
The story of Joanne Kathleen Rowling's near magical rise to fame is almost as well known as the characters she creates. Rowling was constantly writing and telling stories to her younger sister Dianne. "My parents, both of whom come from impoverished backgrounds and neither of whom had been to college, took the view that my overactive imagination was an amusing personal quirk that would never pay a mortgage or secure a pension."

A writer from the age of six, with two unpublished novels in the drawer, she was stuck on a train when Harry walked into her mind fully formed. She spent the next five years constructing the plots of seven books, one for every year of his secondary school life. Rowling says she started writing the first book, Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone, in Portugal, where she was teaching English.

At first nobody wanted to publish Harry Potter. She was told that plot was too complex. Refusing to compromise, she found a publisher. In 1997 Rowling received her first royalty cheque. By book three, she had sky rocketed to the top of the publishing world. A row of zeroes appeared on the author's bank balance and her life was turned upside down. Day and night she had journalists knocking on the unanswered door of her flat.

Rowling's quality control has become legendary, as her obsession with accuracy. She's thrilled with Stephen Fry's taped version of the books and outraged that an Italian dust jacket showed Harry minus his glasses. "Don't they understand that the glasses are the clue to his vulnerability?"

Here's how COVID-19 affected education

- 1. When the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 to be a pandemic on 11 March 2020, few could have foreseen the catastrophic effects the virus would have on the education of the world's children.
- 2. As an OECD report into the effects of school closures in 2021 put it: "Few groups are less vulnerable to the coronavirus than school children, but few groups have been more affected by the policy responses to contain the virus." Nearly 147 million children missed more than half of their in-person schooling between 2020 and 2022, UNICEF says. And it warns that many, especially the most vulnerable, are at risk of dropping out of education altogether.



- 3. The danger is highlighted by UNICEF data showing that 43% of students did not return when schools in Liberia reopened in December 2020. The number of out-of-school children in South Africa tripled from 250,000 to 750,000. When schools in Uganda reopened after being closed for two years, almost one in ten children were missing from classrooms. And in Malawi, the dropout rate among girls in secondary education increased by 48% between 2020 and 2021.
- 4. Out-of-school children are among the most vulnerable and marginalized children in society, says UNICEF. They are the least likely to be able to read, write or do basic maths, and when not in school they are at risk of exploitation and a lifetime of poverty and deprivation, it says.



Catalysing Clean Air in India

1. Globally, air pollution is a silent killer. The air pollution levels in India are among the highest in the world, posing a heavy threat to the country's health and economy. All of India's 1.4 billion people are exposed to unhealthy levels of ambient PM 2.5 – the most harmful pollutant - emanating from multiple sources. Exposure to PM 2.5 can cause such deadly illnesses as lung cancer, stroke, and heart disease. Air pollution is estimated to have caused 1.7 million premature deaths in India in 2019. The health impacts of pollution also represent a heavy cost to the economy. Lost labour income due to fatal illness is a major economic challenge.



"The earth has everything for our needs but not for our greed."

Gandhi, M.K.

Gandhi had cautioned the world, much before any modern-day environmentalist, about the problems of large-scale industrialization, which we are confronting today. Gandhi visualised that mechanisation would not only lead to industrialization, to massive urbanization, and unemployment, but would also lead to the destruction of the environment. His seminal work, Hind Swaraj, written a hundred years ago in 1909, warned of the dangers the world is facing today in the form of environmental destruction and the threat to the planet. The Gandhian idea becomes even more relevant when sustainable growth and development is to be achieved because he emphasised production by the masses instead of mass production. According to him, this will result in the development of an economic system that can minimise environmental degradation and achieve sustainable development.

Gandhi's overall social and environmental philosophy is based on what human beings need rather than what they want. His early introduction to the teachings of Jains, Theosophists, Christian sermons, Ruskin and Tolstoy, and most significantly, the Bhagavad Gita, were to have a profound impact on the development of Gandhi's holistic thinking on humanity, nature, and their ecological interrelation. His deep concern for the underprivileged, the poor, and the rural population created an environment conducive to alternative social thinking that was both far-sighted and local. For Gandhi was acutely aware that the demands generated by the need to feed and sustain human life, combined with India's increasing industrialization, far outstripped nature's finite resources.

Gandhi was also concerned about the destruction of the existing infrastructure, which had more potential for keeping a community flourishing within ecologically-sensitive traditional patterns of subsistence, especially in the rural areas. It always stood in contradiction with western alternatives,

which were based on nature-blind technology and the enslavement of human spirit and energy. Perhaps the moral principle for which Gandhi is best known is that of active non-violence, derived from the traditional moral restraint of not injuring another being. The most refined expression of this value is in the great epic of the Mahabharata (c. 100 BCE to 200 CE), where moral development proceeds through placing constraints on the liberties, desires and greed endemic to human life. One's actions are judged in terms of consequences and the impact they are likely to have on another. Jains had generalised this principle to include all sentient creatures and bio communities alike. Advanced Jaina monks and nuns will sweep their path to avoid harming insects and even bacteria. Non-injury is a non-negotiable universal prescription.

Read the passage given below.

- 1. One of the traits that gets overvalued the most is frankness. However, unrestrained, and unfiltered frankness may lead to the end of even the closest of relationships. Such frankness is understandable, acceptable, and even 'cute' in children under the age of five.
- 2. Thinking before one speaks and using restraint are hallmarks of growing maturity and preparation for life. Learning to put a filter between thoughts and spoken words (and, even more importantly, written words) is an important life skill. Think is an acronym that stands for True, Helpful, Inspiring, Necessary, and Kind. This would work fantastically well as a mental filter
- 3. It is good to speak what is true, but only along with the other attributes in the acronym, particularly the last one, kindness. In the righteous glow of speaking what we see as the truth, we often forget to be kind. We blurt out truth even when it is totally unhelpful and unnecessary to do so, let alone inspiring! Too often, such truth-telling is destructive rather than noble. Only those who do not care about the consequences can afford the luxury of speaking their minds' whenever and wherever they please. When relationships are at stake, it is essential to choose the time, place, and words appropriately when imparting unpleasant truths. And even then, only when necessary and with the utmost kindness.
- 4. Speaking without forethought can be even more dangerous in other circumstances, for example, when someone has entrusted us with a secret. A sign of maturity is the ability to keep a secret. Very young children are incapable of understanding the concept of a secret. To them, every piece of information is interesting, new and meant to be shared. As we grow older, we all learn how to keep a secret, but too often we keep only our own secrets and not those that others confide in us. We may blurt out something a friend told us in confidence, perhaps carelessly, but often to appear important

in other people's estimation. It gives us a sense of power to know something that our friends don't, and it requires conscious effort to keep information to ourselves.

