, 2013(NFSA) ITEM No.29 (FOOD CIVIL SUPPLIES & CONSUMER AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT)

Under the National Food Security Act, 2013, the Government of India supplies 66,250 MT of wheat per month free of cost. Based on current beneficiary data, around 95,000 MT of foodgrains are needed each month. To cover this gap, the State Government contributes from its own resources so that every eligible family receives their entitlement.

The beneficiary database is regularly updated by CRID. Every month, newly eligible beneficiaries are added and ineligible beneficiaries are removed. This is a routine administrative process and cannot be treated as a financial or physical achievement. Moreover, the Department cannot fix any target for inclusion or deletion of beneficiaries, since the updation is a continuous process that must be carried out every month to ensure accuracy of the beneficiary database.

AGENDA PRICE MONITORING
ITEM No.30 (FOOD CIVIL SUPPLIES & CONSUMER AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT)

The Government of India's price monitoring system is run by the <u>Price Monitoring Division</u> under the Department of Consumer Affairs, which collects daily wholesale and retail prices of essential commodities to analyze trends and inform policy decisions, like releasing buffer stocks, to prevent price volatility and ensure availability and affordability. The system uses a web-based portal (<u>FCAInfoweb</u>) and a mobile app to gather data from designated price collection centers across the country.

This department is sending wholesale/retail rates of 22 essential commodities to GOI on daily basis after taking the same from the Price Monitoring Cell in the district i.e. Panchkula, Hisar, Karnal and Gurugram.

No fund has been allotted by the Price Monitoring Cell to the State for the last 15 years.

AGENDA BUREAU OF INDIAN STANDARD (BIS)
ITEM No.31 (FOOD CIVIL SUPPLIES & CONSUMER AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT)

Department of Consumer Affairs is one of the two Departments under the Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution. It was constituted as a separate Department in June 1997.

The major units of the Department of Consumer Affairs are-

Consumer Protection Unit Bureau of Indian Standards Legal Metrology & National Test House.

The Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS) is the "National Standards Body" of India. It was established under the BIS Act 1986 for the "harmonious development of the activities of standardization, marking and quality certification of goods and other related matters. The organisation is under the overall administrative control of the Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution, Government of India.

BIS has its Headquarters at New Delhi and its 05 Regional Offices at Kolkata, Chennai, Mumbai, Chandigarh and Delhi. The Hallmark is a major step taken by BIS, it serves as a guarantee to consumers that the precious metal's fineness meets established national and international standards. As of January 2021, BIS hallmarking has become mandatory for all gold jewellery sold in India.

Recently the BIS has conducted search and seizure operations at the warehouses of major e-commerce players, including Amazon and Flipkart, confiscating thousands of non-certified products like toys, blenders, and speakers. Legal action is initiated under the BIS Act, 2016, against responsible entities.

AGENDA PRADHAN MANTRI BHARTIYA JANAUSHADHI PARIYOJANA(PMBJP) ITEM No.32 (FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT)

This scheme has been launched by the Government of India through the Pharmaceuticals & Medical Devices Bureau of India (PMBI), an autonomous society under the Department of Pharmaceuticals, Ministry of Chemicals & Fertilizers, Government of India, with the objective of making quality generic medicines available to the public at affordable prices through Jan Aushadhi Kendras.

The process of establishment of a Jan Aushadhi Kendra is as follows:-

- 1. Interested applicants apply to PMBI for provisional registration.
- 2. After scrutiny and compliance of conditions, PMBI issues a provisional letter of intent to the applicant.
- 3. On the basis of this provisional letter, the applicant applies to the concerned Licensing Authority of FDA Haryana for grant of a retail sale drug license under the Drugs & Cosmetics Act, 1940 and Rules thereunder.
- 4. After due verification and satisfaction of statutory requirements, FDA Haryana issues the retail sale drug license in the name of Jan Aushadhi Kendra.
- 5. In Haryana, FDA has so far granted 238 retail sale drug licenses to Jan Aushadhi Kendras in different districts. These have been allotted to different categories of stakeholders such as:
 - Non-Government Organisations (NGOs):
 - Private individuals/entrepreneurs: __
 - Government hospitals/institutions:
 - Others
- 6. The scheme has thus enabled the opening of Jan Aushadhi Kendras across the State, thereby facilitating the availability of low-cost generic medicines to the general public.

