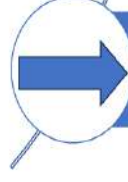
In 1848, Frederic Sorrieu, a French artist, prepared a series of four prints visualising his dream of a world made up of 'democratic and social republics'. The first print of the series shows the people of Europe and America- Men and women of all ages and social classes- marching in a long train, and offering homage to the state of liberty as they pass by it.



The French Revolution and the Idea of the Nation: -



Napoleon Code (The Civil Code of 1804):-

-  Established equality before the law and secured the right to property.
-  Finished all the privileges based on birth.
-  Abolished the feudal system and freed peasants from serfdom and manorial dues.
-  Peasants, artisans, workers, and new businessmen enjoyed new-found freedom.

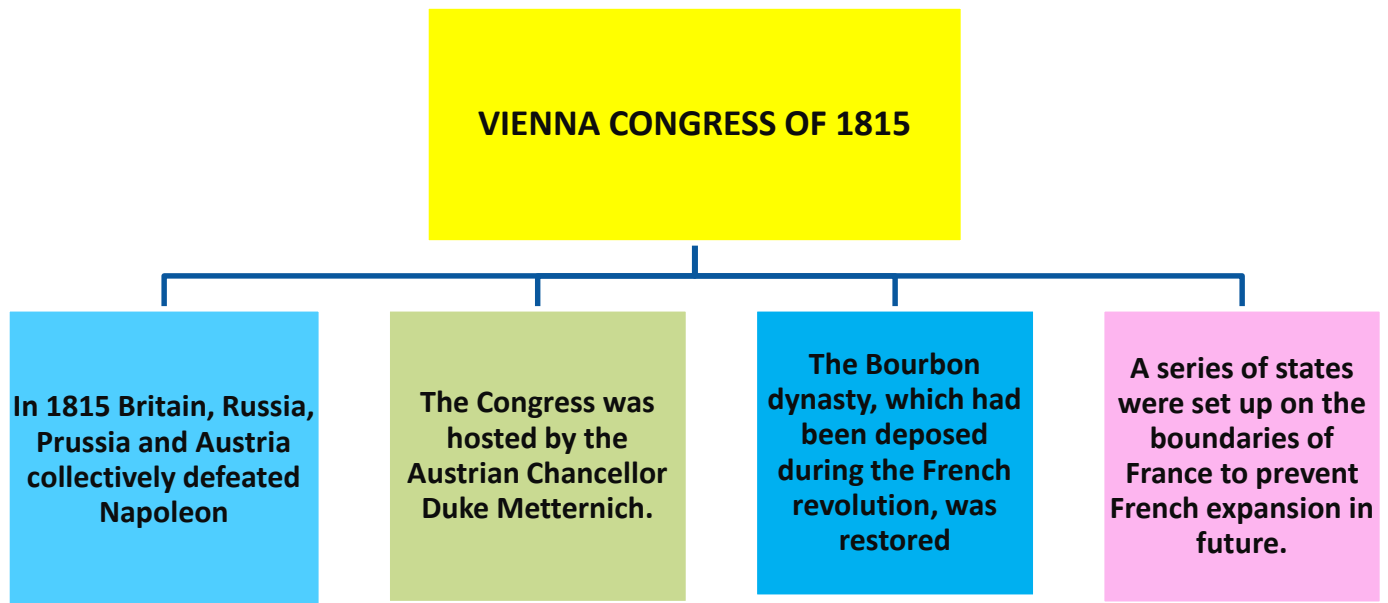

VIENNA CONGRESS OF 1815: -



The Romantic imagination and national feeling: -

Culture, art, poetry, stories and music helped to express and shape nationalist feelings.

German Philosopher Johann Gottfried Herder claimed that true German culture was to be discovered among the common people.

The true spirit of the nation was popularized through folk songs, folk poetry and folk dances.

Language too play an important role in developing nationalist sentiments.

Unification of Italy:-

Italy was divided into seven states. Only one Sardinia-Piedmont, was ruled by an Italian princely house.

Giuseppe Mazzini formed a secret society Young Italy for his goals.

After the failure of the revolutions, Victor Emmanuel II led Sardinia-Piedmont to unify Italy through war.

Chief Minister Cavour led the movement to unify the regions of Italy. He spoke French much better than Italian.

Giuseppe Garibaldi joined the war with a large number of armed (Red shirt) volunteers.

In 1861 Victor Emmanuel II was proclaimed king of united Italy.

Unification of Germany

Led by **Prussia** under **Otto von Bismarck**.

Prussia defeat **Austria, Denmark and France** in three wars over seven years and completed the process of unification.

Nationalism was achieved through "**blood and iron**" (war and military power).

In January 1871, the **Prussian king, William I** was proclaimed German emperor in a ceremony held at **Versailles**.

The Strange Case of Britain

Unlike Europe, Britain's unification was a gradual process through **parliamentary acts**.

England dominated over **Scotland, Wales, and Ireland**.

The formation of the **United Kingdom of Great Britain** through the **Act of Union (1707)** between **England and Scotland**.

The **Union Jack**, national anthem, and English language promoted British nationalism.

VISUALISING THE NATION-



Visualizing the Nation: -

Artists in 18th and 19th centuries found a way out by personifying a nation.

That is the female figure became an allegory of the nation. In France she was Christened Marianne.

Her characteristics were drawn from those of liberty and republic- the red cap, the tricolour, the cockade.

Germania became the allegory of the German nation.

Germania wears a crown of oak leaves, as the German oak stands for heroism.

Nationalism and Imperialism: A Historic Context

Region & Variation

The Balkan region was characterized by vast geographical and ethnic variation, Bulgaria, Albania, Greece, Macedonia, Croatia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Slovenia, Serbia, and Montenegro.

Till the last part of 19th century, this was under Ottoman Empire.

Ottoman Rule
The disintegration of the Ottoman Empire and emergence of romantic nationalism made this region a land of conflict.

Balkan nations tried to capture more territories from neighbouring places.

It also became a scene of big power rivalry like Russia, Germany, England, Austria and Hungary.

Balkan Issue:-

Nationalism & Conflict

The disintegration of the Ottoman Empire, coupled with the rise of romantic

Territorial Expansion

Balkan nations aggressively sought to expand and capture more territories from neighbouring regions.



It led to open wars and finally led it to the First World War.

Big Power Rivalry

Became a critical arena for massive power rivalries involving empires like Russia, Germany, England, and Austria-Hungary.

Led to World War I

This dangerous mix led to open conflicts, culminating directly in the outbreak of the First World War.



NATIONALISM IN EUROPE



Nationalism is a feeling of love, pride and loyalty towards one's nation. In Europe during the 19th century, it inspired people to fight for freedom, unity and the formation of nation-states.



CAUSES

1. IDEAS OF LIBERALISM

Spread of ideas of liberty, equality and fraternity inspired people to demand rights and self-government.



2. RISE OF MIDDLE CLASS

The middle class wanted political power and greater participation in governance.



3. ROMANTICISM

Writers, poets and artists glorified the nation, its culture, language, history and traditions.



4. FRENCH REVOLUTION (1789)

It inspired people with the ideas of liberty, equality and fraternity and spread nationalism.



