Hiroshima Day -

Hiroshima Day, observed annually on August 6th, commemorates the tragic anniversary of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, Japan, by the United States during World War II in 1945. This devastating event marked a significant moment in history, leading to the end of the war and sparking global awareness about the dangers of nuclear weapons. On August 6th and 9th, 1945, the United States dropped two atomic bombs over the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, respectively. The bombings claimed the lives of an estimated 150,000 to 246,000 people, most of them civilians, and remain the only instances of nuclear weapons used in warfare. Following these bombings and the Soviet Union's declaration of war, Japan surrendered to the Allies on August 15, 1945, with the official signing of the instrument of surrender on September 2nd, effectively ending the war.

To honor Hiroshima Day, a group discussion was held during the library period at Kendriya Vidyalaya NTPC, Ramagundam. Students of Class VIII participated actively and attentively, engaging in thoughtful conversations about the victims of Hiroshima and the consequences of nuclear warfare. Both students and librarian Mrs. Jyoti Devi shared their knowledge and insights about World War II and the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, fostering a deeper understanding of this significant historical event.

Medicinal Plant Plantation at KV NTPC Ramagundam

Medicinal plants have long been used to treat common ailments such as diarrhea, constipation, hypertension, dysentery, fevers, and more. They serve as home remedies in many parts of the country. Beyond their medicinal uses, herbs are also utilized for natural dye, pest control, food, perfume, and tea. Medicinal plants are an important part of both traditional and modern medicine, used to maintain health or address specific conditions. According to the Food and Agriculture Organization in 2002, over 50,000 medicinal plants are used globally. The Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, provided a more conservative estimate in 2016, stating that 17,810 plant species have medicinal uses, out of the approximately 30,000 plant species with documented uses. In modern medicine, around a quarter of prescribed drugs are derived from medicinal plants, and these are rigorously tested. In traditional systems of medicine, medicinal plants often form the majority of treatments, although they may not always be scientifically tested.

At KV NTPC Ramagundam, students, along with the science department teachers and staff, participated in a medicinal plant plantation drive within the school premises. Several medicinal plants were planted by the students and teachers. Mrs. G. Padma (PGT Chemistry) and Mrs. Jyoti (TGT Science), two of the dedicated teachers of KV NTPC Ramagundam, educated the students about the importance and uses of medicinal plants, raising awareness about their benefits for health and the environment.