AGENDA NATIONAL HEALTH MISSION (NHM) ITEM No. 33 (HEALTH DEPARTMENT)

AGENDA PRADHAN MANTRI KRISHI SINCHAYEE YOJANA (PMKSY)-HAR KHET KO

PANI- COMMAND AREA DEVELOPMENT AND WATER MANAGEMENT

PROGRAMME (CADWMP)

ITEM No. 46 (IRRIGATION & WATER RESOURCES DEPARTMENT, HARYANA)

Historical Context and Current Status:

The Command Area Development Authority (CADA), Haryana, has been implementing the Centrally Sponsored Command Area Development (CAD) Programme since 1974-75 under a 50:50 cost-sharing arrangement with the Government of India. While the GoI consistently released its share until 2015-16, the CADWM scheme was discontinued in December 2016 for replacing with an enhanced programme with expanded scope and objectives. Subsequently, in April 2025, the Union Cabinet approved the Modernization of Command Area Development & Water Management (MCAD) as a component of the Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana (PMKSY), on pilot basis, allocating an initial budget of ₹1,600 crore for FY 2025-26.

The scheme aims to modernize irrigation delivery systems by:

- Replacing open channels with Underground Pressurized Piped Irrigation Networks (PPIN) up to 1 hectare.
- Integrating digital tools such as SCADA and IoT for real-time water accounting.
- Transferring irrigation asset management to Water User Societies (WUS) with five years of handholding support.

Seven pilot projects from Haryana, amounting to ₹468.61 crore, were presented before the Empowered Committee of GoI on 26.08.2025 and received in-principle approval. These projects will directly benefit approximately 12,995 farmers and cover an area of 15,481 hectares.

Expected Benefits of MCAD:

- Enhanced crop yields and diversification
- Increased and stable farmer incomes
- Generation of local employment opportunities
- Improved access to markets
- Energy savings
- Strengthened farmer ownership and governance through WUS

The learnings from these pilot projects will serve as a foundation for the national roll-out of MCAD during the 16th Finance Commission cycle beginning April 2026.

Issue for Consideration

- The Finance Department is requested to arrange funding amounting to ₹468.61 crore (₹185.77 Cr. Centre Share and ₹282.84 Cr. State Share), for this programme upon receipt of formal approval from the Government of India (GOI).
- Currently, only a token provision of Rs. 2.00 lakh has been allocated for this scheme in MICADA's budget estimates.

Agenda Rastriya Krishi Vikas Yojana(RKVY-PDMC) Item No.47 (Micro Irrigation Projects) (MICADA)

Since April 2021, the Per Drop More Crop (PDMC) component of RKVY is being implemented by MICADA, earlier managed by the Agriculture/Horticulture Department.

• To achieve improved water use efficiency, enhancing crop productivity, and promoting sustainable agriculture in the State.

1. Policy Framework and Subsidy Support

The Government provides 85% subsidy to all farmers (small, marginal, and general) on micro irrigation systems, shared between Centre and State, with an additional State top-up subsidy. Farmers have to contribute only 15% of equipment cost plus applicable GST.

MICADA has introduced the On-Farm Water Tank (OFWT) Policy 2021, duly approved by the Government. A unified online portal (https://micada.haryana.gov.in) has been developed for transparent implementation. Under the OFWT component, differentiated assistance has been structured:

- Individual Farmers: 70% subsidy, with 100% farm area mandated to be brought under micro irrigation.
- Group of Farmers: 85% subsidy, with 75% farm area mandated to be brought under micro irrigation.

- Need for timely release of central share and State Share including Top-up to ensure achieving the targets efficiently.
- The Finance Department may be directed to enhance the budget for top-up subsidy to ₹ 254.80 crore, as against the present provision of only ₹100 crore in the budget.

AGENDA Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP) ITEM No. 49 (INDUSTRIES AND COMMERCE DEPARTMENT)

Background:

The Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP) was launched in 2008 by the Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MoMSME), Government of India. It is a credit-linked subsidy scheme that merged two earlier schemes—Rural Employment Generation Programme (REGP) and Prime Minister's Rojgar Yojana (PMRY)—to create a unified approach to employment generation. The Scheme is implemented at the national level by the Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) alongwith State KVIC Directorates, District Industries/MSME Centres (DICs), State Khadi & Village Industries Boards (KVIBs) at the State level.