5. UNIFICATION OF GERMANY AND ITALY

The unification of Germany and Italy inspired other nations to fight for unity and freedom.



IMPACT OF NATIONALISM

1. UNIFICATION OF GERMANY (1871)

German states were united under Prussia's leader Otto von Bismarck.



2. UNIFICATION OF ITALY (1861)

Different Italian states were united under the leadership of Count Cavour and Giuseppe Mazzini.



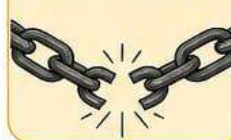
3. EMERGENCE OF NATION-STATES

Many countries in Europe became independent nation-states.



4. END OF FOREIGN RULE

People in many regions fought against foreign empires and gained freedom.



5. INSPIRATION TO THE WORLD

The spirit of nationalism in Europe inspired people in Asia, Africa and Latin America.



CONCERNS AND LIMITATIONS

1. EXCLUSION AND DISCRIMINATION

Nationalism often excluded people who spoke different languages, followed different religions or belonged to different ethnic groups.



2. CONFLICTS AND RIVALRIES

It led to rivalries among nations and eventually caused wars.



3. AGGRESSIVE NATIONALISM

Some nations promoted the idea of superiority over others.



4. IMPERIALISM

European powers used nationalism to justify colonialism and domination over other countries.



5. SUPPRESSION OF MINORITIES

Minority groups were often denied rights in the name of creating a 'one nation, one culture' policy.



CONCLUSION

Nationalism in Europe played a vital role in the 19th century. It helped in the unification of countries and the end of foreign rule. However, when taken to extremes, it also led to conflicts, discrimination and wars. Thus, while nationalism can unite people, it should always respect diversity and promote peace.