An effective formal letter has the following parts:

1. Sender's Address

It is the address of the writer. It is written at the top left-hand corner of the page. If the address consists of several parts, each part should be written in a separate line.

For example,

House no 29

Mangal Pandey Nagar

Mumbai-232344

Note: Do not put a comma at the end of each line.

2. Date

Either of the given formats can be used to write the date:

15 January 20xx OR January 15,20xx.

Note: Do not use abbreviations like Jan, Feb. Do not write19 instead of 2019.

3. Receiver's Address

All official letters are addressed to the authority/post of the person. Hence, we write the receiver's address after addressing the official.

For example,

The Manager

Nandilath Electronics

Gandhi Street

Kannur

4. Subject

It expresses the main theme or objective of the letter clearly. It must be as brief and concise as possible.

5. Salutation

It is the greeting to the person to whom the letter is addressed. In the official letter, we use Sir /Madam or Dear sir/Dear madam.

Note: When writing the salutation, we have to keep in mind the gender of the receiver if specified in the question.

6. Body of the Letter

Contains all the information that the writer wants to convey .The body includes three main parts:

- i) An Introductory paragraph or sentence-It states the purpose of writing the letter.
- ii) Informative paragraph-Gives details of the problem. Its causes, effects, possible solutions, etc.
- iii) Concluding paragraph /sentence-It states your hopes, comments, requests suggestions to solve the problems and rectify the complaint.

7. Complementary Close

It is a courteous way of ending the letter. We can write -Yours sincerely

Note: the first letter of the second word here(s) is never written in the capital. Do not use Yours's instead of Yours.

8. Signature

This is the sender's name. If applicable ,the sender's designation may be added below the name.

LETTER OF COMPLAINT (BUSINESS/OFFICIAL)

Letter of Complaint

Letter of complaint is written to address any type of wrong doing, grievance, or inconvenience arising out of product service, etc. The purpose of such a letter is to raise a concern about unfair things and seek a productive outcome. It helps to preserve any legal rights you may have in the situation. It also ensures the receiver knows your side of the story. The language of these letters has to be polite. Theletterincludes the following

- <u>In case of product or service:</u>
 - i. Details of the faulty productor service.
 - ii. Natureofcomplaint replacement of productor refund
 - iii. Payment information -Bill, cash memo etc.
- <u>In case of grievances</u>
 - i. Details of the grievances.
 - ii. Natureofcomplaint- social problem or personal grievances
 - iii. Date and place of the wrong doing (if applicable)
 - iv. Compensation or corrective action required.

Any other details necessary for resolving the complaint

TECHNIQUE:

- Write about the issue, complaint, order, reply ,quotation ,or the information that you need to provide.
- Explain the issue and your efforts to solve it.
- Use a polite tone when writing a letter of complaint.
- Do not use words or sentences that are irrelevant to the topic. Rather, go straight tto the point.

WRITING TIPS

Although the motive of the complaint letter is to vent out your grievance and frustration, you must use a tone that is polite and simple.

- 1. Try to be formal and avoid using offensive and disrespectful words.
- 2. Make sure that you introduce yourself properly.
- 3. The purpose of writing should be loud and clear.
- 4. Do not deviate from the topic and write to the point.
- 5. Make sure you adhere to the format as it carries marks.
- 6. Underline the subject of the letter with a pencil. Also, underlining the main points is very important but you should do it after finishing your exam. Use a pencil and scale to underline.

- 7. Make sure you double-check for grammatical accuracy and spelling. They carry marks.
- 8. Leave an adequate number of lines between paragraphs to make It look clean.

ANALYTICAL PARAGRAPH WRITING

What is an Analytical Paragraph?

An analytical paragraph is a form of descriptive writing which is written based on a given chart, graph, data, outline, clues, table etc. It requires analysis and comparison of the given facts and drawing conclusions based on the given data. When writing an analytical paragraph, one should remember to describe the facts in the best possible manner and cover the information provided. The paragraph must use clear and crisp language along with providing complete details of the data provided in the question.

Features of an Analytical Paragraph:

- It describes the given chart, table, data, graph, cues etc.
- It should be brief and comprehensive but at the same time, include complete information.
- It should state the facts that are provided.
- It should have simple and accurate language.
- It should mention figures and quantities appropriately.
- It should use the same tense throughout, as far as possible.
- It should not provide any personal observation or response.
- It should preferably use the passive form of the verb.
- It should be written in about 100 to 120 words.

Format of an Analytical Paragraph

The content of the paragraph must include the following:

- **Introduction** (explain in one or two lines the context or what is clearly evident from the chart or graph)
- Body of the paragraph (explain in detail the figure and trends, making comparisons and contrasts)
- Conclusion (give the overall view or summary of the chart or graph)

Points to Remember

- We must not include any personal opinions, conclusions or observations but simply stick to the facts.
- We must choose wisely the important information, organize it well, state the correct facts and summarize it properly.
- For the introduction, we can start with phrases such as chart given above describes.../The given table suggests.../ The line graph shows.../ The data given provides information about.../ The pie chart illustrates..., etc.
- For the body of the paragraph, we should organize the information well. We should look for the large differences that are very prominent. We can mention the aspect which is the smallest or the largest in the data given. Any similar aspect should be mentioned next. We should further mention the aspect that has remained unchanged or is constant throughout.
- If the chart or table mentions two different groups, we should refer to both of them in the paragraph. If there is any contrast or comparison that could be drawn, we must present it effectively. If the chart is about a particular period or highlights trends of several years, we should concisely mention each year. If any comparison or contrast can be made for two or more years, we should write about that too. For describing the pattern of growth, we can use words and phrases like-rapidly doubled, skyrocketed, striking increase, peaked, soared, declined, plummeted, levelled off, stagnated, fluctuating, starting to rise, starting to fall, drop down, slightly etc.
- Mentioning quantities: When including numbers and figures, accuracy must be ensured. Quantities can be described in several ways, such as percentages, fractions, ratios etc. For describing quantities, we can also use words and phrases like one-third of, nearly one-fourth of, majority, on an average, twice as much, almost equal, the highest, the lowest, approximately, etc.
- For establishing a relationship or contrast, we can make use of words and phrases like-similarly, in contrast with, in comparison to, however, whereas, as opposed to, while, a striking difference, a noticeable difference, etc.
- For conclusion, we may use words and phrases like overall, subsequently, in all, in a nutshell, in short, therefore, etc.