The scheme provides employment opportunities by facilitating the establishment of ventures under the Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSME) sector. It is implemented through the State Director, Khadi and Village Industries Commission, Ambala Cantt, the State Khadi & Village Industries Board, and District Industries Centres in the State under the supervision of the Directorate of Industries & Commerce.

Under this scheme:

- 25% of the project cost in rural areas and 15% in urban areas is provided as subsidy to general category applicants.
- 10% of the project cost must be contributed by the beneficiary of the general category as equity participation.
- For SC/ST/OBC, Minority, Ex-Servicemen, Women and Persons with Disabilities (PWD):
- 35% subsidy is provided in rural areas and 25% in urban areas.
- Only 5% of the project cost is required as beneficiary contribution.

1. Objectives:

- To generate employment opportunities in rural as well as urban areas of the country through setting-up of new self-employment ventures/projects/micro enterprises.
- (ii) To bring together widely dispersed traditional artisans/ rural and urban unemployed youth and give them self-employment opportunities to the extent possible at their place.

- (iii) To provide continuous and sustainable employment to a large segment of traditional and prospective artisans and rural and urban unemployed youth in the country, so as to help arrest migration of rural youth to urban areas.
- (iv) To increase the wage earning capacity of workers and artisans and contribute to increase in the growth rate of rural and urban employment.

AGENDA STARTUP INDIA SEED FUND SCHEME (SISFS) ITEM No. 50 (INDUSTRIES AND COMMERCE DEPARTMENT)

The Start-up India Seed Fund Scheme (SISFS) lunched by Government of India in 2021, is a key initiative under the Startup India umbrella aimed at providing financial support to early-stage startups. The scheme is a centrally administrated scheme implemented by Department for Promotion of industry and Internal Trade(DPIIT) under the Ministry of commerce and Industry, Govt. of India, which serves as the nodal agency responsible for overseeing the implementation of SISFS.

AGENDA ONE DISTRICT ONE PRODUCT (ODOP) ITEM No. 51 (INDUSTRIES AND COMMERCE DEPARTMENT)

i) Background & Objective of PMFME:

The Pradhan Mantri Formalization of Micro Food Processing Enterprises (PMFME) is a centrally sponsored scheme of MoFPI, GoI and is designed to facilitate and formalize micro food enterprises, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), Farmer Producer Compnaies (FPCs), Self Help Groups (SHGs) and Cooperative Societies to enhance competitiveness of new/existing individual micro-enterprise in the unorganized segment of food processing industry and promotion of sector formalization & support throughout their entire value chain.

ii) Scheme Components & Progress Status:

a) Support to Individuals and groups of micro enterprises:

- Support for Individual Micro Units :Credit linked capital subsidy @ 35% (Maximum limit Rs. 10 lakhs.)
- Support for Common Infrastructure: Credit Linked capital subsidy for setting up of Common Infrastructure Facilities @ 35% (Maximum limit up to Rs. 3.00 Cr.).
- Seed Capital Support to SHGs: Rs.40,000 seed capital to SHG members for working capital and purchase of small tools (related to food processing) with Maximum assistance upto Rs. 4 Lakhs for a SHG group, which shall be distributed as per the No. of members in the concerned SHG.

b) Branding & Marketing Support to FPO/FPC/SHG/Cooperatives:

50% grant for branding and marketing expenses.

c) Capacity Building:

- Beneficiary Trainings: 24 Hrs (3 Days) training of DLC Recommended Beneficiaries i.e. Applications sent to Bank; and 8 Hrs (1 Day) training of Seed Capital Beneficiaries.
- Handholding Support: Handholding support to beneficiaries through District Resource Persons for end to end application process and formalization of the unit.

AGENDA PRADHAN MANTRI KISAN URJA SURKASHA EVAM UTTHAAN MAHABHIYAN (PM-KUSUM)

ITEM No. 54 (NEW & RENEWABLE ENERGY)

One of the key aims of the scheme was to integrate renewable energy into farmers' irrigation practices, provide them with subsidized solar water pumps, and create an opportunity for farmers to make productive use of their barren land by setting up solar power plants for energy generation. This scheme has three components A, B & C.