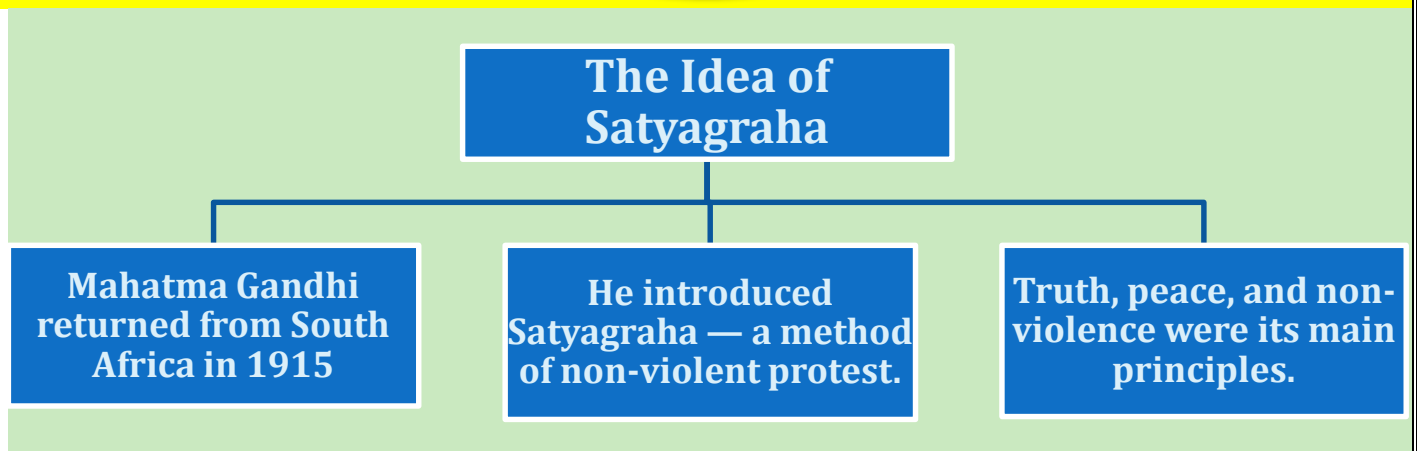

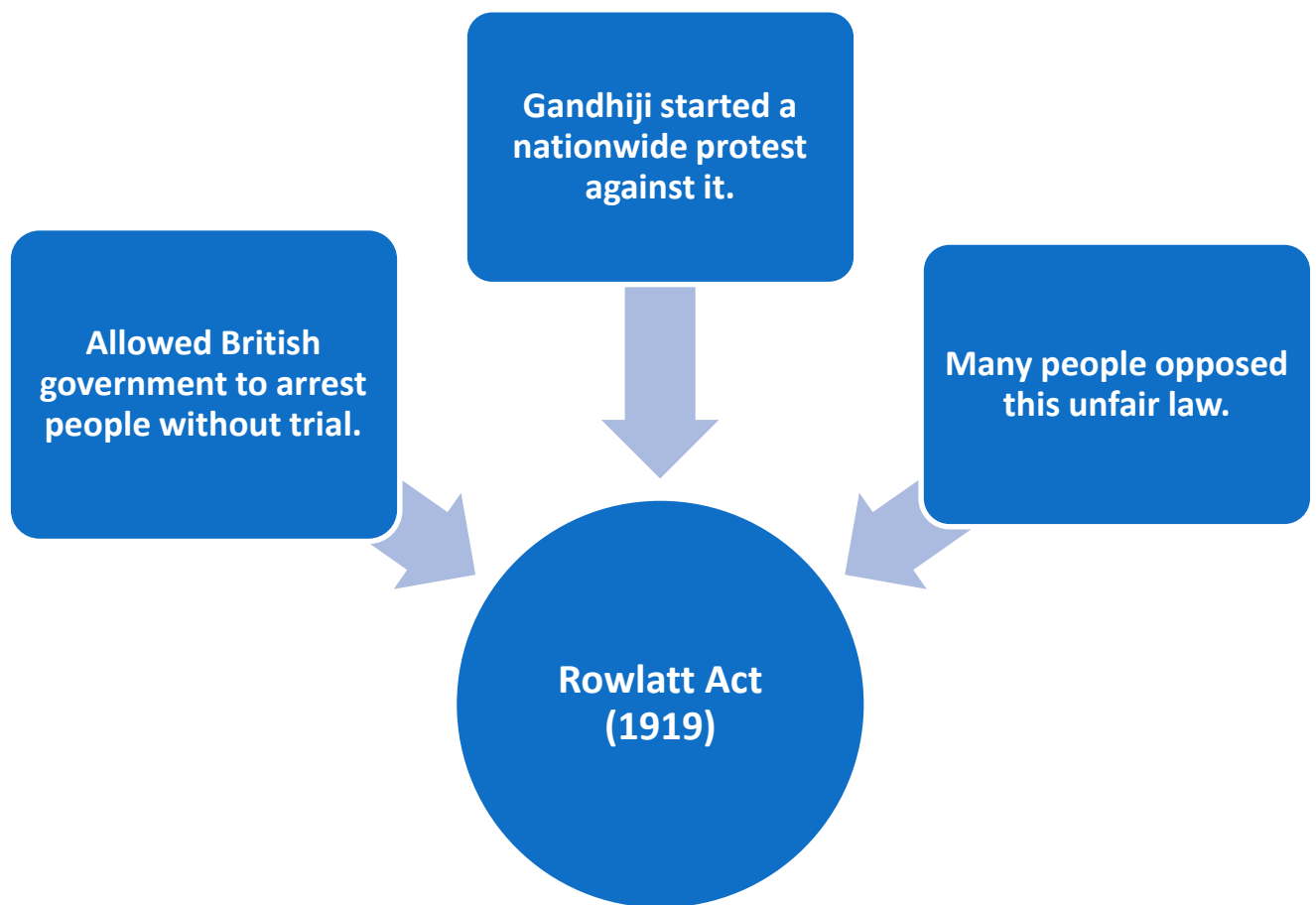


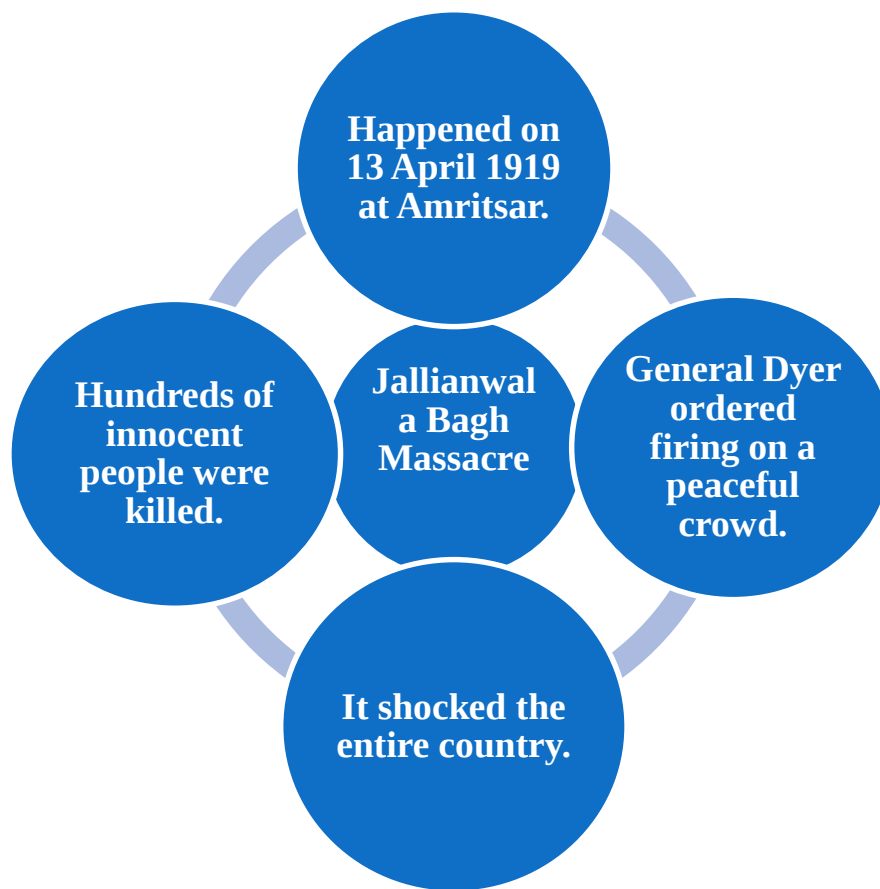
Important Movements:

Champaran (1917) – For indigo farmers.

Kheda (1917) – For peasants facing crop failure.

Ahmedabad Mill Strike (1918)
– For workers' rights.





Khilafat Movement

Gandhiji supported the Khilafat Movement to promote Hindu-Muslim unity.

The movement began after the defeat of Ottoman Turkey in World War I.

Indian Muslims opposed the harsh treatment of the Ottoman Caliph (Khalifa).

Khilafat Committee was formed in Bombay in March 1919

A young generation of Muslim leaders like the brothers Muhammad Ali and Shaukat Ali, began discussing with Mahatma Gandhi about the possibility of a united mass action on the issue.

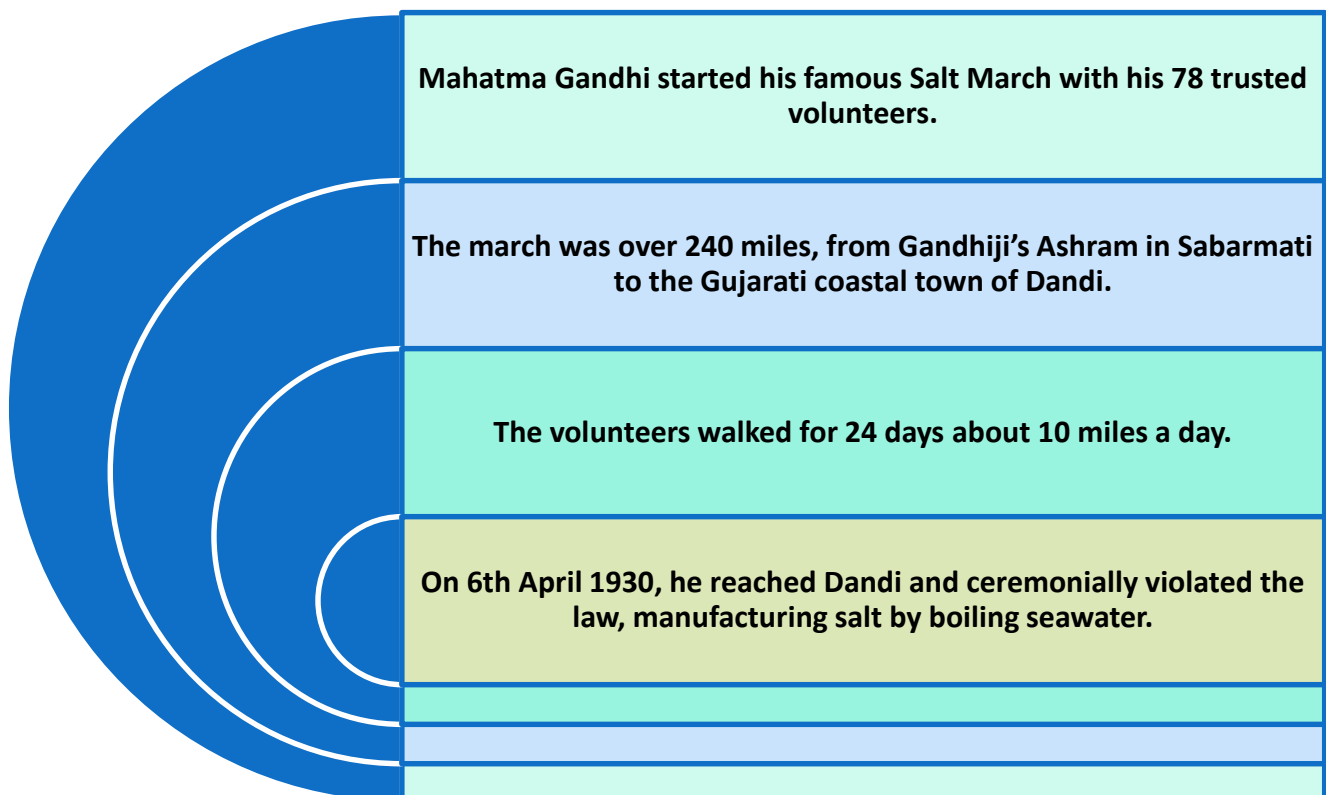
The Khilafat Movement became part of the Non-Cooperation Movement in 1920.