Internet Activities of People

The given table suggests the internet activities of six age groups ranging from teens to those in their seventies for six different kinds of activities on the internet. The table shows that the younger generation is more interested in online games and news, whereas the older generation spends time on the internet in order to research and buy products. It is evident from the table that 81% of the teens mainly use the internet for playing online games, and many are also interested in news and downloads as well as in buying products. The middle-age group, that is, people in the age group ranging from 20s to 60s is highly interested in getting news, doing product research and buying products, with the percentage ranging from 70-80%. The internet activity which gets the least time is searching for people. All the age groups spend less than 30% of their internet time on the same. Sample 2 - The following bar chart shows the number of times per week (in 1000s) over five weeks, that three computer packages were downloaded from the internet.



The bar chart illustrates the download rate per week of Active X, Java and Net computer packages over a period of five weeks. It can clearly be seen that Active X was the most popular computer package to be downloaded, whilst Net was the least popular of the three. The downloading of Active X and Java showed similar patterns, with both gradually increasing from Week 1 to Week 5. However, the purchases of Active X remained significantly higher than that of the other products during this time frame. In Week 1, the purchases of Active X stood at around 75,000, Net at 30,000 and Java just above 40,000. With the exception of a slight fall in Week 4, downloading of Active X kept increasing until it reached a peak in the final week of just over 1,20,000. Java downloads also increased at a steady rate of over 80,000 in the fifth week. The product that was downloaded the least was Net. This began at slightly under 40,000, and in contrast to the other two products, fell over the next two weeks to reach a low of approximately 25,000. It then increased sharply over the following two weeks to finish at about 50,000, which was well below Java that stood at over 70,000 downloads and Active X crossing 1,20,000. To conclude between the three computer packages, the most sort after is Active X, followed by Java, while the least downloaded package is Net.









He faced regular taunting and humiliations from his family. They even threatened to let him starve at the ledge unless he flew away. They say that necessity is the mother of invention. Maddened by hunger, he dived at the fish which his mother was carrying in her beak in order to tempt him to take the first plunge. He felt his wings spreading outwards. Finally, he soared to come down over the sea. He floated on the green sea, as he mustered up confidence and courage. His family felt proud and joyous about his achievement. They celebrated his success by screaming around him and offering him pieces of tiger fish.

2. Home is the first school, parents the first teachers. Proper guidance is a necessity. Good manners, morals, and values should be developed by parents. It is the responsibility of the parents to develop good character traits in children. Children need help to get educated and to become assets of the country.

The sudden marriage of Lomov and Natalya creates laughter. Chubukov puts his daughter's hand in Lomov's in a foolish manner. Lomov is a comic character. His complaints about his poor health provoke laughter. Thus, the play gives us a lot of laughter.
- 3. Lomov was a middle-aged man of thirty-five. He suffered from palpitations and sleeplessness. So, he was desperate to settle down in life, and lead a quiet and normal life. Despite his ailments, Lomov was a rich and prosperous farmer. This makes Chubukov secretly wish him to marry his daughter Natalya. However, despite the negativity, when the crow shakes down the dust of snow onto the poet, it also shakes off some of his regretful thoughts. Today, when all of us live in stressful atmospheres, the poem teaches us to gain happiness from simple things.
- 3. Response matters a lot. Inherent values can be picked up by adopting a positive attitude towards nature. Each little thing in nature can teach us some important lessons at times and even a small flake of snow has its own significance. We should not judge anything by its appearance. Even crow and hemlock tree known as bad omens can bring cheerfulness and uplift the poet's mood. One should live his present with mindfulness. Each moment is filled with life and offers a chance to realise it. Take a moment to breath and unwind, so that one can find the true purpose of being here.

In the first stanza, the first, third- and fourth-lines end with the words fire, desire, fire – same rhythm but the second line ends with the word 'ice', a different note, also it contrasts with 'fire'.

Thus, the poet has brought out the contrasting ideas in the poem by using different rhythms.

The poet tells us about the negative emotion called desire and how it leads to put an end of the world. The poet also uses another contrasting emotion called ice in between to portray that the rigidity and hatred among people who belongs to other gender, religion, ethnicity and nationality etc will be sufficient enough to wipe out the planet, if it has a second birth.

LONG ANSWERS 6 marks

1. Robert Frost was a great scholar in Greek and Roman philosophy. According to the Greek philosopher Aristotle, everything was made up of four elements: earth, water, air, and fire.

Post World War 1, several people postulated multiple theories about the end of the world. One of them was by greed and desire. Another popular assumption was by hatred and indifference. Frost

conceived both these believes, which is truly reflected in the poem, first published two years after the war.

Man is pulled by equally powerful extremes – fire and ice. According to the poet, the negative traits of avarice, lust and fury will lead to the ultimate end of man and the land (earth) he belongs to. The lack of positive human emotions like empathy and sympathy to fellow creatures results in the complete destruction of the planet.

The poet tells us that we are learning no lessons from our own past by citing a possible second death of the earth – now by a polarly opposite phenomenon-ice. Here the poet uses ice as the metaphor for the negative attributes - insensitivity, coldness, intolerance, indifference, rigidity and hatred.

2. Frost portraits the two of the darkest features of humanity; the capacity to be consumed by lust or desire and the capacity to hate. Of the two unparalleled evils, the poet beliefs in stronger negativity of desire. Through this, the poet is giving a philosophical perspective of personal hedonism of individuals which leads him to desire, greed and jealousy. Like the pied piper, man leads every other individual to total self-destruction.