Components

a) Decentralized Grid-Connected Solar Power Plants

(implemented by DISCOMs)

b) Standalone Solar Pumps

(Implemented by HAREDA)

c) Solarisation of Grid-Connected Pumps

(Implemented by DISCOMs)

(A) Decentralized Grid-Connected Solar Power Plants

- Under this component, solar plants of capacity 500 KW to 2 MW will be setup by the farmers on his own land either directly by himself or in partnership with group of farmers/ cooperatives/ panchayats/Farmer Producer Organisations (FPO)/Water User associations (WUA), or through a developer.
- Group of farmers/ cooperatives/ panchayats/ Farmer Producer Organisations (FPO)/ Water User associations (WUA) etc. can opt for developing the Renewable Energy Power plant (REPP) through developer(s). The farmer may provide his land to the DISCOM, which will then be considered as Renewable Power Generator (RPG) in this case.
- The plants will be preferably installed within five km radius of the substation to avoid cost of sub-transmission lines and to reduce transmission losses.
- The renewable power generated will be purchased by DISCOMs at a pre-fixed levelized tariff i.e. Rs. 3.11/kWh
- PPA will be for 25 years from Commercial Operation Date (COD) of the project.
- No CFA is admissible under this component.
- DISCOM would be eligible to get PBI (Performance Based Incentive) @ Rs. 0.40 per unit purchased or Rs. 6.6 lakh per MW of capacity installed, whichever is less, for a period of five years from the COD of the project.

STATUS

- Total Capacity Allocated by MNRE: 158 MW
- LOAs Issued: 79 Nos. for 131.45 MW @3.11 Per Unit allowed by HERC
- PPAs Signed: 59 Nos. for 98.54 MW
- A total of 13 No. plants operationalized with combined capacity 16.61 MW

(B) SOLAR WATER PUMPING PROGRAMME UNDER COMPONENT-B OF PM-KUSUM

The Department of New and Renewable Energy, Haryana (DNRE)/HAREDA is implementing Component B of PradhanMantriKisanUrjaSurakshaevemUtthanMahabhiyan (PM KUSUM) of the Ministry of New & Renewable Energy (MNRE), GOI with the objective to promote installation of standalone solar pumps to provide farmers with reliable, sustainable and cost-effective irrigation solutions. It aims to reduce dependence on grid electricity and diesel, enhance farmer income, and promote clean energy adoption in agriculture. Under Component-B, Off-grid solar pumps of 3 HP to 10 HP capacity with total 75 % subsidy are provided for irrigation purposes.

Eligibility Beneficiaries: Under this scheme, individual farmers, Gaushalas, Water User Associations/farmer Producer Organization/Primary Agriculture Credit Societies/cluster based irrigation.

PM-KUSUM Component C

Solarisation of Grid-Connected Pumps

- Component C of the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Urja Suraksha evam Utthaan Mahabhiyan (PM-KUSUM) scheme focuses on the solarization of grid-connected agricultural pumps. The objective is to reduce the burden on the State Government of Agriculture Subsidy to the DISCOM by installing solar photovoltaic (SPV) systems. Central financial assistance of 30% of the estimated cost of installation (upto Rs.1.05Cr/MW) is provided by MNRE to the developer.
- Individual Pump Solarization (IPS), solar PV capacity up to two times of pump capacity in kW is allowed, so that the farmer will be able to use the generated solar power to meet the irrigation needs and get additional income by selling surplus solar power to DISCOMs.
- Feeder Level Solarisation (FLS):- Instead of the Individual solar pumps the states can solarize the agriculture feeders/mixed feeders. Solar plants of capacity that can cater to the requirement of the agriculture load of the selected feeder can be installed through CAPEX/RESCO mode for a project period of 25 years.

Revamped Rashtriya Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (RGSA) is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme of Ministry of Panchayati Raj (MoPR), Govt. of India. The Scheme was launched in April, 2022 for 4 years from 2022-23 to 2025-26 (co-terminus with 15th Finance Commission).

Funding Pattern: 60 (Central Share): 40 (State Share).