Civil Disobedience Movement: -

This marked the beginning of the Civil Disobedience Movement.

By this Gandhi-Irwin pact, Gandhiji consented to participate in a Round Table Conference in London and the government agreed to release the political prisoners.

In such situation, Mahatma Gandhi once again decided to call off the movement and entered into a pact with Irwin on 5th March 1931.

As the movement spread, foreign clothes were boycotted and liquor shops were picketed.

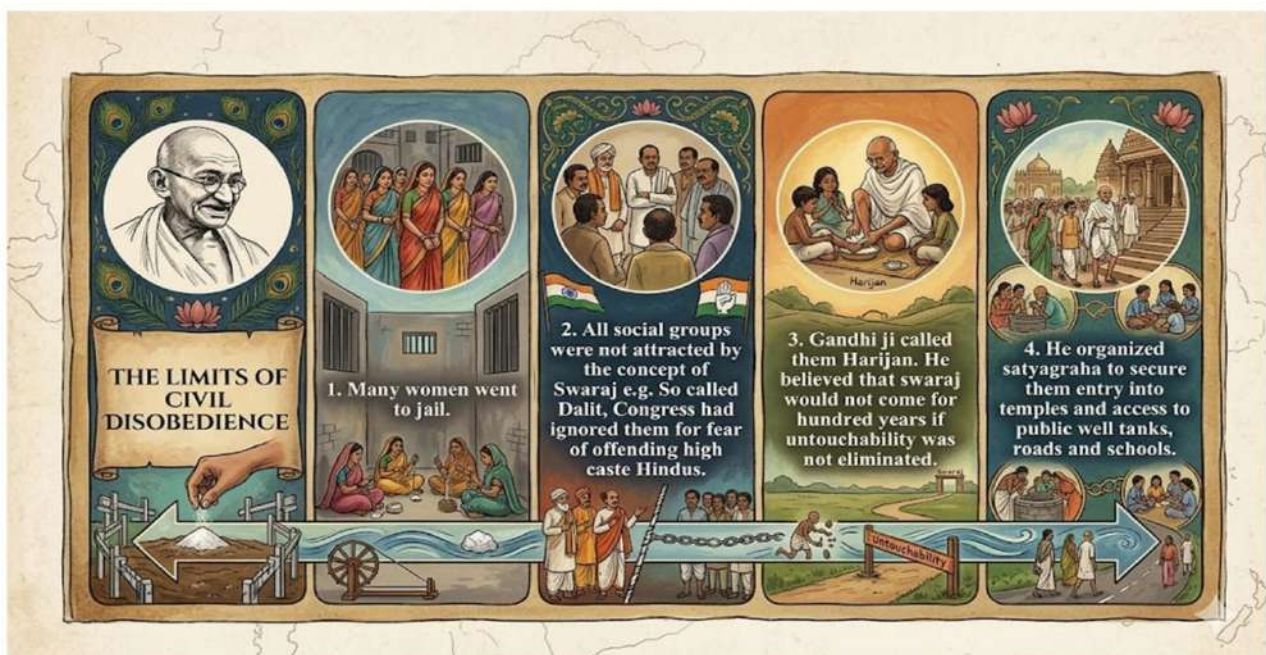
Peasants refused to pay revenue taxes.

Mahatma Gandhi was arrested in April 1930.

After the government began arresting the Congress leaders one by one.

The movement turns violent and the movement was called off.

Chauri Chaura incident (1922): A violent mob clashed with police; resulted in Gandhiji called off the Non-Cooperation Movement.



SENSE OF COLLECTIVE BELONGING: Constructing a National Identity



Nationalism gives feelings of same nation for all communities. Role of cultural factors history and fiction, folklore and songs, popular prints and symbols played their part in national struggle.

Representations the idea of Bharat Mata.

Role playing by bards, for collecting songs in popularization of folklore.

Development of Indian Flag during freedom movement.



Role of reconstruction of India's past history.

Writings on art, religion, law, philosophy in building pride of nation.

Emerging many voices wanting freedom from colonial rule.



QUIT INDIA MOVEMENT (1942) :-

- Started after the failure of the Cripps Mission and World War II tensions.
- Congress passed the Quit India Resolution on 14 July 1942 at Wardha.
- Gandhiji gave the "Do or Die" slogan on 8 August 1942 in Bombay.
- Major leaders Jayprakash Narayan, Aruna Asaf Ali, and Ram Manohar Lohia.
- Women leaders included Matangini Hazra, Kanaka Barua, and Rama Devi.

THE REFORMIST VOICE

Raja Ram Mohan Roy pioneered the movement in 1821 with Sambad Kaumudi. Ideas were printed in local languages like Bengali to reach the common public, challenging monotheism and traditional social rigidities.



ORTHODOX RESISTANCE

To counter radical reforms, the Hindu orthodoxy commissioned Samachar Chandrika. This triggered intense public controversies between reformers and traditionalists over matters like widow immolation and priesthood.

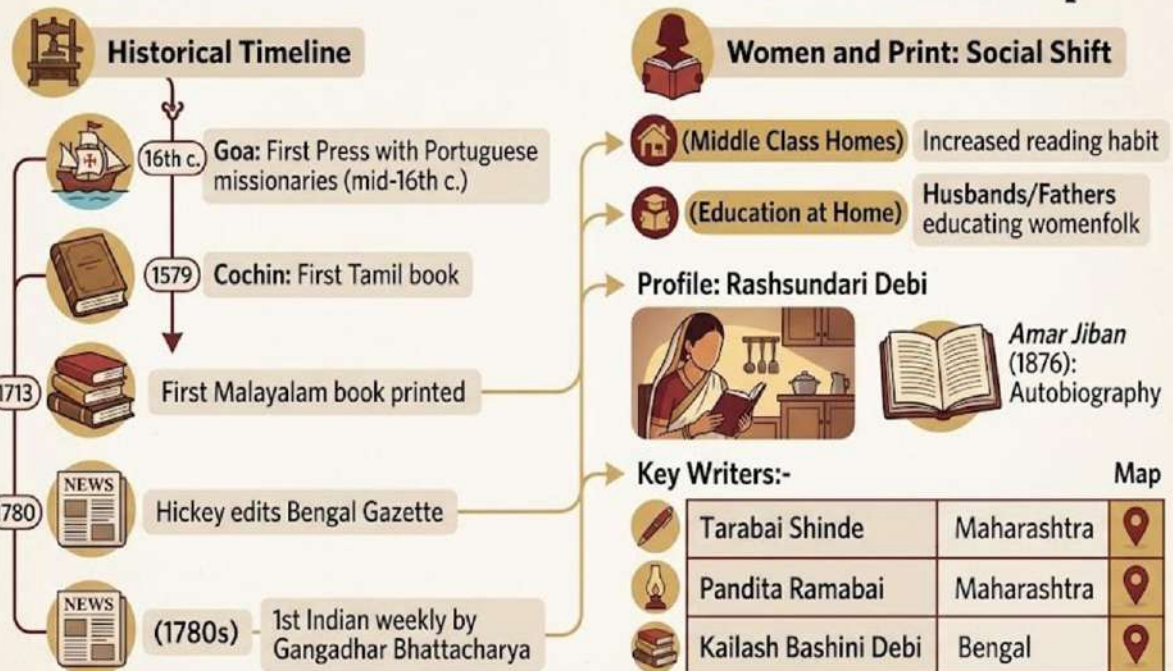


LINGUISTIC REACH

In **Sri Lanka**, power was concentrated in the hands of the majority community. It is mainly a **unitary system** where the central government has more power. Policies such as making **Sinhala the only official language** and giving preference to Sinhalese in jobs and education ignored the Tamil minority. This led to dissatisfaction, tensions, and eventually a civil war.