Frost gives almost equal gravity to another dominant negative trait called hatred. The insensitivity, coldness, intolerance, indifference, lack of flexibility and hatred are represented as ice which sledges the dominant inhabitants of the planet through the complete destruction of the planet itself.

3. The poem FIRE AND ICE was composed in 1920, two years after the first world war, which had a massive impact on the human society. Through the poem, the poet comes with the two possible causes for the end of the world. The poet focuses on two darkest human traits – greed (FIRE) and hatred (ICE). The poet thinks that the unsatiable lust and unfathomable avarice will lead to the destruction of the earth which we belong to. If the earth resurrects, it will face the second death due to another negative attribute of humans – hatred.

As both these traits will wipe out humans from the planet and will lead to the death of the earth, our habitat, we should overcome the two most extreme negativity by spreading positive traits like empathy and love and create a feeling of belongingness and brotherhood.

I think the poem is relevant even after a century of its composition. Our lust for happiness had led the massive destruction of other species in the planet and other phenomena including global warming. Our hatred to people who belongs to other gender, religion, ethnicity and nationality is dragging us to the world of wars, which eventually leads to the end of the world itself.

Here, the tiger changed his natural self by controlling his natural instinctive fierce behaviour inside the zoo. His freedom to growl, hunt and terrorize were snatched away from him. It touches our heart and makes us empathise with the tiger when he is shown helpless captive, watching stars at night and not even being able to sleep due to blaring of sirens of patrolling cars. This shows the cruelty of man on the animals by keeping them in captivity like animals in the zoo.

2. Freedom is an essential virtue valued by all. Not only humans but even the denizens of the forest value it. No one knows it better than a caged tiger in a zoo. Animals, particularly the animals of the wilds, feel free only in their natural habitats. Any attempt to 'domesticate' ferocious and mighty animals like lions or tigers by locking them in concrete cells will be against natural justice. The tiger roams around in the jungle hunting its prey at will. He rarely kills his prey for sport. He kills them only when he is hungry. He knows how to ambush his prey. He lurks unnoticed in the long grass before pouncing upon his prey. He also knows where he can find his favourite plump deer. He may come out of the forest sometimes and terrorise -the villagers living at the outskirts of the jungle. He rarely kills them till he is provoked.

The same tiger feels depressed and is in low spirits when he is put behind the bars. He stalks constantly the length of his cage in his 'quiet rage'. He ignores the visitors and feels helpless. Behind the bars, he keeps on staring at the brilliant stars in the open sky. This sadly reminds him of his loss of freedom and intensifies his grief.

3. It is true that animals, big and small are being used by humans for their selfish ends. We use them for our own benefits. Animals are killed, poached and captured for commercial benefits. Humans have encroached on their space and sheltered them in zoos which is truly inhuman. In the poem, the poet has shown the plight of a tiger. He is captured and confined in a small cage. He is frustrated, angry and restless. It longs for freedom. Confinement brings bondage and bondage is cruel.

Every day we see many animals suffering due to humans. Monkeys and bears are captured and are made to dance on roads. Elephants are chained and are forced to lift heavy loads. Many animals are sheltered in zoos for the entertainment of human beings. They are kept in poor conditions. They are treated inhumanely. We should learn to respect nature and its inhabitants. After all, these animals to share the earth with us.



The poet Carolyn Wells retains humorous tone throughout the poem. The poet is using the literary device called Black Humour (Dark Humour). This literary device is used to outrage the reader and retain his attention till the end of the work of art. It also gives comic relief to the reader from complex subject matters. The way the ferocious animals are depicted in the poem creates laughter instead of fear. Waiting to identify the Asian Lion as it roars at you and the noble Bengal Tiger greeting you to eat, the way the leopard leps at you and the bear hugs you, the cunning hyenas and crocodiles fake pretensions and the way chameleon changes its colour all evokes laughter in the minds of the reader.
- 2. The irony occurs in the title 'How to Tell Wild Animals' when the poet says if ever we go to jungle to see a wild animal from close quarters, we may be attacked by the wild animal. In that case we may not be alive to tell others about the wild animals. It is ironical that the noble Bengal Tiger eats you the moment he sees you. It does no good to roar with pain with you are in front of the spotted leopard. The friendly hug of a bear is deadly. The weird but merry smile of the hyenas and the weeping crocodiles trap their victims to death.

The poet actually is implying that while seeing wild animals we should take all the precautions. We should not go very close to them as they may attack us and hurt us. We should either go in a protected vehicle or with a guide to watch wild animals from a safe distance.

4. Every wild animal has its own characteristics. The Asiatic Lion, the king of the forest, is found in the jungles of the eastern part of the globe. It is a huge and mighty creature with brownish yellow appearance. Its high decibel roar is enough to terrorise a person to death. The Royal Bengal Tiger is a 'noble' and impressive wild animal. This majestic creature has yellowish skin with black stripes all over its body. The Leopard, known for its agility, pounces upon its prey when it sees the victim, without showing any mercy. Her creativity is not allowed enough room, and as a result, it irritates her to the point where she wants even to be an orphan. Excessive nagging may cause children to become rebellious, and as a result, they may acquire a hatred for reality.
- 2. Rapunzel is a German fairy tale of a young woman who lived alone in a high tower with a witch who claimed to be her foster mother. Rapunzel had long hair, and when the witch tried to climb the tower, she requested that Rapunzel let her long hair fall from the window. Amanda considers her mother's unyielding orders to be too much and boring. She imagines herself as Rapunzel so that she can live happily in complete isolation in her high tower with no one intruding on her privacy. Amanda aspires to be Rapunzel because she aspires to have the same independence as Rapunzel while staying calm within the tower. Amanda wants to be Rapunzel because she knew that in the story, there was no staircase to enter the tower. It was only possible with the help of Rapunzel's long hair that she would let down to help others to climb. Amanda feels that life in the tower will be very calm and nice and also makes it a point to never let her hair down for anyone as she doesn't want to get disturbed by anybody including her parents.

The crux of the poem is the conflict between man and nature. A plant is brought inside a house when it is a sapling but when it grows, it gets suffocated inside the house. If we fathom the depth, we find out that Adrienne Rich supports women's emancipation. The liberation of the crushed women is the need of the hour just like the victorious march of the trees.