- ii. Focus on developing the capacity of elected representatives of PRIs for leadership Roles to enable the Gram Panchayats to function effectively as third tier of Government;
- iii. Enhance capabilities of Panchayats for inclusive local governance with focus on optimum utilization of available resources and convergence with other schemes to address the issues of national importance;
- iv. Enhance capabilities of Panchayats to raise their own source of revenue;
- v. Strengthening Gram Sabhas to function effectively as the basic forum of people's participation within the Panchayat system.
- vi. Promote devolution of powers and responsibilities to Panchayats according to the spirit of the Constitution and PESA Act 1996;
- vii. Strengthen institutions for capacity enhancement of PRIs at different levels; collaborate with other Departments & stakeholders for optimal use of available training infrastructure to ensure quality standards in infrastructure facilities, human resources and outcome based training:
- viii. Collaboration with Academic Institute/ Institute of Excellence to support capacity building and hand-holding for PRIs:
- ix. Promote e-governance and other technology driven solutions to enable good governance in Panchayat administrative efficiency and improved service delivery with transparency and accountability:
- x. Recognize and incentivize the performance of PRIs towards attainment of SDGs;
- xi. Enhance capabilities of Panchayats through action research and publicity to reach out to multiple and diverse target groups and taking up research studies related to PRIS for assessments and informed policy decisions:

AGENDA JAL JEEVAN MISSION (JJM)

ITEM No. 57 (PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENG. DEPARTMENT)

Objective

The scheme of Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM) was launched in year 2019 to provide Functional Household Tap Connection (FHTC) to 100% households when 17.66 lakh Household were already having tap connection out of 30.41 lakh households in 6621 villages. The functionality of the tap connection inter alia comprises of meeting all the requirements at household in terms of (i) Provide tap water supply (ii) Water status minimum @ 55 LPCD on daily basis (iii) Meeting quality standards as per BIS 10500. Out of the total 6557 schemes, 3495 schemes have been financially completed. Against an estimated cost of Rs 4786.90 Crores an expenditure of Rs 3789.24 Crores has been incurred. Haryana has achieved 100% tap connections in all 30.41 Lakh household in April 2022.

Challenges:-

Works related to improvements in water supply such as augmentation of sources, up gradation of pipe distribution networks, increasing the capacity of water storage reservoirs, tanks, construction of ranney wells, connecting canal based networks with assured raw water sources by construction of pumping station and laying rising main etc. have been undertaken.

The Department is facing difficulties in completing pending works of providing/strengthening of water supply as no funds have been released by Govt. of India during current and last Financial Year. The Govt. of India has been requested vide Commissioner & Secretary to Govt. of Haryana, Public Health Engineering Department D.O letter No. PS/C&S, PHED-2025/152 dated 19.05.2025.

The Hon'ble Chief Minister, Haryana has also requested Government of India vide D.O bearing No. CMH-202/95656PHE/Rural dated 14.11.2024 & D.O No. CMH-2025/3223 dated 03.06.2025 and D.O No. CMH-2025/4613 dated 29.08.2025 to Hon'ble Union Minister, Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India highlighting the scarcity of funds and completion/ strengthening of balance schemes under Jal Jeevan Mission. The JJM has been onboard of SNA SPARSH and no mother sanction has been released by Govt. of India.

AGENDA ATAL MISSION FOR REJUVENATION AND URBAN TRANSFORMATION 2.0 (AMRUT 2.0)

ITEM No. 58 (PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENG. DEPARTMENT)

- 1. Objective: Hon'ble Prime Minister in his address during launch of AMRUT 2.0 on 1st October 2021, said that "In the next stage of AMRUT, country targets to have access to clean water for all urban citizens, increase coverage of sewerage & septage management, make our cities water secure.
- 2. Summary: Government of India has approved the Central Assistance amounting to Rs 1495.82 crore for implementation of this scheme. Under the first tranche, or State Water Action Plan (SWAP-I) 57 water supply & sewerage schemes were approved by the Apex Committee of the Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs (MoHUA) in its meeting held on 25.09.2023 for Rs 1727.36 crore, as detailed below:

Subsequently, water supply scheme Jakhal was dropped due to non-availability of land for construction of canal based waterworks, thereby reducing the total cost from Rs 1727.36 crore to Rs 1688.98 crore.

Under State Water Action Plan (SWAP-II), MoHUA in its meeting held on 17.04.2025, approved 21 water supply and sewerage projects at a cost of Rs 2134.56 crore as detailed below:

The work on all 56 projects in SWAP-I have been taken in hand and 4 projects, namely water supply Radaur town, water supply Thanesar town, water supply Nagal Chaudhary town as well as sewerage scheme Palwal have been commissioned.

Under SWAP-II, the work is gaining momentums after completion of the procedural formalities of approval of DNITs and finalization of tenders.