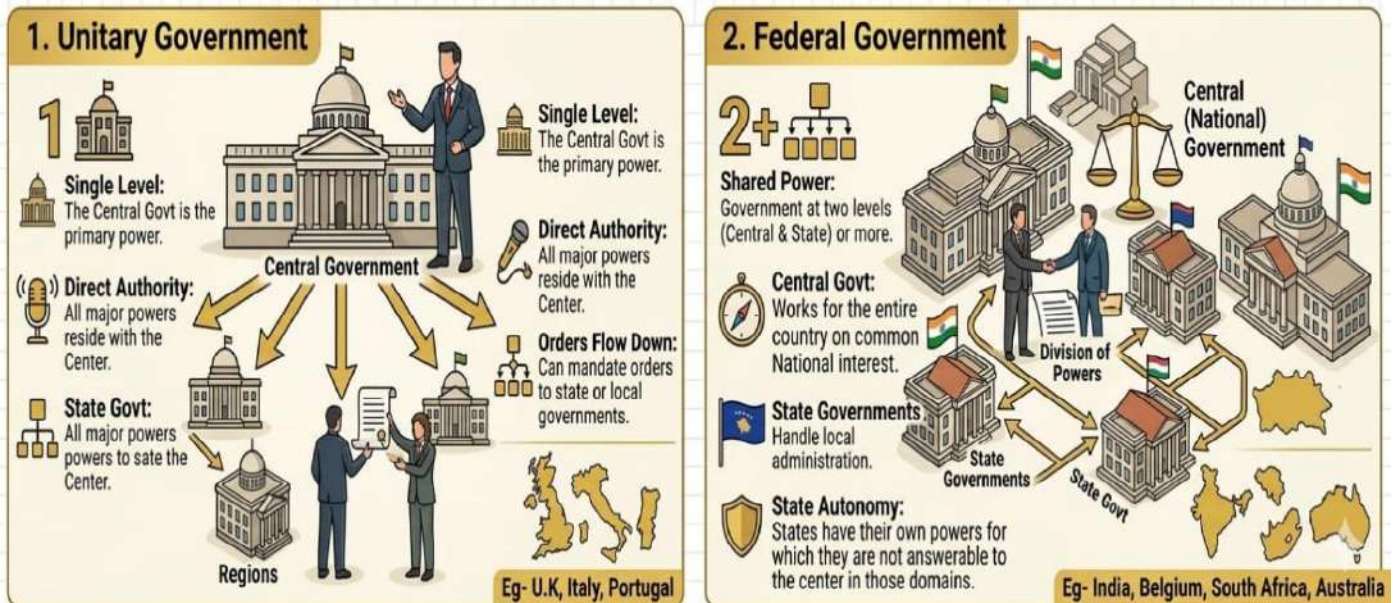

Caste -

- ❖ Social reformers who fought against Caste System are Gandhiji, Jyotiba Phule, B.R.Ambedkar, Periyar Ramaswami Naicker.
- ❖ Reasons for changes undergone in Caste system - Urbanization, Occupational mobility, breaking down of caste hierarchy (old notions) Constitution of India prohibited any caste-based discrimination, Ban on untouchability access to modern education.

5. Various forms of Caste in politics-

1. Democracy is such a political system in which citizens have the right to choose and control their government.

ECONOMIC GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT -

1. Despite having a good government in a democratic system, it is not necessary that there should always be development.
2. If we analyse all democracies and dictatorships between 1950 and 2000, we shall find that the rate of economic growth is slightly better in dictatorships.
3. Despite relatively low economic growth in a democracy, democracy is preferred all over the world. The main reason for this is that the democratic system is an open system in which the fundamental rights and freedoms of the people are respected.

REDUCTION OF INEQUALITY AND POVERTY-

- ❖ In theory, democracy promotes equality, but in practice: Wealth remains concentrated in the hands of a few.
- ❖ Disadvantaged groups (SCs, STs, women, minorities) still struggle for equality.
- ❖ Democracies try to create laws and policies to reduce poverty, but success varies from country to country.
- ❖ *Example:* Programmes like MGNREGA in India aim to reduce poverty through guaranteed employment.

ACCOMMODATION OF SOCIAL DIVERSITY –

ACCOMMODATION OF SOCIAL DIVERSITY

1. Democracies generally accommodate various social divisions and conflicts. Political, economic and social tensions and conflicts do not become explosive or violent due to democratic solutions. 
2. As we know that no society can totally and permanently resolve conflicts and tensions among different groups. Democracy is best suited to solve these differences. On the other hand, non-democratic governments often turn a blind eye to solve these problems. 
3. Nevertheless, the example of Sri Lanka reminds us that a democracy must fulfill two conditions in order to negotiate these difference. 
(A) We should know government functioning the majority always needs to work with the minority on general view of majority and minority are not always permanent.
(B) It is also essential that rule by majority does not become rule by majority community in terms of race, religion, and linguistic group, etc. Democracy can remain a democracy only when every citizen has the chance to be part of the majority at some point of the other. If any person of persons are denied to be part of the majority on the basis of birth, it would be a violation of democracy. 