(iii)God has created all the animate and inanimate objects of this world with a purpose. We don't have any right to destroy the wonderful creations of God. The poem highlights the importance of trees, without them, there will be no shadow, no forest, no place for birds to sit, and no place for insects to hide. want to mention the departure of the forests as she feels guilty for merely looking silently at them as they depart. This way she subtly points out the cruelty of man towards trees.



One should rather think of it as fog, meaning that it has not come to stay but will always leave, like fog.
- 2. In the poem 'Fog' Carl Sandburg has metaphorically compared the fog to a cat. The first strange thing about the metaphor is the comparison of a phenomenon with a living animal. Perhaps the poet wants to emphasize the silent nature and mysterious ways of the fog, so he has compared the fog to a cat. A cat does not make a sound when it walks. So does the fog, but its presence is apparent. Its 'silence' is very much like that of a cat moving on its little feet. Then the fog stays in its place looking over the harbour and city which creates a hazy atmosphere all around. The way it sits is very much like a cat sitting on its haunches, looking here and there before it makes a move. The comparison of the fog to a cat seems very appropriate because, while reading the poem, one feels vividly, the fog approaching stealthily, just like a cat.

The poet has taken utmost pleasure in nature and natural phenomenon like fog. Fog is so special to the poet that he cared enough not only to write about it, but also thinks of its resemblance with other things in the world.

In his close attention to fog, he found fog resembles a cat, in the way it moves and sits on its haunches. The fact that such a resemblance was found by the poet shows how connected he is to various things in nature. This poem serves as amotivation for people, who take nature for granted to find such interesting comparisons and similarities around them.

- 2. The interpretation of the message in the poem may vary for different readers. The situation narrated underscores a basic truth that the real test of courage is during a crisis. The dragon though never put his strength on display but exhibited it in action when it was required to do so.
- 3. The dragon, Custard, initially commanded no amount of respect from Belinda and the other pets, on account of its cowardice; but when the house was attacked by an armed pirate and all others panicked and ran for shelter, the dragon savagely attacked the pirate and ate it up. - 4. We find "The Tale of Custard the Dragon" both serious and funny. It seems serious to us because poor dragon is criticized and teased by his companions. On the contrary, Custard, the dragon does not offend or resist them. Instead he retreats to a safer place. But later in the poem, he proves his metal by protecting his family members from the Pirate. Moreover, the characters and their names are very funny. They boast about themselves when the dragon kills the pirate instead of appreciating him.

- 1. Although Belinda's pet dragon looked fierce, she thought he was a coward at heart. In comparison, the other pets boasted of their bravery, chasing lions and howling tigers, while the dragon only whined about a safe cage to hide inside. The appearance of the pirate showed the true value of the dragon to other creatures. The dragon responded to the pirate's threats by barking at him, snapping his steel tail, and finally devouring him. After the enemy was defeated, the animals appeared and made lame excuses for not being able to face the pirate. In true warrior spirit, the dragon grandly declared that he was truly a coward, exposing their weakness.
- 2. Custard was really brave and not boastful like Belinda and her other pets. Custard had the courage to face real danger while everyone else was just bragging about their bravery. Custard confronted and killed the pirate, and he proved his bravery by not running away. Courage and bravery are qualities that emerge when a person faces a dangerous situation. These properties are therefore spontaneous, as seen in the example of Custard.

This can be proven through an incident that took place in the poem. When the pirate arrived, all of the pets went into hiding, it was the cowardly dragon, Custard, who came to their aid. In rage, he leapt in front of the pirate, making huge engine-like noises. He moved and made clattering sounds like an iron rod hitting the walls of a dungeon prison. He followed the pirate, making dangerous noises, like a robin following a worm to eat it, thus proving his bravery.

3. Dear Mrs. Ms. Seagull

Thank you for seeking me out. I'm humbled. Based on my limited experiences, I feel that what a person really has can only be proven in extremely difficult times. In my case, Belinda and the other pets didn't think I was a coward, but I wasn't aware of my own bravery either. I only saw Belinda cry out for help when she saw the pirate come in; I knew I had to do it at any cost. So, without thinking, I attacked the pirate with all my strength.

I also believe that if your younger brother finds himself in a situation where he has no choice but to fly, he would definitely step up. He didn't know too much about the courage he had in him, nor did I. But soon he proved himself to everyone.

You need to wait for the day when your brother feels the need to be brave. That day, he will show to himself that he has the courage to face the challenge.

'For Anne Gregory' is one of the arresting poems of eyes written by Irish nationalist Y.B Yeats. It is a conversation between a young man and woman. The speaker says that the common men look her external beauty as she is blessed with great honey-coloured hair that acts as a rampart around her ears. The poet /speaker likes her inward beauty not merely her external beauty. He knows very well that outward beauty may fade away. Anne Gregory says that she can change her hair colour into brown, dark and carrot etc.

The poem conveys that people should not be trapped in materialistic sense rather they must emphasis the human quality and moral values. People should cultivate the practices of perseverance, purity and patience. Those qualities will aid a man from 'zero to hero'.

- 2. In the poem 'For Anne Gregory' the poetic genius W.B. Yeats wants convey the message that inner beauty is real beauty, whereas physical appearance is changeable and hence, unimportant. The poet says that young men fall in love with her by seeing her honey-coloured hair but not what she really is. Anne says that her hair colour can be changed into black, brown and carrot. It means external beauty is all superficial and men should not love her for that. Through Anne's reply, the poet has made clear his preference for internal beauty over physical appearance.
- 3. Physical appearance alone cannot give the true account of a person as he can change it through clothing, make up etc. A person can be judged on the basis of his behaviour, which shows the true characteristics of his personality. This is depicted by Anne in her reply to the first speaker that her beautiful hair colour is changeable, which attracts men. Men and women should not fall in love just looking at the physical appearance. The poet feels that this is an injustice and so he tells Anne to beware of men who love her for her outward appearance only. He tells her that she should value a man who loves her for her inner beauty, even if such a man is hard to come by. We should never judge a book by its cover. Appearance can be deceptive. A person should be judged by inner beauty and not the outer beauty. Outer beauty keeps on changing from to time. All that glitters is not gold. We should see the inner shine of a person rather than looking for outer beauty.