- 3. Target and achievement: All the 77 water supply and sewerage projects approved in SWAP-I and SWAP-II are big-ticket projects and require the creation of a substantial infrastructure. The projects include the construction of Water treatment Plants, Source augmentation, upgradation of the existing infrastructure, construction of boosting stations, drilling of tubewells and strengthening the distribution system. Similarly, the sewerage projects include laying labyrinthine network of sewerage systems, construction of Sewage Treatment Plants and repair/rehabilitation of existing sewers. The targets therefore, cannot be fragmented and the outcomes will only be deliver to the target group after the commissioning of the entire scope of work.
- **4. Work Progress 2024-25:** The preliminary formalities of preparation and approval of DNITs, tendering, arranging permissions were carried out during the year 2024-25 and work was kick-started on various projects during the year 2024-25.

PMGSY-I Scheme (2000-2009)

➤ Under this Scheme, **426 Nos**. of Road Works have been allotted and all the Works are Physically and Financially completed with a road length of **4565.224 Kms** with an expenditure of **Rs.1394.43 Crores**.

PMGSY-II Scheme (2014-2019)

➤ Under this Scheme, **88 Nos.** of Road Works and **18 Nos.** Bridge Works have been allotted and all the Works are Physically and Financially completed with a road length of **1015.738 Kms**with an expenditure of **Rs.807.74 Crores.**

PMGSY-III Scheme (2019-2024)

Under this Scheme, 259 Nos. of Road Works have been allotted with a length of 2496.331 Kms (688.937 Kms under batch-I of 2020-21, 1216.946 Kms under batch-II of 2020-21 & 590.448 Kms under batch-I of 2021-22). In last Financial Year i.e. 2024-25, a road length of 93.660Kms stands completed with an expenditure of Rs.34.60 Crores. Till date, a total Road length of 2461.526 Kms stands completed with an expenditure of Rs.1078.71Croresas on 31.08.2025. Out of the total length of 2496.331 Kms, a length of 33.075 Kms is in Savings and will not be executed. The remaining length of 1.730 Kms shall be completed in the Current Financial Year i.e. 2025-26.

PMGSY-IV Scheme (2024-2029)

- This scheme was launched in the **F.Y. 2024-25** and would continue till **2028-29**. Under this Scheme, **25,000** unconnected habitations with a population of **500+** in plain areas, **250+** in North Eastern and Hilly States/UTs, and **100+** in Special Category Areas (including Tribal Schedule V, Aspirational Districts/Blocks, Desert Areas) and Left-Wing Extremism (LWE) affected districts, based on **Census 2011** data, will be covered. A total of **62,500 km** of All Weather Roads will be constructed to connect these unconnected habitations, along-with necessary bridges along the road alignments.
- > Currently, there are no unconnected habitations in Haryana, as all habitations in the state are already connected.

Achievements in Central Road and Infrastructure Fund (CRIF):-

- ➤ The **Central Road and Infrastructure Fund** (earlier known as Central Road Fund) was established in 2000 under Central Road Fund Act, 2000. The administrative control of Central Road and Infrastructure Fund (CRIF) falls under the Ministry of Finance. Earlier it was under the domain of Ministry of Road Transport and Highways.
- The types of works to be considered in the Scheme: -
 - (i) construction or rehabilitation of cross drainage works, widening or strengthening of roads, improvements to road geometrics;
 - engineering aspects of road safety works covering improvement of traffic junctions, road marking, signaling, construction of subways and over-bridges including ROBs and RUBs, construction of parking, lay-byes, bus sheds, traffic calming measures and the like;
 - (iii) Construction of bypasses, parallel service roads along National/ State Highways;
 - (iv) Pre-construction activities for ring-roads or bypasses or service roads along National Highways;
- Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRT&H) has sanctioned **149 no.** works under CRIF Scheme till date amounting to **Rs. 2898.06 cr** for Haryana State.
- > Total Accrual for Haryana (upto 31.03.2024) is **Rs. 2294.06 cr** and Accrual in 2024-25 is **Rs. 178.50 cr.**
- Total release by the Ministry for Haryana (upto 31.03.2024) is **Rs.1762.10 cr.** Release in 2024-25 is **Rs. 178.50 cr.**