DIGNITY AND FREEDOM OF THE CITIZENS-

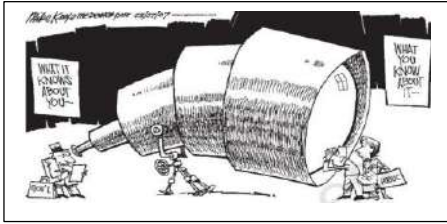

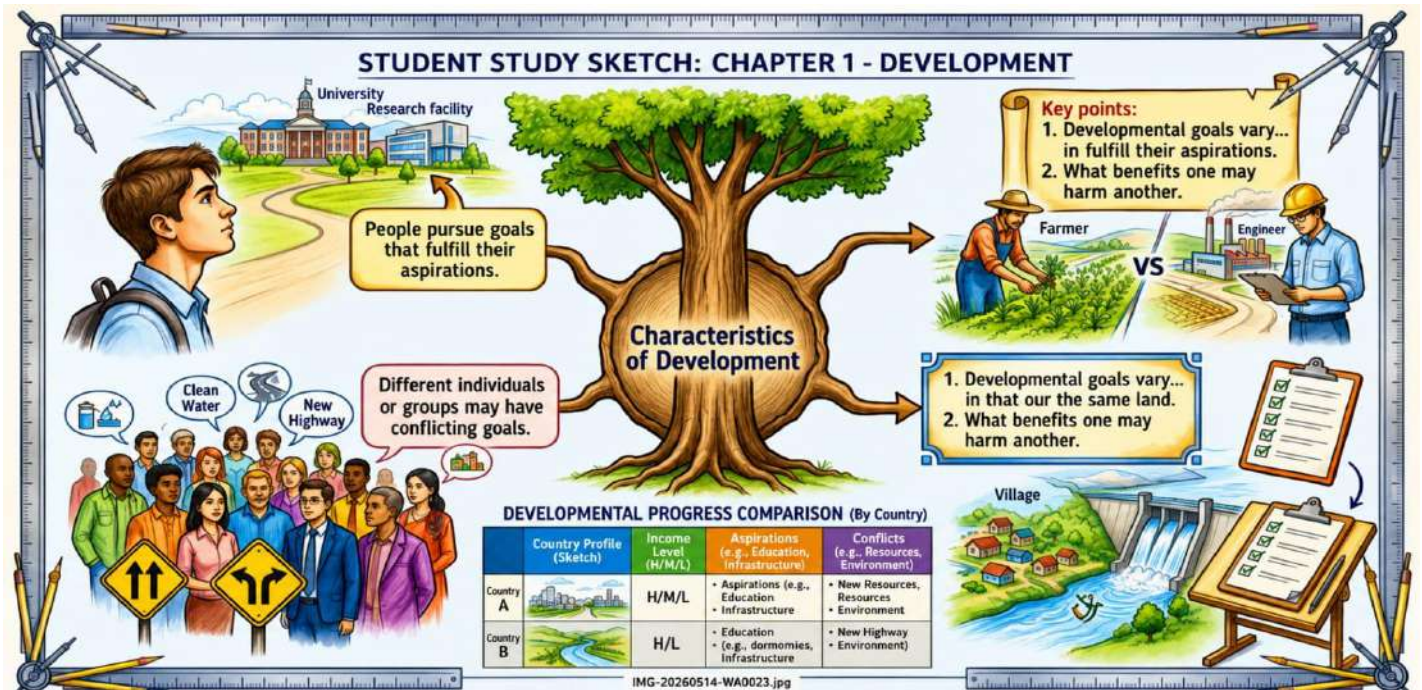

HOW TO COMPARE DIFFERENT COUNTRIES OR STATES

World Bank use income criteria for comparing countries, their income is considered to be one of the most important attributes. Countries with higher income are considered more developed than others with less income.

For comparison between countries, total income is not sufficient to measure a country therefore countries with different populations, may affect the average income /PCI. HDI, Literacy, Public facilities may also be considered for measuring a country.

Hence, we compare the average income which is the country income divided by its total population. The average income is also called per capita income.

India's Per Capita Income USD \$ 1,100, and comes under lower middle-income groups

PUBLIC FACILITIES:

- ❖ Money in your pocket cannot buy all the goods and services that you may need to live well.
- ❖ Income by itself is not a completely adequate indicator of material goods and services that citizens are able to use.
- ❖ Normally, money cannot buy the pollution-free environment or ensure that you get unadulterated medicines unless you can afford to shift to a community that already has all these things.
- ❖ Money may also not be able to protect you from infectious disease unless the whole of your community takes preventive steps.
- ❖ Money can not buy itself social security, safety and defense mechanism.

Even with increased income, a lack of access to education, healthcare, and safe water significantly impacts the quality of life and long-term sustainability of the region.

CHAPTER 2

SECTORS OF THE INDIAN ECONOMY

1. **Primary Sector**-It is related with natural resources. Like agriculture, fishing, forestry, mining, etc.

3. **Tertiary Sector** - Also called service sector. Provides support services to primary and secondary sectors. Examples banking, education, transport, healthcare, etc.