(i) Mrs Pumphrey is a rich lady, who leads an extravagant life and treats her pet with all

the luxuries of life. She loves pampering her dog and, in that spirit, always ended up overfeeding him. She smothered him with love, never denying any of his apparent needs. The advice of the veterinary surgeon, Dr James Herriot about keeping Tricki on a strict diet and to give him proper exercise, seemed to have no influence on her attitude towards her pet. This caused him serious health issues. People like Mrs Pumphrey do not know when to put the foot down on the demands made by their loved ones. In the long run, this behaviour does more harm than good. In Mrs Pumphrey 's case, the fact that Tricki might get hospitalised again might have put the lady on her guard. She might be a little more careful with Tricki's diet and exercise. She would have learnt a proper lesson after Tricki's hospitalization, and another separation from her pet would be quite difficult for her to cope with.

- (ii) At the surgery, Tricki was not given any specific treatment or medications. He was rather put under a strict diet. For the first three days, Tricki was not given any food but plenty of water. Even Tricki did not show any inclination towards food. Later when Tricki showed a slight interest towards food, he was given food like the other dogs at the surgery. Dr Herriot treated him like the others. He made up a bed for him in a warm loose box next to where other dogs slept. Slowly Tricki started joining the other dogs in their friendly scrimmages, playing and running around and enjoying himself thoroughly. This gave him the much-needed exercise. In two weeks', time, Tricki had recovered completely and was transformed into a lithe, hard-muscled animal
- (iii) Based on the lesson 'The Triumph of Surgery' we may state that Dr. Herriot was not entirely wrong in believing that Tricki's problem was greed. Tricki was indeed greedy, but Mrs. Pumphrey only made matters worse by stuffing him with rich food. Tricki's ill-health made him concerned, as a veterinary doctor. Tricki, on the other hand, needed to exercise control on his eating habits. It would have been good if he did not greedily gobble up everything that was placed in front of him. Mrs. Pumphrey herself reveals that Tricki loved cream cakes and chocolates very much. Thus, Tricki ought to have been less gluttonous (excessively greedy) and luxury-loving, and should have behaved more like a dog rather than a spoilt child.
- (iv) Mrs. Pumphrey was an overindulgent mistress and Tricki was a pampered dog. She believed that the reason for Tricki's illness was malnourishment. Since Tricki had become listless lately and seemed to have no energy, she grew worried about him. She started giving some little extras between

meals to build him up, some malt and cod liver oil and a bowl of Horlicks at night to make him sleep. Rather than cutting down on the sweet things, she continued giving him chocolates and cream cakes. Tricki was not even getting proper exercise. Very soon Tricki turned totally sick. He developed an aversion towards food and even his favourite dishes were ignored. Moreover, he had bouts of vomiting. He spent all his time lying on a rug and panting. He did not show any interest in going out for walks or in any other activity. Tricki was very ill and if the situation persisted things could get much worse.







But invisibility helped him in escaping when there was a danger of his being caught and arrested. The first time when his invisibility helped Griffin was when he had set the house of his landlord in London on fire. He had to throw off all his clothes to become invisible and save himself. The second time was when in a big London store, when the employees saw him sleeping in a pile of quilts he panicked. When he was being chased, he threw away all his clothes and saved himself after being invisible. The third time Griffin's invisibility helped him was when he burgled a clergyman's house. He decamped with all the money that was in the clergyman's desk. The fourth time invisible Griffin created a scene when he hit Mrs. Hall with a hat into her face and pushed Mrs. Hall and her husband out of his room by using a chair. 3. When Ebright could not win a prize at the science fair, he learnt that winners do real experiment, they don't simply display slides. Then he started conducting experiments. It was definitely a stepping stone towards his success. His competitive nature, his extra efforts and the will to win for the right reasons made him a successful scientist.

4. The author mentions three qualities that go into the making of a scientist—a first-rate mind, curiosity, and the will to win for the right reasons. Richard Ebright was a very intelligent student. He was also a champion debater, a public speaker, a good canoeist and an expert photographer. He always gave that extra effort. He was competitive, but for the right reasons. From the beginning itself, he had a driving curiosity along with a bright mind, and it was this curiosity that ultimately led him to his theory of cell life.

Hence, he proved a new theory which formed the blue print of DNA. The experiments conducted by Ebright amply show him to be a successful scientist.
- 3 Ebright's' work is directly related to Biology. Discovery of cell's structure has helped the scientific community to understand the way any organism functions and grows. This has helped scientists to discover how disease-causing organisms attack us and grow inside our body. This must have given them an idea to counter a particular disease. DNA fingerprinting is helping police to pinpoint the real culprit. This was not possible when DNA was discovered. Monarch butterflies present an amazing example of a tiny creature migrating thousands of miles from North America to the rainforest of Amazon. Someday we can be in a position to develop as sturdy and reliable navigation system as that of the Monarch butterflies.

Her teacher played an important role in changing her life from Bholi to Sulekha. Consequently, she became a confident, educated girl but nobody noticed any change in her personality because she was no one for her family. She got engaged with a fifty-year-old lame man for which she agreed silently. When her face was unveiled the groom had a close look at her face and noticed her pockmarks. When he demanded five thousand rupees as dowry for marrying such a girl and humiliated her father in front of the people gathered at the function, Bholi at once stood up against it. She refused to marry him. She gave her consent for a mismatched marriage out of love and respect towards her parents but she did not support the dowry system. She called Bishamber a mean, greedy and contemptible coward. She was no more a dumb driven cow. She set an example for the society and became the role model for all the girls.

- 3. Sulekha had been referred to as Bholi as she was a little behind her peer group in her mental attributes, owing to a part of brain being damaged due to a fall when she was ten months old. She had pock-marks and looked ugly. Her speech was faulty and she stammered while speaking and was ridiculed for it. She had no encouragement or support from her parents and consequently she was a timid girl with low self-esteem and totally devoid of confidence. At school, it was with her teacher's encouragement that she regained her confidence and developed courage for herself. The transformation is evident when she refuses to marry Bishamber, who being greedy and selfish commands no respect from her. At the end, she is referred to as Sulekha as a mark of respect for her rejuvenated spirit and confidence. She was determined to become a teacher in the school where she had gained a lot. She deserves the honour for her wisdom and sensibility to support her parents in their old age.
- 4. Dowry is a curse on our society. It has become a monster now. Dowry, no doubt, is a negation of a girl's dignity. Bishamber refused to accept Bholi because of her looks. The moment he saw her face full of pock-marks, he refused to marry her. He did not care for her dignity. But he was ready to marry that ugly girl if her father would give him five thousand rupees as dowry. He was ready to compromise with her looks in exchange for five thousand rupees. It was a sheer negation of Bholi's dignity. Education of girls and women empowerment are the most powerful weapons against this social evil.