| Background | As per the existing practice, land records are kept in open files, tied with sutliand cloth etc. which go on increasing day by day. Moreover, the record rooms are not maintained properly and it takes a lot of time to search and consult the old record as and when required. These records are also needed for past and future references. It became very difficult to maintain and handle these voluminous records because condition of old records is deteriorating day by day, life of paper is outliving and is also being destroyed by termite, space requirement of record rooms is |
| | increasing every day and searching of old records is becoming impossible and very laborious. Thus; the citizens have to go through cumbersome procedure to get the copies of their land records by personally visiting the Tehsil offices / Patwaris time and again due to unavailability of the official/officers concerned. |
| About Project | In view of the rapid deterioration of paper based old records, and to overcome all such problems and difficulties, it was necessary to adopt a system wherein these records are preserved for longer time. Also human based eccentric technology may be used for retrieval purposes. Therefore, the only way to overcome all such problems was to scan, digitize, index and preserve the old records electronically keeping legal requirements in view and to economize the space of record rooms by making available old data online after scanning / digitization of the same. Simultaneously, in order to preserve the original physical land record, there was a need to maintain them as well. This will necessitate the physical Modern Revenue Record Rooms which will not only comprise the physical storage of records but also have computerized system for cataloguing, indexing for the process of access and retrieval of these records effectively, as and when required. Hence; the records / files may be stored in Customized Heavy Duty Racks in specifically made Galvanised Metal Boxes with the help of Bar Code Technology in computerized environment with Bar Code Reader, safety & security measures like; installation of powder bases fire extinguishers, CCTV Cameras, Smoke Detectors etc. in the Modern Revenue Record Room in order to prevent any untoward situation. Also to restrict unauthorized access to the |

- MRRR, biometrics were installed so that only authorized persons can enter into the Modern Revenue Record Rooms.

The project aims at digitization of old revenue records, including that of previous centuries also, thereby providing a means of preserving these ancient records, in a tamper proof and secure manner.

- Ensuring safe and secure upkeep of the physical records in fireresistant Galvanised Metal Boxes for longer preservation.
- Easy retrieval of records in electronic form and supply of original records / scanned copies, as and when demanded by the citizens.
- Security against tampering; once the record is digitized it cannot be temper with.
- To provide time-bound services to the citizens under G2C domain in the form of on-line delivery of requested copies of records of rights through Internet / Intranet.
- Detection of old / missing records / files.
- Ease in RTI compliance where searching of old record was very time consuming process.
- To reduce processing delays
- Overcoming shortage of storage space; proper utilization of space by systematically storage of record. Precious space can be utilized for other important requirements.
- Cost effective method of storage / retrieval and release of manpower deployed presently for the record storage purposes. Only one manpower will be able to handle the entire record room.
- Destruction of old unrequired files / obsolete records from time to time as per the retention policy thereby making space available for other use.
- Citizens will be able to access their land records online on one hand and maintenance of the archival records in a dust free, safe and easily accessible environment on the other hand.

Watershed Development Component- Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana 2.0 (WDC-PMKSY) is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS) (60:40) under New Generation Watershed projects. 9 Projects having an area of 31221 hectares of estimated cost Rs. 80.59 Cr. in five districts namely Bhiwani, Charkhi-Dadri, Mahendergarh, Gurugram and Yamuna-Nagar districts have been covered under these projects.

Objectives

- To improve productive potential of rainfed / degraded land through integrated watershed management.
- To strengthen community based local institutions for promotion of livelihoods by formation of Self Help Groups (SHGs)/User Group (UG) for income generating activities by developing skills and resources & watershed sustainability.
- To encourage farming system approach linking crop live-stock, fishery, afforestation- SHGs horticulture, floriculture, pasture etc.
- To achieve reduction in soil erosion, increase in ground water table, and enhanced green cover over both arable and non-arable lands surfaces in the project area.
- The Gram Panchayat has willingly taken over operation and maintenance responsibility of assets created and transferred to them. There exist alternate livelihood options for all members of project community – farmers, landless agricultural labours, livestock keepers, artisans etc.