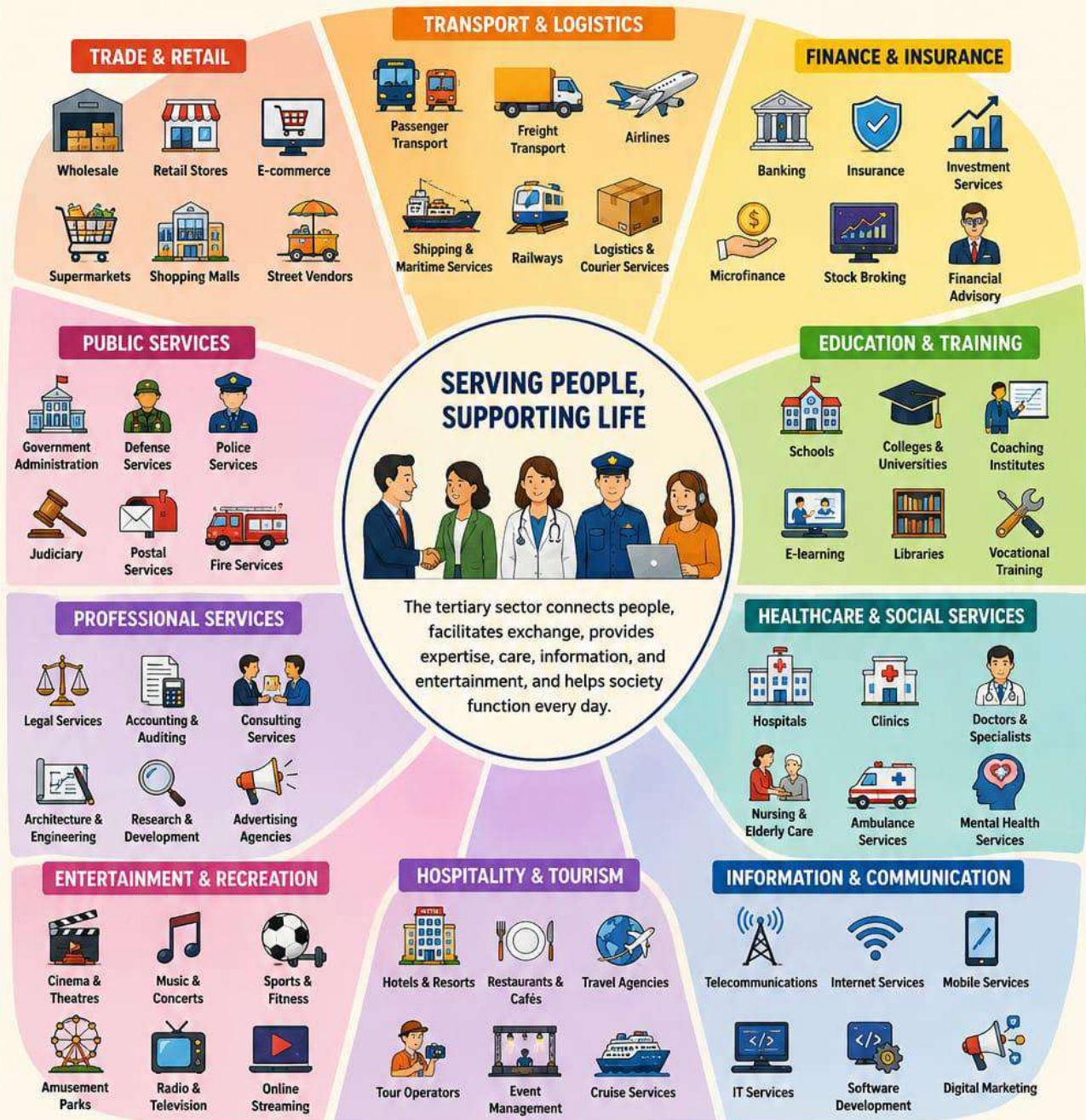

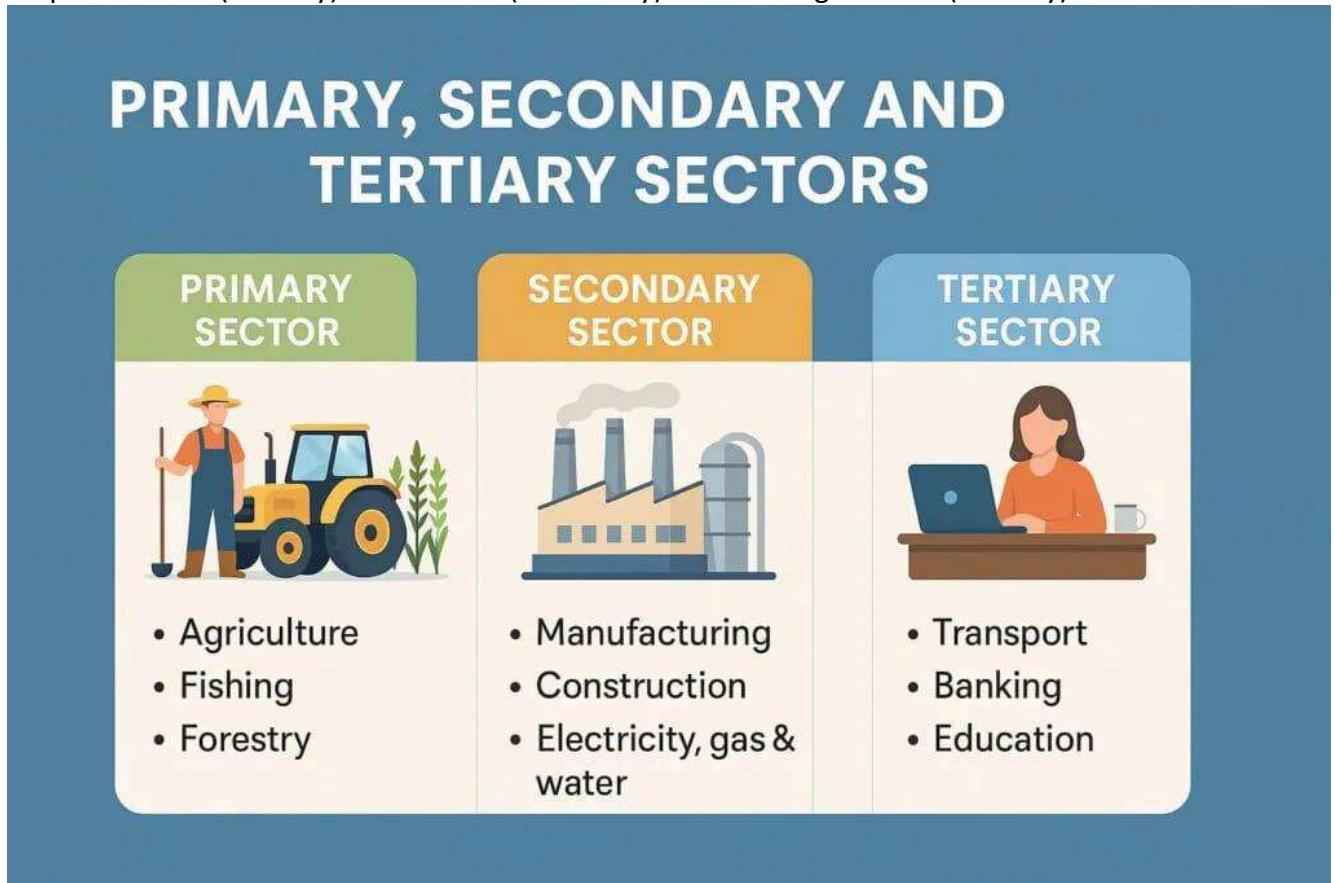

Interdependence of sectors

- Historical changes in the sectors. At initial stage of development, primary sector was the important sector of economic. More than hundred years ago secondary sector became important. In the past hundred years Tertiary sector has become important.
- Rising importance of Tertiary sector in production. Over the forty years Tertiary sector has emerged as the largest producing sector in India.

- Where are the most of the people working. More than half of the workers are working in primary sector.
- How to create more employment. Government can provide loan at low rate of interest, provide employment etc.