Sulekha, who was called as Bholi, undergoes discrimination, humiliation, and miserable moments in her life including ill-treatment at home. Being a disfigured and backward daughter, she is never loved or taken care of even by her mother. She is never given good bath or new clothes. Her elder sister's wrinkled pass on clothes is handed over to her. No one has any expectation of the girl's future.

It is only out of the Tehsildar's compulsion, her father, Ramlal, sends her to a school. Luckily, she gets transformed into an educated and self-independent young girl who can raise her voice against injustice and social menaces. Her teacher guides and motivates her to develop her personality in a positive manner. With her determination and grit, she faces challenges on her way and becomes a brave young girl who can take the decision of standing independently without being victimised by greedy and disrespectful people like Bishamber. She confirms that she is capable of taking care of

her aged parents. Although Sulekha never received the deserved love, care and acceptance from her family, she is ready to reciprocate like all daughters in Indian society.

Bholi's family in particular and the society at large have no faith in the girl's capabilities and hence do not consider it essential to educate her. But Bholi's incidence proves that daughters are capable and responsible in supporting their families same as the men folk and can be the breadwinners, if the family invests in their education.

A significant change in the social attitudes can be brought about by creating awareness and counselling. Mass media such as television is very influential and significant work is already being done to initiate a change in attitude towards the girls. Women in our Indian culture are the 'Ghar ki Lakshmi' and deserve to be honoured.

2. Bholi was a child who did not get proper attention from her parents. Her father sent her to school only due to the order of the Tahsildar. She was considered a burden at home. was sent to school because of her ugly face with smallpox pockmarks and lack of intelligence. Her parents' worried that she had little chance of getting a match. "Let the teachers at school worry about her," said her mother.

Bholi was unwilling to go to school because she thought that she was being sold and turned out of the house like her cow Lakshmi. She felt a little relieved when she got a little care at home and was given clean clothes to wear for the first time. Her visit to school proved a turning point in the life of this neglected girl. Though she sobbed as she thought the other girls were laughing at inabilities, she was consoled by her class teacher. Her teacher worked on her as an artist. She spoke to her lovingly and sweetly in her soft, soothing voice. She consoled and encouraged her to speak without a stammer. She raised in her the hope of a new and respectable life.

Education and the teacher's efforts produced wonderful results. The teacher played a key role in Bholi's life. She made her a confident, bold and self-respecting person. The teacher realised that the frightened girl only needed some tender care and encouragement. Education gave her strength, knowledge and understanding. From a fool, she became an enlightened girl who could stand against inequality and social injustice. If she married Bishamber, the greedy old man, her life would again be miserable. She gained confidence and courage as a result of being an educated person. Behind all those wonderful moments, we can see the proud teacher's lovely face.

3. Sulekha was the fourth daughter of Ramlal. When she was ten months old, she had fallen off the cot on her head and perhaps it had damaged some part of her brain. That was why she remained a

backward child and came to be known as Bholi, the simpleton. At birth, the child was very fair and pretty. But when she was two years old, she had a small-pox attack. Only the eyes were saved, but the entire body was permanently disfigured by deep black pockmarks. Little Sulekha could not speak till she was five, and when at last she learnt to speak, she stammered. The other children often made fun of her and mimicked her. As a result, she talked very little.

Nobody took care of her, loved her or had any expectations from her. Her parents called her a dumb cow and treated her so. The old dresses of her sister were passed on to her. No one cared to mend or wash her clothes. New clothes had never been made for Bholi. No one oiled her hair or tried to teach her anything. 3. D) The mirror is honest about Think-Tank's question of intelligence.

The mirror 'hesitates' while giving the answer to Think Tank's question. It suggests that the mirror did not give an honest reply to Think Tank.

4. Earthlings have tiny heads. Think-Tank believes that the Earthlings are ugly as they have tiny heads. Martians, on the other hand, have big balloon brains which make them more attractive.

SHORT ANSWER QUESTIONS (40-50 WORDS) (3 MARKS)

1. It is a fact that incomplete knowledge can lead to disaster. Suppose we sit to work on a satellite and are able to command only half of the instructions. In that case things would fail and cause disaster. Half knowledge is dangerous and never helps to achieve success. If we are able to apply knowledge fully to any kind of task, we can have self-contentment.

We read in the lesson "The Book That Saved the Earth" that the Martians had to suffer. They had the mission to invade the earth but due to incomplete knowledge they misinterpreted the nursery rhyme book.

- 2. The Martians were very proud of themselves. Great and mighty Think-Thank regarded as the ruler of Mars was always caught in self-praise. He had a quick mind and wished to attack the earth in a great hurry. Martians misinterpreted the signals received from earthlings' book of nursery rhymes and fled away. It was believed — that the books were a sort of communications device. Think-Tank asked the member to decipher the code of the 'sandwiches. The nursery rhymes were totally misinterpreted and it was believed that the Earthlings had developed an advanced civilization and were planning to invade Mars. The mission was called off and the Martians escaped to a remote place to save their lives. Thus, the books saved the earth.

4. Pride comes before a fall. So did Think-Tank falls. Think-Tank, the Commander-In-Chief of the Martians, plans to invade the earth, thinking high of himself and boasting about his power and intelligence. He was very proud of his wisdom, as he had a big balloon-like head. He thought that he was the wisest person on Mars. Nobody could disobey him, or even dare to speak against him. He claimed that he had a quick mind. He had no respect for anyone and regarded other's views as trifling. He was also fickle-minded. He misconstrued the rhymes in a complete verbal manner. The rhyme, 'Mistress Mary, Quite Contrary', made him ponder over the discovery of the earth. From the poem 'Hey Diddle-Diddle', he worried about an interplanetary attack of millions of cows and the poem Humpty-Dumpty, literally frightened him out of his wits that he decided to leave his kingdom and run away to Alpha Centauri. Thus, this great wisdom was defeated and had a great fall.

