(1) 'Brain rot' describes the cognitive decline attributed to excessive exposure to trivial and mindless social media content. The term has gained momentum as digital consumption increasingly dominates modern lifestyles, often leading to trends like 'digital detoxes,' where individuals consciously take breaks from screens to counteract feelings of burnout or mental stagnation. Linguists have observed that the term's casual tone and relatability make it particularly appealing to younger audiences, while its vivid and evocative imagery resonates deeply with broader societal fears about the erosion of intellectual engagement in a hyperconnected era.

- (2) According to Oxford University Press (OUP), the term reflects growing concern over how technology is shaping human thought processes, behaviours, and habits. Its usage has surged in recent years, especially among younger demographics, as people seek to articulate the mental fatigue caused by binge-watching videos, doomscrolling, or consuming low-value online content. By 2024, 'brain rot' is commonly used to describe both the cause and effect of this phenomenon. It refers not only to the proliferation of low-quality content on social media and the internet but also to the negative cognitive and emotional impacts of engaging with such material. These include reduced attention spans, diminished critical thinking skills, and a pervasive sense of disconnection from meaningful interactions.
- (3) This year's selection process for the Oxford Word of the Year was notably participatory, with the public invited to vote on a shortlist compiled by linguistic experts at OUP. Contenders included 'heat domes,' which refers to prolonged periods of extreme weather, and 'neurospicy,' a playful term celebrating neurodivergent individuals. However, 'brain rot' secured the majority of votes, reflecting widespread recognition of its cultural relevance. The term's victory underscores the increasing discourse around mental health, digital detoxes, and the prioritization of well-being in a world dominated by screens. Its recognition in 2024 signals a broader cultural shift towards addressing the cognitive and emotional effects of digital ecosystems, encouraging both individual reflection and collective dialogue on these pressing issues.
- (4) The Oxford Word of the Year is selected based on its cultural significance, frequency of usage, and its ability to reflect global concerns. Previous winners include 'goblin mode' in 2022, capturing post-pandemic behavioural shifts and 'climate emergency' in 2019, reflecting environmental anxieties. This year's selection process drew over 400,000 votes globally, highlighting the participatory nature of the initiative and the public's engagement with the chosen term.
- (5) By crowning 'brain rot' as the Word of the Year, OUP has spotlighted a concept that encapsulates the anxieties, aspirations, and evolving relationship between humans and technology. It serves as a reminder of the importance of mindful digital habits, balanced content consumption, and the necessity of addressing the cognitive toll of living in a hyperconnected age.

- (1) Access to the prestigious Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) has become increasingly skewed against economically disadvantaged groups due to rising fees, dropout rates, and fluctuating placement opportunities. The following analysis highlights these challenges through data trends and their implications.
- (2) **Fee Hike**: The cost of an IIT education has surged over the past decade. In 2016, tuition fees stood at ₹90,000 per annum, while by 2023, they had risen to ₹2,00,000 per annum. Accommodation, books, and other costs further burden families. Despite scholarships for economically weaker sections (EWS), many students struggle to afford the total cost of education, leading to financial exclusion.
- (3) **Dropout Rates**: Between 2018 and 2022, IITs saw over 2,500 students drop out, averaging 500 per year. By 2023, dropout rates reached approximately 700 annually. Reasons include academic pressure, financial strain, and mental health challenges, with students from EWS backgrounds disproportionately affected.
- (4) **Placement Trends**: Campus placement trends indicate a reduction in the average salaries offered. In 2016, the average salary was ₹15 LPA (lakh per annum), but by 2023, it had decreased to ₹12 LPA. The number of students securing exceptionally high packages (above ₹1 crore annually) also saw a decline, reflecting global economic uncertainties and changes in industry demands.
- (5) **Enrolment and Representation**: The representation of marginalized groups, including those from rural areas, has not improved significantly. While IITs have initiatives to enhance inclusivity, many students face systemic hurdles, including a lack of preparation due to limited resources in underprivileged schools.