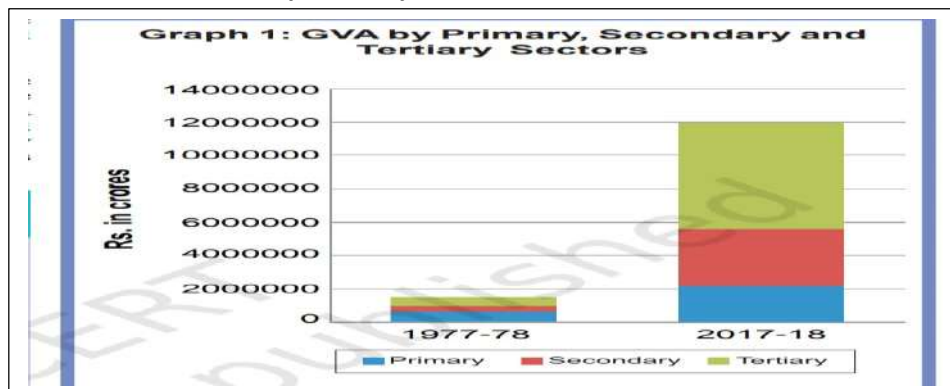

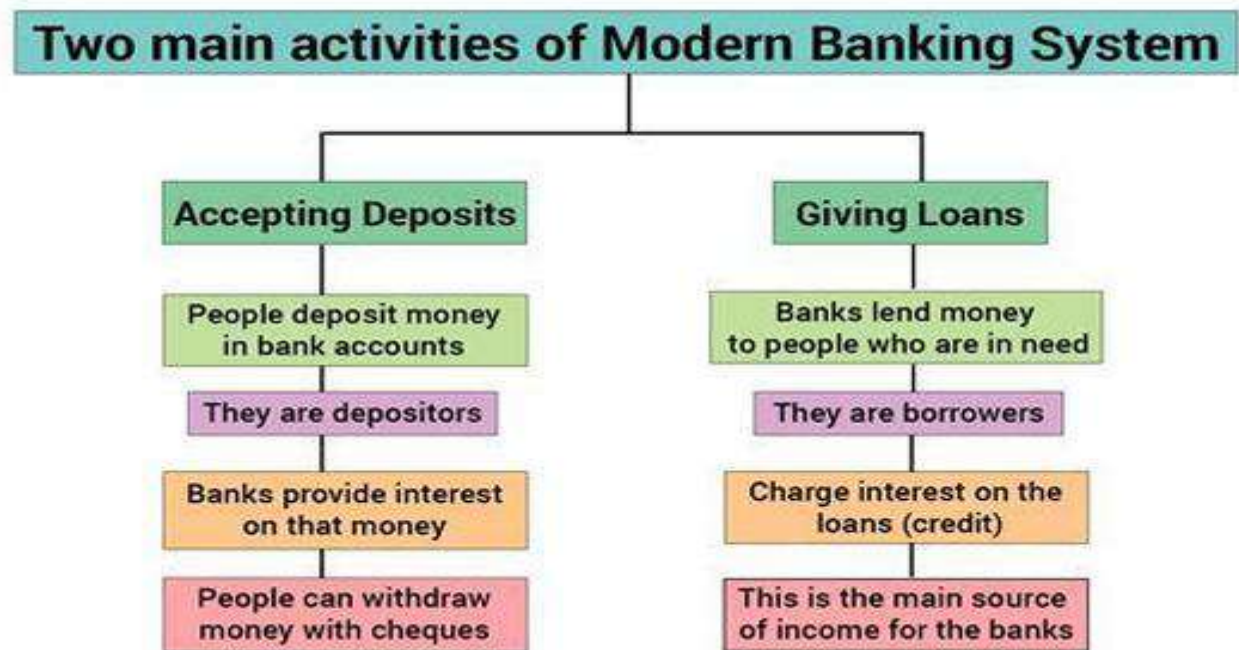

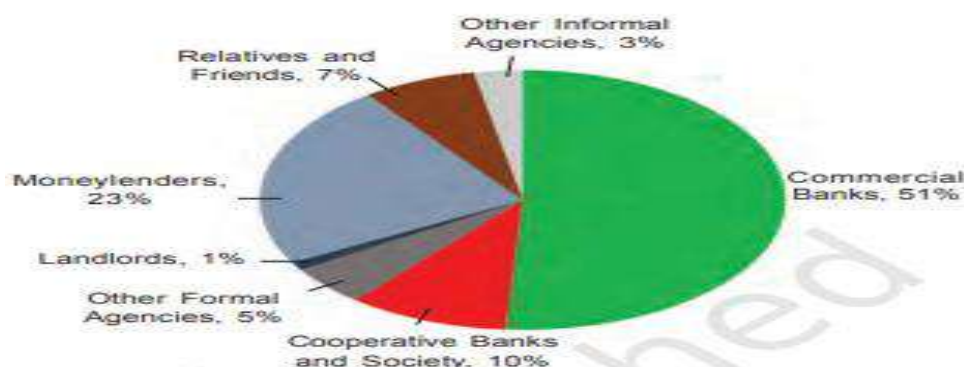

Sri Lanka emerged as an independent country in 1948. The leaders of the Sinhala community sought to secure dominance over government by virtue of their majority. As a result, the democratically elected government adopted a series of MAJORITARIAN measures to establish Sinhala supremacy. Over the years, it created feelings of alienation among the Sri Lankan Tamils. They felt that none of the major political parties led by the Buddhist Sinhala leaders was sensitive to their language and culture. As a result, the relations between the Sinhala and Tamil communities strained over time. On the other hand, the Belgian leaders took a different path. They recognised the existence of regional differences and cultural diversities. 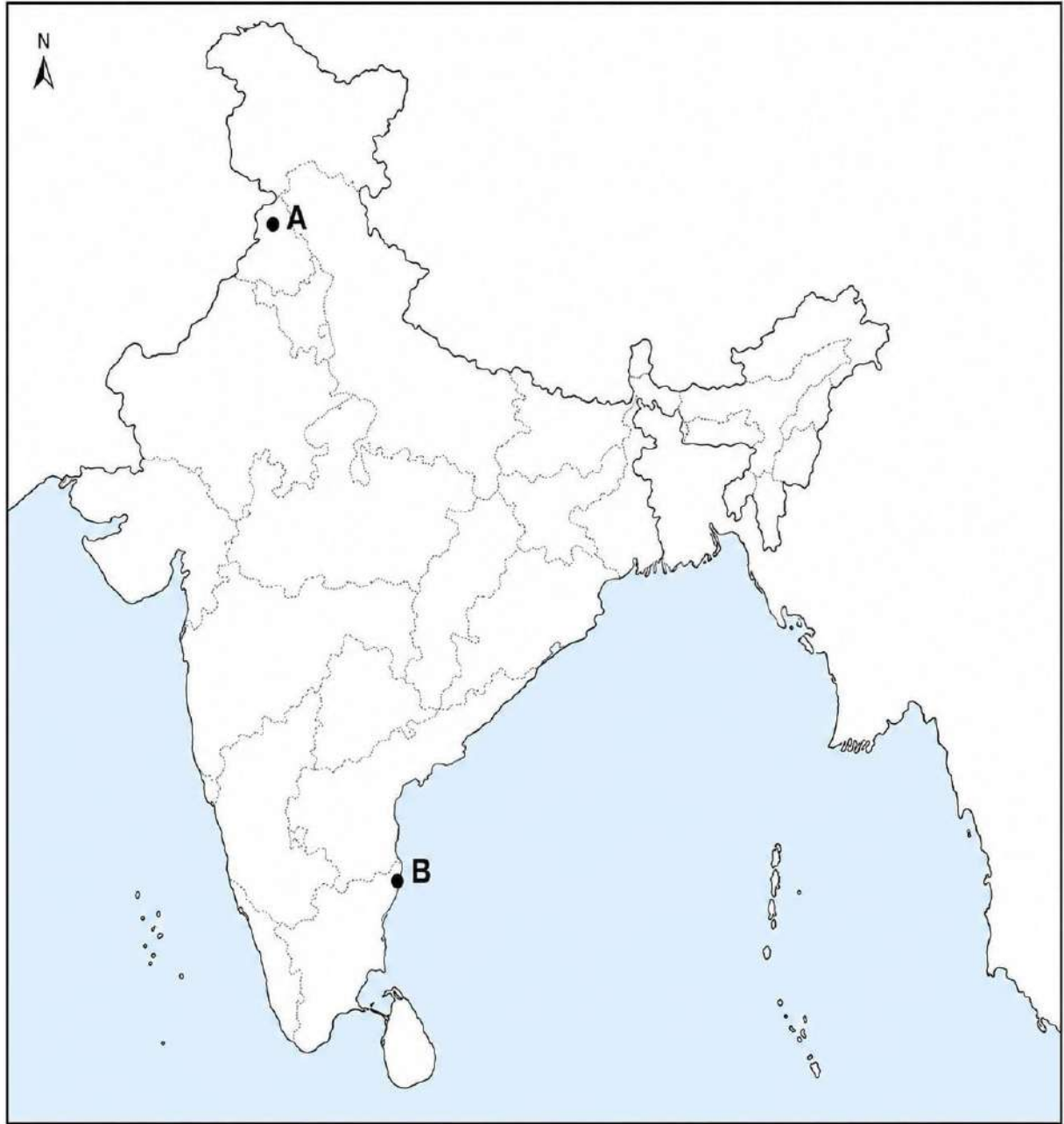

The movement started with the participation of the middle-class in the cities. When people read widely, they question blind traditions, demand justice and become aware of their rights. A printed page can travel to places where even political leaders may not reach." Social reformers used print to spread new ideas on widow remarriage, caste inequality and women's education. At the same time, censorship laws were passed by colonial officials who feared that print could provoke opposition.