LONG ANSWER QUESTIONS [100-120 WORDS EACH] 6 MARKS

1. The invaders from Mars considered themselves too intelligent for the Earthlings. They thought they were a superior race than the inhabitants of the earth. As ordered by Think-Tank, the Commander-in- Chief and ruler of Mars who was praised and flattered as the most intelligent and powerful creature in the whole universe, various members from the invaders' team entered a library. They were unable to identify a book. They made several wild guesses. Think-Tank gave ridiculous and fantastic interpretations of books. He called them sandwiches and finally arrived at the conclusion that it must be a communication device for the Earthlings.

They tried to decode what was written in the book. The book was full of nursery rhymes. This book was totally misunderstood by the Martians. Think-Tank misunderstood the phrases like 'shell', 'silver' and 'garden'. They gave him a false idea that Earthlings grew high explosives. The crew of Think-Tank read about Humpty-Dumpty's fall in the rhyme and showed the picture to Think-Tank. As Think-Tank's head resembled Humpty Dumpty's, he felt that the Earthlings were planning to

invade Mars and capture him. So, he cancelled the invasion and returned. Thus, one old book of nursery rhymes saved the Earth from a Martian invasion.

2. The confusion in the mind of Think-Tank occurred due to the literal interpretation of the nursery rhymes in the book 'Mother Goose'. To ensure that conflicts are checked so that peace and harmony are maintained, cultural differences should be sorted out by initially sending mature and wise people from one culture to the other to establish contact before deciding to wage war.

Think-Tank considers the Martians superior to the Earthlings. He calls earth a ridiculous planet which is just a primitive ball of mud, very insignificant. These pre-conceived notions about another entity make this Martian Commander- In-Chief, send an initial probe, in order to invade the planet and put it under his generous rulership. But being foolish and not sufficiently intelligent or mature to understand Earth's culture, they literally interpret the nursery rhymes and plan to flee in order to evade the Earth's invasion of Mars.

3. There is nothing more dangerous than half-baked knowledge. Truth is not skin-deep. And so is knowledge. We have to take a comprehensive view of things. We have to go deep into the details before coming out with sweeping generalisations. Sweeping statements are never good statements. Sometimes misinterpretation of things leads to unavoidable disasters. Think-Tank symbolises how a half-baked mind could have led to an invasion on another planet.

Think-Tank excelled in misinterpreting and misrepresenting things. When they saw books they could not identify what they were. He jumped to one conclusion after the other. He interpreted them as sandwiches. He misinterpreted the words "had a great fall' to his own downfall. He screamed and at once ordered to evacuate the entire Mars immediately. He felt that Mars was being invaded soon. He decided to escape without delay in a space shuttle. He said that they could go a hundred million miles away from Mars.







In 1975, a scientist named Wallace Wally Broecker wrote a paper in which he asked a simple question: Was the Earth getting warmer? When the paper was published, some of Broecker's colleagues laughed at him. Many of them believed that the world was actually cooling.

Historically, there have been periods in which the Earth's temperature has slowly risen and cooled over thousands of years. This is a natural process that can be caused by many factors, including changes in radiation from the Sun, changes in the Earth's orbit and volcanic activity.

However, climate change can also be caused by changes in the amount of certain gases in the atmosphere. Broecker had noticed that the amount of carbon dioxide - a colourless, odourless gas—was slowly building up. While some carbon dioxide is produced through natural processes, large quantities of it are also produced by humans. Carbon dioxide is generated in especially large amounts when we burn fossil fuels, such as oil, coal and natural gas. This burning happens when we drive cars, use electricity and make certain products. When released into the atmosphere, carbon dioxide traps heat. Broecker reasoned that if people produced a lot of carbon dioxide, then enough heat would be trapped that the Earth would begin to warm. He called this "global warming".

Several decades later, many climate scientists agree with Broecker: The Earth is heating up and humans are largely responsible. This warming process is often referred to as 'climate change'. More carbon dioxide is being produced than ever before. Every year, humans produce about 8 million

metric tons of carbon. 2012 was the hottest year in recorded history. Recently, scientists estimated that more carbon dioxide exists in the atmosphere than has in over three million years.

While scientists understand how climate change works, some of its effects are still difficult to predict. Some scientists expect an increase in the so-called "extreme weather" events, such as hurricanes and floods. Others foresee a rise in levels of sea water. While exactly what changes will happen are unclear, Broecker has warned that people should be prepared for some large disturbances. In an interview with the Guardian, a British newspaper, in 2008, he compared the Earth's climate to a wild animal. Sometimes, when provoked, the animal will react violently and unpredictably.

"If you're living with an angry beast, you shouldn't poke it with a sharp stick," he said. Why are scientists able to understand some phenomena, like climate change, in a general way, but aren't able to predict the changes they will have on Earth? Part of the reason is because many large Earth systems involve "feedback loops" – processes that help amplify (positive feedback loops) or diminish (negative feedback loops) certain changes. Feedback loops can occur in the climate system too. If the temperature of the Earth rises, it can change the environment so that it produces even more heat.

There are a number of different ways in which this phenomenon occurs. Scientists who work in the Arctic, at the northern end of the Earth, have been reporting that, every year, more and more floating sea ice melts. In the last 30 years, more than one-third of the ice that appears in the Arctic during the summer has melted away.

This worries scientists because Arctic ice plays an important role in cooling the Earth – although not in the way you might think. While we add ice to our drinks to make them colder, Arctic sea ice cools the Earth in a different way. Ice, which is white coloured, reflects light. This means that much of the sunlight that hits ice boundaries off and is sent right back to space. Reflecting the light away helps keep the Earth cool.

However, as the Earth heats up, ice begins to melt. As ice melts, this reveals more of the darker-coloured land or ocean water, which doesn't reflect heat, but absorbs it. So, less light is reflected back into space, causing the climate's temperature to increase. As the world gets hotter, this causes the ice to melt even faster. This increase in temperature causes still more ice to melt, which causes the world to get hotter etc. This is an example of a positive feedback loop, in which heat produces more heat.