- 1. INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL OLD AGE PENSION SCHEME (IGNOAPS): The eligible age for IGNOAPS is 60 years. The pension is Rs. 200 p.m. for persons between 60 years and 80 years. For persons who are 80 years and above the pension is Rs. 500/- per month. Under this scheme, pension is being paid at the rate of Rs. 3000/- per month from January 2024 by adding additional amount to the amount currently received from the Government of India. Thus, beneficiaries in the age group of 60 to 79 are being provided pension of Rs. 2800/- from the State Government and Rs. 200/- from the Government of India, totaling Rs. 3000/- and beneficiaries in the age group above 80 are being provided pension of Rs. 2500/- from the State Government and Rs. 500/- from the Government of India, totaling Rs. 3000/-.
- 2. INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL WIDOW PENSION SCHEME (IGNWPS): The eligible age for IGNWPS is 40 years. The pension is Rs. 300 per month. After attaining the age of 80 years, the beneficiary will get Rs. 500/- per month. Under this scheme, pension is being paid at the rate of Rs. 3000/- per month from January 2024 by adding additional amount to the amount currently received from the Government of India. Thus, beneficiaries in the age group of 40 to 79 are being provided pension of Rs. 2700/- from the State Government and Rs. 300 from the Government of India, total Rs. 3000/-, and beneficiaries in the age group above 80 are being provided pension of Rs. 2500/- from the State Government and Rs. 500/- from the Government of India, total Rs. 3000/-.
- 3. INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL DISABILITY PENSION SCHEME (IGNDPS): The eligible age for the pensioner is 18 year and the amount is Rs. 300 per month. After attaining the age of 80 years, the beneficiary will get Rs. 500/- per month. Under this scheme, pension is being paid at the rate of Rs. 3000/- per month from January 2024 by adding additional amount to the amount currently received from the Government of India. Thus, beneficiaries in the age group of 40 to 79 are being provided pension of Rs. 2700/- from the State Government and Rs. 300 from the Government of India, total Rs. 3000/-, and beneficiaries in the age group above 80 are being provided pension of Rs. 2500/- from the State Government and Rs. 500/- from the Government of India, total Rs. 3000/-.

4. NATIONAL FAMILY BENEFIT SCHEME (NFBS): National family benefit scheme is a GOI scheme under which Rs. 20000/- is given as a lumpsum assistance to the bereaved (BPL) household in the event of death of the bread-winner. It is clarified that any event of death (natural or otherwise) would make the family eligible for assistance. A woman in the family, who is a home maker, is also considered as a 'bread-winner' for this purpose. The family benefit will be paid to such surviving member of the household of the deceased poor, who after local inquiry, is found to be the head of the household. For the purpose of the scheme, the term "household" would include spouse, minor children, unmarried daughters and dependent parents. In case of death of an unmarried adult, the term household would include minor brothers/sisters and dependent parents. The death of such a bread- winner should have occurred whilst he/she is more than 18 years of age and less than 60 years of age.

The Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs (MoHUA), Govt. of India launched (June 1st, 2020) a Special Micro-Credit Facility scheme namely PM- Street Vendor's AtmaNirbharNidhi (PM- SVANidhi) - to mitigate the adverse impact on the livelihoods of the urban street vendors during the lockdown due to COVID-19. Earlier, the Scheme period was upto March, 2022 and later the scheme period has been extended upto December, 2024. Presently, MoHUA is restructuring the scheme and the proposal w.r.t formal approval of new revised/modified scheme is in process (Scheme details at ANNEXURE – I).

- 1. Eligibility The Scheme is available to all street vendors as per following criteria:-
 - i. Street vendors in possession of Certificate of Vending/Identity Card issued by Urban Local Bodies (ULBs);
 - ii. Street Vendors issued Letter of Recommendation (LoRs) by ULBs; and
 - iii. The vendors of surrounding development/peri-urban/rural areas vending in the geographical limits of the ULBs.

2. Benefits under the Scheme :-

- i. The Beneficiary can avail interest subsidized 1st Tranche bank loan of upto Rs. 10,000/- and after timely & regular payment of 1st bank loan, the beneficiary is eligible for 2nd Tranche bank loan of upto Rs. 20,000/. Similarly, after timely repayment of 2nd bank loan, the beneficiary may avail the 3rd Tranche bank loan of upto Rs. 50,000/- under the scheme.
- ii. No collateral required.
- iii. The vendors, availing loan under the scheme, are eligible to get an interest subsidy @ 7% from the Govt. of India with the additional interest subsidy from State Govt. @2% also.
- iv. The Digitally active vendors would be incentivized with monthly cash back to maximum of Rs. 100 in a month i.e. Rs. 1200 in a year for promoting the digital transactions by the Street Vendors.
